

Frank J. Richardson, Jr., Ph.D., D.Min., MFT



Dr. Frank J. Richardson, Jr., had been employed at The Maryland School for the Blind (MSB) from September of 2006 to July of 2020. Along with being a staff psychologist at MSB, he was also the Supervisor for The Psychology and Social Work Departments

for a number of those years. From 1994 to August of 2006, Dr. Richardson was an Instructor and then Assistant Professor at The Johns Hopkins School of Medicine in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and a staff psychologist at The Kennedy Krieger Institute. He provided psychological services to children, adolescents and young adults with developmental disabilities. In addition, he was a consultant to a special education school, as well as mentored Psychology Fellows. For two years, from 1999 to 2001, he served part-time as the first oncology chaplain at The Weinberg Center, which is affiliated with The Johns Hopkins Hospital. As the oncology chaplain, Dr. Richardson founded and developed *The Intensive Prayer Unit, Prayer for the Day Program* and *The Blessing of Hands* service. From 1997 to 2018, Dr. Richardson was an adjunct faculty member in the Pastoral Counseling Department at Loyola University in Maryland. He taught courses in *Human Development, Introduction to Family Therapy, Psychotherapy for Children and Adolescents* and *Pastoral Integration*. He also supervised graduate students in this program. Dr. Richardson was a Pediatric Psychology Fellow at Georgetown University Hospital and at The Johns Hopkins Hospital School of Medicine. He is listed in The National Register of Health Services Providers in Psychology and was a Fellow in the American Association of Pastoral Counselors and is a former Board-Certified Chaplain. In his younger years, Dr. Richardson was a professional tennis instructor and certified by The United States Professional Tennis Association.

Dr. Richardson has had various pastoral experiences. Besides his experience as a ministerial assessment specialist where he conducts psychological assessments of candidates for ministry in The United Methodist Church, he served on the National Advisory Committee on Psychological Assessment for The United Methodist Church. From 1978-1987, he was the Pastor of Trinity United Methodist Church, which is located in suburban Philadelphia. He was a guest Chaplain

at The House of Representatives and The Library of Congress. While a local church pastor, he co-founded *The East Lansdowne Caring Organization*, which was a nonprofit corporation serving the indigent and elderly in the community. He was a chaplain intern in the pediatric unit at Massachusetts General Hospital, at Dorchester Inn and School in Dorchester, Mass. and at McLean Hospital in Belmont, Mass.

Dr. Richardson has a doctoral degree in clinical psychology, a Doctor-in-Ministry degree (with special emphasis in pastoral counseling) and a Master's degree in family therapy. One of his mentors was Ivan Boszormenyi-Nagy, who was the originator of contextual family therapy and one of the founders of the entire family therapy approach. Dr. Richardson also earned a training certificate, having graduated from the three-year part-time training program at The Pennsylvania Foundation of Pastoral Counseling. He has published a number of articles and has presented at various national conferences. His area of expertise is pastoral counseling, working with children and adolescents with developmental disabilities and the integration of psychology and theology.



This month is a potpourri of books designed to help you stretch your faith, assess your parenting skills, and determine what makes you angry----and what to do about it! Dive into some of these!

No More Jellyfish, Chickens, or Wimps: Raising Secure, Assertive Kids in a Tough World by Paul Coughlin (173). You can raise children of courage and character. Your children do not need to be timid and anxious. You can protect them without paralyzing their growth. Take the challenge and become a courageous parent whose children know how to be confident and assertive, be neither a victim nor a bully, and respond to injustice and defend others.

30 Days to Taming Your Anger by Deborah Smith Pegues (232). A guide for controlling your anger without burying or blowing it. From mild irritability to full-fledged rage, everyone experiences emotional displeasure from time to time. Using Biblical and modern-day stories, Pegues helps you discover anger-taming strategies such as understanding the underlying emotions that trigger anger, developing a divine perspective toward frustrating people or circumstances, extending grace to others, and learning to laugh at yourself.

A Fragile Stone by Michael Card (Audio-Visual) As much as we enjoy our relationship with Jesus Christ, imagine what it would have been like to take that a step further and be His friend when He was here on earth! The apostle Peter had that special opportunity. Michael Card traveled to Israel to walk us through the friendship between our Savior and the man Jesus renamed The Rock. You'll travel with Michael as he visits the places where Jesus and Peter interacted. You'll listen as Card reveals the intricacies of their friendship. And then you'll have the opportunity to discuss what you observed in order to make the teaching of Michael's lessons applicable to your own life.

