Why Make Security Blankets? ... by Toni Collins Our quilt guild has been making blankets that our local forensics team gives to victims of crime. Sadly, I learned from one of my best friends just how wonderful these blankets are. In early April, my friend and her husband went for a walk in their local park in Northern California. The timing was tragic. An armed felon, wanted for questioning in a freeway shooting, was running through the park, trying to evade law enforcement. He took my friend hostage. Praying through the ordeal, my friend managed to stay calm as the felon dragged her into a creek, holding her hostage for an hour. The police were able to capture the felon when he climbed up a muddy slope and my friend slipped out of his grasp back down into the creek. As we've heard Maureen tell us, my friend's clothes were collected as evidence; the paramedics then wrapped her in a warm blanket. I wish that all of you could have seen her face light up when she talked about how wonderful it was to receive that blanket. While it was not a NCQA blanket, the story does illustrate how important our outreach is to our community.

We have 17 blankets ready to be delivered, however, I don't plan to do that until after our May guild meeting. If anyone has any completed fleece blankets, please bring them to the meeting or call me for pick up at 760-224-3494.

As a reminder, each blanket takes 1-2/3 yards of 58" wide fleece. After trimming off the selvages, make a single turned hem on all four sides. The stitch used is your choice. The blankets are donated to Palomar Forensics team to give to their survivors of sexual and domestic abuse. Thank you so much for your continued support.


Sew Hungry Quilters ... by Susan Peters

The Great Escape

One of my favorite places on earth is the island of Kauai in Hawaii. No matter how many times I've been there, I always want to go back. When I wax poetic about wanting to live there, friends warn me of the dreaded danger of ... oh NO! ... island fever. You won't last more than a month, they prophesize. To which I reply, Yes, that might be true, but it'd sure be fun trying! No one has hit on the real reason I stay put, however. Can you guess why? If you said, fabric, you're a kindred spirit.

I've got way too much fabric to be moving anywhere these days. And I've seen what the salt air and rusty red soil can do to unsuspecting fibers. In Hawaii no fabric is safe from the dreaded hematite stains that seemingly appear out of nowhere. Just ask the folks at Red Dirt Shirts¹ who got their start after Hurricane Iniki hit Kauai in 1992 and dumped iron-rich load of dirt and water on their inventory of white shirts. Instead of panicking they sold the stained shirts as souvenirs of the storm and then went on to make more in the same vein for a whole new line of dirt-dyed products.

But I digress. In lieu of moving to Hawaii, a more reasonable alternative would be to bring Hawaii here. And how would a quilter accomplish such a thing? Through a landscape quilt of course!

There are many definitions of a "Landscape Quilt," some of which try to exclude traditional quilt blocks and patterns and promote it to the lofty realm of "Art Quilt." I hope you'll indulge me as I take a different approach and define a "Landscape Quilt" as any quilt that answers the question, "where?" To me it can be any type of quilt: pieced, appliqued, collaged, or painted. It can be any style:

abstract, improv, pictorial, portrait, natural, architectural. If the quilt gives you a sense of place, of being somewhere real or imagined, it's a landscape quilt!

Take the quilt at right by Edyta Sitar² called "Summer Village." It's very traditional, made of house blocks and yet it provides a wonderful sense of place and time and homey cheerfulness. In contrast Winter Village, also by Edyta Sitar, is almost the same quilt pattern (birds replace flowers) in a completely different color scheme with amazingly different results. I get such a sense of cold from the quilt I want to bundle up in it just looking at it.





Some landscape quilts start not with a quilt block but with a photograph, a sketch or drawing or actual view of a place. The maker then depicts what they see using fabric. Depending on the goal of the maker, the quilt could be photorealistic or impressionistic. This architectural quilt, "Beyond the Gate" (below) by Marcia Eygaboat³ is almost impossible to differentiate from the photo that inspired it.



It's only by zooming in and examining the quilting lines that you assure yourself it's not a photograph.

In contrast there's no mistaking Susan Carlson's "Dixie Dingo Dreaming" quilt for a photograph but she definitely used a photo to capture Dixie's noble face and supple shaded fur amidst a very dreamy surrealistic background. Both artists used fusible fabric collage techniques to create their collage masterpieces.



If you happen to be a collector of quilt books, you might own a copy of one of the first inspirational landscape quilt books, "Landscape Quilts" by Nancy Zieman and Natalie Sewell, published in 2001. These two remarkable women went on to write many more landscape books together and even created a video series showing how they do it. One of my favorite landscape artists is Karen Eckmeier of The Quilted Lizard Fiber Art Studio⁴. She has a super fun landscape quilting book and YouTube video that demonstrates the versatility of what she calls "Accidental Landscapes." Her technique reminds me of the Colorforms⁵ playsets I had as a child. I was immediately transfixed watching her mix prepped wavy strips to create a beach landscape and then easily transform it into a snow-covered winter scape and then into a summery meadow scene just by swapping out a few strips. She uses pressed edges and top-stitching to create her designs. You can see her video here:

Karen is also the creator of a different type of landscape scene, villages. Her "Happy Villages" book describes a method using raw edge geometric shapes coupled with glue and tule to build robust town scenes that range from the simpler "Bermuda Too" quilt (see below) to the complex. To see Karen demonstrate how to combine one of her Accidental Landscapes with a Happy Village in a single quilt, watch her YouTube video here. As you can see, landscape quilting techniques are as varied as the landscapes they portray. If one method or look isn't your ticket to curiosity, try another one. You're sure to enjoy the journey no matter what technique you use as long as you're having fun with fabric.
