### "Changes"

I have been thinking a lot about changes lately. Our collective lives have been full of them over the past year and a half. If you are like me, watching the evening news these days has been disconcerting. Covid-19, the end of the war in Afghanistan, virtual school vs. in-person school, church in-person vs. church online, "to mask or not to mask, that is the question," vaccines and anti-vaxxers, working at home vs. working at the workplace, overcrowded hospitals, global warming (and associated wild-fires, hurricanes, and ocean level rise)...to name just a few

of the major situations that are "unprecedented ongoing sagas." (How is that for an oxymoron?) Even the leaves on the trees are changing color. We humans have been going through a lot together.

We have been going through a lot individually, too. Many of us have lost loved ones during the pandemic. Some of us have lost friends over political allegiances, vaccination/mask preferences, or the general moodiness that comes when we feel as though we are languishing. Perhaps we, too, have experienced health crises or despair over feeling isolated from people we love. Change is *hard*!!!

As a pastor who has seen a lot of birth, death (and just about everything in-between) in journeying alongside the people I have served, I found out years ago that trying to control what happens in our lives, both individually or collectively, is useless. The best way to make God laugh is to tell God your plans, right? We never know what the future holds, and change is one of life's unfailing certainties. Perhaps you, like me, have learned that control is an illusion. Better to expect the unexpected.









### Orphan Stones: Caring for Those Without Families



As All Saint's Sunday approaches and is observed, the Wesley U.M. Church Cemetery Committee is accepting donations for the repair of "Orphan Stones." Even though the cemetery is not responsible for the repairs to the monuments, we have many older ones that have no family left to repair them—thus they are "Orphan Stones." Time and weather have caused these older monuments to break, tilt, or fall. The earliest marked burial is 1841 and there are nearly 1,000 former members of our Church buried in the cemetery. Our church has a wonderful history of 231 years.

At this time, we have used many of the funds designated for Orphan Stones with repairs that need to be made to them. In honor of and gratitude to these people who founded and sustained our Church, and to keep our cemetery in good repair and appearance, we ask for your support. You may send your tax-deductible donation to the Church or put it in the collection plate on All Saint's Day or at any time. Be sure to add your name to the outside of an envelope and if you have a regular Church envelope, please include that number, also. Mark it for the "Orphan Stones" or Wesley Cemetery. Also, please keep the Church and cemetery in mind when you are preparing or updating your will. This will help us in the future.



Have you seen the signs around town that tell us to BE KIND? Do you ever wonder why someone feels the need to tell us to be what Jesus, the Father, and the Holy Spirit clearly already teach us? When we think about the fruits of the Spirit, kindness seems to be the multiplier. It spreads from me to you, from you to others, and then from others to still more people. Kindness is something we can spread to others, having a heart like the One who showed us how to be kind: Jesus. Here are a few books we found about kindness and Jesus.

A Heart Like His by Mike and Amy Nappa (232) This beautiful collection on character traits comes from the inspired pen of the apostle Paul and reflects the very personality

of Christ. But you don't have to be a spiritual superhero to demonstrate the fruit of the Spirit in *your life*! God wants each of us to experience and show love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control—and what He desires of us, He enables us to do. But if you're not sure how to begin, perhaps this book can help. A Heart Like His will point you toward the fruitful life that God wants you to enjoy. Filled with inspiring Scriptures, thought-provoking quotes, and wonderful stories that relate to each of the nine traits, this easy-to-read book will guide you to greater heights in your Christian walk.

Love is a Verb by Gary Chapman (232) Be inspired by lives changed by love. To last for the long haul and through the stresses and complexities of life, love has to be more than something we feel. It has to be something we do. We have to demonstrate it concretely in our marriages and families, among our friends and acquaintances, and, yes, even among our enemies. And that's what this book is about. In the following pages, you'll see examples of people just like you—like all of us—who learned to take the obstacles, the lemons they face in life, and turn them into satisfying, emotional thirst-quenching nectar. These are the success stories that make you want to go out and try harder.

Think Like Jesus by George Barna (230) If you are like most Christians today, nobody has ever taught you how to develop a Scripture-based view of life and how to live consistently with that perspective. George Barna looks at Jesus' life and uncovers seven characteristics of His worldview that define what Jesus believed and how He acted. The author points out that while there are benefits from thinking and acting this way, such as wise decision-making, relational advantages, and spiritual health, we emulate Jesus because it is the right thing to do, not because of the positive outcomes. And these benefits are not received unless we are totally committed to seeking, knowing, and following God's wisdom. If imitation is indeed the sincerest form of flattery, what better way is there to express your love for God than to commit yourself to thinking like Jesus?

