HOW THIS CAME ABOUT!

Two years ago while chatting with a neighbor Keith, who I have know for many years, he mentioned that his great Grandfather was a soldier in the Civil War and that he had lived in Union Center. I got a few details such as his name Milton Bostwick, and his relation to him, his moms fathers father. I casually spent some time on the internet and checking our local history books. I presented my finding to Keith who then added a lot more including another cousin Ted Warner who was related via Milton's daughter Louise a sister of Charles, Keith's grandfather.

I had run into the Bostwick family name while researching other presentations. Specifically the Dudley family when I was looking through the photo album of Myra Dudley whose aunt Martha had married Leroy Bostwick. Leroy was shown as the owner of the pharmacy in the book by Sue Lisk "Maine and the Nanticoke Valley." A google search of the Bostwick family provided many leads with the history highlighted in the book "Genealogy of the Bostwick family in America." Specifically Milton was a direct descendant of Arthur who arrived in Connecticut in 1639. Many other Bostwicks arrived in North America and much of their history is documented on the internet. Besides the primary sources of Keith Singer and Ted Warner, Shirley Woodward had developed information cards of this family (found in the NVHS archives). I used *Find a Grave* website which is very helpful in tracing families through the generations. The 1855, 1866, 1876 and 1908 Plat books of Broome County provided maps with owners names on the property which assisted in searches for the family of Maine and Union Center. Revisits with Keith and Ted filled in many personal tidbits which helped me appreciate this fabulous family. Phil

THIS IS HOW THIS FAMILY BEGAN ITS HISTORY IN AMERICA.

Arthur Bostwick was 37 years old when he traveled to Stratford Connecticut in 1639. He was baptized in Cheshire county, England Dec 22, 1603, and married his first wife Jane Whittel January 8, 1627. Their children were: Mary 1629, Jane 1631, Ellen 1633, Arthur 1636, and John 1638. His wife died before the family left England and he married Ellen Johnson, a widow, when he was in America. He was a Puritan who left England seeking religious freedom. Arthur was one of the first 17 settlers in Stratford Conn and had his lot registered in 1639. He also has been traced to Southampton, Long Island with land holdings in 1643. His second wife Ellen died 5.13.1677 in Stratford Conn. And his son John inherited Arthur's estate when Arthur died December 10, 1680. The genealogy of the Arthur Bostwick family was published in 1901 in a book authored by Henry Anthron Bostwick which traced the family up until 1901. The Bostwick family name is found throughout the world and many other family branches are traced to others who traveled to the shores of many countries. The earliest origins of the Bostwick family is traced to Robert De Brostick of England in 1522 with its family motto *Semper Presto Servire (Always Ready to Serve)*.

“**Stratford** was founded in 1639 by Puritan leader Reverend Adam Blakeman, William Beardsley, and either 16 families (according to legend) or approximately 35 families (suggested by later research) who had recently arrived in **Connecticut** from England seeking religious freedom.”

Stratford: 375 years old, 1639 - 2014

Rev. Adam Blakeman (born in 1598), clergyman, emigrated to New England because he could not, in conscience, live with the orders of King Charles I and Archbishop Laud. Blakeman became a convert to the Puritan principles of Thomas Hooker.

When he and some of his parishioners arrived at Massachusetts Bay, much of the land was already taken up. Blakeman and his followers followed Thomas Hooker to Connecticut where, at Wethersfield it was found that the best farmlands had been taken by the first arrivals..They settled there but decided to move farther on to new and better lands at the first opportunity.

Early in 1639, Blakeman's group moved on southward toward the shoreline of Long Island Sound. As soon as the weather allowed, the main group set out overland with cattle, sheep and hogs while boats were left at Wethersfield laden with heavy household goods and stores, and with the old and infirm. Forging the Housatonic River near Oronoque, where the Paugussett Indians had a fort where their trail crossed the river, and where the depth at low tide was only a few feet, they came south along the river's edge until they found their vessels moored snugly in the little inlet later called Mac's Harbor (now on/at Elm St.). Here they erected the meetinghouse and built English-style wigwams and temporary sod homes. Tradition says that on a spring day in 1639 Rev. Adam Blakeman and his small group of Englishmen knelt to pray on the banks of a little cove near the mouth of the Housatonic River and agreed that this was the place they sought. They had traveled over five thousand miles to reach this spot. The shores of this sheltered inlet..Cupheag, as the Indian named Okenuck called it.. would be their home. After years of searching for the freedom to worship their God in their own way, this was to be their Paradise.


