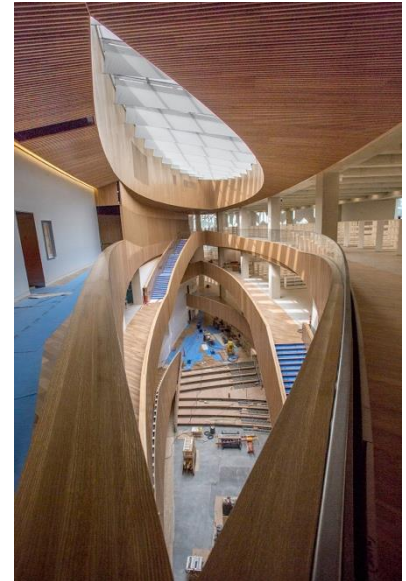

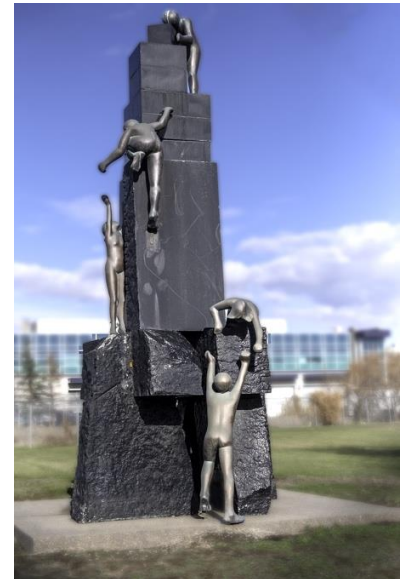

**10:00 am – Noon — Restoration and Stewardship of
E.P. Ranch after the 2013 Historic Flood**

The E.P. Ranch, a privately owned and Provincially Designated Historic Resource, was devastatingly impacted by the 2013 Pekisko Creek flood. In 1919 Edward, Prince of Wales, purchased the ranch south of Longview which dates to the 1880s. It's believed to be the only land privately owned by a royal family member. The tour chronicles the repair, conservation, and restoration of the site and buildings post-flood. The restored Prince of Wales Ranch House, Manager's House, and 1883 Log Cabin are again integral parts of this

