
Dear Wesley Family & Friends;

Library Notes

During this season of Lent, as we prepare for the resurrection of our Savior, reading the Bible may be something to include in our daily time with God. These suggestions may help you to choose where to start.



Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.

- Celebrating Jesus As Lord by Morris A. Inch (226). A study of the gospel of Matthew. Inch presents the gospel with a conviction that it should be encouraging to Christians today who are in a rapidly changing society. A "Getting Involved" section after each chapter contains questions and activities.
- How to Study the Bible by Robert M. West (224). This small guide gives the principles of Bible study including methods and helps.
- Mark: A Good News Commentary by Larry W. Hurtado (226). The fruit of a decade of study and reflection, this pastoral and accessible commentary indicates Mark's purpose at each point of his account, tells how the evangelist's contemporaries understood the text, and points out the Gospel's meaning for today.
- Pocket Bible Handbook by Walter Elwell (224). A compact summary of the background, content, theological themes, and outlines of every book of the Bible.
- Scripture: The Word Beyond the Word by Nancy A. Carter (224). This book suggests a variety of approaches to Bible study so that the student does not get into a rut always approaching study from the same perspective or using the same methods.
- Life Lessons with Max Lucado: Book of Acts by Max Lucado (226). This is a workbook to study the book of Acts. Scripture readings are from both the NCV and NKJV.
- Beloved Disciple: The Life and Ministry of John by Beth Moore (Audio-Visual). A DVD study of the Disciple John designed to be completed over 11 weeks. The set includes six DVDs and a leader guide.
- The Secret Power of Speaking God's Word by Joyce Meyer (232). Meyer tells about having a personal problem and how God's Word dealt with it. Then she explains how to use the Word in everyday life. The bulk of the book is divided into subjects with scripture related to each subject. This makes it possible to memorize and use appropriate scriptures for various situations. Doing so is a spiritual discipline that leads to a powerful, victorious life.
- Daniel: Lives of Integrity, Words of Prophecy by Beth Moore (Audio-Visual). A 12-session study of the book of Daniel with six DVDs and a leader's guide. While designed for group study, it can also be used for individual study.

Did Ya Know? A Finance Tidbit



If you are required to take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA or other qualified retirement plan because you are 70.5 years old or older, you can have your RMD paid directly to Wesley UMC. Instead of getting a charitable deduction, the distribution is tax-free, which in turn might reduce the amount of your taxable Social Security income. If this strategy appeals to you, please reach out to your retirement plan trustee or custodian - he or she will need time to process the paperwork and make the distribution to Wesley UMC.

If you elect to make a donation to Wesley from your retirement distribution, please contact Laura Waltrup to assist with providing any necessary information to your financial advisor and for instructions as to where you would like your distribution to be applied: a lump sum in lieu of weekly tithing or a designated donation for a special purpose such as Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP), Endowment, etc. Thank you!

Administrative Council Minutes • February 27, 2019, at 7 PM

Attendees: Kim Peake (presiding), Brenda Kennedy, Janet Martin, Jason Martin, John Martin, Stephanie Halley, Rev. Amy Sarah Lewis-Rill, Linda Hollman, Jonathan Yost, Jason Montgomery, Denny Rill, Laura Waltrup, John Sies, Matt Sichel, and Jess Sichel.

The meeting was **opened in prayer** by Kim Peake at 7:04 PM. The **devotional** was shared by Matthew Sichel and was from "The Christian's Secret to a Happy Life," published in 1875.

Old Business: The January Ad. Council Meeting Minutes have been emailed out. The minutes were approved with a bit of minor correction.

- There have been some email issues with the Ad. Council mailing list (adcouncil@wesleychurch-hampstead.org). These should be resolved as of this meeting. Jason Martin is also not receiving email through his jasonmartin@wesleychurch-hampstead.org email account; Jess Sichel has tested the system and does not see the problem [more investigating might be needed or the issue may be with Jason's system.]
- During the last meeting, it was discussed that posters should be made of the Vision and/or Mission Statement of Wesley UMC; however, the type of posters was not clear. The posters should be 8.5" x 11" for each classroom and there should be two or three Vistaprint-style banners. Jess Sichel will take care of this.
- Also, the January meeting minutes are to be amended to include that projects can be added to WIP (Wesley Improvement Project) by Trustees at the approval of the Ad. Council.

Committee Reports

Trustees:

- The Trustees wish to let the congregation know that they are very grateful for all of the donations coming in for WIP (Wesley Improvement Projects). The Wesley Window Warrior project will really help refill the balance. The windows have been installed; the look great and will hopefully save us money on oil.
- The WIP program and the facility's needs are in a constant state of flux. Many things have been identified/ reidentified as needs for the church. The Trustees wanted to be able to add projects to the program as it is all for the improvement of Wesley. The committee was advised by the Finance Committee to speak to Ad. Council about this and get approval. Some of the projects to add include:
 - Repainting the Sanctuary where there was water damage
 - Repainting/Patch Painting both vestibules (had water damage)
 - Painting from the Sanctuary and stair tower through Education Wing hallway down to the fellowship hallway (dirty; doesn't look clean)
 - Brighten up the parking lot with additional lighting (Mike Sichel has a rough estimate of approximately \$20,000 to properly do the project; Trustees will get two or three estimates for every project.