In the beginning, in 1639, Reverend Adam Blakeman prayed to God that this new plantation would be a Paradise on earth.





1855 Maps of Broome County





1876 Map of Union Center Area Showing D. Bostwick Farm Property (1463 Route 26) see next slide for modern photos of homes.




1457 Union Center Maine Highway (NYS 26) 1463



Charles was born at the family farm located today at 1463 Route 26. The 1876 plat book map shows Daniel Bostwick as the owner. Milton and Julia L. married in 1866. Keith was told that Milton and Julia L. first lived on Bradley Creek road before they moved here. It is probably the same home shown in slide 58. Their children were born here and the home remained with Julia L. until she died in 1926.

Some time after Milton's death in 1915 Julia sold Charles land from the farm where he built the home at 1457 Route 26. Charles shared the home with Roberta's family later and he was living with them at Washingtonian Hall when he died in 1974.

Milton Bostwick enlisted In Company H of the 168th Regiment of New York Volunteers, on the 18th day of September, 1862. From this service he was honorably discharged October 31, 1863. He reenlisted in the 16th New York Battery, August 1, 1864, and served till the close of the war, his discharge papers being dated July 6, 1886. Served in 16th LA Reg. NY Mustered Out at Elmira, NY on 06 July 1865

- Broome Counties population during the Civil War was approximately 40,000. 4,000 soldiers enlisted from Broome during the war.
- The town of Maine furnished 190 men, nearly 100 of whom belonged to the 50th engineers. Of this number fifteen were killed. The towns population was about 1,800. About 11 % of the population served from Maine, NY.

OBITUARY MILTON

"Milton Bostwick aged 74 years a long time resident of Union Center NY, died Friday night, October 15, 1915, at nine o'clock, while on a brief visit at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Huntley, 38 Main street, Johnson City, N. Y. He was taken suddenly ill and passed away a few hours afterwards. His body was removed by Oliver Bros., undertakers of Union, N. Y., to the family residence where the funeral was held Monday afternoon at two o'clock, Rev. Mr. Hawley, pastor of the Congregational church of Union Center officiating Mrs. M. L. Pitkin, Mrs. Wyman Edison and Messrs. A. J. and A. L. Oliver sang appropriate selections. Members of the G. A. R. bore the body to its last resting place in the cemetery at Union Center and conducted the service at the grave.

Mr. Bostwick enlisted in Company H of the 168th Regiment of New York Volunteers, on the 18th day of September, 1862. From this service he was honorably discharged October 31, 1863. He reenlisted in the 16th New York Battery, August 1, 1864, and served till the close of the war, his discharge papers being dated July 6, 1886. The folds of an American flag draped about the casket and a profusion of flowers were tributes of love and respect from comrades, relatives and friends. Had he lived one day longer he would have celebrated the 49th anniversary of his wedding day.

On October 16, 1866 he married Julia Andrews Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Frederick and **Charles both of Union Center**; two daughters, Mrs. J. W. Dunn of Bridgeport, Conn., Mrs. Harry Howard of Endicott; **brother Mr. LeRoy** Bostwick of Maine NY; eight grandchildren; and one great grandchild.

If we had not any money with us we would suffer but the most of us here got money & we get the most of our victuals at the Sutters & Eating _____. But I wish I could be home long enough to take a good ride & have something good to eat. But do not think I am homesick for I am not. I feel as gay as a Peacock & full of fun. There is someone playing the Violin In the Camp & it makes me think of the Party at John Smiths. Is Leroy Smith home now & how does he & Ophelia get along? Are they going to be Married? If they are married before I get back I shall give them _____
_____ Columba. Well I cant think of any more to write tonight so - I will wait till tomorrow. Good night with a kiss.

