REMEMBERING LIZ JONES

Former editor of the Packet, and Parochial Church Council (PCC) Secretary, Liz Jones sadly passed away in March this year. Liz was born in 1948, and spent the majority of her childhood in Reading, where her family moved for her dad's work as an English lecturer.

Liz met Graham at the University of Aston and they married in 1972. They lived in Manchester for around 30 years, but their heart lay in the South West, and in 2007, took early retirement and moved down here. Liz often spoke about the warmth and welcome they felt from so many parts of the community, particularly Poundstock Church and the Gildhouse – it really felt like home to them.

Liz loved gardening and had an encyclopaedic knowledge of plants. Some of her favourite days were spent pottering around the garden, especially if her beloved grandchildren were staying. If Liz wasn't gardening, she was researching family history. She traced her ancestors back to the late 15th Century, but disappointingly not found any links to royalty!

Liz was very active in the life of the church, participating in special services, carol singing with friends from Bangors chapel, decorating the church for special events and cleaning working parties. Liz was a keen ringer, learning to ring at St Winwaloe. Along with Graham, she enjoyed the good natured and often amusing Tuesday night practices and especially liked "ringing in the new year".

Liz and Graham also compiled a plan of graves in St Winwaloe churchyard, a valuable resource for visitors researching their own family tree.

In 2018 Graham died and Liz's life was turned upsidedown. It's a real reflection of her strength, determination and love for where she lived that she decided to stay put. A year or so later, Biskit (a biscuit-coloured toy poodle) came into her life. He was a great companion to her and always so excited to greet her when she came back home. Liz always thought he was a prize-winning poodle and was proved right, when he won 'Waggiest Tail' at the Launceston show in 2023!



Liz was diagnosed with non-smoking lung cancer in 2022 and thankfully was able to live well for three years while battling the cancer. She had lots of special family time, including family trips to Lundy, a place that was so special to her. In February this year, she moved to a nursing home in Bristol where she had 2 good weeks before passing away on March 7th. She's sadly missed by her three children, her four grandchildren and Biskit, as well as all her friends at St Winwaloe's Church.

Today, you can trust in Jesus. You've never seen Him before with your naked eye. You may not know Him, but he is there waiting for you with open arms to help you.


So this Easter I'm asking you today, to quit flying blind. The Bible reminds us that Jesus came to seek and to save those who are lost, (Luke 19:10).



BUDE LITERARY FAIR



BUDE LITERARY FESTIVAL 2025 TAKES PLACE FROM WEDNESDAY 14TH TO SUNDAY 18TH MAY.

Bude's fourth annual literary festival is shaping up to be even bigger and better. This year's event will span multiple venues across town, including The Castle Heritage Centre, Bude Library, The Kitchen Front, The Parkhouse Centre, and more.

Patron Raynor Winn, renowned author of 'The Salt Path', will be among the key figures inspiring and entertaining audiences throughout the event, including the closing act Saltlines on 18th May. Together, Raynor and the Gigspanner Big Band will celebrate, in traditional songs and newly written words, this "630 uninterrupted miles of coastline, crossing wild headlands with the calls of



oystercatchers, and the smell of salt laden air ever present".

Tom Michell will be visiting on Sat 17th May to talk about "The Penguin Lessons" his amazing book just being released as a film, starring Steve Coogan. In conversation with Suzanne Hargreaves, hear more from Tom about the penguin's determination to survive a catastrophic oil spill that killed thousands of other birds and how, after Tom found him, cleaned him, and tried to return him to the sea, he refused to go, electing instead to stay with his rescuer. Tom had no alternative but to smuggle him back to Argentina and the college where he taught, making a difference to so many lives in the dark and dangerous days of the fascist military dictatorship of the time.

