From the desk of the Pastor...

Dear Brothers and Sisters in the Lord:

You and I are part of a great fellowship. Wesley United Methodist Church is unique in the Lord's work and worship we have been able to accomplish together. We have been "family for each other" in all aspects of human life lived in the Lord: baptisms, weddings, funerals, as well as everyday life as a part of a faith community. It has been a very rare occasion when I need to come to you with a pastoral appeal, but that moment has arrived.

Dear friends, this summer has been an extremely difficult one, financially-speaking. While there

are a variety of possible reasons for why this might be so, the bottom line is that we have been struggling mightily to pay the bills for our operating budget. While people have been very generous in their contributions to Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP), youth trips, and other special

giving opportunities, our general giving has decreased suddenly and substantially. What that means is that Laura Waltrup, our church treasurer, has needed to "pick and choose" what gets paid and what doesn't. At this time, we are behind two months on our apportionment payments ("Mission Shares") to the Annual Conference. Pension and medical bills are a month behind at this time. A large (and unexpected) insurance payment has come due that we have been unable to pay. These are just some of the stressors upon our church coffers. There are others.

The Finance Committee met this past week, and we decided together that we would ask the congregation to please consider giving more to our operating budget. If everyone were to give even five more dollars a week, we would be in a better situation than we are. I wanted to be the one to write the letter, because I want to inform you about where we are and because, quite frankly, the financial situation is stressing me out. It is difficult to focus on preaching and ministry when I am concerned about the budget.

Denny and I give a tithe of our income to Wesley. It is our joy and privilege to do so. We also give above and beyond that to various opportunities as they arise. We see the money as belonging to God, and we are giving back what God has given to us already. Would you consider joining us in giving back to God an appropriate portion of what God has given to you? Please help us meet our financial responsibilities, so that we can re-focus our attention on mission and ministry. With gratitude, I am,


I want to thank everyone for the thoughts, prayers, cards, communications, and visits during my health issues in June. The love and concern helped a lot.







Donations to Wesley UMC in Memory of Loved Ones



When a loved one passes, many times family and friends make donations to Wesley UMC in memory of that person. There are many ways to give to our church including our Wesley Improvement Projects (WIP) Fund, the longer term Building Fund, Orphan Stone Repairs and of course, the Memorial Fund. In addition, an Endowment Fund was created in late 2018 for the purpose of accumulating a principal balance over time through donations and bequests in the hopes that it will someday produce an income stream off the interest earned. Donors can designate funds given in memory of a loved one as they wish. And families of a loved one who has passed can designate a specific purpose for how donations are used, such as the Lucy Harrell Scholarship Fund and Linda Rill Playground. However, a change was made as agreed upon by the Memorial Committee and affirmed through a vote by Ad Council on 2/27/2019. All donations received in memory of a loved one that does not indicate a specific designated fund or purpose, will be split equally between Memorial Funds and Endowment Funds. "But my life is worth nothing to me unless I use it for finishing the work assigned me by the Lord Jesus—the work of telling others the Good News about the wonderful grace of God." ---Acts 20:24 (NLT)

In the past, we have dedicated this newsletter to children and youth, moms and dads, but what about the revered wise ones of our congregation? Now is the time! We appreciate your stories, wisdom, advice, memories, and knowledge of the grace we have been given through Christ. We have listed some texts about growing old, imparting accumulated knowledge, and celebrating a life well-lived with our God.

Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.

A Life God Rewards by Bruce Wilkinson (232). Jesus revealed a direct link between what you do today and what you will experience after you die. Wilkinson shows you what Jesus said about God's plan to reward you in eternity for what you do for Him today. This will help to unlock the power and potential of your life, and you will live with the unshakable certainty that what you do today matters forever.

Ruth Bell Graham: Celebrating an Extraordinary Life by Stephen Griffith (920). From a small village in China to a mountaintop in North Carolina, the light of Ruth Bell Graham can be traced through the lives of those who knew and loved her. This is a unique portrait of one of America's most revered and influential Christian women as seen through the eyes of those who knew her best.

