## Visitation Policy for LifeBridge Health

Effective August 20, 2021, LifeBridge Health has updated their visitation policy. Please note:

Visitor hours will be from 12 p.m. to 8 p.m.

 Patients, who are not under investigation for COVID-19 or COVID-positive, may have one designated visitor/support person AT A TIME.



- All visitors will be screened for flu-like symptoms and will not be allowed to visit the hospital if symptoms exist.
- Visitors MUST wear a mask. A mask will be provided if you do not have one.
- No visitors age 12 and under are allowed.
- Patients at end of life can have 2 visitors at a time.
- Surgical patients and outpatients will be permitted one visitor for the full duration of their stay.
- No visitors for COVID+ or PUI (exceptions for disability and compassionate care)

CLOTH MASKS ARE NOT PERMITTED. All visitors will be asked to continue social distancing practices in all areas (including waiting rooms).

Please note: Levindale has slightly different visiting hours and PPE guidelines. Their visiting hours are from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. and all visitors must wear a mask and eye protection. A mask and shield will be provided if visitors do not have them.

## **Orphan Stones:** Caring for Those Without Families



As All Saint's Sunday approaches and is observed, the Wesley U.M. Church Cemetery Committee is accepting donations for the repair of "Orphan Stones." Even though the cemetery is not responsible for the repairs to the monuments, we have many older ones that have no family left to repair them—thus they are "Orphan Stones." Time and weather have caused these older monuments to break, tilt, or fall. The earliest marked burial is 1841 and there are nearly 1,000 former members of our Church buried in the cemetery. Our church has a wonderful history of 231 years.

At this time, we have used many of the funds designated for Orphan Stones with repairs that need to be made to them. In honor of and gratitude to these people who founded and sustained our Church, and to keep our cemetery in good repair and appearance, we ask for your support. You may send your tax-deductible donation to the Church or put it in the collection plate on All Saint's Day or at any time. Be sure to add your name to the outside of an envelope and if you have a regular Church envelope, please include that number, also. Mark it for the "Orphan Stones" or Wesley Cemetery. 
# A Note from Wesley's United Methodist Women

# **Library Notes**

"Do you worry that you've written too many checks on God's kindness account? Do you drag regrets like a broken bumper? Do you huff and puff more than you delight and rest? 'If so, then I have a word for you', says Max Lucado. 'Grace.' *Grace* is simply another word for God's tumbling, rumbling reservoir of strength and protection. He has enough grace to pardon every sin, solve every dilemma, wipe every tear, and answer every question. It's more than we deserve and greater than we imagine. Grace." Here are a few books we found about grace!

Grace in a Tree Stump by J. Ellsworth Kalas (232) Christians often assume too sharp a distinction between the Old and New Testaments, argues preacher, teacher, and best-selling author J. Ellsworth Kalas. They are too quick to view the Old Testament as a strict book of laws and commandments and the New Testament as a witness to grace. The God of the Old Testament is misperceived as a God of wrath and judgment, while the God of the New Testament is

seen as a God of love and mercy. Using stories from the Old Testament, Kalas helps the reader see that grace has always been part of the character of God and that the Old Testament demonstrates that fact in a variety of ways. The character of God has not changed, says Kalas. It has always been grace-filled.

In the Grip of Grace by Max Lucado (232) Just imagine being love-driven instead of self-propelled. Imagine abandoning your life to Jesus instead of trying to save yourself. Can you imagine exchanging your fears for that peace that passes understanding? Being relaxed and free instead of stressed out and anxious? If you can imagine enjoying God instead of trying to repay him, then you can imagine grace.

Grace Will Lead Me Home! by Paul Gerhard Tittle (920) True story of a family of four generations living through two world wars and a cold war of equal brutality and extreme miserable conditions with nothing to eat and nothing to keep warm. It tells of three family members one of whom was severely wounded in World War I, the other who was imprisoned for over five years in Siberia in World War II, and a third family member who at his young age of 16 could not endure political indoctrination and starvation any longer. He made a bold attempt to escape from East Germany to freedom in West Germany. By God's grace all three were led safely home.

The Grace Awakening by Charles Swindoll (232) Preachers preach it. Teachers teach it. Theologians analyze it. Then we forget about it. Here, in a twentieth-anniversary edition, is *The Grace Awakening*. Charles Swindoll's best-selling classic that has awakened hundreds of thousands of readers to the untapped wonders of grace. Wonders that Christians know with their minds but forget with their hearts. Wonders that can make a difference in the way we live, in the way we approach life. Wonders that can make the difference between ho-hum religion and an intimate relationship with a God who wishes us nothing short of joy.

