From the desk of the Pastor... *Is he a Christian?*

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord:

I am blessed in that my daughters have always been able to come to me with their enthusiasm over a new young man that they have met. Very recently, one of those daughters was providing me with a litany of all the virtues of an individual she was dating. After hearing about how this young man is truly God's gift to women, I asked the inevitable question, "Is he a Christian?" Did Ya Know? A Finance Tidbit



If you are required to take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA or other qualified retirement plan because you are 70.5 years old or older, you can have your RMD paid directly to Wesley UMC. Instead of getting a charitable deduction, the distribution is tax-free, which in turn might reduce the amount of your taxable Social Security income. If this strategy appeals to you, please reach out to your retirement plan trustee or custodian - he or she will need time to process the paperwork and make the distribution to Wesley UMC.

If you elect to make a donation to Wesley from your retirement distribution, please contact Laura Waltrup to assist with providing any necessary information to your financial advisor and for instructions as to where you would like your distribution to be applied: a lump sum in lieu of weekly tithing or a designated donation for a special purpose such as Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP), Endowment, etc. Thank you!

How about curling up with a good book while drinking a cup of hot tea? No matter what you do when the weather turns cold and snowy, remember that our Heavenly Father wants us to have some relaxing time for ourselves so that we can be renewed and refreshed to do His will according to his purpose!



Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.

Forever, Erma: Best-Loved Writing from America's Favorite Humorist by Erma Bombeck (920). Bombeck left a legacy of more than 4,500 columns and twelve books. This treasury contains more than 190 of her most requested columns. Here she reveals herself and allows us to laugh and sometimes cry with her from the 1960's to the 1990's.

Nearby by Harold E. Kohn (240). This little book of 21 devotional articles begins with the Light given at Christmas and continues with aspects of spiritual living.

Treasures to Behold from the Salesian Collection by Jennifer Grimaldi (800). This is a collection of inspirational poetry on a variety of topics. It is well illustrated.

An Ark on the Flood by Anne Knowles (Fiction). Rachel Bellany Adams is a young veterinarian in a farming town in the Cotswolds in England. What she may lack in physical stature, she makes up for in sheer determination and commitment. Life with animals and their humans never runs smoothly. There are daily encounters with surly beasts and idiosyncratic owners. Besides the farmers, there are the townspeople to contend with. Then she must grapple with her own private conflicts: a growing professional ambition and a desire to start a family.

Old Turtle by Douglas Wood (Children's Fiction). This fable promotes a deeper understanding of the earth and our relationship with all the beings who inhabit it.

The Truth for Youth by Tim Todd (Teens). This book contains the New Testament along with comic stories packed with the truth about many issues that young people are confronted with and sins that are destroying their lives. Included is a list of student's legal rights for religious freedom on public school campuses.



Pam opened the meeting at 9 am. She made the announcement that there will be a potluck at her house on February 2, 2019 at 6 pm. Pam offered prayer and read our Mission and Vision, which currently are:

Vision: To show the people the hope in Jesus.

Mission: To make disciples by growing and learning, worshipping and praying, and serving and connecting.

Devotions were shared by Linda Yost. She read about "A Bit of Clay." We are just a bit of clay on our own, but we are able to be used by God.

A Review of Our Situation:

- What are the "vital signs" of Wesley UMC today?
- How do we move forward?
- Are we goal-oriented, producing fruit?

Our goals should be for reflection and conversation for strengthening our ministry.

Pam divided those gathered into four groups. She had two questions to be considered:

- Where is God working in the midst of Wesley Church?
- Where might God be calling this church in the future?

Group 1: Matthew 22:34(36)-40 – "Which is the greatest commandment of the law?..." (read and discuss where Wesley fits in)

Rough takeaways from the conversation:

- We can be too wrapped up in the logistics of church rather than worship (Martha/Mary balance)
- Not putting God first as prominent
- Priorities are out of order – people first instead of God
- What about reclaiming members (and children/grandchildren)? We don't have to be at church to love God and our neighbor.
- We are vessels of God's work; God does the work through us; we don't.

Group 2: Luke 10:25-37 – "Good Samaritan"

Rough takeaways from the conversation:

- We pass by each other and others; do we "make ourselves busy" to justify not being a neighbor?
- How do we justify what we do and don't do?
- The Samaritan has a wholistic type of ministry (money, time, effort, hands-on). How do we do this?
- What can we do to reconnect people?
- Sometimes, we need to set aside the program to be in relationship.
- We are called to be "moved by pity [compassion]" in connection with God
- Is there compassion outside of God?
- God loves us [perfectly]; we love Him back [terribly]. We need to learn how God loves, then love others better.

