From the desk of the Pastor...

"This Too Shall Pass" and "The Ten-Year Rule"

I need to be honest. This has not been a restful summer. Trying to negotiate a "new normal" during a pandemic has not been for the faint of heart. For my clergy colleagues all over the globe, with whom I share blogs and Facebook pages, the laments are often similar: "Everyone has an opinion and I cannot seem to please anyone. Church members can be so MEAN!" "Does any-

one know the best media forum for getting worship services out to everyone, including those who do not own a computer?" "I have not been able to visit with my home-bound and assisted living-dwelling parishioners since March. It is killing me." These are

just a few of the words I have seen written from those called to ordained ministry. If we are feeling this way, I am certain you are, too. Perhaps you feel isolated and alone, frustrated, angry or depressed. You are not alone. Human beings were not made for this.

When I was going through a divorce that was about as horrible as divorces can possibly be during the mid-1990s, my then District Superintendent, The Rev. Dr. Mary Jo Zimmerli, said four words to me: "*This too shall pass.*" During that awful period in my life, I could not envision a time when I would no longer be paying attorney's fees and fighting custody battles. Such a time did come, however. It was then that I discovered the wisdom of Dr. Zimmerli's words: "*This too shall pass.*" Divorces do not go on forever. Pandemics come to an end. *This too shall pass.*

There is little we can control about our world right now. Control is a human illusion, anyway. God is the only one who can do that. What we can do, however, is maintain our spiritual lives and integrity to the best of our ability. When I counsel couples for marriage, I always ask, "Ten years from now, where do you see yourselves?" It is a question designed to help them look beyond the wedding day to where they see themselves in a different stage of their married lives together. For what we are going through right now, I would consider the ten-year rule a bit differently. For those of us fortunate enough to live another ten years, I wonder how we will look back upon our behavior during this pandemic. Did we trust God to lead us? Did we have faith? Did we let Jesus into our boats (to quote a recent sermon)? Last, but not least, did we treat others with respect, kindness and love during the 2020 pandemic, or did we let our emotions and fear get the best of us, thereby projecting negativity onto others in hurtful ways that will not be forgotten...even ten years from now?

This (pandemic) too shall pass. Are we exhibiting faith and behavior that we will be proud of ten years from now?





WELCOME BACK TO THE LIBRARY! You can now come in and check out materials. There isn't a lot of traffic in here and it's a quiet place to visit; please feel free to wander around! You can pick out books for you and your children!

******Important to remember!! We have CDs of past church services available for you to take home and listen to, if you cannot make it to our service on a Sunday. No need to check out the CDs, just bring them back when you are finished with them.******

We thought that, given the stress that we are experiencing due to the pandemic, it may be a good idea to check out some fiction books. Even better, start a series...you can jump into the characters' lives and forget about what is making you crazy now! Here are some suggestions:

A Thrill of Hope and Heavenly Peace by Marble Cove [Patti Berg] (Fiction). Two books in one. In *A Thrill of Hope*, the beautiful Christmas ornament that mysteriously appears on Diane's doorstep brings with it the haunting cries of a baby in the night and poignant memories of her late mother's final wish, which set her on a course to bring a living Nativity back to Marble Cove. With Christmas just four weeks out and one obstacle after another standing in her way, time isn't on Diane's side – but hope is. Still, she knows it will take a miracle! In *Heavenly Peace*, Shelley's Christmas season is shattered by the unexpected arrival of her mother – without her stepfather – adding to a busy baking schedule. And when Shelley's father and stepmother arrive early for their visit, the turmoil deepens. Tasked with finding the costumes for the living Nativity, Shelley is convinced she'll need a miracle of her own when all of her efforts yield nothing. Can she find peace amid the chaos? Volume 1 of the Christmas "Miracles of Marble Cove" series. (Yes, this is about Christmas, but let's REALLY pretend!)

