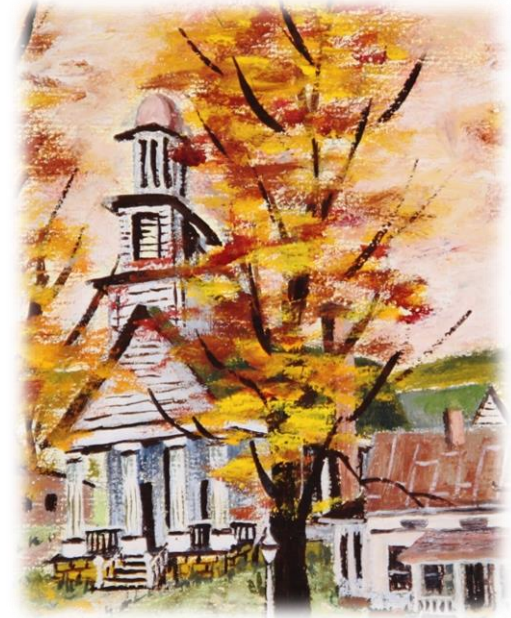

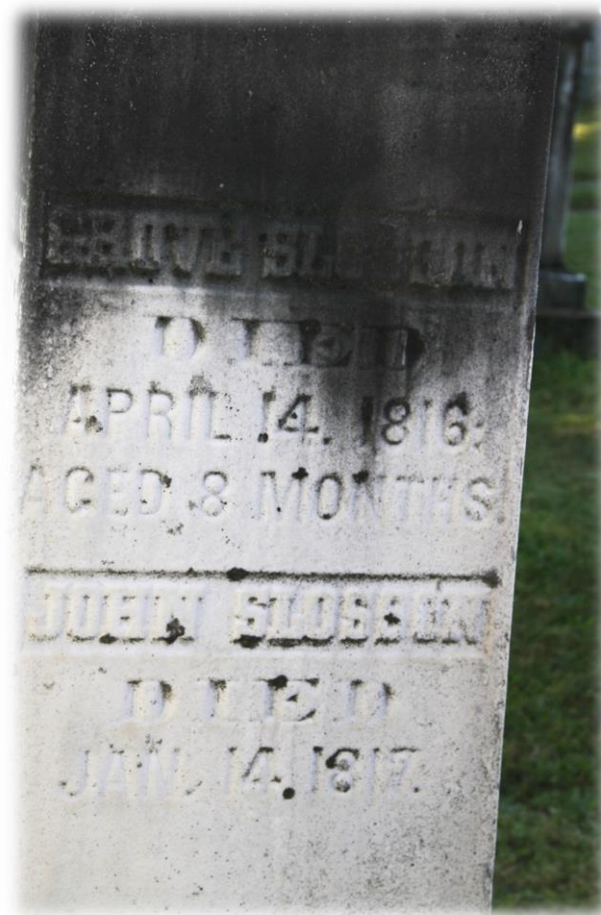
Maine Cemetery



One mile to the south of the village of Maine, N. Y., lies a continuation of a lot once owned by the Congregational Church Society of Maine and where their first church was erected. As was the practice in those by-gone days, burial of the dead was made in the church lot.

The first burial on this plot was that of the remains of Grove Slausson, on April 14, 1816, and from that time the graves were opened by the public without order or regulation until March 17, 1896, when the lot was deeded to the Maine Cemetery Corporation which had purchased land adjoining.

The new plot was laid out with walks and driveways and the lots numbered and sold and deeds given. Under the supervision of T. T. Lawton a system has been inaugurated which provides the community with a beautiful place of burial for the dead.



