Glenbow Western Research Centre in Libraries and Cultural Resources at the University of Calgary opened its doors to researchers the morning of October 15th. That evening, approximately fifty members of the Chinook Country Historical Society attended a presentation and took a tour through the new Centre. Several staff members were on hand to guide members through the new Centre and rare book and archival storage areas. Our staff greatly enjoyed meeting you on this tour and learning about your diverse research projects and interests. We have since welcomed additional Society members who have visited the Centre to begin working with materials.

Located on the second floor of the Taylor Family Digital Library, the Centre is the new service point for library and archival collections that have been relocated from Glenbow and our other archival collections in Libraries and Cultural Resources at the University. Researchers are welcome to work with archival materials Monday-Friday, 10:00 am – 4:30 pm in the Centre.

Planning and carrying out of the move has involved a large team from the University of Calgary, working closely with staff at Glenbow. The library materials were the first to start moving, in March. In July, movers began the process of moving archival boxes. The move will be completed next year.

Materials from the Glenbow are stored in secure, climate-controlled archival storage in two locations. The earliest accessions of archival materials, as well as oversize items and rare books, have been moved to the Taylor Family Digital Library. The vast majority of holdings are stored at the High Density Library, which offers the same environmental conditions, as well as additional cold storage for audiovisual formats.

Library and archival moves continue three days a week. Archival and conservation staff are currently working on the organization, packing, and moving of the Glenbow Archives photographic holdings. During this time, university staff are able to fulfill photographic reproduction orders. The photographic collection will be stored at the Taylor Family Digital Library. Already, the university's Digitization and Repository Services team have provided hundreds of images for researchers from this collection. Reference staff have been answering questions and providing access to materials as they arrive at the University. Former Glenbow staff members Anita Dammer and Kim Gerald have joined the staff at the University.


Libraries and Cultural Resources staff working on the project, include members of the senior leadership team, librarians, archivists, conservation staff, technologists, and copyright officials. All are deeply motivated to offer the best possible care of and support for this astonishing collection of historical books and archives. Already, students and faculty members at the University are drawing on the collection for their work.

The relocation of the Glenbow Library and Archives and the creation of the Glenbow Western Research Centre have been made possible because of the generous donations made by the Siebens Family, the Taylor Family, and Fred P. Mannix. Special thanks to the Government of Alberta for its integral support of this endeavor.

Every day, we welcome new faces to the Glenbow Western Research Centre, many of whom have long ties to the collections that have moved from Glenbow. We take pride in serving you all.


