I have to confess to being a member of the former, not the latter. I was girding up my loins for "same old, same old,"

Since 1984 The Northeast Social Action Program (NESAP) has been helping our neighbors in need by "Inspiring Hope and Restoring Dignity." Our Mission Statement defines our purpose and guides us daily to be God's feet on the street when our neighbor is in crisis. Whether it is a single mom that has no food to feed her kids because she was laid off, or a family that lost everything in a fire, or an elderly person that has no money to pay their heating bill in the middle of winter because of an unexpected medical bill. These heart breaking stories are heard often by our staff; luckily, due to our community partners, churches and people like you, we have the resources to continue to answer the call and be there in times of crisis. Your generous gift has helped put food in the refrigerator of that single mom and make sure that elderly person has heat. As stated in our Mission Statement, our goal is to help every client that is capable to work toward self sufficiency; I love that part of our Mission Statement.

In my time at NESAP I have met many that are now donors that once received assistance from NESAP. They often say to the staff, "I don't know what I would have done without NESAP when I was in crisis; now I want to give back."

Thank you for your generous gift...that will provide that hand up to our neighbor that feel down and is just asking for a hand up! Your gift was critical in helping to raise a total of \$28,432 and 3, 881 pantry items, which exceeded our goal.


* The Rev. Dr. Stanley Harrell provided a definition of "batey" for us:


Also, GriefShare members and friends will continue to meet once a month throughout the year for breakfast. Anyone who is interested in joining them for breakfast or wants to



Library Notes

"O Lord, you are so good, so ready to forgive, so full of unfailing love for all who ask for your help." Psalms 86:5 "Instead, be kind to each other, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you." Ephesians 4:32



Forgiving is hard...no, it is HARD. Sometimes we think we have forgiven someone and then we realize in our hearts that we truly have not fully forgiven. How long does forgiveness take? Is it an ongoing struggle? How can we gain strength in our faith through forgiving others? How does our faith help in giving grace to others? These books may help in our search for guidance. Information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved.

Praying for Wholeness and Healing by Richard J. Beckmen (245). Beckmen begins with questions: How do we pray for healing? Why are some people not cured? What does forgiveness have to do with healing? He explores historical Biblical, theological, and practical matters related to praying for healing. Study questions and activities are included.

Completely Forgiven: Responding to God's Transforming Grace by Shannon Ethridge (232). Does the abundant life that Jesus promised seem like a distant dream? Do you wrestle with a sense of inadequacy wondering how God could possibly use someone like you? Let this encouraging 30-day devotional serve as a reminder that God delights in using imperfect people to accomplish His perfect will. Packed with Biblical insights and inspiration, this guide looks at the Biblical stories of people who plumb the depth of God's mercy and demonstrate His willingness to create beauty out of the ashes of our sorrows and regrets.

Building Healthy Relationships by Peter Scazzero. (226) A six-part study on love: Loving Jesus: Loving God's Family, Loving Your Neighbor, Love that Forgives, Loving with Your Words, and Love that Lasts.

Loved: Stories of Forgiveness by Rebecca St. James (920). If you have ever made poor choices or stumbled in your faith, you are not alone. But be encouraged: there is hope! These forty-eight true stories of women who turned away from God before finding their way back to Him will inspire you to rediscover and embrace God's incredible forgiveness and love. God is waiting for you with open arms!

The Power of Right Believing: 7 Keys to Freedom from Fear, Guilt, and Addiction by Joseph Prince (232). Believing right is the key to a victorious life proclaims Prince. The seven keys are believe in God's love for you, learn to see what God sees, receive God's complete forgiveness, win the battle for your mind, be free from self-occupation, have a confident expectation of good, and find rest in the Father's love.

Forgive and Forget by Lewis B. Smedes (180) How can you forgive a friend's betrayal, a parent's limitations, an unfaithful lover? Forgiving is love's toughest work, and love's biggest risk. But you have the power to free others—and yourself—from undeserved guilt and pain. In Forgive and Forget, Lewis B. Smedes shows you how to move from hurting and hating to healing and reconciliation. With the lessons of forgiveness, you can establish healthier relationships, reclaim the happiness that should be yours, and achieve lasting peace of mind.

Total Forgiveness by R.T.Kendall (232). One of the core messages of the gospel is that of total forgiveness. Jesus forgives totally, and He expects no less from us. In this revised and updated version of the best-selling book, Kendall teaches how you too can experience this incredible freedom as he lovingly challenges you to root out the hidden and hardened places where resentments remain. As you read, you will be encouraged by the new testimonies of people whose lives were changed as they learned to forgive. Make the choice of forgiveness today, and step into a new dimension of freedom and inner peace.