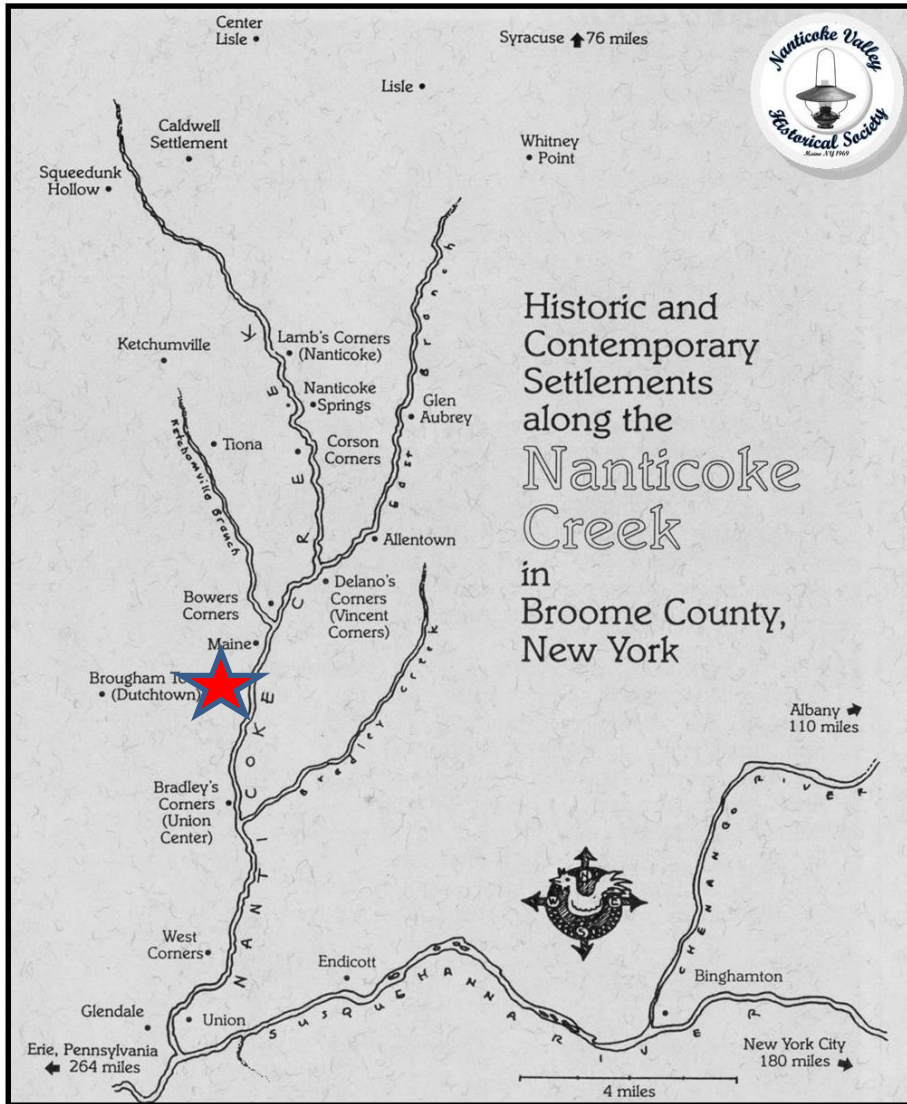

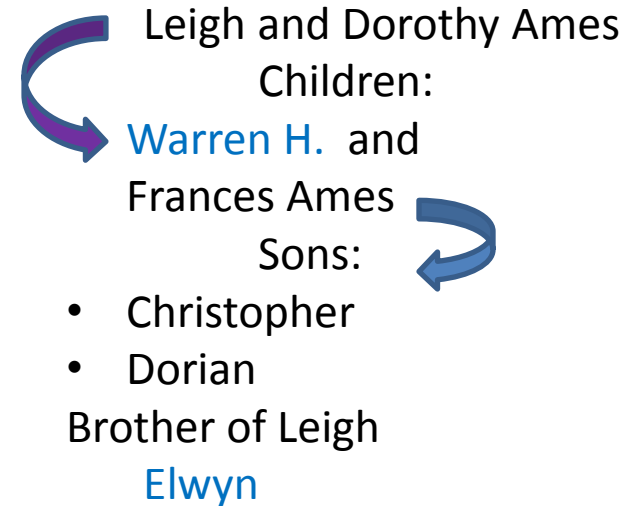
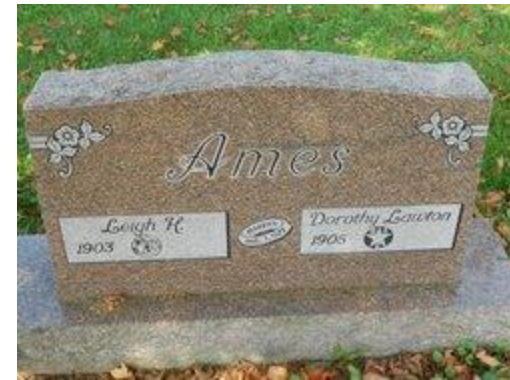
WARREN H. AMES 1928 - 2010