Good morning friend Julia. I cant help think where I was 2 weeks ago last night & this morning. 2 weeks ago last night I were with yourself & I was very happy & 2 weeks ago this morning I was home. I am in a hurry to get to Petersburg so to see Leroy for I want to see him more than any one else now for it is most 2 years since I have seen him. I am less than 10 miles from him & I don't suppose he knows I am within 500 miles of him. Julia I want you to have your Photographs taken & send me one for I want to see you very much. Have Adda send hers to you. Don't know how much good it would do me. Have you got my Photographs from Owego yet? I left one for you. I went to my Brothers & left all the names & told him to send them. I cant think of any more so I will close.



Endicott, NOV. 17 Eugene M. Andrews, prominent resident of Endicott and Union Center during most of his life time, died at 1 o'clock this morning at his home at 32 Roosevelt avenue. He was 87. Mr. Andrews was one of the organizers and the first president of the then Farmers National Bank of Union, heading that financial institution for 20 years. He was prominent in Democratic political circles and served for six years, as postmaster of Endicott in the Wilson administration, resigning because of ill health. 

Living in what may be the oldest house in Broome County has both rewards and disadvantages.

Mr. and Mrs. Dorse L. Singer know. For four years they have lived at 3725 River Road in Endwell, a stately mansion described in Broome County's "Historical Architecture" publication as the oldest large home and possibly the oldest building in the county.

The Singers have furnished most of the home with antiques. "It's furnished through and through with antiques . . . but we'll never be able to furnish it the way it should be," Mrs. Singer said.

"We're always working on the house," she said. They've painted the house twice but say more work needs to be done. The house may be drafty in the winter, even with central heating, but it's cool in the summer.

The house's 14 rooms are spacious enough to accommodate the large Singer fami-

ly. In addition to Mr. Singer, a carpenter, and his wife, the house is shared by four of their seven children and Mrs. Singer's father, Charles Bostwick. A married daughter, Melody Franchini, lives with her husband in the carriage house across the street.

The mansion was built in 1799 by Amos Patterson, one of the first settlers in the Town of Union. Historians disagree on the origin of its name, Washingtonian Hall.

According to the county architecture pamphlet, the name probably comes from the Washingtonian Movement of the 1840s, a temperance group that met in the building. But according to a 1918 issue of the Record, a Johnson City, Endicott and Union weekly newspaper, the hall was named in honor of the death of George Washington.

The house was completely remodeled in 1925 by its owner of the time, Judge Thomas MacClary.

"All the wooden pegs were replaced by nails," Mrs. Singer said. "Before that there wasn't a nail in the house." Judge MacClary also rebuilt the floors and probably added a portico, a summer house and a sun room.

"I'd like to see this place a museum," Mrs. Singer said. "There's quite a bit of history here. Evidently it's not enough or it couldn't be proven."

She said there was a movement to make the home into a museum before her family bought the property. James E. Fiori, Town of Union historian, said age alone is not enough to make the house a historical monument. He said no significant historical happenings have been linked to the house.

The house belonged to the Patterson family until 1830, when it was sold to John Sayre, whose family kept it through the early 20th Century. The house was used as an inn in the 1840s, according to county pamphlets. (The Record, how-

ever, says Washingtonian Hall has always been a residence.)

Mrs. Singer pointed to wide, old chestnut trees that grace the grounds. Amos Patterson, the original owner, produced Patterson sweet apples from grafts to apple trees he planted on the land, according to the Record.

The original plot owned by Patterson was 50 square miles that he purchased from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. His tract extended over Broome and Tioga counties, the Record says.

Now the land is down to several acres. "We lost our backyard to the new Route 17," Mrs. Singer said. The property includes a carriage house and a barn across the road.

The house has a few modern touches — like a large swimming pool on the side lawn — but it has kept the long, curving driveway, stately white pillars, and high ceilings of the old days.

