



Library Notes

Moms and Dads of Wesley, have you looked at the selections in the Harrell Library for children? We have books with many different subjects for our littlest ones of the church. We have series books about the wonder of God, books with songs about Jesus, and texts that explain to young listeners about the love of our Heavenly Father and His Son, Jesus. Check out some of these... Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.



Butterfly Doctor by Sarah Toast (Children's Fiction). A story for very young children about a day in Bugtown's doctor's office.

- Happy Birthday, Jesus, and Other Favorite Songs by Patricia S. Mahany (Children). A children's song book beginning with some Christmas favorites and including others such as "Jesus Loves Me" and "Heavenly Sunshine". The music is included for all but five of the songs, and these are sung to familiar tunes.
- Jeremy, Barnabas, and the Wonderful Dream by Joni Eareckson Tada (Children's Fiction). Jeremy is on Uncle Dave's farm and can't wait to milk the cows, feed the chickens, and explore every inch of the house and barnyard. But Jeremy's holiday turns into disaster when he makes some big mistakes. This story of a little boy's misadventure lets children know that a loving God is indeed in control of all He has made.
- *The Non-Praying Mantis* by Matt Whitlock (Children) tells the story of a bug who wanted something, asked God for it, but didn't get exactly what she expected. In the end, Amanda discovers the secret of getting prayers answered. We all have times when it seems like God isn't hearing our prayers, and our faith can waver. But when we earnestly seek God and delight in Him, He gives us the desires of our heart. Help your children to understand the true heart of prayer as they journey with Amanda Mantis through this engaging story.
- *Best Family Ever* by Karen Kingsbury (Children) Much-loved storyteller Karen Kingsbury's Baxter Family books have captured the hearts of millions who have come to think of the Baxter family as their own. Now Karen Kingsbury and her son Tyler Russell tell the childhood stories of the beloved Baxter children—Brooke, Kari, Ashley, Erin, and Luke—to inspire and entertain younger readers. "...But the best part of that morning was the time with her family. Because snowy Saturdays might not be good for bike rides. But they were great for something even better.......Being with family."
- *Bedtime Prayers* by Bonnie Jensen (Children) What better way to end your child's day than with thoughts of the Shepherd's great love. Simple Bible verses, rhyming text, and prayer starters encourage little ones to have thankful heart and to spend time with God, just before they close their sleepy eyes.
- *The Bible Story* by Arthur S. Maxwell (Children) In writing *The Bible Story*, the author has tried not only to tell the dear old stories in language that boys and girls of today can understand but also to reveal the golden thread which binds them—the love of God for the children of men, and His wondrous plan for their redemption. The overall purpose has been to provide what might be called a Bible for children by retelling all the old familiar stories in language that can both be understood and enjoyed. This is Volume 1 of a series of ten books.
- *Noah Builds a Boat* by Mary Manz Simon (Children) Noah's three sons learn the value of obedience, patience, and gratitude as they help their father build the ark and collect the animals in this delightful retelling of the classic Bible story.

Reports from Our Lay Members to Annual Conference

We, Linda Yost and Matthew Sichel, are your representatives to the Baltimore-Washington Conference's Annual Session. Normally, we would bring you a joint report on the happenings at the Annual Conference. However, this year, we're bring separate reports from our own perspectives, due to the differences we have in feeling and opinion on what happened at Annual Conference, specifically in regard to issues around human sexuality. We have dissimilar perspectives on issues, but still love and respect one another. We wanted you to have a better understanding of what happened and how it affected people differently.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE – DAYS OF PROMISE, BLESSING AND LOVE

