

From the Staff-Parish Relations Committee:

The following pages contain information being presented by the Staff-Parish Relations Committee. Some of you may have heard of it, but others may not have. Please take the time to carefully review these pages. Thank you.

OPENING PRAYER

Dear Lord! We are saddened, confused and disheartened as what used to be our place of refuge, no longer feels that way. Guide us as we sift through words, doctrine, emotions and theology. Keep us centered on You and the belief that Jesus Christ died on the cross for us – for all of humankind. Remind us to be respectful and considerate of those with whom we may not agree. Keep our minds and hearts open during the upcoming months. In Jesus' name we pray, AMEN.

INTRODUCTION

Today, as a member of the SPRC, my job is only to summarize **WHY** we are here today watching this video. For many of us, the pandemic put a mental hold on the church's conflict on human sexuality. Many of us thought that resolutions had been reached. NOT SO. I believe, and this is in my own words, that a wound had only been covered up, left to fester. So now, here we are ripping off that gauze and tape to expose and clean the wound. It will take some time to heal and there will be a scar. However, with God's help we will heal and be made whole again.

SUMMARY

In 2016 the General Conference voted to retain the traditional text in doctrine around human sexuality. The vote rejected the motion to revise the wording that would remove any reference to sexual orientation in respect to clergy. Also, there was no revision to allow same sex marriages. As a result of vocal disagreement with this, in order to keep the denomination together, the 2016 delegates asked the Bishops to form a special commission to study the matter.

A special conference was called for in 2019 where the 32 member "Commission on the Way Forward" gave their report. They met for several months, and 3 plans were drafted:

Traditional Plan - One Church Plan (OCP) - Connectional Conference Plan

While the OCP appeared popular among bishops, the Traditional Plan was approved.

When the leaders of this church started the "Let's Talk" discussions a couple of year ago, we were talking about the 3 different plans, there was no talk of formal separation, no disaffiliation. Many of you were at those discussions and had questions. Today, the moment we are in the Book of Discipline in, there is no support for any of the 3 plans. The chasm between those that want progressive wording and those that want to maintain traditional wording have given us at the congregational level only a choice of STAY OR GO.

In light of the ever-growing disagreement between progressives and traditionalists, a document was drafted called "Protocol of Reconciliation & Grace Through Separation". This as well as other separation plans were to be before the 2024 General Conference. The *Protocol* was an extremely important development and represented a concerted effort from all sides to work together on separate futures. The admission that separation is needed and should be amicable was groundbreaking. The Global Methodist Church was created in part to align with the *Protocol*.

IN CLOSING

Each Conference makes a decision, to become progressive, (allowing LGBTQ clergy and same sex marriage) or to maintain a more traditional doctrine (no non celibate LGBTQ clergy, no same sex marriage). Our Baltimore-Washington Conference has committed to moving in the progressive direction. What we, the congregation, *have to do* is decide to stay with the BWC and follow the progressive views or disaffiliate and either join the GMC or become an independent church.

There is a lot that has to happen before we formally cast a vote. The SPRC is here to help you be informed of the options available and the consequences/repercussions of your decision. Your job is to read – digest – ask and pray about your decision to "Stay or Go".

Rescue Mission dinner in November: UWF will provide. Food from the supper will be purchased and donated to Rescue Mission.


December Meeting: Christmas Potluck Luncheon at Cindy Myatt's home.

Our faith journey is an ongoing and evolving adventure, and we strive to become closer to the heart of Jesus. C.S. Lewis, in one of his publications, said this about God's demand for perfection: "...you must realize from the outset that the goal toward which He is beginning to guide you is absolute perfection; and no power in the whole universe, except you yourself, can prevent Him from taking you to that goal. That is what you are in for."



The following are just three examples of the works of this popular Christian theologian:

The Joyful Christian by C.S. Lewis (230) This is a collection of more than 100 readings taken from the classics of C.S. Lewis. There are excerpts from Mere Christianity, Miracles of a Preliminary Study, Reflections on the Psalms, and The Screwtape Letters to name just a few. Reading the forward is important also, as it tells about the conversion to Christianity that Lewis experienced in 1931.

