Hi everyone! Welcome to our new guild year.

Our Security Blanket program is still ongoing, even though the availability and affordability of the Blizzard fleece has become a bit of a problem. There is still a great need, so any donations of blankets or yardage would be greatly appreciated.

As a reminder, we donate fleece blankets to Palomar Health Forensics for survivors of sexual and domestic abuse (women and children). Each blanket takes 1-2/3 yards of solid or subtle print 58" wide fleece. We do a single turn hem on all sides, after removing selvages, using your choice of stitching.

Quilt Hanging Option By Karen Crowson

I needed a hanging option for my moderate-sized appliqué quilt, without the need to attach a sleeve on the back. I found the STAS Quilt Hanger Set which comes in both light and heavy duty, depending on quilt size/weight. Installation was fairly easy. The quilt hangs nice and straight, and fairly flush to the wall. It will be a snap to change it out to another quilt or wall hanging for seasonal decor.


Seeing is Believing?


I was thrilled when I found out Wendy Mathson was coming to our September NCQA meeting to talk about her Storm at Sea and Snail's Trail designs. What fascinates me about these two blocks is the multiple interlocking patterns they create when set side by side. It's not just one pattern that's generated but many, often tricking our eyes into thinking we're seeing circles when there's only straight seams involved. Say what!!!????

Optical illusions have thrilled me since I was a kid. I loved having my eyes trick my brain into seeing something that's not there. Modern science has researched such phenomena to the point that they can now tell us exactly what's happening physiologically. Psychologists and physicians even use optical illusions to diagnose depression and balance disorders.

But it's the fun factor that appeals to me, especially the surprises optical illusions bring to the world of quilt design. Take the Ebbinghaus Illusion for example. Below are two clusters of blue circles. Look carefully at both clusters. Which cluster has the larger middle circle?



If you said left, that was my answer. But believe it or not, both middle circles are the same size. The explanation for why we perceive them as different stems from our brain's use of context (i.e. the surroundings) to judge size. The middle circle on the left is surrounded by smaller circles, so the brain interprets that center circle as big. The center circle on the right is surrounded by larger circles so we see it as small. My mind immediately hiccups and tries to apply this revelation to big fish and little fish and their ponds. Could it be there are no big ponds and little ponds? Maybe ... it's all an optical illusion and the ponds are the same size!! I'm going to leave that question for the poets and philosophers of the guild to ponder while we move on to another example of an optical illusion, the Café Wall Illusion.



In this illusion the rows appear to alternately angle up and down like teetering layers of the cake I made in middle school. In reality everything is straight rows. The black and white rows are straight. The skinny dark gray rows between the b/w rows are straight. Impossible, says my brain! That is, until I get out a straight edge and prove beyond a doubt to myself that the rows are indeed straight. What's going on physiologically again has to do with context. The retinas in our eyes consisting of tiny light receptors (rods and cones) interpret the gray line value differently depending on whether there are 2 blacks surrounding it, 2 whites or one of each. These differences in perceived value turns the gray straight line into a series of wedges which bend our perception of the real straightness.

Take this illusion into the world of quilts and you have endless possibilities. The design below is not a quilt, but a flag design by u/FoxyJnr987 on Reddit. It could easily become a quilt, however.



That idea almost sent me to my sewing room to try to make such a critter, but luckily, I stumbled onto a website called christaquilts.com where she does indeed turn the original Café Wall Illusion into a quilt. Go to this link:
