From the desk of the Pastor... "A Little Bit about Lent"

Lent is coming! Lent is a season of forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday (March 6, 2019) and ends on Holy Saturday (April 20, 2019). The English word "Lent" comes from the Anglo-Saxon word "lencten," which means "lengthen," and refers to the lengthening of days that comes with springtime.

As early as the third century, Christians have prepared ourselves for the celebration of Easter. In earliest times, two days before Easter were dedicated to the practice of fasting. From the end of the worship service on Good Friday to the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ on Easter—equaling the time Jesus spent in the tomb—Christians

by the Spirit to live the lives Jesus Christ has set us free to live... not because we have to, but because we truly want to live as God's children, as sisters and brothers in the Lord.

would fast. Generations that followed increased the period of fasting to six days, which was also the amount of time catechumens spent in humble preparation for the reception of Baptism and the Lord's Supper that they would receive at the Easter service. History shows that the length of preparation for Easter increased from one week to three weeks to six weeks. In the seventh century, the western church

arrived at a forty day preparation period for Easter. They fasted for six weeks at six days a week for a total of thirty-six days. Fasting was thought to be beneficial to the Christian because evil spirits used food as a means of entering the body. During this period of fasting, Christians would not eat any food during the day until the middle of the afternoon. Even though the body strongly desired food, the Christian was to put this desire aside and focus instead on the things of God, the very Word that comes from the mouth of the Lord (Mt. 4:4).



Library Notes

MAJOR TECHNOLOGICAL BREAKTHROUGH

Announcing the new <u>Built-in Orderly Organized Knowledge</u> device called "BOOK." The BOOK is a revolutionary breakthrough in technology: no wires, no electric circuits, and no batteries, nothing to be connected or switched on. It is so easy to use even a child can operate it; just lift its cover! Compact and portable, it can be used anywhere - even sitting in an armchair by the fire.

Each BOOK is constructed of sequentially numbered sheets of paper (recyclable), each capable of holding thousands of bits of information. These pages are locked together with a custom-fit device called a binder which keeps the sheets in their correct sequence. Portable, durable, and affordable, the BOOK is being hailed as the entertainment wave of the future. Many of these BOOKs are in our library!

Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.

- The Gospel for Children: Object Messages from the Gospel of Mark by Harold J. Uhl (256). Simple objects like a flashlight, a map, a ball, or a flag are used to present the Gospel story in a way that children can both see and hear. There are 60 visual explanations of passages from the Gospel of Mark useful for both worship and teaching.
- Then Sings My Soul: 150 of the World's Greatest Hymn Stories by Robert J. Morgan (780). This two volume set (each with 150 hymns) contains both the hymn and the story behind the hymn on facing pages. Title, author/songwriter, and first line of hymn indexes are included.
- The Power of the Spoken Word by Florence Scovel Shinn (232). This is a collection of the teachings of Shinn, who taught metaphysics in New York for many years. She was colloquial, informal, friendly, and humorous and for this reason, she appealed to many who would not have taken the spiritual message through more conservative and dignified forms.
- Who Was Jesus? By Paul Kroll (227). This is a presentation of the person and work of Jesus, his relationship with God, and our response to him.
- Jesus the Son of Man by Kahlil Gibran (227). Gibran presents the words and deeds of Jesus as seen through the eyes of those who came in contact with him. Illustrations are reproduced from original drawings by the author.
- Jesus Wants Me for a Sunbeam by Hans Wilhelm (Children). An illustrated book based on the song "Jesus Wants Me for a Sunbeam".
- A Step Further by Joni Eareckson (920). Joni's first book told the story of the accident that left her a quadriplegic and her struggle to accept her handicap. This book relates more of Joni's struggles and victories, telling honestly how God has used circumstances, individuals, and events to reveal more of Himself to her and to mold more of Himself in her.

When you return a book, find the card, put the return date on the card, and put the card in the pocket of the book. You can stack books on the shelf beside the yellow box or on the desk; the librarians will re-shelve them. Please return borrowed items within 6 months.

Donated items may be left stacked on the library desk. <u>Please</u> leave a paper with your name and the names of the donated items so that we can give you proper credit. Remember that we only take items suitable for a church library. The librarians reserve the right to determine suitability.

Please leave the stepladder used for reaching books on higher shelves in the corner visible near the closet doors.

