




























What types of plastic can and can't be used to make the sleeping mats?



Plastic bag types that CAN be used:

					
Clean dry supermarket bags	Thin bags	Clear or any colour, any size >A4	Retail store bags	Fruit/Veg bags Clean dry produce bags with all crumbs removed	Thin transparent rain ponchos
					
Plastic from furniture deliveries	Dry cleaner bags	Non-stick barricade tape	Clear plastic from online shopping	Clean dry bread bags with crumbs removed	Thin plastic tablecloths [not flopped or fabric-backed]
					
Food packets larger than A4 that are: - 100% clean and dry, no crumbs remaining - soft plastic, not crunchy/foil-lined or made from cellophane	Clean dry ziplock bags that are larger than A4 size	Plastic mailer envelopes from online shopping that DON'T CONTAIN BUBBLE PADDING and are larger than A4 size	Plastic mailer envelopes from online shopping that DON'T CONTAIN BUBBLE PADDING and are larger than A4 size	Clean paint-free plastic painting drop sheets	

Plastic bag types that CANNOT be used:

				
Wet, dirty or smelly bags	Bags containing any scraps/crumbs	Cling wrap	Bubble Wrap	Food packets which are NOT made of pure soft plastic - ie. if they feel crunchy, crackly, foil-lined or made of cellophane .
				
Compostable bags (designed to disintegrate quickly)	ANY BAG that is smaller than A4 size	Bags that previously contained oily foods eg. potato crisps	Thick plastic such as dog food bags	Padded mailer envelopes from online shopping that CONTAIN BUBBLE PADDING or are smaller than A4 size
