
HOPE: SHARING OUR HOPE IN JESUS

the end of 1999, I left my hometown and my beloved job as an editor at Guangxi TV to immigrate to Sydney. When I first arrived, I went to visit my former university teacher in China. She had become a Christian, but she didn't talk to me about faith. Before I left, she gave me two cassette tapes, saying they were some songs to listen to.

After that, we lost touch, as often happens. Like many new immigrants at the time, I worked hard and studied, eventually having a son. Life was a constant rush, busy and exhausting.

On the day of the 9 /11 attacks in 2002, I happened to be home on a break. Holding my napping son, I watched the news on TV, feeling disappointed and confused. I worried about the kind of world my



After a while, I became pregnant with my second child and stayed home to prepare for the birth. One day, while cleaning the house, I found the cassette tapes that my teacher had given me when I first arrived in Sydney. They were still brand new - I had never opened them. By the way, I'm a music lover with a good sound system and a collection of many world-famous compositions, so I never got around to listening to them. I thought, before throwing them away, I might as well give them a listen since they had been sitting in my house for three years. That's when the miracle happened!

Community: the Wadawarrung and all our first nations peoples, their elders; those working toward reconciliation and treaty, recognition of the country on which we live, work and play; for all who come into our communities of any race, creed, colour, faith, or no faith that they will experience welcome; for who are struggling with life; that our neighbours will be find a new and better hope.

What sort of people can put their hope in Jesus? Who might God be asking you to share your hope in Jesus with and invite them to explore hope in your church?

Pray: God of hope, you call us to be your witnesses in this uncertain world. By your Spirit awaken in us a true vision of your kingdom, a greater certainty of our salvation, and a deeper dedication to your service. Through our words and actions may the same Spirit bring many who are lost to be found, and for them to celebrate the hope that we can only have in Jesus Christ, in whose name we pray. **Amen**.

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I put the tape into the stereo, planning to listen casually while I continued my work. As the music started to play, I felt a strange atmosphere in the room. I was moved by an emotion that I couldn't express in words. I put down what I was doing and listened carefully. I didn't understand the melody or the lyrics, but I was inexplicably touched. I started trembling and crying. I wanted to know what was happening, so I looked at the lyrics. They mentioned something about the Heavenly Father. Who was the Heavenly Father? I didn't know. I only felt surrounded and embraced by a force that was incredibly warm and sweet.

I've always been a rational and composed person, and I wanted to quickly break free from this uncontrollable state, but I couldn't help myself. I heard a voice say to me, "My wandering child, you've finally come home. Daddy loves you."

After this miraculous experience, I asked around and found a friend who went to church every week. I asked her to take me to church. During my journey to church, I encountered many obstacles, but after six months, I had learned some Christian teachings. I found them particularly good and wanted to believe, but my background in atheism and my self-perceived rationality still held me back. At that time, I often asked myself, "Could this just be the best form of idealism I've ever encountered? Is it merely the essence of human thought? Do I really have to believe that there is a God I cannot see or touch who is watching over me?"

During my intense inner struggle, I read a story about a sports day at a special needs school. A group of children with disabilities started running after the signal. One little boy fell after running a short distance. He saw the other children running ahead of him and began to cry in frustration. The child in the lead hesitated when he heard the crying, stopped, turned back, and ran to the fallen child. He helped him up and supported him as they walked together to the finish line. Although he lost his chance to win, he gained applause and friendship. The story concluded by saying that this is what pleases God.

Our Christ is full of sacrifice and compassion. This world encourages us to win at all costs, but God values love and kindness. At that moment, I decided to confess my sins, repent, and humbly trust in this God. I could no longer ignore the prompting of the Holy Spirit, as this was the strength and refuge I had long sought in the world but never found.

Later, I realised that the first time God touched me was through that hymn tape. The music carried a mysterious message, revealing His love to me and calling me to know Him as my Lord and Savior.

Questions for reflection:

- 1. Read Sheena Zhu's testimony of her hope in Jesus. What encourages you in this testimony?
- 2. What led you to be curious about Jesus, and how did you, do you, respond to Jesus' invitation?



Yayasan Cita Wadah Swaday provides critical cash assistance programs for refugees in the Jakarta area and supports refugee children who have lost their families.

Without funding, food will run out within weeks and many thousands of refugees will face severe hunger and malnutrition.

returning to Myanmar.

The Border Consortium primarily funds