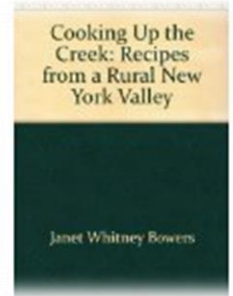

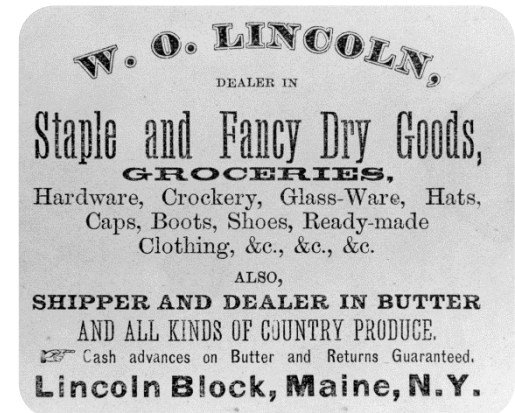
The Lincoln store was constructed in 1856 and burned down in 1893. The Lincoln home, built next to the store survives today at Maine and Church Streets.

WHO BUILT PITCHER'S MILL ?

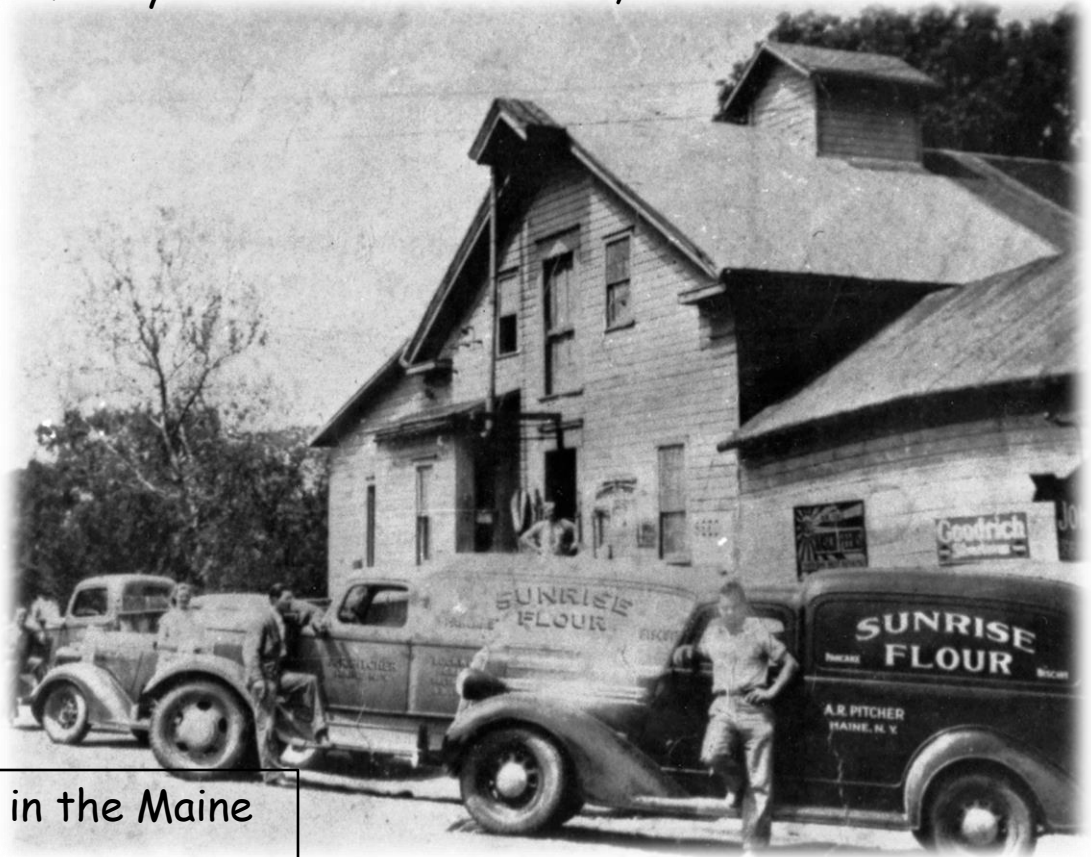
It was Daniel Slosson who died in 1853 at 41 years of age -

Note : *Sarah J. Slosson* who died in 1826, at the age of 15 years, was brought back to the original family home in Richmand MA, to be buried.

Pitcher's Mill was built in 1830 by Belden and **Daniel Slosson**.

Archie Pitcher owned the mill from 1925 - 1941 and gave his name to the building. The mill closed in 1955.

