From the Desk of the Pastor...

Moving Forward in Faith

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1

Friends,

I came across this quote by Renata Adler which says, "Fear is forward. No one is afraid of yesterday."

Quotes, however, convey only partial truths – this one included. Let us begin by examining the latter part of Renata Alder's quote which states, "No one is afraid of yesterday." The writer seems to imply that one is not afraid of yesterday because there is no unknown aspect to the past. Yet, we know of those suffering from PTSD (Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder) caused by traumatic events

that happened in their past. This creates anxiety and stress that makes it difficult for one to face the present and future. For those dealing with PTSD, yesterday is the source of their fear.

Now let us move to the first part of her quote which says, "Fear is forward." We certainly do experience fear when facing the future. Fear of the unknown manifests itself in

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the following ways: waiting for the results of a medical exam, worrying about our economic security after retirement, feeling anxious about the birth of child, wondering about the best way to parent, and the list can go on and on. It is only natural for us to experience a measure of fear facing uncertainty. Yet, fear is only one component of how one faces the future. For if fear is the only approach, then the present becomes so anxiety-ridden that we become immobilized and unable to plan and work towards future goals. I remember the words of President Franklin Roosevelt to the nation when facing a crippling economic crash called the Great Depression. He said, "The only thing we have to fear is fear itself." Roosevelt told the nation that if fear becomes the dominant approach to the future, then things will only get worst. An unhealthy fear leads us to major in the minors – thus we lose sight of the larger purpose.

It is important to address the issues facing our world (and yes, the church) in healthy ways, such as choosing cooperation over fear and intimidation, preferring to gather for vital conversations that invite everyone to the table. This is important because of the current issue of schism facing The United Methodist Church. I have been in conversation with various leaders of Wesley concerning this issue. The Staff Parish Relations Committee will soon begin the process

Current COVID-19 Guidelines...



Wesley UMC's Administrative Council has voted to follow the guidelines set forth by the CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) or the Baltimore-Washington Conference (whichever is more stringent). At this time, the community level for Carroll County is "Medium," meaning that we should stay up to date with COVID-19 vaccines and get tested if we have symptoms. Also, if someone is at high risk for severe illness, he or she should talk to a healthcare provider about needing to wear a mask and taking other precautions. People may

choose to mask at any time. People with symptoms, a positive test, or exposure to someone with COVID-19 should wear a mask.

We are currently "mask optional" at Wesley; this is dependent on the conditions surrounding us regarding COVID; if the numbers increase again, we may need to re-mask. Attendees should socially distance when possible (sit between the blue pieces of tape on the pews) and use hand sanitizer, which can be found near the entrances to the sanctuary.

Please use your discretion as to whether or not you feel comfortable attending services, and thank you for your help in protecting each other! 
Sunday School Starts Soon!

A Note on Sunday School Classes for Adults — "The Amen Corner: A Deacon's Thoughts on Teaching"



It is that time of year again. Sunday School begins again on September 11, and we have two Sunday morning adult classes and one Monday evening small group. The women's class is facilitated by Jan Graf, the small group is coordinated by Jess Sichel, and I teach the co-ed adult class. Christian discipleship is more than worship on Sunday morning; it is a life that is constantly honed and shaped by the Spirit of God through spiritual disciplines (disciple and discipline have the same root!). Sunday School is not just for your kids; it's for every Christian disciple. I heartily encourage every Wesley member to get involved in either a Sunday School class or join the small group ministry. John Wesley has a famous quote about how important it is for Christians to engage in group discipleship, "Holy Solitaires is a phrase no more con-

sistent with the gospel than holy adulterers. The gospel of Christ knows of no religion but social, no holiness but social holiness." This was Wesley's instruction to Christians that you can't be a solitary disciple of Jesus, but discipleship is a group activity. Make time for Sunday School!

For those interested in the co-ed class that I lead, we will be beginning this year with a book that I hope folks will find helpful and interesting. The book is called *The Story of Reality: How the World Began, How it Ends, and Everything Important that Happens In Between.* It was written by Gregory Koukl, and it was recommended to me by another Methodist pastor for group study.

The central theme of the book is to help the reader see that Christianity is more than simply a religion or a simple message about salvation in Jesus Christ. Instead, it's a way to understand everything in the entire world, and how we fit in it: a worldview. But the neat thing about this book, is that it's written at an eighth grade level, so it's not intimidating or difficult to read. In total, it's 177 pages. It also comes with a weekly video.

When we learn that what we believe is actually tied into the story of *reality itself*, it changes the way we understand our faith *and* how we communicate that faith to the world that increasingly has a very different worldview than we do. We plan to cover the study in about 6-8 weeks, and then we'll begin something new. If this sounds interesting to you, I hope you'll join us! Let me know by September 11th that you would like to participate, and we will order a copy of the book for you.