Chicken Soup for the Grandma's Soul: Stories to Honor and Celebrate the Ageless Love of Grandmothers by Jack Canfield (240). Whether you're a veteran grandma or a Nana-to-be, this collection of stories will warm your heart and make you laugh about the universal experiences of being a grandmother: the phone call that announces your baby will become a mom herself; the first time you hold the most beautiful grandson or granddaughter in the world; and the day you're on baby-sitting duty and realize that major issues are minor infractions best solved with love instead of lectures. This book celebrates the memories we make and the times we cherish with grandmothers: the women who can both spoil and be stern; who provide unconditional love and invaluable wisdom; who can share sage advice while sharing an ice cream.

The Golden Hours by Edna Hackett Oliphant (800). This is a collection of poems, thoughts, and words of wisdom, compiled during her later years spent at Presbyterian Home of Maryland.

It's Taken Years to Get This Old by Karen O'Connor (269). You're wiser, your life is a bit more settled, and you get to spoil your grandkids. Getting older offers these advantages...and at least one more: senior moments to smile and laugh about. Popular speaker and humorist, Karen O'Connor, takes a lighthearted look at the "perils" of growing older, such as ordering a Coke and fries at a bank drive-thru.

Nearing Home by Billy Graham (232) Scripture is filled with examples of men and women whom God used late in life, often with great impact—Noah, Abraham, Moses, Elizabeth, and Anna, to name a few. They were ordinary men and women who discovered that the latter years of life can be some of the most rewarding and fulfilling. In this moving narrative, [Billy Graham] reflects on his life and contemplates what God still has in store for him.

My Favorite Senior Moments by Karen O'Connor (269). Ah, those senior moments we dread...and yet laugh about. Gentle humorist Karen O'Connor tickles your funny bone in these senior moments that also highlight the many blessings of living long. You'll chuckle and want to share these stories that reveal the sunny...and funny sides of life.

Our library is for you to use and enjoy. Remember to sign your name and date to the card found in the back of the book. File the card in the yellow box under the letter that begins your last name. When you return a book, find the card, put the return date on the card, and put the card in the pocket of the book. You can stack books on the shelf beside the yellow box or on the desk; the librarians will re-shelve them. Please return borrowed items within 6 months.

- **Outreach is also collecting School Supplies and will take them the first Sunday in August or first Monday (in by August 4th) to NESAP. There are two big bins in the back of the church marked School Supplies.**

Christian Ed.:

- A smaller group will be meeting after the Cherokee trip to discuss curriculum changes.
- Teachers are getting lined up and shuffled around.
- Last year, there were two Sundays with combined Sunday Schools (all ages; one before Advent and one on Palm Sunday). This year, Stephanie is looking at doing four of these events this coming year. She will be proposing to Sunday School teachers that we use the model of stations, where there is a cooking station, craft station, etc. The Sundays will be at harvest time in Oct., the 1st Sunday of Advent, the beginning of Lent, and Palm Sunday.
- **Adult Sunday School:** Plans are in the works to have some of the same offerings and some different offerings.
- This will be a confirmation year; at this time, there are three candidates. The class will start at the end of January (before Lent) and go through Pentecost.

Youth: Junior Youth Group (4-6 grades) Good year to do it. Sr. High girls are helping to lead the younger group. Will be on the youth calendar and brought to next Ad. Council.

Finance: Laura sent an email out to the Ad. Council ahead of time, but will answer questions.

- Cash flow is tight; it is tighter than normal. Expenses have been cut, but income is down. We do not usually recover until November's supper. The amount that we have in the bank to pay bills is down. We've been tracking all year about \$8-9,000 low in income and cash flow.
- There has not been a recent Finance meeting.
- It will soon be budget season.

Trustees:

- The Trustees understands where we are financially. WIP funds are different from the regular budget; however, they have been "derelict" in getting the ladies room done. It will be done shortly. The decision on flooring needs to be made, then the bathroom can be put together.
- After that, it would be great to redo flooring from the stair tower to the Fellowship Hall; however, this depends on finances. It would also be great to get new tables and chairs (this was brought up in the town hall meeting.) At the next meeting, the Trustees will consider if that makes sense. WIP consider asking the congregation to help us replace the flooring as a fundraiser like the Window Warrior project (18/22 windows "sold.")
- The fuel oil tank is still not hooked up; the tank is in, but the "plumbing" from tank to furnace has to be redone. John has not pushed the company on it. This part of the bill is approx. \$3-400. Shipley noticed the leak and informed us; we had to fix once we knew about it.