The Postcard by Beverly Lewis (Fiction). Rachel Yoder, a young Amish widow, struggles to come to terms with the tragic loss of her husband, her son, and her sight. Though painfully shy, Rachel and her precocious daughter help her parents run a bed-and-breakfast in Lancaster County. Philip Bradley, a New York journalist on assignment, comes to stay at the family's B & B. When he finds an old postcard written in Pennsylvania Dutch, he enlists Rachel's help in uncovering its mysteries. Soon Philip and Rachel are drawn to one another. Will the community succeed in keeping them apart—and the postcard's secrets hidden forever?

A.D. Chronicles: First Light by Bodie and Brock Thoene (Fiction). Spiritual and political darkness shroud the world's holiest and most turbulent city. Ruled by Rome and manipulated by religious rulers with only selfish interest in mind, the people of Jerusalem wonder if their Deliverer will ever come. Susanna and Manaen desperately search for hope and meaning—in a world where their love is forbidden. Others pray and wait for light, the True Light of Messiah, to dawn. Peniel the beggar, Marcus the Roman centurion, Zadok the Chief Shepherd of Israel, and his three adopted orphan boys—all long for a vision of hope. Now a healer named Yeshua walks the streets of Jerusalem. Is He the true Messiah? Or only another imposter, like so many before Him?

A Mother's Sacrifice by Carole Towriss (Fiction) A tiny infant floating in the Nile...who became the man who saw God on the mountaintop and brought down the Ten Commandments. The reluctant leader who brought his people to the gates of the Promised Land. We all know the story of Moses. Less familiar is the story of his mother, Jochebed, an ordinary woman whose extraordinary quick thinking and courageous actions saved the life of her son in a time of great peril. Volume 1 in the Ordinary Women of the Bible Series

Administrative Council Minutes • June 24, 2020

The meeting began at 7:00 PM via Zoom.

Attendees: Pam Phillips (Chairperson), Jessica Sichel, Rev. Amy Sarah Lewis-Rill, Matthew Sichel, Jonathan Yost, Linda Yost, Laura Waltrup, Lisa Kemp, Dennis Rill, John Sies, and Vicky Wilmer.

Rev. Amy shared a **devotion** based on Moses' request to be passed over because of his lack of eloquence and God's direction to him. Exodus 4:10-16.

Outreach (highlights; please see full report in this issue of The Wesley Journal):

- **Takeout Tuesday**—89 people were served. Different people came. The Horners gave lettuce. People donate; lots of people are helping. It is involving the community and the church. At this time, the donations are funding the meal.
- **Church Picnic**—The church picnic will be held on August 30, 2020. We will need to know the number of people ahead of time. Men will take care of getting the meat.
- **Back-to-School**—waiting for word. NESAP/Pat Murphy still waiting for schools to decide. Some churches are sending just money.

Trustees: Linda Yost

- The Parsonage A/C is not working. Carroll Harris will be coming early next week.
- There is a new dehumidifier in the choir room that runs 24/7. It has made a noticeable difference.
- Wesley changed from Shipley to Aero for heating oil; later, we will shift to Aero for Propane. ****Any church member who uses Aero fuel can have \$0.04/gallon for the year donated to Wesley. Also, the church gets a credit back.**** [For information about Aero, please contact the church office.]
- The cemetery will pay for the 2020 mowing.
- The Trustees are investigating the Fellowship Hall flooring regarding moisture and new tile.
- The remotes for the new Air Conditioning units in the Education Wing need to be in sync with each other (e.g., they all need to be in "cool" mode). [All units on each side of the building use the same compressor, so putting one unit on "dry" and another unit on "cold" will cause a problem.]

Christian Education:

- "VBS in a Box" kits will be handed out on June 27. There are 50 reservations and 60 kits.
- Fall Sunday School for the children is TBD. Linda will take her cue from Carroll County Public Schools and the Bishop. She will assess and see if children's Sunday School will be okay. Adults can continue as they have been if they like.

SPRC: The next meeting of the committee will be in August.