Self-Taught Artist Bostwick Dead at 90

He was a self-taught artist who called himself an "unfinished painter," and although he produced many works in his leisure, fishing was his favorite hobby.

Charles R. Bostwick, 90, of Endwell, who preferred talking about fishing to discussing painting, died Monday at 2:30 a.m. at Wilson Memorial Hospital.

Funeral services will be held today at the Allen Memorial Home, 511-513 E. Main St., Endicott. Burial will be in the Nanticoke Valley Cemetery, Union Center.

Despite the varied interests, Bostwick began "picture painting" 65 years ago, and at one time in his life was employed as a commercial artist. During the first quarter of the century, he worked briefly in the advertising department of Endicott Johnson, where he painted Indian heads on pieces of leather for the workmen.

Bostwick was born and

raised on a farm in West Corners and as a youth began working as a carpenter. He changed his craft and became a painting and decorating contractor for private homes in the area.

Bostwick also made reproductions of antique furniture for his own use and even made five violins.

In a Press feature from last year, Bostwick said he never completes a picture and could always see some kind of change. Despite Bostwick's claim of their "unfinished nature," some of his recent oil paintings and sketches were on display in May at the Willow Point Nursing Home, 3700 Old Vestal Road, Vestal.

Most of his paintings were of rural scenes.

Bostwick lived with his daughter, Mrs. Dorse Singer, at 3725 River Road, Endwell. He is survived by seven grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.





THE FAMILY IN AMERICA.

1. **Arthur Bostwick**, (Bostock), the emigrant ancestor of the family, was baptized in Tarporley, in Cheshire County, England, Dec. 22, 1603.

Tarporley is a parish in the first division of the parish of Eddisbury and Nantwich Union. The market town of Tarporley being about 173 miles northwest from London, 10 miles east by south of Chester, 12 miles west-southwest from Middlewich, and is now situated two miles from the Beeston station on the London and Northwestern Rail Road.

*The dates of Arthur Bostock's departure from England and arrival in the New World have not, as yet, been ascertained. Searches have been made, which have covered all the available lists of passengers who came on the sailing ships of the time, but his name has not been found among them. This is a frequent occurrence, when emigrants wished to leave no record of their destination or whereabouts after fleeing from home.

There is also no positive knowledge of his first place of settlement in this country, but Samuel B. Orcutt, in his "History of Stratford, Ct.," names him as one of the first seventeen settlers in that town. He also gives a map of the town of Stratford, which was prepared from a careful study of the land records of the town, as laid out in 1639, and he shows Arthur Bostwick as occupying one of the original town lots or "home lottes", as they were called. Unfortunately the town records of Stratford were burned while being kept in one of the settlers' houses, and the book containing the records from 1639 to 1648 was destroyed. The record of events occurring during these years was re-written from memory, in about 1649, and much valuable information was omitted.

On the list of owners of land in "Ye Oulde Fielde", in Stratford, appears the name of Arthur Bosticke, as occupying "6 rods and 9 fecte".

*Arthur Bostock's first wife was probably a daughter of Rev. Robert Whittel, rector of St. Helen's Church, in Tarporley, from 1613-1638. He was a pronounced Puritan and died in 1639.

At this time the persecution of the Puritans by Archbishop Laud was in full force, and no doubt this was the cause of Arthur Bostock's leaving England to seek, in the New World, that religious freedom which was denied to him at home.

This list was made out prior to 1651. The "Seconde Common Fielde" was laid out prior to the year 1648, since there is an extant deed of that date, showing that one Robert Rice owned land in it.

The "oulde fielde" was filled up long before this, and it was because the land in this field was all occupied, that the second field was laid out.

Arthur Bostick, or Bosticke, owned land in the "oulde fielde" as is shown by the land records, and the location of his "home lotte" shows that he was one of the first settlers in the town of Stratford, Ct., which was settled in 1639.

Now going over to Long Island, it is found that Arthur Bostock was, at one time, a resident of the town of Southampton, for the early records of that town disclose the following extracts :

May 29, 1643.

