pleased that this book will be published soon.





As you walk around the hamlet of Maine certain vestiges from the "good ole days" jump out at you. Houses did not have electricity until after 1922, prior to then all homes had outhouses. The center photo shows the back of 37 Lewis st. where an attached outhouse was used until 1946 when a bathroom was added to the home. Where else can you "find" outhouses in the hamlet of Maine? Let Phil know!

"The first "bathrooms" came about during the Renaissance. Although the flush toilet was invented in 1596 by Sir John Harrington, it turned out to be an idea before its time and didn't catch on. In the American Colo-





It takes a village to repair a Pagoda. 1973 seems like a long ago; Clarence Ames and friends has just completed the Pagoda for the 125th year Maine Celebration. The town ran a competition for a town seal and 17 year old Douglas Guiles came up with the winning design based on the Pagoda.

In two years the town will celebrate its 175th anniversary. The NVHS asked permission from the town to make needed repairs to the Pagoda and we asked the community for support. The community response was excellent and monetary donations exceeded seven thousand dollars. This amount means that the Pagoda will be maintained for many years to come. Plans are in the works for new lighting and new landscaping. The Pagoda and the land around it were given to the town by Lil Ames a few years back and it is now a small town park.



### Diphtheria

A toxoid clinic will be held thia morning in the office of

Dr J. Edward Grant In Northville all children from the ages of six months to ten years will be inoculated without charge. Dr. Grant will have charge of the clinic assisted by Miss Carrie Del Torto, public health nurse The clinic is part of the special health program being carried out in the Township in an effort to eliminate diphtheria.



Before the introduction of vaccines, diphtheria was a leading cause of childhood death around the world, including in the United States. Due to the success of the U.S. immunization program, diphtheria is now nearly unheard of in the United States


### Small Pox

### The 1947 New York City smallpox out-

break occurred in March 1947 and was declared ended on April 24, 1947. The outbreak marked two milestones for America. First, it was the largest mass vaccination effort ever conducted for smallpox in America, and second, it marked the last outbreak of smallpox in America. Within three weeks of the discovery of the outbreak, the U.S. Public Health Service, in conjunction with New York City health officials, had procured the smallpox vaccine and inoculated over 6,350,000 adults and children. Of that number, 5,000,000 had been vaccinated within the first two weeks. The rapid response was credited with limiting the outbreak to 12 people, 10 of whom recovered, while 2 died

Pitcher's Mills sits at stream level and within 100 feet of Nanticoke creek and therewith is the problem. Numerous times in the last 190 years the creek has risen, swirling around the mill and filling the lower level. December 24, 2020 was the latest time that this happened. The photo to the right shows what the creek did as it left ice left behind and knocked the sliding door off its track. The lower area also sustained damage to one of its supporting walls on the southwest side next to the race and below the building. We have to support this wall beneath it as the ground was washed away during this flood stage. As you can imagine how difficult it will be to do this work beneath the building. We have a plan and a group of individuals who will provide the labor and expertise. In the meanwhile, due to caution, we had not opened the mill to visitors. We will keep you posted on our work to repair this treasured landmark. Ca 1830 built by the Slosson brothers.