As one of your Lay Members to Annual Conference for our own Wesley Church, my main responsibility, in my mind, was to attend all the sessions, pay attention to the pros, cons, amendments, substitution amendments, amendments to the amendments (oh yes!), resolutions, election of delegates, and vote my heart when asked. This year's Annual Conference promised to be one of controversy, pain, and heartache. We were not disappointed. However, there was also much promise and love shown as our Bishop, LaTrelle M. Easterling, presided over a clergy session which voted overwhelmingly to approve two deacons and nine Elders as candidates for commissioning, and one Deacon and 11 Elders for ordination. Included in those approved were T.C. Morrow, a provisional Deacon, and Joey Heath-Mason, a full Elder, both of whom are married to people of the same gender and were not approved at last year's clergy session. These two persons had been duly examined and put forth by the Board of Ordained Ministry as qualified, fit and ready for ministry. Their approval this year came, in part, from a motion brought to consider all the candidates together as a block, rather than as individuals. This method of consideration was approved in a 245 to 122 vote. Upon attending the ordination service, I witnessed the full blessing of the Holy Spirit upon each of these Deacons and Elders, and the joy upon their faces was amazing to behold! Our God is an Awesome God indeed!

What will happen in January, 2020, when the Traditional Plan takes effect is unclear, both to me and to many United Methodists. Our Church, as a whole, is at a crossroads. Perhaps, if we all prayerfully decide to continue to serve our Risen Lord, and love our neighbors as ourselves, we can still keep the word "United" in our denomination designation. I am convinced that Our Lord has a plan for us, His children!

It was a privilege to assist the Conference United Methodist Men in blessing the large ballrooms before the sessions began. I also served in the Prayer Room each morning, emailing responses to some of the many prayer requests that were received. Our Bishop had seen the need to have Prayer Warriors available to pray with those who might need to take some time away from a difficult session. As a Prayer Warrior, I stood ready to serve. Again, for the eighth year, the United Methodist Men and the United Methodist Women collaborated in sponsoring a luncheon, and this year's inspiring program was an original skit addressing mass incarceration.

Because of my many responsibilities as President of the Conference United Methodist Women, I have decided to vacate my position as your Lay Member to Annual Conference at the end of this year. I have truly enjoyed serving our church as your lay representative and will be available to guide and mentor my replacement.

May God bless each and every one of you!

Only and All Glory to God!

The 235th Session of the B/W Conference convened in Baltimore on May 29th at the Marriott Waterfront Hotel. It ran from Wednesday to Saturday, with business happening on Wednesday through Friday. Saturday was a day dedicated to youth ministry, and many churches brought their Confirmation Classes for presentations.

The Conference session included some inspiriting worship and a solid Bible study based on Luke 16:19-22 (the story of the Rich Man and Lazarus). This called on us to look for, see, and truly help the poor among us. We also heard various reports on the ministry the Conference is doing, approved a different structure for the Conference Discipleship support ministries, approved a budget, and handled other necessary pieces of business.

This was the first Session of our Annual Conference after the Special Session of General Conference in St. Louis adopted the "Traditional Plan" and reaffirmed the domination's long-standing position (since 1972) on human sexuality. This position states that all people are of sacred worth and beloved creations of God, but that the same-sex practice is incompatible with Christian teaching. As a result, it also prohibits same-sex marriage in United Methodist churches by United Methodist pastors and prohibits ordaining or commissioning of those in same-sex relationships. The reaffirmation also includes enhanced accountability measures to prevent the continued breaking of our shared covenant in the *Book of Discipline.* Because of the very divergent perspectives on human sexuality, the Bishop convened a discussion group of a few leaders in the Conference, from different perspectives, in something called a Samoan Circle. The majority of the Conference was able to witness their discussion and hear different perspectives. Nevertheless, there are many clergy who have formed an active resistance to what they see as a hurtful policy of exclusion. This is the position of our Conference leadership, including our Bishop, and the majority of its clergy.

As a result, the Clergy Executive Session overwhelmingly voted to approve two candidates who are married to people of the same gender, one to be commissioned as a Deacon, and the other to be ordained as an Elder (pastor). On Friday night, Bishop Easterling ordained and commissioned the candidates. Both of these actions violated our shared covenant found in the *Book of Discipline*.