- Pam to John Martin: thanks for putting the huge expense of the fuel tank on his personal credit card to buy us 30 days to pay for the cost. He will be reimbursed; this is a red flag for finances. Borrowing the money from WIP was discussed with the understanding that this is NOT a capital expense. Comment from John Sies: There have been times in the history of this congregation when the treasurer had to make decisions about which bills needed to be paid at what time. There is no secret that at one time or another, we have robbed Peter to pay Paul. We got through it; there was no great stressing; it was done because it was necessary. **Linda Yost made a motion to take the money from WIP (borrow the money) to pay back John for the tank expense; seconded by Stephanie. All in favor; none opposed; none abstained.**
- The A/C in the Education Wing needs signs and proactive turning on and off.

UMW: Minutes will be forwarded out.

- UMW is still collecting Box Tops for Education for the Board of Child Care (Betty Barr.) They are used for educ. materials, etc.
- The UMW will be having a Boscov's Coupon Sale (\$5 for discounts; Sale Date: Wednesday, Oct. 16th.)
- The Susanna Wesley House Gala is open to all (with tickets—see Linda Yost.) It will be on September 21st from 1 to 5 pm. The Susanna Wesley House is a national mission organization in Baltimore.
- Fall Supper (November 9, 2019) – Please help support the UMW through the Christmas Table & Bake Table.
- Mission U – Linda & Connie will be attending.
- Spring Supper – An Organizer/Facilitator is needed to take the reins of this supper. There are folks who would help, but there is no one to lead the event.

UMM: No recent meeting.

- Sponsored Lemonade on the Lawn with ice cream.
- The men have been asked to cook for the church picnic; awaiting reply.

Worship: Will be meeting August 4th, 2019

- There has been a meeting with Rev. Amy to create a calendar for the year. The group will be working through the calendar at the August 4th meeting.
- There will be a new service on December 21st (a Saturday). It will be a "Longest Night/Blue Christmas" service. More details on the calendar.
- Linda Yost informed us that the Choir is having a party at Jan Graf's on August 22nd. If you would like to come and join the choir, Jan Graf would welcome you with open arms.

Rev. Amy: On July 1st, Rev. Amy started her 30th year of ministry in the UMC.

- Charge Conference will be on October 8th, 2019, at 7 PM at Pleasant Grove UMC.
- There will be an August meeting of a/the subcommittee of the Lay Leadership Committee. A huge slate of officers is rolling off; we could also talk about the Ad. Council format as it is or whether we want to have a different model. Might be the right moment to do that in August to help avoid burnout for members. This will be ahead of the probably two nominations meetings starting in September.
- It was noticed that in the past, folks have discussed another form of organization as approved by the Book of Discipline. We have been very administratively heavy, traditionally. There was a motion that we refer the question on organizational structure to the Lay Leadership Committee, to come back at the August Ad. Council meeting (on August 28th at 7 PM) to provide us a report of what the options are. Matt made the motion; Jess seconded it. All were in favor; none opposed; none abstained. If there is a new form of organization to be taken, it would begin in January of 2020. Ad Council would approve the new form.

Lay Member to Annual Conference: Linda Yost will not be returning as a Lay Member to Annual Conference. Matt may be moving out of the role of Lay Member to A/C because he will possibly be moved to clergy this coming A/C.

NEW BUSINESS:

Motion to Escrow Apportionments: Lee Ann Crochunis, as an individual, not as Finance Chair, but representing others in the congregation who are interested in the issue being presented, brought forth a motion that dealt with the Human Sexuality question. Traditionally, the Book of Discipline as it exists has rules specific to ordaining / commissioning candidates who are practicing homosexuals [LGBTQIA]. At the Special February General Conference Session, there were amendments to Book of Discipline, but the current stance on the issue was confirmed. Our Baltimore Washington Conference (BWC) violated the Discipline in two cases [since then.] The Recommendation/motion was to say as a church that the Conference went against the Book of Discipline, and as an outward sign of that, Wesley UMC would hold apportionments aside and send a letter to the Bishop to this effect. An additional note is that due to the personal disagreements individuals have with the BWC, some giving has been diverted away from the General Fund; there are, however, also viewpoints in support of the BWC's actions.