"Yt was ordered by ye General Court yt Richard Barrett, John Mulford, Arthur Bostock, Thomas Tomson and Robert Bond, shall each of them have twe acres of Land divided vnto themselves upon ye playne, * * * * * and Arthur Bostock's two acres to lye against Robert Bond's west and against Mr. Gosmer's eight acre Lott north."

March 7, 1644.

"Yt is ordered by ye present Court that yf by ye Prouidence of God there shall be henceforth within ye bounds of ys plantation, any whale or whales cast up, ffor the preuention of disorder yt is consented unto that there shall be foure wards in this towne, eleven persons in each ward, and by lott two of each ward, if any such whales shall be cast up, shall be employed for the cutting out of the sayd whales, who for their paynes shall have a double portion.

And every inhabitant, with his child or servant that is above sixteene years of age, shal have, in the diuision of the other part, an equal proportion, provided that such person, when yt falls into his ward, be a suffycient man to be employed about yt. And it is further agreed that there shall be in each ward eleven persons, * * * * * and the ones for the third ward Richard Gosmer, Arthur Bostock, Henry Pierson," &c., &c.

May 6, 1645.

"Whereas, Iosiah Stanborough, Richard Barrett, Arthur Bostock were appointed to laye out the eight and ten acre lotts upon ye great playne."

Arthur Bostock was married in St. Helen's Parish Church, in Tarporley, England, on January, 8, 1644, to Jane Whittel.

It is not known whether this wife came to America with him or not, but as there is no mention of her whatever, on any of the town records, she probably died in England. He married, as his second wife, Ellen Johnson, a widow, as appears from a synopsis of her will on the Stratford records, in which she mentions her son, ——— John-son, then living in New Jersey.

It is possible that Arthur Bostock resided in New Jersey before coming to Stratford, and may have married her there, but the only foundation for such a supposition is the extract from Ellen's will.

Arthur Bostock had but one son, John, that there is any record of in Stratford. He had other children, born in England, as is shown by the records of St. Helen's Parish Church, at Tarporley, and undoubtedly some of them were brought to America with him, as he mentions his "other children", in the agreement between himself and his wife, but he does not mention their names.

About the year 1658, he appears to have had a controversy with his wife Ellen, in relation to their property, but there are no means of determining the exact nature of or the grounds for the difficulty.

The "Colonial Records of Connecticut," Vol. I, page 336 say: "That at the General Court of election in Hartford, May 20, 1659, the court ordered the Secretary to send an attachment to be served upon the estate of Arthur Bostock".

And, Oct. 6. 1659, (page 340):

"This court, having considered the petition in Behalf of Arthur Bostock, and what hath been presented in behalf of his wife, according to ye desire and proposition of ye said Arthur, have appointed Mr. Blackman, Goodman Beardsley, Mr. Fairchild and Joseph Judson, as a committee to consider the state and condition of said Bostock and his wife and to order what they think suitable therein, and in case Bostock be dissatisfied with their act, then he is required to appear at ye next session of this court, to render the reason of his dissatisfaction with the act of the aforesaid committee. And the committee to make return at ye next session what their determination is about the premises. But in case Bostock rest satisfied with what is done by the committee, this court doth free the attachment that was formerly laid on the estate of ye said Bostock".

It is evident that a satisfactory arrangement was made, for on May 17, 1660, (page 351), it appears that "This court doth confirm and

y^e spring, a very narrow white streak on y^e face reaching down to y^e nostrills and a little star in y^e forehead, branded & ear markt like y^e above".

The exact date of Arthur Bostwick's death is not known, but he undoubtedly was living on December 10th, 1680, when at a town meeting, a division of land was made, and lot 77 was laid off to him. Ellen, his wife, died before this time and the following is found upon the records of Fairfield, Conn., which was the probate district of Stratford:

"An inventory taken by Thomas Tomlinson, of Stratford, of the estate of Ellen Bostock, the wife of Arthur Bostock, deceased y^e 13th of May, 1677."