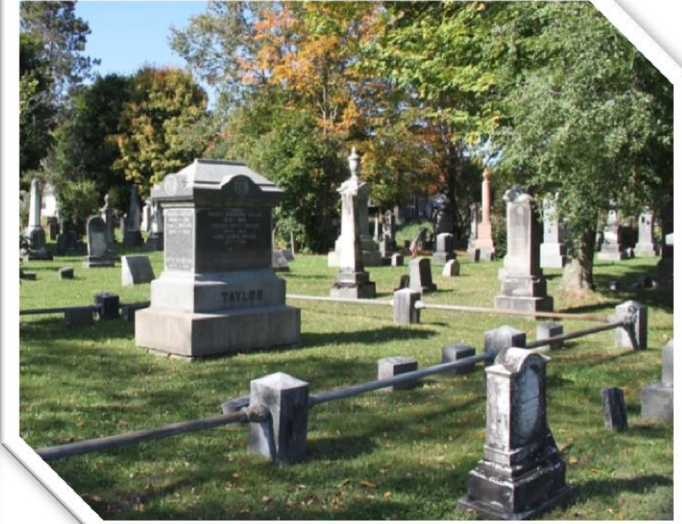
Fourteen Slosson's are buried in the Maine Cemetery, including Grove.

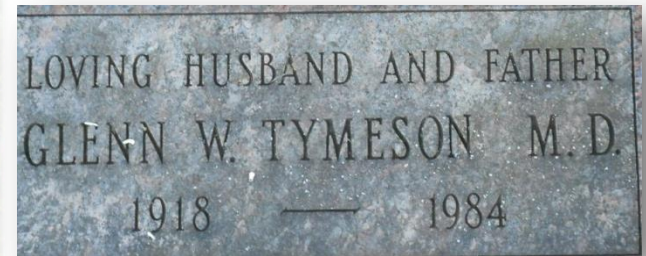

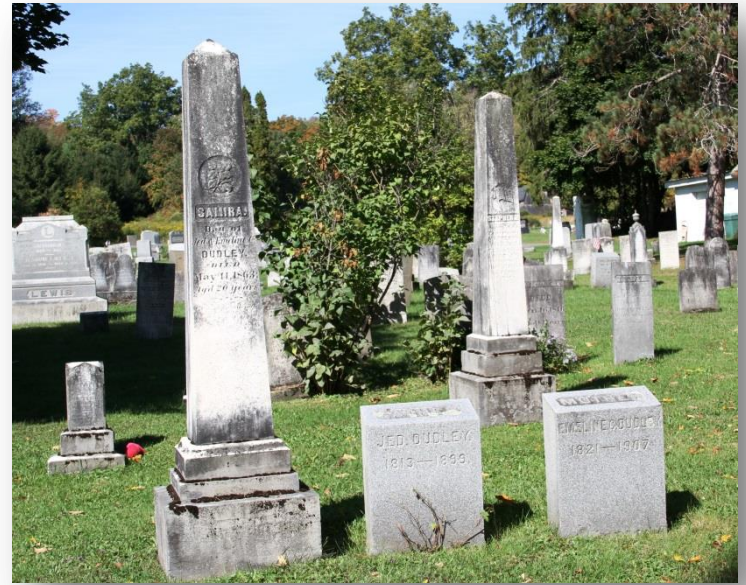

Dudley Family

Jedidiah Dudley arrived in 1796 from Stockbridge MA. His home was built in the late 1880's.(see below) His son was) Jedidiah Jr. b. 1813 and his wife Emeline b.1821. Alice Haskins Dudley was a widow when she married Dr. Dudley. She was briefly married to *Vernon E. Turner*; 1852 - 1883, when on March 13, 1883 on her wedding day 10 minutes after saying "I do" Vernon collapsed, his right side paralyzed. Dr. Brown one of the attending physicians, said it was caused by a too tight collar. He died 6 days later. Alice married Dr. Dudley in 1884.

Dr. Dwight Dudley; 1841 - 1921, died in Endicott one year after leaving Maine Myra Dudley Carman, their daughter, 1885 - 1989 lived to be 104 years of age. She was the last of the family and donated a lot of their family records to the museum.

"Maine. Henry Curlhair died at his home in this village last Saturday afternoon after a brief illness following the shock with which he was stricken while driving from Union a week ago last Friday. Funeral services will be held at his late home this Monday afternoon, Rev. E. P. Van Deventer officiating. He is survived by his wife and two sons. Marshal Curlhair of Bainbridge, and Freeman Curlhair of this place. Mr. Curlhair was about seventy-five years old and had driven stage from this place to Binghamton almost continuously for a period of thirty-six years, carrying passengers and doing errands. He was entirely trustworthy in his business relations, a good citizen, a kind neighbor, and he will be greatly missed by his large circle of friends and patrons."