A Heart Like Jesus by Max Lucado (232) God loves you just the way you are, but He refuses to leave you that way. He wants you to have a heart like Jesus. Our hearts seem so far from His. He is pure; we are greedy. He is peaceful; we are hassled. He is purposeful; we are distracted. He is spiritual; we are earthbound. The distance between our hearts and His seems immense. How could we hope to have the heart of Jesus? You already do! If you have given your life to Jesus, Jesus has given himself to you. He has made your heart His home. And the same one who saved your soul longs to remake your heart.

Chicken Soup for the Christian Soul by Jack Canfield (240) ...in this exceptional new volume especially for Christians, you will find stories that will deepen your faith and expand your awareness of how to practice Christian values in your daily life—at home, at work, and in the community. Your heart will open to the expression of Christ's enduring love.

Our library is for you to use and enjoy. Remember to sign your name and date to the card found in the back of the book. File the card in the yellow box under the letter that begins your last name. When you return a book, find the card, put the return date on the card, and put the card in the pocket of the book. - Jackie was asked when material will be in for Sunday School; this should be asked of Jen Ejk or Patty Harris. The
  group needs to think about the next couple of months and increasing enrollment...
- We should advertise the start of September and October Sunday School on Facebook and Instagram. Rose Sichel volunteered to help. It was suggested that we emphasize the family feel.

### Treasurer's Report: Laura Waltrup

• There has not been a Finance meeting since approximately June of 2021. The rough idea is that our income is slightly (Continued on Next Page)

behind budget, but our expenses are way under budget. Last year, we had the PPP loan, and we started the year strong because of the loan. This helped us currently have a healthy checking account. [The below information was sent in by Laura prior to tonight's meeting and was accompanied by reports from her records:

- 1) Income & Expense compared to 2021 Budget:
- a) Operating Income for 7 Months was \$132,451 compared to a budget of \$136,518 slightly behind budgeted income by (\$4,065)
- b) Operating Expenses for 7 Months was \$145,333 compared to a budget of \$155,451 so we managing expenses well and are under budget by \$10,117
- c) Our budget through 7 months anticipated an operating deficit significantly higher than actual performance (considering the seasonality of giving volumes)
- 2) Balance Sheet compared to same period in 2020:
- a) Operating Cash (General Fund) as of 7/31 is \$8,500 compared to \$18,240 in 2020. NOTE, however, that in 2020 we received COVID relief funds (SBA Payroll Protection Plan) in the amount of \$26,967 which had been applied to expenses and fully utilized to this point. This signifies that our current General Fund balance is quite healthy given the time of year and no COVID relief in 2021. Another reason our operating cash is nicely positive is that we ended 2020 with over \$20,000 in our General Fund Cash account which carried over into 2021.
- b) It was decided between Finance and Trustees, that \$1,551 that was in the Building Checking Account and designated to long-term projects should be transferred to the RBC Building Investment account for maximum earnings. This is reflected in the Other Accounts / Building Fund Checking account balance.]
- There was an RBC investment meeting with Finance and Trustees. The Building Fund Checking Account was/will be moved to an investment account. The Endowment Fund has really started growing since its inception several years ago. 50% of it is for the Lucy Harrell Scholarship Fund, monies which will be spit out.
- We are headed into budget time; Laura will be reaching out about this.
- It was noted that two employees recently resigned [Lana Montgomery and Rose Hohmes]. There was a question about the Youth stipend, but all of this goes back to SPRC to be managed for now.
- Discussion ensued, including notes about Charge Conference paperwork being sent out and one-on-ones with District Superintendents occurring. It was also noted that we are not worried about finances; however, many other churches are. Rev. Amy stated that many of all kinds of churches have found themselves in difficult straights. Laura noted that we have not had the normal August "summer dip" in income. Linda Yost said that Rev. Amy has been very instrumental in getting us opened back up early. Opening earlier has put us ahead of the ball, local-church-wise. John Sies and others noted that it says something about our local community and the ministry that lots of money has come in to Outreach [without lots of fundraisers being run.] Jess Sichel reminded the committee about the mental affects of moving back to a lock-down or pre-lock-down format. It can seem like the walls are closing in for people who had trouble with the lock-down; for example, Jess felt the walls closing in when folks began discussing moving back to a Zoom meeting format.