UMW:

- The UMW provided 12 graduate cards.
- The unit will not meet again until September.

UMM: *No report.*

Finance:

- We are doing very well, financially.
- The Payroll Protection Program (PPP) Loan/Grant provided around \$27,000. It covered Payroll and more.
- We have about \$20,000 non-restricted funds in June in the operating budget, which has not been the case in quite some time.

Rev. Amy:

- We have been "open" for two Sundays. The first was a Traditional service on June 14. 26 people came. It was a bit stiff and strange. The second was a Contemporary [outdoor] service on June 21. 50 people came. It was more fun, etc. We were able to witness to passers-by. It was also graduate Sunday.
- On a personal note, Rev. Amy will be away from July 2nd through July 11th. There is no designated preacher in the inter-

mediate period [7/5]. Rev. Dick Harden from Pleasant Grove UMC will be providing pastoral back-up.

- Also, Rev. Amy passed her oral and written comprehensives with a 3.9 GPA. She now moves on to the dissertation portion of her program, which she believes will involve theology of animal rescue. On that note, there may be a St. Francis of Assisi Sunday in the future (the actual St. Francis of Assisi Sunday is in October.)

A discussion came about regarding people who have not been attending and what we can do for those who are missing.

- There seems to be some confusion as to whether or not the calls that happened earlier in the year (people took a page of the directory and called to check in on those individuals) are supposed to be ongoing.
- Our services are being live-streamed.
- People are being admitted to the Wesley Facebook Group Page.
- Vicky asked Jess about doing a flyer for Takeout Tuesday, basically saying "Worship at 10 AM" and to go online to view services. It is to be on a small, 1/4 sheet on colorful paper.
- Can we contact people who view the service(s) online? It would require a higher level of involvement in the web statistics, etc., to do this.
- A telephone poll of people in the directory was also suggested.
- One way to contact people at home would be to address them directly at some point during our live-streaming service, letting them know that we are here, how to go to the website, how to give an offering, etc.
- Rev. Amy affirmed Jess, how far we've come, and that we're reaching a great many more people than before. The increased interest in Wesley is great.
- It was noted that there is a learning curve.

The discussion then turned to issues regarding recording the services.

- The North Carroll Cooperative Parish's video is great, but it is integrated into the webpage. Jess Sichel indicated that there are levels of involvement for web pages: low maintenance, medium maintenance, and high maintenance. We are currently in medium maintenance, and going beyond that level would require more than Jess can offer.
- John Sies indicated that we need to be careful putting too much on certain individuals. Jess emphasized having to be a people of prayer. We need to pray for people to come forward to assist with this and ask God to bring people forward.
- It was suggested that we could be more intentional about our Facebook and YouTube feeds, with announcements playing ahead of time. We could simply have a flyer with info on it as a slide(s) ahead of time. Basically, how can we have pre-playing advertisements prior to the service starting?
- Jess shared that someone commented and she herself observed that it is hard to hear the live streaming and noted that we are currently using people's personal cell phones. John Sies stated that we may be able to put a "shotgun" mic on recorders. Part of the sound loss is in recording amplified sound. We should talk to Bryce Davey about this.
- John Sies also shared that Gettysburg Presbyterian started out with an old camcorder. Instead of using a cell phone, using a digital recording device might be possible. John said that his son, Dean, indicated that an ordinary WIFI camera can do what we're talking about and to let him know if we want to be in contact with Dean. Matt Sichel is supposed to talk to Dean; John will send Dean's phone number.
- It is important that we invest the money in equipment well.
- Perhaps we can use a computer instead of a cell phone.
- John Sies noted that, in order for ideas to move forward, we must identify a champion or a leader for the cause.
- It was stated that Rev. Amy needs to put out a plea — a personal plea by mouth during worship or in the newsletter. [Prayer is also needed!]

The topic of conversation transitioned into talk of paying a person to come in and help with our Audio/Visual needs.