The conversation that followed was thorough and detailed. Some of it touched on the following:

- **What do apportionments pay for through the UMC?** **A:** Multiple funds: General Conference, Jurisdictional Conference, Annual Conference. Things like World Service, General Boards of the UMC, Africa University, conference budgets, etc.
- **What happens to our money?** **A:** 68% goes to Mission and Ministry; 32% is Administrative. The local church pays the BWC, which takes that and pays their budget. Part of their budget is a large chunk to Jurisdictional Conference. JC does the same thing for the General Conference.
- **Have we ever withheld apportionments before?** **A:** Yes: Between 1860 and 1868, Wesley withheld apportionments because it disagreed with the position of the United Methodist Church on slavery.
- **What would this group want to see from the BWC in order to release apportionments put into escrow?** **A:** "As such time as the actions have been corrected" (per the motion); this could mean different things. The Book of Discipline changed, the Annual Conference won't do it again, the persons (Bishop or individuals commissioned/ordained) tried.
- **Have charges been brought up on the Bishop?** **A:** No. Then why do we have the right to find her guilty and punish her if others have not?
- **From where did this originate?** **A:** From a group of people within this church, not local churches. However, it is being discussed in other areas like Hereford, Little Orleans, and Oakdale UMCs. It was noted that many, many churches withhold apportionments [around the General Conference on both sides of the issues.]
- **Would we not have to call a congregational meeting to decide this?** **A:** No. The UMC is not a congregationally-run church, but is led by the Administrative Council, made up of individuals chosen by the church and confirmed at Charge Conference.
- **Does the Book of Discipline say when we have a right to withhold apportionments?** **A:** In fact, it is given as the [local] church's first responsibility to pay apportionments, and it would be a direct violation of Rev. Amy's ordination for her to advocate withholding them.
- **Is the BWC meeting anytime soon to discuss a position?** **A:** The BWC has determined at the 2019 Annual Conference that it will go against the Book of Discipline. It has already taken a stance and implemented it.
- **What action can the BWC take against our church if we don't pay?** **A:** Bishops change, so each thing is different, but it could result in looking like we can't afford a full-time clergy person could become part-time, part of a charge, etc.

Some of the thoughts brought up in the conversation include:

- Apportionments are like tithing; the money is God's. We are all sinful human beings, but that doesn't warrant not tithing. There are other ways to protest.
- It probably won't ever be corrected; the trend is showing signs that the UMC will change in structure—what do we do with apportionments in escrow at that time?
- This motion seems to be premature and like wielding apportionments as a weapon when we haven't had conversations as a church about this.
- There is no system of accountability for the UMC the way it is today, which frustrates many. The bishops can't be held accountable by other jurisdictions—just those bishops in their own jurisdiction. There is no other way for a church to dissent.
- The motion is about a rule and rule-breaking, not necessarily about our feelings.
- Is it right to violate the Book of Discipline to protest someone else breaking the Book of Discipline?
- Rev. Amy is vehemently opposed to not paying apportionments per paragraph 340.2E – pg. 277 of the 2016 Book of Discipline.

The discussion took a turn towards having communication with the congregation. Kim Peake said that we have to aggressively address putting the conversation out there. Even if the church splits down the middle, we **MUST** be talking about it and deciding where we stand. The two small groups at Wesley met together to discuss the question of human sexuality, and Laura Waltrup did a great job of leading us in the conversation. It helped the participants get a broader view of the issue. Laura said that we are not doing our job if we are not taking into account the feelings of the parishioners. We all have a responsibility to really try to understand both positions. Finding out what other people think helps us be more caring and respectful and helps the situation become less like a "camp" situation. Matt Sichel said that he assisted with bringing the motion here tonight, and that he would be willing to table it as long as we discuss it and keep on discussing it. A second was needed to table the motion, which Vicky Wilmer did. **The vote to table the motion was 17 for, 4 against, and 0 abstaining.**

From there, the Council discussed how to encourage/create areas of conversation for the issue. Some things suggested included holding classes twice a month on Sunday mornings with two or three educated people leading the group; praying about it and coming back together to work it out based on the Word of God; being open, but structured; using the resource[s] used in the small groups; lunch and discussions once a month, etc. **Send ideas for how to discuss the issue to Pam; if interested in creating the discussion structure, talk to Laura.**

We stood, held hands, and prayed, closing the meeting at 9:07 PM. The next meeting is August 28th at 7 PM.
