BREAKING FREE OF MENTAL MODELS DEFINING CHURCH?

Challenging our unconscious assumptions about what Church is can greatly assist our understanding of how to develop a healthy church culture.

Revd Robert Warren writes about a time when he and a friend were walking down the high street of a Yorkshire Dales village and they passed a middle-aged man talking to a woman in her early thirties. After they had passed he said to his friend, 'Did you notice the vicar?' Looking round, his friend said 'He looks a bit scruffy for a vicar, doesn't he?' Dressed for all the world as if he were a farmer. That was a valid point, except it was the woman who was the vicar. We had a good



laugh at how our unconscious assumptions catch us out.

This process of challenging our unconscious assumptions is an important part of the healthy churches process. It evangelizes a church's understanding of what really matters and what is involved in developing the health of a church. It has proved to be one of the most valuable parts of the whole exercise for some churches.

The term used to describe our unconscious assumptions is our 'mental model'. So, before we go any further, we would do well to try to get hold of our *unconscious mental model* of church. It is an important question because it so controls the assumptions and expectations about what church really is.

Archbishop Rowan Williams, when asked at a conference what his definition of church was, replied along the lines of: 'church is what happens when the impact of Christ on a situation brings two or more people together'. What is surprising about that definition is what it leaves out. There is no mention here of word, sacrament, priest, building, public worship and much else besides. But it is a mental model that gets back to the heart of what church is all about. In times of change that is vital for us to do.

In an earlier book I gave a working definition of most people's mental model of church (slightly reworked here) as being:

Church = Building + Priest + Sunday Services

That is what we recognize as 'church'. This mental model shapes not just our understanding of what church is but also how we then participate in its life. So 'keeping church going' is seen as keeping buildings open, finding the money to keep a priest (or at least part of one) and getting enough people into the building on a Sunday to keep the services going. That is what 'church work' - at its heart - is all about.

One way of approaching the task of nurturing the health of the church today is to address our unconscious mental model at this point. What we need is an understanding of church that gets to the heart of what it is all about. Here is one such way of developing a different approach to church that takes us back to what church is essentially about.

Church = Community + Faith + Action

Church is essentially a *community* of people drawn together by *faith* in, and encounter with, Jesus Christ as Lord, which leads them to take action in the whole of life. living by a different set of values from what would otherwise have been the case.

Another way of putting these three words (community, faith, action) is to describe the church as an engaging faith community. Engaging not just in the sense of being attractive, but rather, primarily, as involved with the world around us, following after the pattern of the Incarnation.

The power of mental models stems from their being unconscious. We do not realize that we are being shaped by them. Equally, once we pay attention to them and discover what they are, we can break free of their constraining influence.