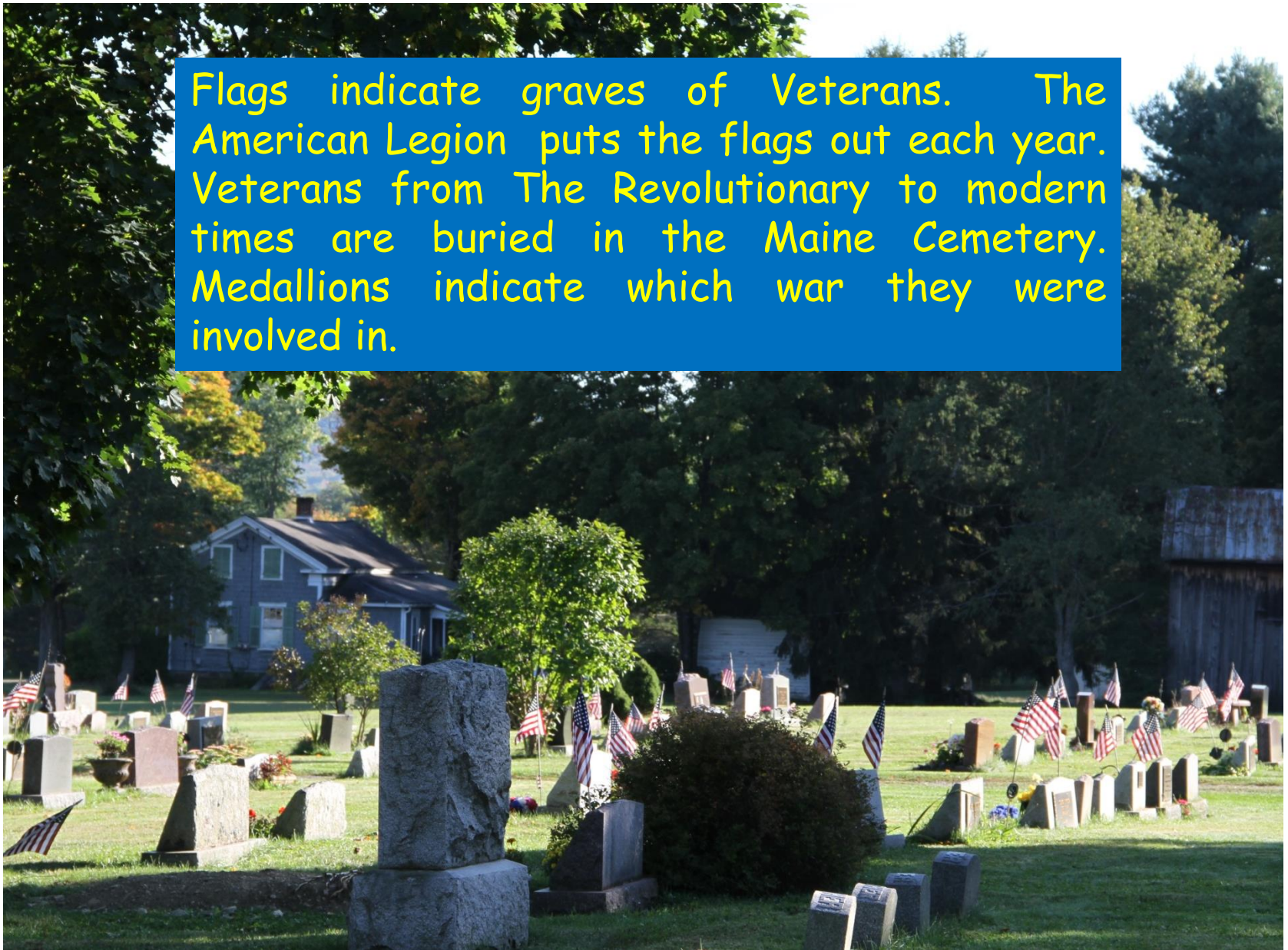

CIVIL WAR VETERANS: GAR

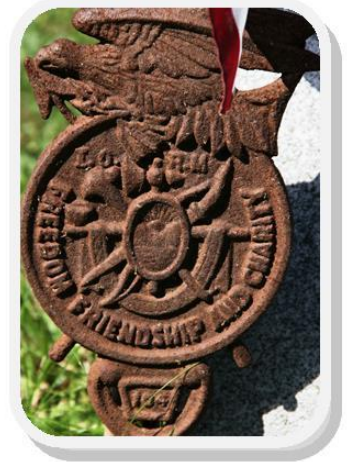

Row 3: James Riddle, LeRoy Bostwick, Norman Brown, Joshua Murch, Nelson Baird, Rufus W. Porter. Row 4 Morgan Yarnes, F.F. Corwit. George Norton was the last GAR veteran to die in 1931.”

