

The song commemorates a festive Christian season know as Twelvetide, which traditionally began on Christmas day and lasted 12 days with gifts given each day. There are many versions of the lyrics, but the one we know today dates from the 1909 arrangement by Frederic Austin, an English composer. 


Rare Bears News ... by Tonita Waters

Red and Green

This is the time of year that thoughts traditionally turn to red and green as the predominant color scheme for any decorating or sewing project we might be considering. Sometimes we might throw in a smattering of blue, white or gold but for the most part, red and green win out during the holiday season. A little bit of online digging suggested that the muse for these particular colors was the cold weather of western and northern Europe. Folks living there through harsh winters enjoyed the green of holly, ivy, mistletoe, and evergreen trees coupled with the red of apples and the golden glow of candles to remind

them that better weather was right around the corner.



In the mid-1800s, red and green quilts were wildly popular in the US. It wasn't the weather that influenced color choices for quilt makers, however, but the availability of light-fast and color-fast fabrics in red and green that prompted their use. Fabrics were imported and expensive at the time. So a little had to go a long way and the occasion had to be worthy of the cost and effort involved. The resulting red and green quilts were mainly applique quilts on a white background. The applique pieces were intricate flowers, leaves and vines sewn with meticulous precision and quilted lavishly with wreaths and garlands. These were not quilts for daily use, but quilts made for special people or special occasions like weddings.

Prior to the Industrial Revolution dyers used the Rubia plant to produce a slightly orange brick-like red dye for the clothes of merchants and artisans. Dyes used to make the vivid reds preferred by the rich and royalty were created by crushing a tiny insect, the cochineal, that lived only on the roots and stems of particular types of grasses. In the 16th century Spanish explorers looking for gold and silver in the New World discovered that the Aztecs of Mexico had another resource they desired ... a cochineal species living on local cactus which produced an even more magnificent red than its European cousins. Imagine trying to keep the cochineal

insects and cacti alive on the Spanish galleons on their way back to frigid Europe and then growing enough of them in sufficient number to keep up with demand. Despite the difficulties inherent in obtaining Mexican cochineal, it became the preferred red dye of European cardinals, bankers, aristocrats, and royal courts.

With the advent of the Industrial Revolution in the 1800s, the textile industry needed more plentiful and cheaper red dyes to use with their new large-scale machinery. Cochineal availability was scarce and too expensive to be used in dying mass produced textiles. Trade with India and Turkey, however, provided the answer. Textiles from these countries were dyed a vibrant bright red color using the readily available Rubia plant of old but enhanced by a complex multi-step process involving lye, olive oil, sheep dung and a few other esoteric ingredients to achieve its brilliance and colorfastness. Known as "Turkey Red", this dye soon became a staple of the British textile industry which exported Turkey Red cotton to the Americas. It cost more than the standard brick-colored reds, but because of its colorfastness and vividness, Turkey Red cotton became the fabric of choice for important quilts made in the Americas in the mid-1800s.

Here are a few quilts from that era which showcase the richness and beauty inherent in red and green quilts.

The quilt below was made by Mrs. Wesley Wright of Trough Creek Valley, PA about 1840. It is called "Dutch Tulips Applique Quilt" and features blocks of red and yellow tulips on point surrounded by a border of red roses. It is thought that the tulip motif in the quilt may reflect her German heritage.

The red and green quilt below, entitled "Rose of Sharon Applique Quilt," was made by Elizabeth Price about 1851 and features rose and rosebud blocks surrounded by a border of rose blossoms. Each rose bud is reverse appliqued and detailed with green chain embroidery. Historians are not certain, but they believe that Elizabeth devoted the extra time and skill to this quilt because it was part of her dowry. Records show she married John Acton Robey the same year she made it.



As I put out my red and green Christmas decorations and unearth a red, green and yellow log cabin quilt that for some reason I keep buried all year long until December arrives, I wonder if our 19th century sisters weren't onto something. Why not have a red and green quilt out all year long? Like theirs, ours doesn't need to be on the bed for daily use. It could be displayed just as theirs were as a reminder of a special occasion or a special person. And best of all, it could be a reminder that we are part of a vast tradition of quiltmakers who love nature, bright colors, and meticulous craftsmanship with quality materials worthy of our efforts, our skills and our commitment of time. Happy Holidays all year long!

How to Get the Joann Snail Mail Flyer

- 1. Login or make yourself an account on the joann.com website.
- 2. In the upper right hand corner of the website you will see your name and this symbol A.
- 3. Move your cursor over the symbol and a popup box will appear. The top entry says, "My Account". Click there.
- 4. It's now on YourName's Account screen. Look along the left edge. You'll see a list of clickable Labels. The very last one says, "Communications." Click on that.
- 5. It's now on your Communications screen. The first group of settings is labeled, "Communication Preferences." They show your current Email, Text and Mail settings to receive Joann marketing messages, aka ads. On mine next to Mail, it said "Not enrolled." (Eureka!! Problem found.)
- 6. To the far RIGHT of the words "Communication Preferences" notice the word "Edit". Click on it. That brings up the editing window for your Communications Preferences. You'll see little on/off switches. Pick which ones you want based on if you want to get ads by email, text or mail. You can pick any combo you want. Notice that Text also allows you to get "order updates" if you want by text. This is the cool message telling you they've hunted down everything in your order and it's ready for you to pick up. You should also see boxes to add your cell phone number and address if you are turning on those options.
- 7. **VERY IMPORTANT** ... do NOT leave this screen until you hit **SAVE** at the bottom of it. Without hitting SAVE, none of your changes will occur.
- 8. Once you hit SAVE, now it ACTUALLY is time to be patient. I did this 2 months ago and I just this week saw the first flyer show up in my mailbox. I was about to give up hope of ever seeing one and even emailed Customer Service who told me it took 6-8 weeks for it to start. They were right. Almost 8 weeks to the day.
- 9. Also very important ... once you get it, try to remember where you put it. And don't let anyone throw it out. Coupons come with every issue.

Disclaimer ...

The one disclaimer I need to make with these instructions is that they were done on my laptop. If you're using a tablet or cellphone or the Joann app, things may look differently. The position of labels on your particular screen could be different than described here. But the wording will be the same or very similar. Look for key words like "Communication" and "Preferences." Be patient and don't give up. Think of it like looking for buried treasure. Best of luck. You CAN DO IT!