Grace by Max Lucado (232) Grace: we use the word for hospitals, baby girls, kings, and premeal prayers. We talk as though we know what grace means. But do we really understand it? When asked, "Do you believe in grace?" who could say no? Max Lucado asks a deeper question: Have you been changed by grace? Shaped by grace? Strengthened by grace? Emboldened by grace? Softened by grace? Snatched by the nape of your neck and shaken to your senses by grace? Grace comes after you. It rewires you. From insecure to God secure. From regret-riddled to better-because-of-it. From afraid-to-die to ready-to-fly. Grace is the voice that calls us to change and then gives us the power to pull it off.

A Dangerous Grace by Charles Colson (242) This is a collection of a year of daily readings from a man who was labeled a political scoundrel. Colson was converted to Christianity by God's grace and was transformed into someone who ministered through Prison Ministry. The body of Colson's work reveals a person transformed in every area of his life, every part of his thinking. When God gets a grip on our lives, nothing is left untouched.

Our library is for you to use and enjoy. Remember to sign your name and date to the card found in the back of the book. File the card in the yellow box under the letter that begins your last name. When you return a book, find the card, put the return date on the card, and put the card in the pocket of the book. You can stack books on the shelf beside the yellow box or on the desk; the librarians will re-shelve them. Please return borrowed items within 6 months.

- The leadership is checking with teachers to see if anyone is coming back to teach Sunday School for the Fall 2021 school year.
- Confirmation Class: for Confirmation Class to be run, at least two people are needed. Rev. Amy emphasized that this should be a priority, that it is once in a lifetime. A mix of ages is being asked based on attention/interest.
- Fall curriculum: Jen & Linda are working on this. They liked what they used and would like to use it again. Lisa often comes up with her own material. Lisa will need assistance. The High School class is using the Bible (leaders are Nan Lishman, Chet Phillips, and Vicky Wilmer).

**Worship:** Jess Sichel made a mistake with the Father's Day gifts, which she will rectify [gifts were handed out and mentioned in the July 4th worship bulletin].

#### Trustees:

- There was no water in the church after the recent rainfall.
- There is a question about payment for the mulch; the estimated cost is \$210.00.
- A cello teacher who usually uses McDaniel College as the location for his lessons has been given permission to use the church for that purpose. Wesley has two out of the three students (Jonathan Yost and Alayna Mahosky).
- A question was asked about the high cost of HVAC utilities. The answer was that the first quarter's financials
  were the ones that were looked at. We were not on budget billing at the time. The figure looked high because
  of the timing of the high utility use. It was noted that Trustees needs to check the heat in the Parsonage; Denny
  Rill will do this.
- The report for the Ad. Council from Trustees is as follows:

- Trustees met in person and virtually on June 2, 2021.
- Mike Sichel determined that Sigmund's price for the Church office ac/heating unit was too high, (\$9500) and a GE unit was also high (\$8500). Linda contacted Carroll Harris who priced this unit at \$3920. Carroll was given the go ahead to order this unit, which is expected to arrive in August.
- Some gutters and downspouts have been replaced along the Education wing outside of the Choir room. Proposed and agreed that down spout be cut off leading into the French drain and re-routed along the outside wall of the Education wing to discharge near sidewalk at end of wing. Gary and Denny have completed this and we will wait to see if this corrects the leaking problem.
- Gordon Benson will be ordering 7 yards of mulch from Schaeffer. Trustees work day is scheduled for this Saturday, June 26<sup>th</sup>, beginning at 9:00 a.m. Need workers, shovels, wheel barrows, rakes, and buckets.
- Tommy Smith has begun work on his Eagle Scout project at the Parsonage.
- The Meditation Garden near the cemetery is in need of attention. Both benches need repair and staining, and the gardens need weeding and replanting. Phillip Daugherty will contact Robert Kirby to see if the Scouts could help him work on it. According to Robert Kirby, the Scouts have done repairs over the years.
- Girl Scouts have been allowed back into the building and met this past week for the girls to work on some badges.
- Boy Scouts are requesting to use the shelves in the parsonage garage for some of their items. It was recommended that their items be labeled. This will be done over the summer.
- No meeting for Trustees during July and August. If something comes up, we will have a Zoom meeting.
- Cello lessons by Tim Anderson. Request by Jonathan Yost for lessons to be held in the church hall. Safe Sanctuary rules must be followed. In lieu of Fee, it is recommended that 2 special music performances be given during a worship service in 2021/2022.
- Question to Finance Committee: Why are the Utilities for the Church Building and Parsonage so high when the buildings were not in use? Linda to take to Finance committee for answer.