#### **Outreach Committee:**

- Thank you to those who helped with prepping corn for the supper! There were around 20 people—lots of hands; lots of work got done.
- Back-to-School Donations: Outreach took over 24 larger backpacks and several large bags of supplies to NESAP. The committee will also contribute \$300 towards \$15 gift cards to Walmart for shoes to NESAP. NESAP was able to provide 130 backpacks for kids in the area.
- September 12th Picnic: Instead of grilling for the picnic, fried chicken will be provided to give folks a break. There is a sign-up sheet going around for sides. The picnic will be at the new pavilion after the 10 AM worship service (11:30 am-ish).
- Operation Christmas Child: Outreach will sponsor the postage for the project this year. Shop now for school supplies!
- Meals are being provided once a month on the third Tuesday for the Westminster Rescue Mission/Healing and Addiction Center. There will be a coordinator from Outreach who will extend the project to the whole congregation. Outreach purchased two \$500 gift cards to Mission BBQ and Millers Market for the Rescue Mission. The guys were really working hard to prepare for 4 an additional food truck, and the Mission purchased fried chicken and BBQ for them.
- The Cold-Weather shelter is now going by the name "Night by Night." A collection of items from Wesley is going on now. Often, clients are going to work and missing meals, so the shelter is looking for quick meals and breakfasts on the go. There is a list in the Journal and bulletins. It was noted that sometimes, clients might even have the money to provide for a place to live and have a good support system, but places to live are not available. (Continued on Next Page)

- Outreach continues to provide meals; at the moment, they are for Reenie Harris.
- The committee needs names of our college students.
- Tommy Smith's Eagle project is coming to a close. Outreach offered help to finance the project; Stephanie Smith will get back to the committee about that.
- The committee has been thinking about Haiti and Afghanistan needs. Jan Kurtz sent out some things, which need to be discussed. John Sies will send additional information to Vicky Wilmer. Lutheran Immigration Services has a "local" chapter. The group is thinking to donate more "hands-on" stuff, such as plates, towels, etc.

**Chicken Carryout Supper:** There will be a Chicken Carryout Supper on November 13th, which will be run by Vicky Wilmer and Pam Phillips. At this time, the leadership of the supper(s) has decided not to do oysters.

Parsonage Mold: Laura Waltrup brought up the fact that the Parsonage has a mold issue which must be remediated at some point. Discussion ensued, and a motion developed into the following: The Ad. Council moves to protect the asset [of the parsonage] and handle the health concern [of mold] by referring the mold and eradiation needs to Trustees. The motion was seconded, and all voted in favor of it. So moved.

Mini Camp Wesley Project: Someone needed help with a mini-Camp Wesley project. It feels like satan has knocked down our ability to do the project. There is a house that someone is trying to get ready to sell. The house is split-level with a tall front. Some work has been done (i.e., a roll-off dumpster was provided and plants were donated from Betsy Sennett). However, there are problems, such as that the ground is dry and hard (though some of the plants were planted and mulched.) A small crew of 6 to 8 people (including men) would be helpful. However, there is Camp Wesley money to hire someone to help with this as a church mission project, given that there are not a lot of people with available time and/or abilities to do the work within the congregation. Vicky needs help. If you know of person(s) who can provide that help, please contact Vicky with the suggested names. The work should take about four to five hours during the course of one day.

**SPRC:** The next meeting of the SPRC is 7:30 PM on Wednesday, September 8th.

- The SPRC is currently working on the Nursery Supervisor and Youth Directory positions.
- Reports for Charge Conference will be worked on the 8th.

**Trustees:** The next meeting of the Trustees will be on September 1st at 7 PM.

- Jessie's [Office] Air Conditioning unit [HVAC unit] is still a work in progress.
- Gary Wilmer and Denny Rill have worked on the new gutter/downspout for the Education wing; there has been no more leaking.
- There will be scaffolding up for masonry work.
- The Downstairs freezers (in the kitchen's basement) are both no good and need to be removed.
- Naylor's Plumbing has been contacted; there is sludge in the tanks.
- The flowerbeds have been mulched; the gardens are beautiful.
- The Parsonage needs some perking up (i.e., weeding). An estimate to treat the tree in the backyard is to be obtained.

**Candidate for Ordained Ministry:** Matt Sichel continues as a Candidate for Ordained Ministry. He was again invited for the Board of Ordained Ministry exams in February. He will update some of his paperwork, and he requests prayer.