It is my belief that our different perspectives are headed for a collision at our regularly scheduled General Conference in Minneapolis next year. This year, we elected delegates from our Annual Conference to represent us at the General Conference. I was a candidate for delegate again, but was not re-elected. All of the delegates elected from our Annual Conference are in favor of full inclusion of those in LGBTQ lifestyles in ordained ministry and same-sex weddings. However, it is probable that the majority of delegates on the floor will again affirm our long-standing policy. This is because about 40% or the voting delegates come from Africa, the Philippines, and Eastern Europe, where the traditional perspective is favored. These churches are growing dramatically.

For this reason, I am afraid that the denomination may divide. The actions of our Bishop and clergy have frustrated many of the more conservative churches in our Annual Conference. On the other hand, many of the more progressive churches have applauded the Bishop and what happened. These two perspectives will not continue to exist side-by-side. As a result of this Annual Conference, there are churches which have now decided to withhold and escrow their apportionment dollars. I expect others to follow.

For full disclosure to my brothers and sisters at Wesley, I am in favor of the traditional perspective. I currently sit on the board of the local Baltimore-Washington Chapter of the Wesleyan Covenant Association, which is a global group that has been working for renewal of the church and to continue a traditional perspective. I love and respect Bishop Easterling and have always had a very good relationship with her; however, she and I very strongly disagree with each other. Even so, we have committed to love one another.

I know that there are people here at Wesley who come from both perspectives. This church is **open to everyone and anyone who would want to come and seeks to follow Jesus.** Many times, we will disagree on things, but I hope that we continue to be a church open to all people, learning to love one another better, and holding each other accountable every day as we live out the Gospel. People need Jesus, so let's work together to help them know Him better. Only and all glory to God!

Donations to Wesley UMC in Memory of Loved Ones



When a loved one passes, many times family and friends make donations to Wesley UMC in memory of that person. There are many ways to give to our church including our Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP) Fund, the longer term Building Fund, Orphan Stone Repairs and of course, the Memorial Fund. In addition, an Endowment Fund was created in late 2018 for the purpose of accumulating a principal balance over time through donations and bequests in the hopes that it will someday produce an income stream off the interest earned. Donors can designate funds given in memory of a loved one as they wish. And families of a loved one who has passed can designate a specific

purpose for how donations are used, such as the Lucy Harrell Scholarship Fund and Linda Rill Playground. However, a change was made as agreed upon by the Memorial Committee and affirmed through a vote by Ad Council on 2/27/2019. All donations received in memory of a loved one that does not indicate a specific designated fund or purpose, will be split equally between Memorial Funds and Endowment Funds. It was noted that the Halleys and the Martins are at a Spring Concert, and Lee Ann was unable to be present. The meeting opened at 7:03 PM with welcome and prayer. Linda led devotions on behalf of Outreach. A motion to approve the April minutes was raised and seconded; all were in favor, none objected, and none abstained.

Christian Education:

- VBS will be at the end of June; registrations are in the box outside of the church and on the website. The theme is "To Mars and Beyond." Laura will be in the parsonage for any adults who would like to have coffee, danish, conversation, etc. (new!) Vicky can use the playground now.
- Last Sunday of Sunday School is June 2nd.
- Graduation Sunday: June 16th. UMW is giving graduation gifts out to grads; will present in church. There are four Graduates that we know of: Ricky Catron, Matt Sichel, Olivia Zachman, and Sterling Davis, III.

Finance:

- In preparation for the Ad Council meeting, Laura sent out a summary of financial reports through April 30, 2019:
 - Balance Sheet (Assets & Liabilities):
 - ACCOUNT BALANCES*: Main Checking / Operating Account: General Fund Balance is \$11,072 compared to \$13,782 in 2018 for the same period; Endowment Funds: General Endowment Balance is \$4,528 (now \$4,798 as of 5/15); Lucy Harrell Scholarship is \$5,908 (now \$7,000 as of 5/15); Building Funds / WIP (Short Term): General WIP Balance is \$34,438 (now \$27,484as of 5/15 after 50% deposit on A/C Install). *See Laura for other Bank Account Balances