Trustees is requesting to add these projects now and other projects as they arise with the permission of the Ad. Council. At the previous Ad. Council meeting, it was noted that incremental things will be capital improvements. Also, per Laura Waltrup, it is very common for the scope of a capital campaign to change.

- Painting: The motion came from a committee, so a vote was taken. All but one were in favor of the painting project (one abstention.)
- Lighting: Discussion proceeded. Jonathan Yost asked what changing the lighting would entail (i.e., lighting all the time at night?) Kim Peake stated that as a whole, it appears that the Ad. Council is in favor of the project, but asked if Trustees could get back to us about the project with additional details. John Martin noted that other scopes of projects have been approved without details. Discussion continued. It was noted that prioritization is to be done by the Trustees (and the current prioritization is painting, then air conditioners, then chair lift. The motion from the committee was to include the parking lot lighting in the WIP program, and that the cost would not exceed \$20,000 at this time without further approval (not including the cost of upgrading

the electricity for the lighting, which also needs to be added later.) A vote was taken. All but one were in favor of the lighting project (one abstention.)

• The March Trustees meeting will be adjusted in date and/or time due to the Ash Wednesday service.

Education

- VBS is scheduled for the week of June 23rd
- On Palm Sunday, there will be a joint Sunday School activity similar to what was done right before Advent [all are welcome to participate!]

Youth

- (Stephanie Halley reporting for Madison Smith, Youth Representative to Ad. Council): The Sr. High Girls' Bible Study is awesome. The girls decided at their last meeting that they would like to start a junior youth group. They will be leading a 4th/5th/6th grader youth program, probably starting next Fall. Stephanie noted that this is kids leading ministry and said that the girls are excited about it. There will be more from Madison at the next Ad. Council meeting.
- Next weekend is the Youth Retreat at Camp Eder.
- The most recent Destination Unknown: Outreach helped some of the kids make Linus blankets; another group made/stained wooden cross centerpieces for the fellowship hall. This is a good example of the rest of church engaging with the Youth.
- There is a Youth and Family Mission Trip scheduled for July. The Montgomerys are leading the trip to Cherokee, NC, where the group will be staying on an Indian Reservation.

Worship: No further report.

Finance: Reports were emailed out ahead of time. Good news: we aren't broke!

Outreach

- Outreach is holding a Pie/Tart/Cobbler sale on Palm Sunday. Bakers and buyers are needed; special requests are also being taken.

Pastor

- A sermon series on the "Sermon on the Mount" starts with the Beatitudes on Ash Wednesday and follows on Sunday morning [Sundays through Palm Sunday]
- There is a Spiritual Gifts Study being held on Tuesday nights from 7:30 to 8:30 PM and Thursday mornings from 10 to 11 AM.
- Rev. Amy's second residency was two weeks ago; it was wonderful!

Endowment: Previous discussion: there are many ways to give financially to the church and the endowment fund; however, in an effort to build the endowment fund, it was suggested that any memorial donations that come in which are NOT specifically designated be split 50/50 between the endowment fund and memorials. UMM

- Pancake Breakfasts: \$600+/- came in between the two breakfasts already held. The money goes to the Westminster Rescue Mission this year.
- The UMM has also purchased a window for the church.

UMW: No report

Visitation: Reenie needs visits! Also, there was a question about cross-referencing attendance. If you notice someone is missing, tell Rev. Amy and visitation may be consulted.

Spiritual Gifts: In a retreat earlier this year, discussion about having a more in-depth look into spiritual gifts was held. This issue has pretty much resolved itself with Rev. Amy's Spiritual Gifts Studies.

Lay Member to Annual Conference: Matt Sichel reported about the General Conference Special Session on Human Sexuality. He sent email updates during the conference. The conference was tough. Hopes and understandings of some people were not realized, which led to a deep surprise and a lot of anger. Because of the anger, the debate became acidic. Filibustering-type activities followed. Things did not go as anticipated, and there was much emotion involved. There was also a great amount of division, to the point that there was a large disruption.

Stephanie Halley went on record to say that she was utterly heartbroken about the decision of the General Conference and that others are, as well. She said that it is important to recognize that there are people who are really hurting over this decision. Matt's response was that we need to love each other a lot better than we have done, and we also need to recognize that a lot of the problem is because we haven't talked to each other. We aren't really communicating; we are not really listening. Matt was watching people "talk past each other." He stated that if you aren't learning how to articulate the "other" position in a faithful manner [whatever the "other" is from you], then you've missed it.

The future is unclear, and there are a lot of hurting people here and everywhere. It is easy to make mistakes when in pain.

Question: Were the exit plans raised? Answer: An exit plan did make it out of debate, but it may be unconstitutional. The Judicial Council will decide on that in April.

It is vitally important to have love and respect, and to be clear that the doors to the church and the communion table are open to <u>ANYONE</u>.

The Bishop will be conducting [an information-sharing] live-streamed session on Saturday, from 9 AM to 12 PM.

Reminder: Tomorrow is the Texas Roadhouse Fundraiser from 3-10pm; 10% of your bill comes back to the Capital Fundraising Committee [which is then designated to WIP.] Also, pray for the Phillips family and for the church.