The workshops are well worth a visit, covering everything from history writing and self-publishing to calligraphy, illustration, and creative writing. Worth exploring are lyric writing sessions with Gary McCausland and James Dixon, as well as 'Writing the Emotions' with Ellen Hawley. There's also a full programme for kids and families, including an 'interactive character treasure hunt' that promises fun for all ages, and a production of Charlie and the Chocolate Factory performed by Budehaven Community School on 13th and 15th May.

Bude Lit Festival regular, Veronica Henry is back in Bude to talk about the inspiration behind 'One Night at the Château', the inspirational story of two women, thirty years apart, whose lives are transformed by the Château Villette in Provence. This is Veronica's twenty fourth bestselling novel and perhaps her favourite to write so far.

Headlining this year's festival, comedian Marcus Brigstocke brings his show 'Vitruvian Mango' to The Parkhouse Centre on 14th May. He asks "What are men for?" Most heavy things can be lifted by machines and most problems can be solved by computers and most puddles can be crossed without us gallantly draping our capes over them – so are we fellas of any use at all? Award winning Marcus Brigstocke thinks we might still serve some useful function. But what is it? This new tour show will resolve the entire issue once and for all (in a non-patriarchal, open minded, progressive sort of way). DaVinci's Vitruvian Man is the image of the ideal male form. Marcus' Vitruvian Mango is the same, but sweeter, softer, seasonally available and, when ripe, delicately perfumed.

WEATHERING THE STORM

Weathering the Storm is a brand-new exhibition at The Castle Heritage Centre. The exhibition tells the story of lifesaving at Bude and how it has shaped the community. Visitors will learn about the early days of rescuing those in peril on the sea as maritime trade increased. As well as the history of Bude's lifeboat, from the first boat with no organised crew, to the inshore lifeboat we have today.

There are stories of heroism, such as that of George Bate, who bravely rescued a woman from drowning in 1857. On display is a bible given to George by the women he saved in thanks for his actions. Also on display is the medal for

bravery awarded to George by the Royal Humane Society, by kind permission of the Bate family.

The exhibition also includes the history of the Bude Surf Lifesaving Club, the first of its kind in the UK. Stories are brought to life with many original artefacts, some kindly on loan from the Bude branch of the RNLI and Bude Surf Life Saving Club. Exhibits also include an original breeches buoy, used to haul sailors off stricken vessels and an original lifesaving reel, used by the Bude Surf Lifesaving Club.

Exhibition open from Friday 21st March, free entry, 7 days a week.



PLASTIC CARRIED BY WIND & WAVES

We're Behaviour Change Cornwall, and we recover and recycle lost fishing nets and ocean plastic from around Cornwall's coast and transform it into unique pieces of jewellery and homeware - designed to last a lifetime.

At Widemouth we found several large sections of nets both washed up on the strand line and a myriad of plastic detritus - from tiny multicoloured shards to branded bottles and fishing ropes hiding in the sand. All of which has been repurposed into our recycled fishing net bracelets & melted down into our Bude Bay Jewellery - which we recycle in our lab near Fowey.



The ocean plastic crisis is not limited to one area; our recoveries take place all around the Cornish coastline and beyond. Widemouth Bay's wide expanse of wild waves, open sand and the exposed nature of its stretch of coast which faces west, unfortunately means we almost always find a heaps of plastics brought in by the full force of the Atlantic Ocean.

We never know what we will find though! In less than a century since its creation, plastic in its myriad of forms can be found in every marine environment: from lost or discarded fishing nets – called ghost nets – threatening to entangle wildlife in the depths of the ocean; to micro-plastics which are so small they mimic sand grains on the beach.



Due to the nature of recovering lost fishing nets and plastics - never knowing what we will find means that our products are always changing and evolving. Each time we visit Widemouth and the rest of Cornwalls coast we never know how much net and of what colour we're going to find where but that's what makes it fun!

Once recycled - each of our products help to support a cleaner ocean and protect marine wildlife - with 50% going towards the funding of more recovery of plastic from the ocean and the other 50% funding more recycling of ocean plastic and new ways to do so, creating a circular economy. We're actually in the process of building the first dedicated ocean plastic recycling lab in the UK here in Cornwall!