LIABILITIES: Total Liabilities \$1,997 - mostly monthly payroll tax accrual

Profit & Loss Report (Income and Expense)

OPERATING BUDGET INCOME: General Fund Receipts in Total is \$82,518 compared to \$91,672 this time last year - Difference of (\$9,154.02) almost 10%. *Finance is investigating the possible reasons for the big difference in General Fund giving from last year.*

WIP INCOME: Total Donated through 4/30 for WIP is \$27,298 (compared to ZERO this time last year) **EXPENSES**: see Budget Tracking Notes Below

- YTD Budget Tracking through 4/30: Overall for the General Budget, we are tracking (\$7,957) UNDER BUDGET for Expenses, which is good because we are tracking (\$8,114) under budget for Income required to support our 2019 Budget. Program Expenses under budget by \$333; Salaries/Comp Expenses over budget slightly by \$974 timing difference; Utilities over budget slightly by \$80; Operating Expenses under budget by \$2,914 mostly due to Insurance premiums not billed yet for 2019 / timing difference; Maintenance & Repair under budget by \$4,711 (many costs that would typically fall here are rolled into the WIP Program.)
- Attendance History: Through May 12, our average attendance on Sundays is 94. This is down from 99 in '18 and 103 in '17.
- Seneral Note given that general budget income is down almost 10% YTD, we are concerned that the Summer Dip in giving will impact our ability to cover fixed expenses over the next 4 months.
- In a comparison that Jonathan Yost observed, funds are not necessarily being diverted to WIP. It was noted that 15 families support 50% of the church.
- Finance is working with Trustees in preparing for Town Hall.
- Working on annual audit process, 11 accounts. This year, they will be done internally. Due June 30th.

• Hope to do semi-annual giving statements in July, maybe closer to August, depending on time required.

Outreach: Will meet on June 12th (not in May).

- Will work with NESAP to get school supplies for kids.
- New Life for Girls will be coming on July 14th to sing and give testimony. Lemonade on the Lawn will be coordinated to incorporate the group.
- Outreach is planning a churchwide picnic 25th of August and is reaching out to all the other committees to help in some way. They hope to have another big crowd.
- College students were very appreciative of all the notes they were sent; they were surprised.

Trustees:

- Thank you to Gary and Todd Wilmer for the new lines painted on the parking lot! Parking lot decals will be ordered and done soon.
- New air conditioning/heaters/dehumidifiers have been installed. Signs about using them will be installed. It was noted by more than one person that it was a shock to see all the conduit on the side of the building. Are we going to find a way to camouflage it? Maybe paint it to match the building? No answer at this time.
- The education wing ladies' bathroom is being updated. Kim & Pam are/have purchased a vanity and mirrors; there will be electronic paper towel dispenser; the room is getting painted.
- The historical room will be painted
- The old oil tank in the cemetery is being replaced; a temporary one is there now
- The Wesley Window Warrior project is almost sold out; 4 windows are left for sponsorship
- The organ has been tuned
- The septic tank has been cleaned out at the church and the parsonage
- We have a new lawn mowing company
- Many thanks to Gordon, Rick, and Mason for coordinating planting of the front church beds
- The Boy Scouts are having ice cream on us to thank them for all they have done
- The new playground has been installed. Wood chip expense needs to be raised maybe memorials can provide assistance?
- The upgrade of the electrical system for the HVAC units and parking lot lighting has occurred; however, it does not change the receptacle capability in the Education wing rooms (we cannot plug in two heaters and not blow the circuit)

Rev. Amy:

- Rev. Amy has reached out to a particular individual interested in a new member class; however, her contact efforts were not returned.
- Next week is Annual Conference; it is going to be difficult. It is working on Rev. Amy in the subliminal level.
- Rev. Amy's next doctoral residency will be the week after that; she just completed her second term.
- Rev. Amy feels like stuff has been going on every day. She will be working on crafts and with Laura at the Parsonage during VBS. Things seem to be winding down a bit so that she will have a breather.
- NESAP: Don Dietrich is the assistant director and will be taking over for Lynn Sheavly in a natural transition. There will be a farewell luncheon for Lynn next Wednesday.
- Rev. Amy (et. al.) wants to see what options we have to work with Carroll County Health Services on the opioid situation. Rev. Amy (and possibly Vicky Wilmer) will meet with CCHS on June 12; time TBD. She would like to know what our options are to help, even if it is a naloxone training (will they have a free sample to give out?) Luann from CCHS spoke to NECMA; she follows up on all overdoses. She is the one who would be coming. The question is: what can we do on our side of Rte. 140?