### Lay Member to Annual Conference:

- This year's Annual Conference will be all virtual; the hotel costs have been/will be refunded. The exception to the all-virtual events will be the Ordination Service, which will be at a church near the Conference Center.
- The Bishop recently returned from a sabbatical. She is now managing two Annual Conferences (Peninsula Delaware and Baltimore-Washington). Long ago, these two were yoked, but the groups are not currently happy about this. Other conference(s) are facing similar things due to a reduced number of Bishops in the Northeastern Jurisdiction.

Pastor's Report: Rev. Amy reported the our Charge Conference will be on Zoom and shared with other local churches. The date and time of the conference are Saturday, November 6th, at 4 PM. Charge Conference paperwork is due to Jessica Sichel [preferably before the 10/1/21 deadline for the Conference]. [Rev. Amy also sent in the below prior to tonight's meeting:

• This summer has been a relatively quiet one. No funerals, weddings, or baptisms thus far.

- Attendance at worship for both contemporary and traditional worship services has averaged around 35-40. This is a little less than half of our pre-pandemic levels. Worship continues to be livestreamed and it is not known how many are watching at home.
- Communion is served on the first Sunday of every month and, due to Covid-19 variants, we will continue to use the communion kits on communion Sundays.
- Visitation rules at hospitals and nursing homes continue to change. Last week, I was scheduled to see Stewart
  Graf on Thursday, but Longview is on lockdown for at least two weeks, due to Covid. Carroll Hospital Center is
  allowing only one visitor per patient. Surgical patients may only have one visitor with them throughout the day
  of surgery. I was able to get special permission to be with Reenie Harris and Martha Harris during their recent
  surgeries at CHC, but that was prior to Governor Hogan's most recent announcements.
- Charge Conference information has been distributed by the Baltimore Suburban District office. Wesley's Charge
  Conference will take place on Saturday, November 6, 2021, at 4 PM via ZOOM. We will share Charge Conference
  with Pleasant Grove, Mt Zion (Finksburg), Shiloh and Patapsco United Methodist Churches. All Charge Conference paperwork is due into the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference office by October 1, 2021, at the latest.
- We have had two staff resignations. Rose Hohmes is attending another church with her sons and will not be serving as nursery coordinator any longer. Lana Montgomery announced during last Wednesday night's Worship Committee meeting that she will cease leading and playing for Contemporary Worship services, effective immediately following the September 5, 2021 Contemporary Worship service. The Montgomery family will remain on our membership rolls. At this point in time there are no plans in place to replace these staff. Lisa Kemp will continue to lead one (1) Contemporary Worship service per month, beginning in October of 2021. This will happen on the fourth Sunday of each month.
- Worship in September of 2021 will be held at 10 AM (outdoors whenever possible), alternating worship style by week. Sunday School will be held at 9 AM beginning on Sunday, September 12, 2021. As of October 1, 2021, Sunday School will take place at 9:30 AM, fellowship time from 10:30 until 10:45, and worship will begin at 11 AM. All worship services, except for the fourth Sunday of each month, will be traditional in nature.
- Bishop Latrelle Easterling is on sabbatical. As of this writing, there has not been direction from the Baltimore-Washington Annual Conference about Covid-19 protocols for local churches. Perhaps when Bishop Easterling returns to work, direction will occur, although she has, in the past, advised local churches to follow local and national guidelines for mask-wearing, singing indoors, social distancing, etc.
- In mid-July, I wrote a letter to all confirmation-age teenagers who are probationary members (baptized) within our church's membership. I have had only one affirmative response to that letter. The letter states that I will have a confirmation class if two or more youth respond positively. I followed up with several additional young people who are "regulars" within the life of our church, asking them (and their parents) if they had received my letter and whether they were interested in confirmation classes. I stated that I would work with their schedules. A number of those young people and their parents said no, indicating school sports and other extracurricular activities as being in competition for young peoples' time and energies. Two others declined, referring to the anticipated "split" within our denomination, should "the Protocol" be accepted at the 2022 General Conference. Still another young person's mother refused, indicating that she, herself, was not a churchgoer, and that confirmation classes would demand her participation in something she was not ready to commit to. This is the second time, since 2017, that I have attempted to lead a confirmation class (also tried in 2019).
- I continue to work on my doctoral dissertation, almost daily. It is slow going, but very interesting and rewarding work.]

**United Methodist Men:** The men will be meeting on September 14th with a cookout meal. They will discuss the future (and will need to provide a grill).

United Methodist Women: The women are doing well and will meet on September 16th at 11 AM.

**Small Groups:** One (possibly two) small groups will resume in September. We will meet at the Church. It was noted that it is time to resume the ministry.