- Paying a person to come in might entice a younger person. The main work needs to be a paid person or two people. Perhaps we can advertise through the college? Jess Sichel has a connection at the community college who might be able to help.
- Could the Boy Scouts help?
- Pam will ask her boss at Gettysburg Presbyterian for a job description.
- Linda asked if we were talking about this as another staff position. Laura said that we are still under budget.
- Laura also noted that it is a challenge and unrealistic to get one person in every Sunday. Perhaps we could have someone do a summer internship?

- McDaniel College and Carroll Community College may provide some assistance for our needs; Carroll Media Center may have knowledge, etc., about equipment.

A motion was made to refer to SPRC the task of coming up with a job description and other information pertaining to hiring a media specialist for the church. This motion was made by Matt Sichel and seconded by Linda Yost. It was “declared so moved,” but a vote was not taken.

Use of Fellowship Hall: Vicky Wilmer asked about the use of the hall, specifically for Davona Palmer’s “Stampin’ Up” workshops. Davona can go ahead and put in a request for use of the hall and to put the September date on the calendar, but the event may have to be cancelled if there is a problem. Trustees will decide the issue and, if it is allowed, decide what requirements will be necessary (face mask, social distancing, people capacity, etc.) There will be a Trustees meeting on July 1st. Linda Yost will reach out to Davona.

Simplified, All-Carry-Out Dinner: Vicky also noted that we could consider an all-carry-out supper of fried chicken, simple veggies, and dessert, with a possible bake table from UMW, towards the end of August or September. The cost would be less, but the profit margin could still be significant. John Sies said that we could send out to the mailing list. Reservations could be made with someone. Laura Waltrup said that we can take preorders and pre-payments (PayPal/credit card is available!) Laura is also willing to take calls and payments. Pam will eventually contact Jeff Graf about his availability.

Westminster Rescue Mission: Laura stated that the Mission is desperate for people to help with the food run. There is some lifting from boxes of foods from grocery stores. The hours of pick-up are generally Mon.—Thurs. 8:30 to Noon. This could be a Service Learning Hours opportunity for youth (15 years old and up). The driver helpers would be with background-checked driving adults. Masks and gloves would be needed. Contact Laura Waltrup or Scot Hurley (Mission Volunteer Coordinator).

Worship Equipment: Lisa Kemp was given the go-ahead to purchase equipment. Paul McGill wants to donate the equipment (mics, cords, stands.) **[THANK YOU, PAUL!!]**

Christmas Concert: Lisa has spoken with Abby Otradovec (friend of Bill Harris), and they would still like to put on an Annual Christmas Concert to raise money for whatever purpose in Bill’s honor. At this time, they will plan for a Dec. 6th concert, but not sure whether it may be held. Jess will reserve a hold on the church for the entire week ahead of that date. Rehearsals would be held in advance. Contact for a lighting donation has already been done. The event will be cancelled if meetings/gatherings are still a problem leading up to that time. Lisa and co. will meet next week and start planning.

Youth: Vicky asked what is happening with the youth. At this time, nothing is happening right now. The youth landscape has changed, with four graduates this past spring. Jess Sichel volunteered to host a summer pool party and food after-hours at the pool. She will contact the Manchester-Lineboro Lions Club Pool and get back to Linda as soon as possible. We could invite all Youth from those going into 6th grade to those coming out of 12th. We could also have a sign-up ahead of time.

Certified Candidate for Ordained Ministry: Matt Sichel reported that the DCOM (District Committee on Ministry) voted to recertify Matt and asked him if he wanted to go before BOOM (Board of Ordained Ministry) for exams in February of 2021. The voted not to send him forward for the exams and gave him conditions to meet with his candidacy mentor and work on answers to the questions in his paperwork. Matt has also applied to the London School of Theology program through Asbury Seminary. He is waiting to hear from Asbury. He could start in October, but it would probably be February when he would begin.

Matt closed in prayer at 8:40 PM. The meeting ended at 8:43 PM.