**SPRC:** A new Youth Director is needed. There was a recommendation that we could advertise for free on Indeed (Laura Waltrup said that the Mission did this all the time). Also, Zip Recruiter has a free five-day trial. Churchstaffing.org was another suggestion. Laura Waltrup would be happy to help. A Word version of the Job Description needs to be sent to Laura ASAP. The SPRC report from Linda is as follows:

- The Youth Leader job description and it has been publicized in the Baltimore-Washington UMC E-Connection, the Wesley UMC Journal, and the Sunday bulletins. As yet there has not been any response. The goal is to have someone in position by September, 2021.
- SPRC conducted annual reviews of Wesley UMC's Contemporary Worship Leaders, Lana Montgomery and Lisa Kemp on June 9, 2021. Their love of our Lord shows in the excellent work they are doing as leaders of the Contemporary Worship experience here at Wesley. SPRC committee agreed that we are truly blessed to have such diligent and reliable leaders who care deeply about sharing their skills and Christian love with their Wesley Church family.
- There will be no SPRC meetings during the summer months of July and August. We will reconvene on September 8, 2021, at 7:00 p.m.

Cemetery Fund: The Cemetery Committee currently has \$82,000 in very low-risk (risk level "1") profile. After a talk by/with RBC [investments company], the Cemetery committee voted in favor of moving the funds to a "3rd Folio Risk." No vote from Ad. Council was needed.

## Membership: Sandy Cole

- Sandy is working on updates as they come in.
- She is working on the church pamphlet for this summer. Committee heads should update their sections. Sandy keeps up with the obituaries; there have been lots of funerals. She always puts an entry in Servant Keeper with the obituary for church members.

## Lay Member to Annual Conference: Matt Sichel

- The "Protocol for Grace and Reconciliation through Separation" is still on track to be passed by the General Conference; it seems to be a foregone conclusion.
- Wesley will be free to vote on our forward movement [which are, at the moment, staying with the post-separation UMC (psUMC) or switching over to the Global Methodist Church] as soon as General Conference happens, which will be August of 2022. [No vote will direct us to stay with the psUMC.]
- Wesley will hopefully go as quickly as we can to a vote, but with <u>everyone</u> informed. This starts with the Administrative Council, then spreads to the church. The District Superintendent will have to come to oversee the vote.
- With regard to time frames for making a decision: based on the preparation for a 2020 General Conference, local churches had four years to decide whether to stay or separate from the psUMC. Annual Conferences have one year to decide if they will move over to the Global Methodist Church.
- Per some guesses, the Baltimore-Washington (BW) Conference is likely to stay with the psUMC.
- Discussion about these things proceeded. Some thoughts from the Council include:
  - Laura Waltrup said that it is in the Ad. Council's best interest that we have an idea of which way the church will go/where people stand. There will be "fallout" in leadership, finances, etc. The church will make a decision; we need to try to plan for fallout.
  - As an example of handling fallout, we might plan for things like renting the building to the group that separates.
  - ♦ Other people may "swap" churches.
  - ♥ John Sies said that we would be surprised by how many people seem to suddenly care about things.
  - The membership situation has the potential to be a "gooey mess."
  - ♦ John Sies also asked, "Are we going to jump on the ball or get out of the way?"
- What are our first steps? We could take a "straw pole" in the next six months. This may draw BW Conference attention, which may not be good. We could also have a special meeting to plan in the next six months/fall.
- Per Matt, the Protocol was put together so as to be less prone to amendment (but they will probably happen on some scale).
- Much discussion ensued.
- Laura stated that we need to update and education people again. We should have another round of talking about the issues. This can help prevent perceptions and judgments towards each other.
- It was stated that wee need to begin the contingency planning in the Fall.

## Treasurer/Finance: Laura Waltrup

• We are under budget for expenses and tracking on budget for income. Laura is cautiously optimistic going into the summer months.

**Next Meeting:** There will be no July meeting; we will meet again on August 25th. **Devotions** for next month are to be by Sandy Cole.

**Tuesday Prayer:** In response to the concerns about Wesley's future, Jess Sichel stated that we need to have something like a "stop where you are and pray" time. It was decided that Jess would send out an email (with Rose Sichel's help), with a prayer and a verse. People can stop where they are at 7 PM and pray for our future.

**Meals:** Vicky Wilmer stated that if people in our church or in our community are in need of meals/food, let her know.

The meeting was **closed in prayer** at 8:29 PM by Vicky Wilmer.