The Chronicles of Narnia series by C.S. Lewis (Teens). Narnia....where talking beasts walk....where a witch waits....where a new world is about to be born!!! Here are the books in order:

- o The Magician's Nephew On a daring quest to save a life, two friends are hurled into another world, where an evil sorceress seeks to enslave them. But then the lion Aslan's song weaves itself into the fabric of a new land, a land that will be known as Narnia. And in Narnia, all things are possible...
- o The Lion, the Witch, and the Wardrobe Narnia...a land frozen in eternal winter...a country waiting to be set free. Four adventurers step through a wardrobe door and into the land of Narnia—a land enslaved by the power of the White Witch. But when almost all hope is lost, the return of the Great Lion, Aslan, signals a great change... and a great sacrifice.
- The Horse and His Boy On a desperate journey, two runaways meet and join forces. Though they are only looking to escape their harsh and narrow lives, they soon find themselves at the center of a terrible battle. It is a battle that will decide their fate and the fate of Narnia itself.
- Prince Caspian A prince denied his rightful throne gathers an army in a desperate attempt to rid his land of a
 false king. But, in the end, it is a battle of honor between two men alone that will decide the fate of an entire
 world.
- o The Voyage of the Dawn Treader A king and some unexpected companions embark on a voyage that will take them beyond all known lands. As they sail farther and farther from charted waters, they discover that their quest is more than they imagined and that the world's end is only the beginning.
- o The Silver Chair Through dangers untold and caverns deep and dark, a noble band of friends are sent to rescue a prince held captive. But their mission to Underland brings them face-to-face with an evil more beautiful and more deadly than they ever expected.
- The Last Battle During the last days of Narnia, the land faces its fiercest challenge—not an invader from without but an enemy from within. Lies and treachery have taken root, and only the king and a small ban of loyal followers can prevent the destruction of all they hold dear in this, the magnificent ending to The Chronicles of Narnia.

A Grief Observed by C.S. Lewis (Audio-Visual) Written after his wife's tragic death as a way of surviving the "mad midnight moments", A Grief Observed is C.S. Lewis's honest reflection on the fundamental issues of life, death, and faith in the midst of loss. This work contains his concise, genuine reflections on that period. This is a beautiful and unflinchingly honest record of how even a stalwart believer can lose all sense of meaning in the universe and how he can gradually regain his bearings.

Administrative Council Meeting Minutes • September 28, 2022

Attendees: Jan Kurtz (Committee Chair), Lee Ann Crochunis (Vice-Chair), Rev. (Pastor) Gary Sheffield-James, Brenda Kennedy, Reenie Harris, Vicky Wilmer, Rose Sichel, Rev. Matthew Sichel, Michelle Hudgins, Connie Wiegel, Scott Palmer, John Sies, Linda Hollman, Laura Waltrup, Patty Harris, Jess Sichel, Linda Yost, and Jonathan Yost.

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 PM and opened in prayer by Rev. Matt.

Finance/Treasurer: Finance met last month.

- Laura passed out finance reports [can be obtained by contacting the Church Office]. Much of the information was year-to-date through August.
- We are behind budget (which is normal) for the General Fund as of August. Year-to-date, our General Fund receipts are pretty comparable.
- Our investments are navigating a volatile environment, so it is understandable that they are down some. They are taking a hit due to market values, not withdrawals.
- The Endowment Fund and the Lucy Harrell Scholarship are being separated into different funds.
- Salaries and Compensation: we are significantly under budget in this area, as Rev. Amy went on leave in March,
 Pastor Frank would not accept a salary/compensation, and Pastor Gary has a reduced salary because he has
 come out of retirement.
- We are relatively balanced except for the Maintenance and Repair costs associated with the Parsonage (those
 expenses are above budget; our Maintenance and Repair costs are higher by about \$10,000 year-to-date). More
 Parsonage expenses are coming up (approved this year and proposed for next year's budget).
- The question of what the Youth Fund is was brought up. The Youth Fund is for monies given specifically for Youth (ex. Mission Trip Fundraising). Camp Wesley line item also has a good amount of money in it.