Group 3: Matthew 28:18-20 – The Great Commission

Rough takeaways from the conversation:

- We go out, but do we get the teaching component?
- It is important to understand our spiritual gifts
- The business of the church has distracted us from the calling of God (Martha / Mary balance)
- We don't know how we impact others
- We are flawed individuals; however, we need to be comfortable with ourselves and rooted in the LORD with an active relationship with God.
- There is a perception that we are "the holders of the knowledge," and some make the assumption that we know something that others don't know.
- Remake ourselves to say/act/be that we don't have all the answers or a monopoly on the truth
- We should recognize our utter depravity and recognize God's grace for us.
- Empty ourselves to be filled by God
- How to reach out to others to engage? [How do we communicate grace?]
- Where are the "lost sheep" of our congregation?

Group 4: Galatians 3:(25)26-29 – "So in Christ Jesus you are all children of God through faith, for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ..."

Rough takeaways from the conversation:

- The [Old Testament] law becomes a wall that can separate us from God and others who need help
- Christ calls us together as a whole (vs. being separate)
- We minister well to each other and to others, but what about immersion ministry?
- Women between the ages of 45 and 64 are the largest growing group for opioid users
- Welcome the Stranger: families of drug addicts are welcome here, but they feel very isolated
- It could be possible to form a foundation/corridor of churches (from multiple denominations) up Rte. 30 from Hampstead through Manchester to help combat the opioid pipeline

Review of 2018 January and March retreat minutes/goals

Discussion of our Vision and Mission in break out groups, then reconvened to discuss.

- What does it mean to show the hope in Jesus / how do we "show hope in Jesus"?
 - Caring, sharing, compassion, attitude
 - Optimism
 - Talk the talk / walk the walk
 - Meeting the real needs of people
 - Offering grace
 - Living joyfully
 - Testifying: sharing how God impacts our lives
- What is a disciple of Christ Jesus?
 - Student
 - Dedicated follower of Jesus
 - Accepts & spreads the Gospel
 - Learning/teaching – working together to learn
 - "Going towards something – Christ
 - Prayer Warrior
 - Discipleship is allowing God to pour into you; worship is glory to God
- Have we made disciples at Wesley Church this year?
 - The church is a garden to be tended
 - We don't always know the "rest of the story"
 - We might not see the seeds grow that we have sown

- God commands us; we are helpers
- Who are the people?
 - Those in the new housing developments
 - Scouts
 - Stay at home "Moms"
 - Christmas and Easter attendees
- What are the needs of the community? To answer this, we need to welcome new ideas and groups at Wesley, and we need to enhance our current programs (each committee should evaluate.)
- We have a treasure in clay jars [2 Corinthians 4:6-10: For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," made his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of God's glory displayed in the face of Christ. But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body."]
- It was noted that our Vision is actually a Mission; a Vision should be what we can see in our mind's eye. Changes to the Vision were discussed. **By the end of the retreat, this was the new Vision: to be "a community filled with the hope and love of Jesus."**

What did we do well in 2018? Small groups, picnic, Sr. High Girls' Bible Study, hospitality luncheons, hands-on missions, prayer warriors, town hall meetings, UMM, UMW, GriefShare, visitation, suppers, increased attendance at the contemporary worship service

What can we do differently in the next six months?

1. Communication

- There are issues with communication between committees. To help with this, committees should report the highlights to Ad. Council. It has been helpful to see the different group minutes printed in The Journal.
- Some committees don't know their responsibilities. **If you don't know who is responsible for something, let Pam know and she will find a committee for that responsibility.
- "Classifieds" sections of the bulletin and Journals might be a good idea
- We can restart the "Wesley Wall of Who's Who." The heads of committees and other ministries and staff will have a photo of themselves on the wall in the hallway along with a job description and contact information so that they can be more easily identified and accessed.

2. Development of committees: Description, [etc.]

3. Ministry development:

Participate in conferences, hone skills, encourage/get new ideas

Adding to the Contemporary worship team member group

Work on understanding how people hear the Gospel

Always "train your replacement" – meaning, more than one person should know what is going on with the coffee maker, within a committee, etc.

Develop an online ministry (sermons)

4. Expand our ability to reach others online and reach youth: Website, podcast; perhaps identify a social media coordinator

5. VBS: Communicate with the participants throughout the year

6. Invite Girl and Boy Scouts to our events

7. Walk the new development(s)

8. Understand the needs of our community: invest in finding out what the demographic needs to better serve them – i.e., practical help, broken marriage or prison support group