Worship: Have not met recently; [email Billy Harris' suggestion about band backing up the choir directly to worship]

Last Meeting's Challenges from Planning Retreat:

- The "Wesley Wall of Who's Who" was discussed; work still needs to be done on the project. The goal is to get the staff info. up, as we are halfway through the year with committee participants and other leaders, and lots of turnover is possible this coming year. SPRC is being tasked to head up/coordinate the project. Please see Pam for details.
- Also to be discussed is expanding our ability to reach others online and expanding our ability to reach our youth. There will be VBS communication; we have done better with the Boy/Girl Scouts.
- A support group will hopefully evolve out of the work we are planning regarding opioid use.
- The Education Wing needs to be decluttered. The box for NESAP is only for food, not for items. We need to educate the community again; Outreach will update the box.
- Vicky and Pam will be doing a walkthrough at the new neighborhood off of Houcksville Rd.

Annual Conference (A.C.): A.C. will be tough, per Rev. Amy. Please, please pray for A.C. There are lots of different ways prayer is being incorporated into the gathering. A question was raised about security; the answer is that there is not really security, similar to prior years; there are Marshalls. Attendees should be aware of their surroundings. If tempers are hot, feel free to leave. Jessie Sichel will put out prayer bursts through the Prayer Chain on behalf of Matt. A cost savings will occur because of the sleeping arrangements for this session. See G.C. News for more.

General Church (G.C.) News:

- Two annual conferences recently met.
- "UMCNext" met in Leewood, KS; leader is Rev. Adam Hamilton (this is a center-left group); another group [called United Methodists for the Way Forward] from the Western Jurisdiction was very progressive. Both groups had significant contingents interested in leaving (1st group was about ½ & ½; 2nd group wanted to create a new Methodist/Wesleyan group). The Wesleyan Covenant Association (conservative group) met the week before; there was no call to leave, but there was discussion of an amicable separation.
- General Conference has approved a gracious exit plan under certain circumstances. It would require a 2/3^{rds} vote of a church conference, all sorts of study by the Annual Conference to determine whether or not the petitioning church can viably survive on its own, then Annual Conference votes on the leaving. There is a process, but it is only open until 2023 and has to be because of disagreements over human sexuality. The church property would be kept by the church; however, the Board of Trustees of the Church and of the Annual Conf. would negotiate the terms of the transfer. The church would be closed as a UMC; then, the Conference Board of Trustees would transfer the property to the church Board of Trustees. There is only a pathway for a *church* to leave; however, not really a pathway for a *Jurisdiction* or *Annual Conference* to leave at this time.
- Matt is again a candidate for General Conference delegate [he was not elected.] Delegates will be elected in 2019 for the 2020 General Conference session.
- The Special Conference in St. Louis shifted the subject matter from a "conclusion" vision to "how do we find appropriate space between each other for everyone knowing that we don't speak the same language."
- One Baltimore/Washington Annual Conference resolution asks for the disaffiliation of the BWC from the UMC and a reaffiliation with Western Jurisdiction. This would be "out of order." There are a number of "aspirational resolutions" (not legislation) also being offered up at Annual Conference.

There will be **no June meeting of the Ad. Council**. **The next meeting will be on July 24 at 7 PM** (a recording secretary will be needed for that meeting.) **There will be no August meeting.** However, if Charge Conference is early, we will need time to prepare for that.

Rev. Amy closed the meeting in prayer at 8:18 PM.