Flags indicate graves of Veterans. The American Legion puts the flags out each year. Veterans from The Revolutionary to modern times are buried in the Maine Cemetery. Medallions indicate which war they were involved in.

What can I learn from visiting a local cemetery?

- Names associated with community: Roads, Landmarks, House Names, Communities, What the Town was like 100 plus years ago, families etc.
- How long people lived. Check for disease outbreaks: 1918 Spanish Flu pandemic.
- Members of the family.
- Veterans of what wars.
- Types of rock used in tombstones at various time: (Bluestone - local) Marble, Granite.
- Weathering of stones.
- Iconology on stones.

How to improve visibility of lettering in the stones

- Flour
- Shaving cream
- Time of day -shadows Early morning or late afternoon increase shadows which make reading easier.
- Rubbings
- Find A Grave Website Many tombstones are photographed.

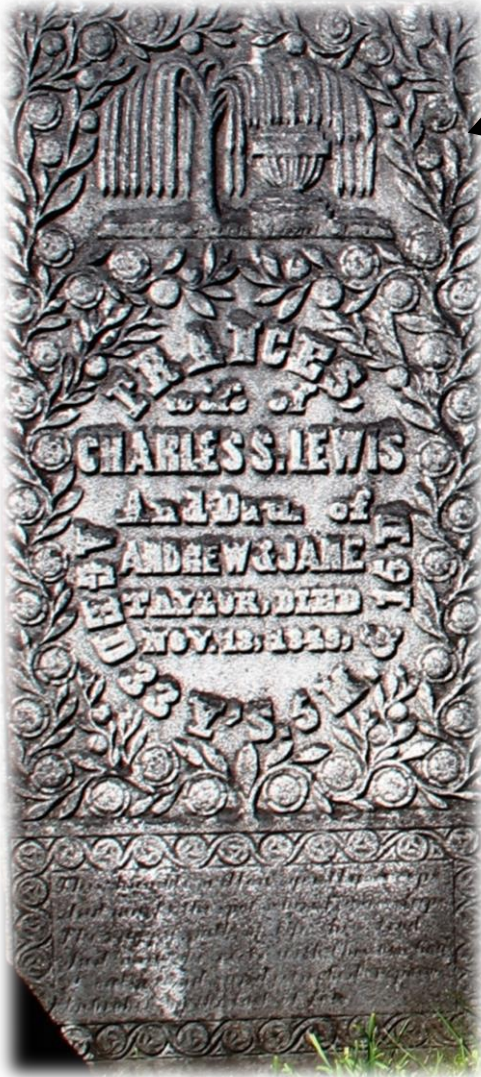

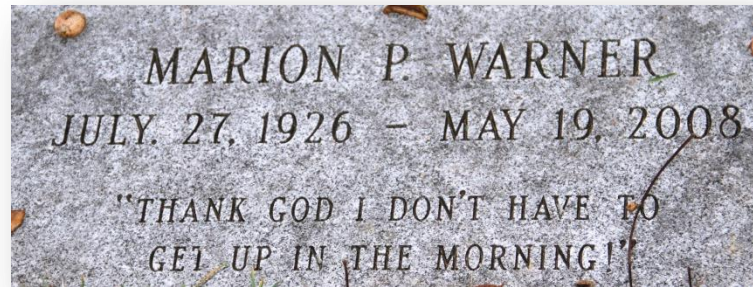

Ray Warner : Ray died quite suddenly collapsing on their kitchen floor, leaving Marion with a very young family. He was buried in the Riverhurst Cemetery in Endicott. As time went by Marion decided a buy a plot in Maine and have Ray interred there. There was a small ceremony at the gravesite and then a reception at home. Marion had a cake made for this occasion: It was a coffin cake with the sentiment, "*Welcome Home Ray!*". Also on her grave she had written "*Thank God I Don't Have to Get Up in the Morning!*"