There is no record of Arthur's having any children by his wife Ellen. His son John was by his first wife. Arthur, Ellen, and his children were undoubtedly buried at Stratford, but time has obliterated all marks which served to denote their last resting places.

6. John Bostwick^s, son of Arthur and Jane (Whittel) Bostwick, was baptized in St. Helen's Church, Tarporley, Cheshire County, England, Oct. 18, 1638.

He died in Stratford, Ct., prior to Dec. 11th, 1688, on which date a settlement of his estate was petitioned for by his widow.

He married, in Stratford, Ct., about 1665, Mary, daughter of John and Mary (Carter) Brinsmead.

She was born in Charlestown, Mass., July 24, 1640, and died in Stratford, Ct., before Dec. 28, 1704, on which date the inventory of her estate was taken by her son Zachariah, as found on the Fairfield, Ct., records, (Book 2, p. 34). After the death of John, she married John Reed.

John Bostwick received from his father his entire estate, as noted in the agreement dated March 25th, 1674. He also acquired more land from the subsequent divisions of the town lands.

On Feb. 5, 1674, in the list of "lots drawn for y^e swamp division," he was given lot 58.

In a list of "lots drawn Dec. 6, 1672," he received lot 79 in meadow 9.

At a town meeting held Dec. 26, 1674, he drew lot 32, in a piece of land "formerly owned by the Indians".

In the new pasture field he had "6 rods of land".

On Dec. 10, 1680, at a division of land, "lott 87 was layd off to John Bostick," also, "John Bostick, of two miles division, hath twelve acres of land lying in y^e new pasture, bee it more or less, bounded east wth y^e land of Samuel Galpin, south wth y^e land of Timothy Wilcoxson, west wth y^e highway, north wth y^e common land or highway, by verball information from y^e surveyors y^e layd it out & recorded in their presence, this 10th day of Mch. 1682".

He did not keep his land inheritance intact, but disposed of several parcels of it, as is shown by the following :

"Mr. Joseph Hawley, by way of purchase from John Bostick, hath one acre & halfe & 16 rods of swamp land, bee it more or less, bounded north wth y^e land of henery Weeklin, south upon John Wells, east wth another range of lotts, west wth a highway, for y^e further confirmation the granter hath subscribed this 20th of September, 1678."

John Bostick, y^e 20th Mch. ib. 1644, hath a dunish mouse coloured mare, five yeares old this spring, wth a meally nose, brownish maine & tayle.

"At a court of sessions held in Fairfield, for y^e county of Fairfield, on y^e second Tuesday in December, in y^e 4th year of his Majestic's reign, & annoque Dom. 1688; That Mary Bostick, y^e relict of y^e decd John Bostick, of Stratford, y^e presented herself at y^e court, for a settlement of her Dec^d husband's estate, but produced no inventory, y^e court considering y^e same, do ordain that y^e said Mary Bostick, wth y^e advise of Mr. Joseph Hawley & Israel Chauncey to take y^e estate into her hands & take care to preserve it and paying and receiving all just debts due to and from y^e estate, until y^e next court of Quarter Session to be held in Fairfield, and then to bring an inventory'.

"An inventory of y^e estate of John Bostick, of Stratford, Dec^d, made y^e 30th day of November 1689'.

Minor, halfe y^e lotment in y^e new pastures, halfe y^e lotment lying in y^e new field west side of Well's bridge, swamp division purchased of Mr. Grey, and Thomas Fairchild, halfe y^e meadow in y^e great meadow & y^e common meadow, halfe y^e pasture in y^e new division, y^e whole being six acres, halfe of Bear Swamp division & y^e land upon y^e long hill & this is in full of John Bostick's portion out of y^e lands of his father, deceased, set out to him by his mother & is subscribed Dec. 10, 1690.

John Bostwick removed from Stratford, and went to Derby, Ct., where he remained but a short time.

In 1707, probably in the Autumn, he went to New Milford, Ct., where he was the second settler in the town. His first deed of land is dated Dec. 2, 1707, and speaks of him as "late of Derby".