GriefShare Session—Starting a New Session in September



I went to my first GriefShare meeting ten years ago in Sept. 2012, four months after Bill died. I had been invited to two different Grief groups — I wasn't sure if I wanted to attend either one, not being much of a talker in groups at that time. However, I knew that I needed some sort of support of people who were going through the same thing. So, I tried the other group first. A group of grieving people going through the same things, all talking about the same problems I

was having...hours at the MVA, paperwork, and on and on... many problems, and that seemed to be the focus. I left that evening feeling far worse than I had when it began. So, the following week, I thought I would see what the Grief-Share group was like. While watching the first video, I knew that this group was exactly what I needed. This class offered hope — the hope that is only found in Jesus. The knowledge that God is still in control, He has a plan and a purpose for my life since I am still here, and that He alone would get me through this. The people in our lives are gifts from God. They do not belong to us. They are on loan to us from God. As one of the quotes in the GriefShare book says, "Time is not the healer of wounds. God is." Even the name of the program has hope: "GriefShare...Your Journey from Mourning to Joy." Grief is a very critical time in a person's life. They either turn towards God or turn away from Him. If they turn away, they may become bitter and never heal. That is why GriefShare is so important...It helps people learn to turn to God.

From the Perspective of a Visitor... Fort Loudoun, PA



FORT LOUDOUN, PA

For anyone looking for a different historical site to visit that is within a reasonable distance from our area, you might consider Fort Loudoun in Pennsylvania. This is a reconstructed fort that was in existence from 1756 to 1765

when that area was the western frontier of the colony. It was built on the remains of a farm which had been destroyed by the Indians. The fort was a wooden stockade and had small canon mounted atop the corner towers. Also on the 208 acre site is a reconstructed farmhouse which contains a gift shop and small museum.

There are three forts by this name, the other two being in Virginia and Tennessee. They were named for the Earl of Loudoun, who was commander of the British forces of North America at the time. The Pennsylvania area was also the site of the so-called Black Boys' Rebellion of 1765. These were rowdy residents who rebelled against British authority because the British wanted to stop westward migration and make the Appalachians a firm border. They also traded with the Natives, including weapons and ammunition. Both of these were threats to the colonists in the area, especially the latter. This precipitated the attacks. The locals thought that the colonial authorities were not only not acting in their interests, but also not in the King's. Skirmishes between colonists and soldiers occurred here ten years before, and maybe contributed to, the American Revolution.


Travel time to the fort is just under two hours. Take 140 west into Pennsylvania where it becomes Route 16. Continue to Mercersburg and take Route 75 north to the town of Fort Loudon (note the slight change in spelling). Go east on US 30 and it is not far to the fort entrance on your right. If you continue north on 75 roughly eight miles, on the left are the remains of a blast furnace that was in use during the Civil War and produced 35 tons of pig iron a week.

They are not able to have regular hours of operation at this time due to ongoing restoration at the site. Visitors are welcome to park outside the gate area and walk around the site during daylight hours. Most Wednesdays there are volunteers working at the site who would be available for tours. The site is closed from dusk to dawn. Their web site is fortloudounpa.com.

From a spiritual point of view, life was hard for most of the residents at that time. The church was central for both social and spiritual growth. If it had not been for their relationship with the Lord, our nation would not exist today. The colonists were not perfect, neither are we. However, God loves us and has a future for us when we maintain a relationship with Him. Always remember that both the future of our country and ourselves depends on our knowledge of and witness for our Lord.

As we wind down our summer and look forward to cooler weather and beautiful fall days, here is an assortment of possible texts for you to enjoy:

New Mercies: A Daily Guideposts Prayer Companion (2014) by Guideposts (245). Whether you want to start your days with a boost of spiritual refreshment, take a peaceful afternoon break with message of faith and fulfillment, or drift off to sleep with God's love in your heart, this beautiful prayer book is for you. It is filled with prayers from the Bible, historical figures, and Daily Guideposts' writers.

A Bead and a Prayer: A Beginner's Guide to Protestant Prayer Beads by Kristen E. Vincent (245). Vincent tells how to make and use prayer beads. She gives a treasure trove of history, practical counsel and loving instruction.

The One Year Uncommon Life Daily Challenge by Tony Dungy (240) Beloved Super Bowl-winning coach Tony Dungy is known for his truly uncommon character—as a coach, a dad, and a mentor. Yet it didn't happen overnight. He learned that the path to significance and ultimate success starts with a challenge that we can all take: to discover what God has in store for you by spending time with Him every day. In The One Year Uncommon Life Daily Challenge, Tony Dungy shares 365 Scripture readings and reflections on how to live an "uncommon life" of integrity, honor your family and friends, create a life of real impact, and connect with God in a deep way.

Rose Guide to the Tabernacle by William Ashby (223) Learn all about the Old Testament in the Wilderness of Sinai. This "movable tent" was the place where God met with his people. The tabernacle is important because it shows God's desire to live among His people, God's original design for the world, and God's plan to fix a broken creation. Includes The Courtyard, The Holy Place, and the Most Holy Place, along with explanations of furnishings, sacrifices, calendar of feasts and holy days, and garments worn by the high priest.

Raising Great Kids: A Comprehensive Guide to Parenting with Grace and Truth by Henry Cloud and John Townsend (173). The authors help you provide both the care and acceptance that make grace real to your child, and the firmness and discipline that give direction. Avoiding the twin extremes of permissiveness and over-control, they show how you can help your child cultivate six necessary character traits: attachment, responsibility, reality, competence, morality, and worship/spiritual life.