- A draft budget was passed out for us to ponder. It is based on the same levels of giving and activity; however, in July of 2023, it accounts for an increase in pension, medical, and housing.
- There is also a line-item for a Church bookkeeper in the budget. Laura is stepping down as Treasurer [effective 12/31/22]. A church bookkeeper would be in charge of QuickBooks, payroll, Accounts Payable, etc. It has been recommended that the bookkeeper work 20-25 hours a month for \$20 an hour. A Treasurer would still be needed. At this time, there is no one for either position effective 1/1/23.
- In the planned maintenance for the church, the A/C units in the Sanctuary should both be replaced. They are more or less 20 years old. One quit this summer, and the other managed to keep us going through the rest of the season. There is no estimate yet. Also, the metal roof needs to be painted and some improvements are needed on the parking lot.
- The budget is a deficit budget; however, including the money remaining from this year, it should be at least fully funded next year.
- The plan is to vote on the budget in October.

Trustees:

- Denny brought forward a security camera motion for approval:
 - ⇒ 2 "bullet" cameras in the sanctuary
 - ⇒ 1 camera pointed towards the pavilion
 - ⇒ Total cost: \$1,624.96
- It was noted that we must have signs up to alert people about the recording(s).
- Why cameras in the Sanctuary? Because of possible break-ins and other dangerous incidents.
- This estimate does not include a cemetery view [which was where a congregant's purse was stolen].
- The new cameras can be remotely viewed. Remote access would not be available to all, but it will be available.
- John Sies asked about whether they are WIFI or hard-wired; answer—they would be hard-wired.
- Another question was if the system looped in memory; answer—yes; around 2 weeks. Also, they are motion-detected.
- An amendment was made to the motion: Trustees is asked to have four cameras installed instead of three (the
 fourth would be facing the cemetery), with a \$2,500 maximum allowance to handle all four cameras. Vote: 1 abstention; all the rest were in favor.
- Already approved are the following for the parsonage:
 - ⇒ Flooring for the basement (Towne Pride on Thursday or Friday)
 - ⇒ Well tank/tank "T" for the parsonage (Denny will schedule ASAP)
 - ⇒ Water Softener at church (\$2,180)
 - ⇒ Secretary's light (repaired, apparently—[thank you!])

United Women in Faith (UWF)

- Met September 16th.
- The Boscov's Coupon use date is October 19th.
- Another fundraiser will be the November Bake Sale on Nov. 12th (at the Fall Supper)
- The UMW changed its name to UWF to be more ecumenical—to be inviting to more women than those just in Methodist circles.

Christian Education

- Met August 29th.
- Sunday School materials were ordered.
- New teachers have come in and other teachers have moved.
- As a recap regarding numbers, we have:
 - ⇒ Pre-K/K—4 to 6 children
 - ⇒ 1st through 3rd grades—4 to 5 children
 - ⇒ 4th through 6th grades—1 to 2 children
 - ⇒ 7th through 12th grades—1 student
- The whole Sunday School group will meet together at 9:30 AM on the following dates with the following themes:
 - ⇒ 10/23: Fall Harvest
 - ⇒ 11/27: Advent Carnival
 - \Rightarrow 2/14/23: "God is Love"

- \Rightarrow 4/2/23: Palm Sunday
- There was some discussion about the last day of Sunday School. Also, it is possible that the Pageant might be a new program and inside. It was suggested that another person or group in the church consider putting on the Live Nativity with a potluck, possibly after a church service as a separate activity; this is TBD.
- There has been discussion about ways to increase our numbers of children in Sunday School. Facebook was suggested. VBS attendees have not really come to the church. Pastor Gary said that we are not alone with our small numbers "post-Covid;" however, Patty said that our numbers are about the same except for the aged-out youth.

United Methodist Men (UMM)

- The men did not end up having a speaker, so they had fellowship instead with a good meal and dessert.

- The budget is going down quite a bit, which is good.
- This is a busy time:
 - \Rightarrow 11/6/22: Soup Sale
 - \Rightarrow 12/4/22: Caroling
 - ⇒ 12/11/22: Cookie Walk
- Outreach has, is, and/or will be heading up the Thanksgiving Food Drive, the sponsorship of Christmas families, supporting Westminster Rescue Mission once a month with meals, the Immigrant Supply Drive, NESAP (which needs volunteers to drive people to doctors appointments—contact Janet Martin).
- Pastor Gary asked if we celebrate Student Day; we could do this in November or January—close to a break.
- Alpha Pregnancy Center is having a fundraising event at Grace Bible Church this Saturday; it will be a BBQ dinner, program, and silent auction.

