



MARY AND MARTHA AND GENDER EQUALITY IN THE KINGDOM OF GOD

The story of Mary and Martha is a story concerned with Jesus' affirmation and confirmation of the equal place of women in discipleship.

The dominance and inequality of males within our society continues to be expressed in a culture of violence in society. By violence we mean physical, sexual, social, technological, financial, spiritual, emotional, and mental violence. Violence describes any form of control of or fear in another person whether it leaves physical marks or not.

There are those who quote Ephesians 6:22 as a rationale for holding and arguing for this inequality that, in its



extreme forms, leads to violence. 'Wives be subject to your husbands as you are to the Lord.' But they have forgotten to read the verse that comes directly before it, 'Be subject to one another out of reverence to Christ.' (Ephesians 6:21) And I am sure they forget to read on, 'Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her.' (Ephesians 6:25) What they forget is Christ, out of love for his church, died for it. So husbands should be willing to die to self for their wives. And, then, in only a few more verses we read, 'in the same way, husbands should love their wives as they do their own bodies.' (Ephesians 6:28) In other words, 'treat your wife as you would like to be treated.' Do to others as you would have them do to you is a

pretty good rule to apply in most, if not all, things as a guide to our life as Christians.

Jesus, himself, challenges the patriarchal mindset of his day especially when it comes to issues of Christian faith. And this, I think, is the main point of the story of Mary and Martha. It is a challenge to our culture and male domination that leads to family violence and violence against women.

The story of Mary and Martha is an important story because it is a comparison between Mary and Martha as both servants and disciples. We have traditionally made the mistake of separating the two; you are either a Mary or a Martha. Too often we hear people described as good workers in the church, in the church choir, played the organ, led the women's guild, arranged the flowers every Sunday, or worked in the op shop. Very rarely do we hear about the person being a disciple and being able to gracefully and lovingly give an account of their faith, and knowing Jesus standing up for the rights of those Jesus wants them to stand up for, and helping others that Jesus wants them to help.

Jesus, however, is firstly making it known that women can be disciples. Women are not dependent upon a husband, or father or brother to tell them what they should believe, they can work out their faith for themselves. And we should be reminded that we all should be disciples before we do anything including offering our service and our service should be inspired by our discipleship.

The problem with us moderns is that we get distracted by many things and we get busy with many things. Mary has chosen what needs to happen before anything else is undertaken. She is first to be a disciple – a learner from and about Jesus. Our action needs to come out of our relationship with God; our service needs to come from our being disciples. We are not made good by what we do, we do what we do because we know we have been made good.

The story of Mary and Martha is a story concerned with Jesus' affirmation and confirmation of the equal place of women in discipleship. It is easy for us moderns to say, 'yes,' to equality of women in terms of discipleship, but the culture of our society is still revealing something different about the attitude to women.

The kingdom of God is a challenge to many aspects of the culture of our society and the example Jesus gives in this interaction with Mary and Martha reveals the kingdom of God as a place where men and women are equal and should feel safe in all aspects of their lives.


