

Library Notes

"Eternal God, our Heavenly Father, may this month of pine and spruce and balsam, this month of holly wreaths and candle glow, this month of visiting, homecoming, song and laughter, this month of giving and getting of gifts, be, above all, Christ's month...Make us as quiet of heart and mind as the Judean hills, so that, like serene shepherds, we may hear the heavenly voices, and partake of the heavenly joy, and gladly obey the heavenly command to go to that humble place where Christ can be found. Some suggestions for this month of Christ (information in parentheses indicates where library items are shelved):

Christmas Jars by Jason F. Wright (Fiction). Hope Jensen is a young, single woman and an aspiring newspaper writer, and when she receives a much needed, but anonymous Christmas gift, she's determined to find her benefactor. That search leads her to an unusual family with a longstanding Christmas tradition. Sensing a front-page feature article, Hope desperately wants to publish their story, but doing so would be a breach of trust. What she decides to do will change her life forever. This Christmas tale is a heartwarming story that will restore your faith in mankind and make you want to start your own Christmas Jar tradition.

Miracle in the Manger by Tim Wesemann (Children). This is the story of the birth of Jesus told for very young children.

In Unexpected Places by Harold Kohn (240) This is a collection of sketches, poems, prayers, thoughts, and advice about the season of Christmas. It encourages us to, during shopping, rushing, decorating, and planning, do our Christmas **thinking** early.

Two From Galilee by Marjorie Holmes (Fiction) One hushed Christmas Eve several years ago, a woman sat in a darkened church. The greens, the carols, the beauty of the night—all contributed to the expectant stillness that filled the church. Suddenly, she became aware of the strong sweet smell of the hay in the candlelit manger. [She realized that the Christmas story really happened.] The impact of the discovery was overwhelming, and the woman left the church that night determined to tell the story of two real people whose lives were touched by God.

Home for Christmas by Marble Cove [Anne Marie Rodgers] (Fiction) It's Christmastime in Marble Cove, and Margaret gets an unexpected and unwanted gift: a letter from the IRS. On top of that, her mother's beloved angel ornament is missing. Is it any wonder Margaret is having a hard time finding her Christmas spirit? Meanwhile, Diane looks forward to spending time with her kids and sharing some great news. Shelley receives a shock when a social worker arrives on her doorstep. Will her niece Hailey be taken away before she even settles in? And Beverly is determined to make her first Christmas with Jeff perfect—until a blizzard threatens all the Newport Avenue neighbors' best-laid plans and reminds them of the true meaning of the holiday. Volume 19 in the Miracles of Marble Cove Series.

Christmas: Reflections on the Joy of the Season by Heather Russell-Revesz (800) Peace. Love. Joy. Nowadays our daily lives are so rushed and harried that often "the most wonderful time of the year" turns into "the most stressful time of the year." The collection of quotes gathered in Christmas: Reflections on the Joy of the Season will hopefully remind readers what the holiday season is all about.

The Purpose of Christmas by Rick Warren (230) Why is Christmas such a big deal? If you stop to think about it, it is astounding that the simple, unassuming birth of a peasant baby boy more than two thousand years ago in the Middle East can today cause traffic jams every December in places like New York City, Tokyo, and Rio de Janeiro. The night Jesus Christ was born in Bethlehem, a small group of poor shepherds were quietly tending their flocks of sheep in a nearby field, looking up at the stars. Nothing seemed any different from a thousand other nights. But what was about to happen would transform not only their lives but billions of other lives as well. The world would never be the same again.

Charge Conference Minutes • October 23, 2019

Charge Conference for Wesley UMC opened on October 23, 2019, at 7:00pm at the Social Hall of Pleasant Grove UMC with a welcome from its pastor, the Rev. Dick Harden, and the Rev Dr. Ann Laprade, District Superintendent for the Baltimore-Suburban District and Presiding Elder for the Charge Conference. Churches present were: Pleasant Grove, Mt. Zion (Black Rock), Millers, Bixlers, Greenmount, St. John's, Grace (Black Rock), Wesley, Patapsco & Shiloh.

Present from Wesley: Rev. Amy & Mr. Denny Rill; Mr. & Mrs. Matthew and Jessica Sichel, Miss Rose Sichel, Mr. Isaac Sichel, Mr. & Mrs. Jonathan and Linda Yost; Mrs. Brenda Hess; Mrs. Vicky Wilmer; Mrs. Pam Phillips; Mrs. Sandy Cole; Mrs. Laura Waltrup; Mr. John Sies; Mrs. Kim Peake; Mr. John Martin; Miss Cynthia Davey; Mr. Michael Eastwood; Mrs. Stephanie Halley; Mr. & Mrs. George and Jocelyn Davey.

The Scripture lesson was Exodus 14 and the escape of the Israelites across the Red Sea. Rev. Laprade noted that with the turmoil in the United Methodist Church it looks like there will be no return to the condition of pre 2019 and the Special General Conference, just like the Israelites could not go back to Egypt. However, she challenged everyone to move forward into the Red Sea of the future in faith, knowing that God would make a path for all of us through the uncertainty.

Following the devotional exercises, the Conference business began. We viewed a video from Bishop Easterling about the Bible Study being offered by the Conference called, "Who Are We? A journey from head to heart." The study is meant to help us understand both our differences and appreciate our similarities as we approach our Christian faith as United Methodists.

Next, Rev. Laprade presented the questions required for the Charge Conference reports. Each church presented in turn: Milers-Bixlers Charge; Mt. Zion; North Carroll Cooperative Parish; Pleasant Grove; Shiloh-Patapsco; Wesley.

For Wesley, Rev. Amy spoke about the challenges facing the whole denomination due to divisions over human sexuality. She lauded our strong laity who, in their desire to report on these divisions, developed a program to do so. Our "Let's Talk" gatherings were a success and she thanked the lay leadership of Wesley. She noted that Wesley is the church that "has her heart."

Wesley approved its lay leadership report, still needing to name a Finance Committee Chairperson [and needing additional edits due to errors made by Jess Sichel in the preparation of the form.] Wesley approved the Clergy Compensation Report.

Linda Yost gave her report as a Certified Lay Servant, noting that she has a lot of competition for pulpit supply from Wesley's two seminary students. She is also Conference UMW president. She was affirmed unanimously.

Matt Sichel was approved as a Certified Lay Servant and as a Certified Candidate for Ordained Ministry unanimously. He gave a report emphasizing the importance of Sunday School education for all ages.

Stephanie Halley was approved as a Candidate for Ordained Ministry unanimously. She gave a report about youth ministry at Wesley, but she challenged the church to go out and find the people who are in need of the fellowship of the church. She also emphasized the importance of rethinking children and youth ministry.

Matt witnessed to the power and gift of Wesley fully supporting two seminary students. [He also expressed concern about the attention given to local UMCs by the Conference.]

All other churches present gave their reports. Dick Harden thanked everyone for coming to Pleasant Grove and invited everyone to support their new ministry called, "The Gathering Table," which is a dinner church that meets on Saturday evening in their Social Hall. Lynn Sheavely, former director of NESAP is the spiritual leader for that new service.

Rev. Laprade closed in prayer and the 2019 Charge Conference adjourned at 8:45pm.
