CHILDREN'S HISTORY BOOK PROJECT

In commemoration of the 25th Anniversary of HCW, an age -appropriate history book is being published for children. We expect the first volume to be available in the late fall of 2015.

This children's book, geared to engage 8-12 year olds, shares important and interesting people, places and events of Calgary's past through the adventurous eyes of children. More than 20 local historians and authors have contributed exciting chapters for this book. Each chapter will have family-friendly activities and suggested further reading to enhance appreciation of our history.

Our plans are to distribute books to elementary schools and public libraries. The book will be available for sale at CCHS program events and in local bookstores as well.

HCW FOREVER FUND

Chinook Country Historical Society has established the "Historic Calgary Week Forever Fund", to assist in funding Historic Calgary Week in future years. This fund has been established at and administered by The Calgary Foundation to provide annual revenue to pay a portion of the cost of sponsoring Historic Calgary Week.

HISTORY HUNT

The first Historic Calgary Week in 1991 featured a History Hunt. Participate in the "Historic Calgary Week 25th Anniversary History Hunt" and find some hidden history nuggets throughout Calgary. 

Although the town has long since disappeared the stories of the families who lived, worked and thrived there provide great insight into the conditions of quarry workers in the early 1900s and the challenges faced by Alberta's early residents. This unique log church, where worship is conducted every Sunday, was built in 1896 using upright log construction and sandstone foundation. Local historians lead a tour of the historic Christ Church (still containing its original furnishings) and Cemetery. The bell was donated by the Hudson's Bay Company, and local artist Ross Weaver sculpted the Crucifixion Statue.

4:00-6:00 pm SALUTE TO THE STONES OF SIGNAL HILL

100 years ago, an area, just south of Glenmore Trail was a WWI training site for Albertans, called Sarcee Camp. As part of their conditioning soldiers carried and arranged some 20,000 river and field stones in their battalion numbers on the side of the hill: "113 our Lethbridge lads, 151 our Red Deer men, 137 were from Calgary, 51 were the men from Edmonton."

Join us for a concert tribute entitled **Take A Pilgrimage** by author and songwriter **Phyllis Wheaton**, musicians **Tom Poole, Craig James** and a guest violinist. Their music, stories and archival photos honour the sacrifice made by the men that went off to war.

After the concert you have the option to climb up the stairs of Battalion Park to view the Stones of Signal Hill. Commemorative plaques have been placed along the stairs in remembrance of those who fought and their families who each sacrificed in their own respective ways, for the freedom of all.

Meet: Signal Hill Shopping Centre, 5660 Signal Hill Centre SW, at the base of the stairs leading to Battalion Park next to the Staples store.