Against the Night by Charles Colson (263) In Against the Night, Chuck Colson challenges Christians to regain a vision of what it means to live as members of the kingdom of God and to **be** the people of God. Page by page, he maps out a strategy for all who are determined to stand faithfully in the midst of the present darkness. In so doing, he rekindles our spiritual passion for goodness, for righteousness, and for living as lights amid the gathering darkness.

America's Controversy with God's Covenant by Perry Stone and Bill Cloud (950). The authors say that America has fallen victim to the snares that entrapped great superpowers of the past and is racing toward a breaking point. By forsaking the covenant made by our ancestors with the Almighty, we are beginning to see His hand of protection lifted and spiritual darkness descend. The question is asked, will this trend continue? Will we follow in the footsteps of fallen empires, such as Rome, or will we retrace our steps and return to the God of our fathers?

Audacious by Beth Moore (232). This is a deep dive into the message that has compelled Beth Moore to serve women around the globe. Glancing over the years of ministry behind her and strengthening her resolve to the call before her, she came to the realization that her vision for women was incomplete. It lacked something they were aching for. Something Jesus was longing for. Beth identifies that missing link by digging through scripture, unearthing life experiences, and spotlighting a turning point with the capacity to infuse any life with holy passion and purpose. What was missing? It's audacious and it is for all of us. And it's the path to the life you were born to live.

Orphan Stones: Caring for Those Without Families

As All Saint's Sunday approaches and is observed, the Wesley U.M. Church Cemetery Committee is accepting donations for the repair of "Orphan Stones." Even though the cemetery is not responsible for the repairs to the monuments, we have many older ones that have no family left to repair them—thus they are "Orphan Stones." Time and weather have caused these older monuments to break, tilt, or fall. The earliest marked burial is 1841 and there are nearly 1,000 former members of our Church buried in the cemetery. Our church has a wonderful history of 234 years.



At this time, we have used many of the funds designated for Orphan Stones with repairs that need to be made to them. In honor of and gratitude to these people who founded and sustained our Church, and to keep our cemetery in good repair and appearance, we ask for your support. You may send your tax-deductible donation to the Church or put it in the collection plate on All Saint's Day or at any time. Be sure to add your name to the outside of an envelope and if you have a regular Church envelope, please include that number, also. Mark it for the "Orphan Stones" or Wesley Cemetery. The meeting opened at 7:07 p.m. with Brenda Kennedy presenting a devotion called "The First to Forgive" from Devotions for a Heart Shaped Life, Psalm 103: 11-12 and prayer.

Minutes for August 25, 2021, were approved as amended by correcting Brenda Benson's name changing it to Brenda Kennedy as an attendee.

Christian Education: Jen Ejk

- On September 12, four more people attended Sunday School.
- Nan Dubit and Chet Phillips stepped down as high school teachers. Jackie Otwell and Patty Harris will look at ways to attract more participants. Rev. Amy asked for prayers that the Lord will bring us some children.
- Rev. Amy noted that Rose Sichel is the only person who answered her call for confirmands.
- Gospel Light material is being used again this year for Sunday School.

Trustees: Linda Yost

- Trustees met virtually on September 1, 2021, at 7:00 p.m.
- Carroll Harris is waiting for parts to arrive to replace the damaged ones for the Church Office ac/heating unit. He will replace them as soon as they are received.
- Re-routing of the downspout and gutter along the outside wall of the Education wing appears to have corrected the leaking problem in the Choir room.
- Tommy Smith has nearly completed the pavilion for his Eagle Scout Project. Some corrections need to be made in order for it to be passed by zoning.
- Tim Anderson, Cello Instructor will continue to use the Choir Room for lessons. In lieu of a fee, he will perform during our 11:00 a.m. Worship Service on October 10, 2021. He will plan other performances as well.
- Sam Muller Masonry has completed the repair on the shorter church tower, including spraying a sealant on the upper portion of the tower. No leaking has been seen, and we will keep watch during the next few rain storms.
- Trustees Committee is in the process of obtaining bids for the removal of the two maple trees in the parsonage back yard. Both have serious decay and pose a threat to both the parsonage and the new pavilion.
- Per a request by the Administrative Council, Trustees is in the process of obtaining an outside assessment on presence and remediation of mold in the parsonage basement. Trustees carefully examined the basement and may have found one small spot in the bathroom.
- Boy Scouts of America has filed for bankruptcy and has settled multiple cases of sexual assault. The chartered organizations (churches, etc.) were not included in the settlement and thus are vulnerable for lawsuits. The United Methodist Church is asking us to use the new Charter which is being worked on and will be issued by BSA in 2022. Churches are being encouraged to keep our Boy Scout Troops chartered at our churches.
- I spoke with Robert Kirby, Scoutmaster of our Troop 38o. At this point he said it's a wait and see, fingers and toes crossed scenario that National UMC will come up with a solution. The BSA certainly want to charter our Troop, it's the UMC that is telling us to step back. He believes we will have some kind of answer by the end of this November. Our troop certainly does not want to go anywhere else, and is hoping for a positive outcome.
- Two Charge Conference forms (Parsonage Report, and Accessibility Audit) have been submitted to Conference. The remaining form, Trustees Report, is in progress.