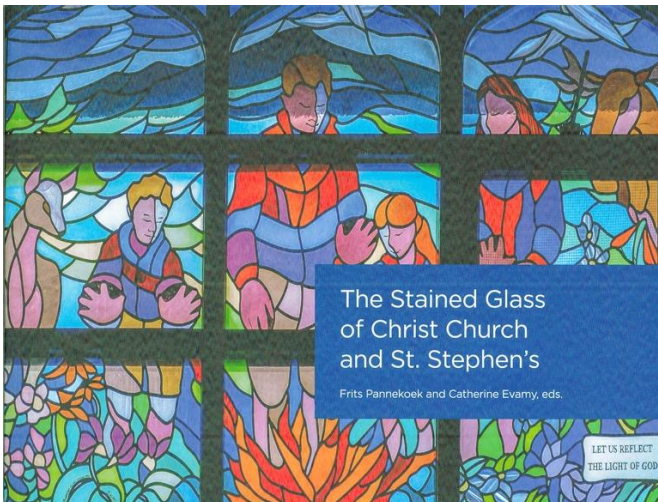

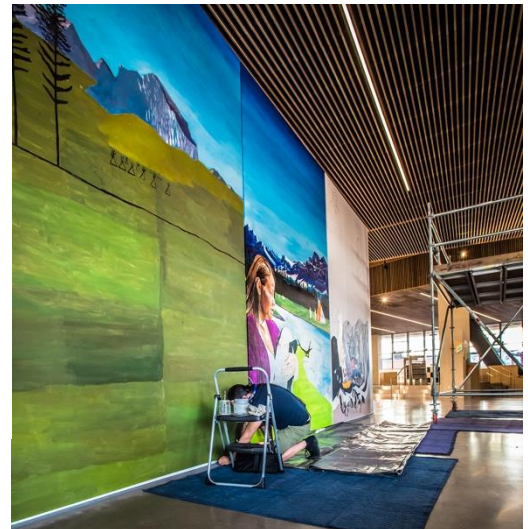

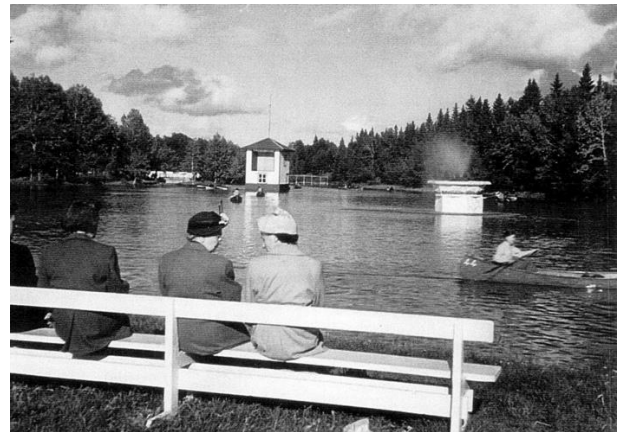

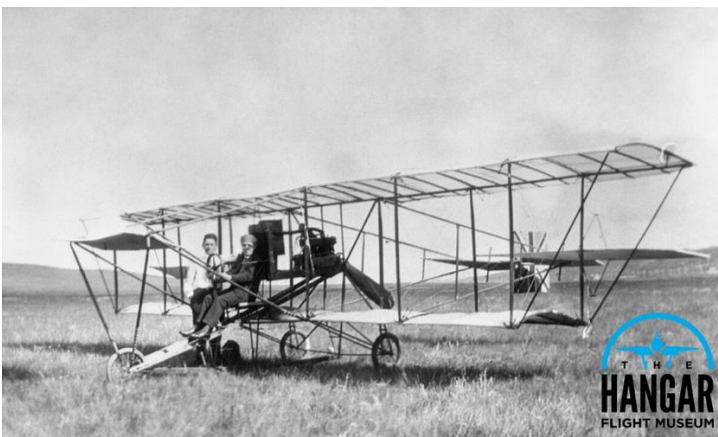

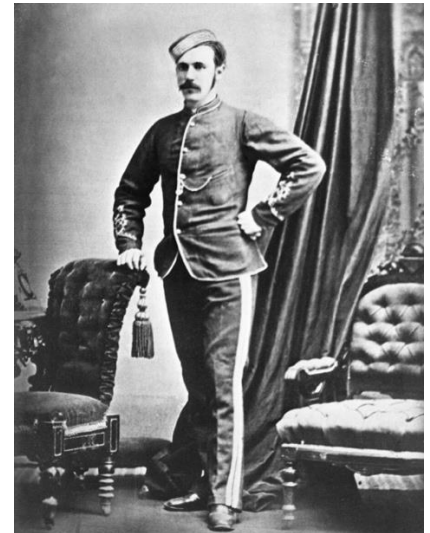

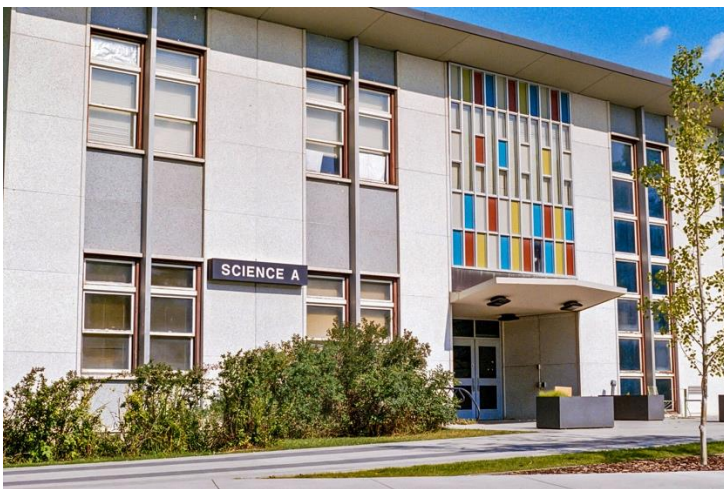
1:00 – 2:30 pm — Brisebois – What’s in a Name?