Lay Leadership Development/Nominations

- The group has made 70+ calls to Wesley's leadership.
- 85% of the leadership has agreed to participate in leadership. Nine ministry positions are open: Lay Leadership Committee (2 positions), Librarian, Lay Leader, Church Treasurer, Chair of Memorials Committee, Trustees Committee (1 position), Chair of Endowment Fund Committee, and Cemetery Committee Treasurer.
- Regarding the Church Treasurer position, Laura is stepping down after eleven years. Thank you for all you've done, Laura. So far, one person has declined the position.
- Separating the Bookkeeper and Treasurer jobs is the way that we should move forward. The Bookkeeper would handle transactions and the Treasurer would handle things like reporting, stats reporting, and so forth.
- Laura can be present during the transition phase for the new position(s).

The job description(s) should be put in the next Journal.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC)

- Linda Yost and Pastor Gary gave a short presentation on the process of discernment concerning disaffiliation. Pastor Gary has contacted Rev. LaPrade, the District Superintendent, about how the process begins for a church to start discerning. The first step was to connect with the D.S., which Pastor Gary did. That meeting started the process of **discernment**, not of disaffiliation.
- After talking to Rev. LaPrade, a disaffiliation packet is going to be constructed that will include the financial obligations of a church that decides to disaffiliate, etc.
- Rev. LaPrade notified us on September 27th that we would need to send the current roster of professing members with current addresses within 15 days of the initial contact. Also, we are to send the D.S. all copies of deeds, mortgages, and gift letters or wills where there is a property interest to be addressed by the Chancellor and local church leaders with 30 days of the initial contact. The latter has been provided to Pastor Gary by Rev. Matt, who will give them to Rev. LaPrade. Discussion about privacy concerns with the former requirement was held amongst the Ad. Council.
- The decision that needs to be made by the Ad. Council is whether to begin educating the congregation about how disaffiliation works. We have until April 2023 to vote on whether to stay with the UMC or disaffiliate from the UMC under the current structure of the Book of Discipline. We have until December of 2023 to finish the disaffiliation process. The deadlines aside, we need to decide whether to educate the congregation about the possibility of disaffiliation. The Ad. Council voted unanimously in favor of educating the congregation.
- The education of the congregation includes offering viewing(s) of the "Stay or Go: Real Talk for United Methodists Exploring Their Future" webinar as well as a four-week small group study on the book, "Living Faithfully: Human Sexuality and The United Methodist Church. [SPRC began holding "Stay or Go" webinar viewings and had scheduled the four-week small group study almost immediately.]

- Pastor Gary is away on vacation to New Zealand/Australia October 7th to October 31st.
- Pulpit Supply for 10/9, 10/16, 10/23, and 12/30 will be supervised by Rev. Matt Sichel. Per Matt, the first two Sundays, he will cover, the third Sunday Stephanie Halley will be in the pulpit, and the fourth Sunday, Rose Sichel will preach.
- Pastor Gary goes on vacation Nov. 19th to Nov. 26th (needs pulpit supply Nov. 20th) and Dec. 26th to Jan. 2nd (needs pulpit supply Jan. 1st).
- Rev. Matt Sichel will be covering any pastoral emergencies during this time. You can contact him at 443-278-3440 or popsichel@hotmail.com.
- Wesley's Church Conference Date is November 1st, 2022, at 6:30 PM via Zoom. All forms are due 10 days prior to the Conference (October 22, 2022).
- Bishop LaTrelle Easterling, the episcopal leader of the Peninsula-Delaware and Baltimore-Washington Conferences, has an online town hall meeting tonight at 7 PM. The town hall will address misinformation and confusion about the current state and future of the UMC including our tenets of faith, the strength of our connection, the policies approved by the General Conference and Annual Conferences to disaffiliate, and what (if any) decisions local churches, members and clergy need to be making. Bishop Easterling and other leaders from both conferences will shine a light on these issues and more. The town hall will be recorded.

Deacon's Report: Rev. Matt's semester at London School of Theology (LST) began today (late due to the death of the Queen). He attended some LST activit(ies) virtually.

New Business:


