A Brief History Of Oak Hill Park

The Oak Hill estate dates back to the middle of the 18th Century and belonged to the Woodward Family. In 1815 the land was leased and subsequently purchased by Thomas Hargreaves, head of the Broad Oak Print Works. The present mansion was built soon after the purchase of the land. Thomas died in 1822 and the house was passed onto Thomas's youngest son, Jonathan, who enlarged the mansion, by addition of a further wing. Jonathan Hargreaves left the area in the 1850's and Oak Hill was let to a number of tenants over the following three decades. In 1889 the estate belonged to Jonathan's son Reginald Gervis Hargreaves, who was married to Alice Liddell, the model for Lewis Carroll's 'Alice in Wonderland'. The town council, during Reginald's ownership, began the lengthy negotiations for Oak Hill Park.

The price agreed was £9,591, or one and half old pence per square yard, with Reginald Gervis Hargreaves returning £1,000 to help with the refurbishment of the grounds.

Work commenced in July 1892 on preparing the estate for opening as a park and by the spring of 1893 work was almost complete. The grand opening scheduled for Whit Monday 22nd May 1893 went ahead as planned with a street party atmosphere amongst the crowds that gathered.

Oak Hill Park in the 21st Century

The park continues to respond to the needs of the local community with new facilities being provided and existing facilities updated as opportunities arise. Recent improvements include a new bandstand built in the original style, a new play area and the most recent facility is a multi-use games area available for football, cricket and basket ball on a tarmac surface.