Outreach: Rev. Amy reported from minutes

- Five soups are being prepared for sale, in addition to cornbread muffins being baked by Rev. Amy.
- There will be no Christmas caroling this year.
- Fried chicken dinners were provided to the Westminster Rescue Mission/Healing and Addiction Center. They were very well received.

SPRC: Linda Yost

- The Youth Leader job description is in the process of being updated to include some form of Children's Director verbiage.
- Matt Otwell is continuing to collect information from the congregation on Chairperson positions within Wesley Church. His and SPRC's intent is to compose Chairperson job descriptions that are succinct and are pertinent to Wesley UMC.
- Two Charge Conference forms (Clergy Compensation, and Congregation Profile) have been submitted to Conference before the October 2, 2021, deadline.
- SPRC is recommending a 3% raise for Rev. Amy, which, in dollars, is \$1800. Her new salary, if passed by Charge Conference, will be \$61,645.

- Eleven women including two new women attended the meeting on September 16th. It was great to have so many present.
- Fifty hygiene kits will be delivered to UMCOR next Wednesday, September 29th.
- Boscov's fundraiser will be done again this year.

Finance: Michelle Hudgins and Laura Waltrup

- Committee met last week and everything looked positive. We have enough money in the bank to pay our bills.
- 2022 budget will soon be worked on.
- Michelle is working on a pamphlet to be handed-out at church.

John Sies reminded us that the Narcan we received from the Health Department last year has now expired. We can take ours to the Health Department to exchange for new ones. Laura Waltrup mentioned that Stephanie Halle at the Rescue Mission is in the process of applying for a grant and we might be able to receive Narcan when the grant is accepted. Rev. Amy suggested our old Narcan be put somewhere for Outreach to handle.

Rev. Amy announced that Jan Kurtz will be the new 2022 Chair for the Administrative Council, will be attending Ad Council meetings for the rest of this year. Jan is checking with the Lutheran Immigration and Rescue Services to see how Wesley might help with refugees.

Janet Martin announced that Brenda Kennedy and Sandy Cole will handle the Altar Guild. Linda Yost made a plea for Trustees.

Linda presented a YouTube video by Daniel Dalton from the law firm Dalton & Tomich. The link to this presentation is https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=mKM74fgVTRc and the video date is February 7, 2021. The presentation provided a brief explanation of the Separation Protocol. Dalton said it is important for us to remember this is just a proposal. Five groups got together to decide how to graciously separate. The last proposed separation occurred in 1844 over the slavery issues at that time. The Book of Discipline is in the process of being rewritten by one of the groups. We will have four years to decide how we want Wesley to proceed unless this is changed at General Conference. It was said that the Central Conference is the African Conference. John Sies said that from what he is able to see so far, there are two separate protocols that seem pretty much to be written in stone.

Matt Sichel added: The Global Methodist Church is the name of the traditionalist "group" that is to form out of the Protocol. They are no longer "in the process" of rewriting the Discipline, but have already completed that work. That rewritten Discipline is called: *The Transitional Book of Doctrines and Disciplines*, and it is meant to function after the Protocol passes, but before the Global Methodist Church can have a convening conference to adopt a permanent book. A link to the *Transitional Discipline* is here: https://globalmethodist.org/wp-content/uploads/2021/08/Transitional-Discipline.20210630.pdf The Global Methodist Church already has everything set and in place to legally launch and receive churches as soon as the Protocol passes.

Linda Yost asked that we continue to worship, love each other and praise God.

Jen Ejk will provide the devotion for our October 27th meeting. Our November meeting will be held on November 17 since November 24 is the day before Thanksgiving.

Since Rev. Amy's virtual connection shut-down, Linda Yost closed the meeting in prayer at 8:08 p.m.