Certain regulations were established in regard to the division of land among the settlers. In accordance with these rules, the "Town Plat," consisting of a "Town street" and sixteen "home lots," was laid out on Aspetuck Hill, (New Milford, Ct.).

These "home lots" were twenty one rods wide and sixty rods long, and were to be taken up in regular order as the settlers came to reside in the town, and John Noble took No. 1, on the east side of the street "at the south end of the hill".

John Bostick took No. 2, the first lot on the west side of the street.

And further, I, y^e s^d Sam^l Camp, Sen^r do for me, my Heirs, Exe^{rs}, Ad^{ms} and assigns covenant to and with y^e sd John Bostick, his heirs and assigns, that he, y^e sd John Bostick, his heirs and assigns, shall quietly and peacefully have, hold, use, occupy and enjoy, all and singular, y^e above sd right without any molestation from me my Heirs, Exe^{rs}, Ad^{ms} or Assigns or any other person or persons whatsoever, that shall lay any legal claim thereunto or any part thereof.

John Bostwick was an energetic citizen and bore his full share of work for the new plantation and town, and the town records show that he was elected to fill many offices within the gift of his fellow townsmen.

The following are a few extracts.

"On Dec. 30, 1714, In Town meeting were chosen John Bostwick, Sen. and Samuel Brownson, to agree with Mr. Boardman what shall be his wages for half a years work"

"Dec. 11-1721, y^e town, by vote, granted to John Bostwick, Sen', y^e liberty and privilege of y^e highway across Aspetuck River, at y^e lower end of Mount Tom meadow, in case he erect a good grist mill sufficient for to grind y^e town's corn well and seasonably, within one year after y^e time and maintain y^e same in good and sufficient repair, both he and his heirs after him."

It is not known whether he ever built the mill or not.

"Dec. 11-1721. It was agreed that a commity be chosen to hire a school teacher and the Commity chosen are John Bostwick, Sen', William Gaylord, and Stephen Noble and they are empowered to do their work".

"John Bostwick's, Sen' ear mark for neat cattle, sheep and swine, is a half penny on the fore side of the neare ear and a slit on y^e top of y^e same ear".





A Sudden Death.

At 7 o'clock this morning the family of Mr. John W. Bostwick residing in the Churchill block were shocked to find him dead in his bed. He had apparently been dead for two or three hours. Mr. Bostwick had been suffering for some time from kidney troubles but was apparently better yesterday, going even so far as to go out and down town for a short walk. Coroner W. J. Moore took charge of the body this morning and ordered a post mortem. Drs. J. W. Hughes and H. T. Dana made the examination and found that the deceased came to his death through a cystic enlargement of the kidneys.



Yet Her Death Was Announced in Three Churches and in the School She Attended.

A Cortland dispatch says: On Friday afternoon last Mrs. **Sarah D. Bostwick** died of malignant diphtheria. The day before she died her elder daughter, Carrie, was taken ill with the same disease. On Saturday night it was reported that Carrie had died and that her sister was at the point of death, but no one cared to go to the Bostwick home to verify the report. In three churches Sunday morning the death of Carrie was announced, and prayers were offered for her sick sister. The girls were students at the state normal school here, and Sunday morning during the services in the chapel, Dr. Cheney told the students of Carrie's death, and in glowing terms eulogized her life. He also spoke of the serious illness of the younger sister. Monday afternoon a reporter visited the home of the Bostwicks and was received by the younger sister. She is not ill, nor has she been. Her sister, she said, was not seriously ill, but in a fair way to recovery. This afternoon Dr. Cheney informed the normal school students of his mistake.



“Mr. Bostwick enlisted In Company H of the 168th Regiment of New York Volunteers, on the 18th day of September, 1862. From this service he was honorably discharged October 31, 1863. He reenlisted in the 16th New York Battery, August 1, 1864, and served till the close of the war, his discharge papers being dated July 6, 1886. The folds of an American flag draped about the casket and a profusion of flowers were tributes of love and respect from comrades, relatives and friends. Had he lived one day longer he would have celebrated the 49th anniversary of his wedding day.”