News & Notes from the Trustees - February 2019

By now you may have noticed that the old windows are a part of Wesley's history. In their place are 22 energy friendly windows. No leaks, more window space to let in the sun light (if we ever get any), plus they all work! And they have a lifetime warranty.



You may have heard that we are seeking help from our Wesley family to support us by becoming a Wesley Window Warrior (WWW). Each window cost approximately \$600. If you are interested in helping us purchase a window, please just note on your check that your donation is for windows. If we can recover the \$13,300 paid for the cost of our windows, we will be able to move on to our next projects.

The next grouping of projects the Trustees is focused on is as follows:

- Paint Sanctuary wall water damage
- Paint Vestibule wall water damage
- Paint Education Wing Hallway from Sanctuary to Fellowship Hall
- Paint Window Sills since windows have been replaced
- Place new wall mounted Air Conditioning units in the Historical Room, Harrell Library, Choir Room and Nursery.
- Replant Flower beds and bury rain spouts
- Look at Chair Lifts for Steps in Education Wing and Stair Tower to Sanctuary
- Repaint parking lot space markings and add several additional handicap parking spaces near the Fellowship Hall entrance.

Currently, Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP) funds on hand as of 2/14/2019 is \$22,850 - this is after paying for the windows that were installed on February 11th. The above projects listed are estimated to cost between \$48,000 and \$50,000. Any assistance we can garner from our Wesley family WWW's to help restore the \$13,300 recently spent on new windows or WIP donations in general, will help us maintain momentum in accomplishing the next set of Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP) plans.

We are happy to report that since inception of the WIP program in October 2018, the following projects have been completed – many donated with people's own time, talents and funds:

- Repaired all roof leaks
- Replaced Windows
- Nursery Renovated: New Floor, Paint, Slider Repaired, Plumbing fixed
- New Smoke Detectors have been installed
- Sanctuary window lights replaced with LED bulbs and timer
- Motion detector light replaced with LED bulbs
- Security cameras have been installed at several locations
- New doorbell has been installed at Fellowship Hall door

Finally, we would like to extend a heartfelt THANK YOU to everyone who has supported the WIP program to date. Since October 1, 2018, Wesley has received donations totaling \$29,800 for WIP. This is over and above normal tithing that supports the day to day Operating Budget. God is GOOD!

Stephanie Halley opened the meeting with prayer at 7 PM. The devotional for this evening was shared by Pam Phillips and was on the fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23).

The minutes of the Administrative Council Planning Retreat were reviewed [please see the January 2019 issue of The Wesley Journal for the full minutes of that meeting.] Of specific note:

- The Vision Statement was changed [from "to show the people the hope in Jesus" to "to be a community filled with the hope and love of Jesus."]
- Our goal is not to create new jobs, but to see how we can look at making disciples and reaching out to those in our community.
- Ministry development.

Finance:

• Lee Ann Crochunis, Finance Chairperson, brought forth a motion from the committee asking that all of the projects currently defined by the Trustees as "Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP)" be classified as "Capital Improvements" instead of some being "Capital Improvements" and some being "Maintenance and Repair." According to IRS precedent, projects associated with the improvement of a building that are connected to the capital improvement campaign can also be listed as capital improvements. The program would still be "WIP." Also, only those projects previously identified by Trustees as WIP would fall under this classification; no other projects can be "tossed on the pile." This is basically a motion having to do with how Finance accounts for the funds.

Vote: All persons less one in favor; none opposed; one abstention. The motion carried.

• Finance would like to have another Town Hall since the previous one was so well received. A date in June was suggested; however, there was a conflict with the set up of the fellowship hall for VBS. During discussion, it was decided that the summer schedule would begin on June 9, 2019, at 10 AM. Finance would host Lemonade on the Lawn for that date at 11 AM and the Town Hall would begin at 11:30 AM.

Vote: All persons were in favor; none opposed; no abstentions. The motion carried.

• The Maryland Faith Health Network in which Wesley UMC is a participant, offers a free estate planning presentation. Finance thinks this is a good idea and wanted to gauge the interest about a general information session. During discussion, the suggestions were made that it be opened to the community and possibly tied in to a potluck. Further on, it was suggested that the presentation/session be combined with a summer activity to be an "event" and that a spaghetti dinner in place of a potluck might work better with the community.
