

















TAKE AWAYS

Giving kids the freedom to layer, combine, and place adhesive elements however they liked made the activity feel like true self-expression. Many surprised themselves with how "cool" or "unique" their lunch boxes turned out, boosting their confidence and pride in their work.

Just like with gift tags in previous activities, offering a space to write their names or a short message ("This belongs to [Name]") gave kids a sense of identity and ownership. It turned the craft into something functional and personal, and many kids were excited to show theirs off right away.

As kids worked side-by-side, they naturally began chatting about what they were making, who they were thinking of, or what made their lunch boxes special. This kind of open conversation created a positive, collaborative energy where creativity, confidence, and connection all came together.





IMPROVEMENTS

The most colorful and playful patches were the first to go stars, hearts, and fun icons disappeared quickly, leaving mostly letters behind. While the kids still made it work, having a wider assortment (and greater quantity) of popular stickers would have kept energy high and sparked even more creativity across the board.

A few kids needed help getting started or felt unsure about how to begin. Having 1–2 sample lunch boxes on display could help spark ideas and give them the confidence to dive in. These examples could be used as talking points, too, to encourage storytelling and sharing.