MARHAMCHURCH WI



The group was lucky enough to have as the guest speaker, Millie Moore, a partnership manager from 'The Pearl Exchange'. This is an award winning Charity based in the old Bude DIY building and set up to support 18-35 year olds from the North Cornwall and North Devon Area.

The Charity was started by Rose and Johnny Bamford in 2020 following the death of their daughter Pearl aged 19. The aim is to assist young people in the area struggling with life and no immediate and local help on offer.

As well as creative workshops, there are budgeting and cookery courses, Open Mic nights, Theatre groups and the popular 'easy Sunday', with bread donated by the Electric Bakery, for a get together on what can be a particularly difficult day if you are young and single.

To combat the horrendous waiting list for NHS mental health treatment, The Pearl exchange offers free and expert mental health support which can be independently and privately accessed. The cost to run the Exchange is £200,000 a year with no government funding and limited grants. There are plans to expand into the yard next door and create a garden area. All agreed that a considerable amount has already been achieved by the 5 part-time workers and 10 volunteers as well as all who donate to such a worthy cause.

If you get a chance, visit the Pearl Exchange (phone for appointment), take a look at all the inspiring activities and don't forget to donate if you can.

There was a full house at Marhamchurch WI in March to welcome the guest speaker, Dave Sargent or Chef Sargent as he is now known. Dave now spends a lot of his time cooking for other people in their own kitchens but he started off making and selling desserts.

Dave now cooks all over the country and occasionally out of the country, bringing a taste of restaurant cooking into peoples homes His success means he has repeat bookings and has watched families grow over time. Dave works alone for smaller parties and fewer courses, but employs waiting staff for his larger 10-15 course meals with lots of diners.

The business is online and diners have included various famous people holidaying in the area as well as those just wishing for a treat for a special occasion. He also caters at Weddings and other large events. A true Cornish boy, a pupil of Jacobstow primary school, Dave uses local products and local suppliers where ever possible and is a great advocate for North Cornwall.





SPEEDWATCH AT WIDEMOUTH

You will notice that a team of volunteers have been regularly (once a week) at Widemouth Bay, speed testing the cars which go past. They've been doing this for a while now to raise awareness of the speed limit.

Speed is a major cause of accidents, and near the beaches with footpaths which are accessed across the road, we must be doubly aware.

The team is made up of four persons, one to wear the camera and count traffic, one to clock any speeding cars, one to take the registration and one to confirm the car number plate.

Ideally the aim would be to create a further team, so that there would be a replacement if someone was poorly or to set up another Speed Testing team elsewhere in the parish.

To date, the maximum speed which has been recorded was 48mph and most people have accepted that the speed needs to be enforced



CALL FOR SITES: HELP SHAPE POUNDSTOCK'S FUTURE

Poundstock Parish Council is preparing a Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP) for the Parish. As previous minimum housing requirements have been met, the work so far on an NDP and related public consultation has not sought to identify any sites for possible development. However, Cornwall Council has now introduced a new minimum housing target for the Parish of eight houses. The Cornwall Homechoice register also currently indicates a total of 22 households with a local connection to the Parish seeking affordable rented housing. In order to address this housing need, the Parish Council is undertaking a Call for Sites.

The Parish Council therefore invites submissions for affordable housing schemes. Proposals should make provision for up to 22 affordable homes for local people or those with a local connection. These may be on one or more sites and may be for social rented accommodation or other forms of affordable housing.

Local landowners, developers and their agents are invited to submit potential housing sites for consideration. Proposed sites must be within the Poundstock Designated Neighbourhood Area.

All submitted proposals will be subjected to a site assessment process by the Parish Council consistent with the public feedback so far received for the draft NDP (see the Poundstock Local Landscape Character Assessment, Vision Statement, Policy Intentions and survey feedback on the Parish website). Sites considered suitable following this assessment will be considered for possible inclusion in a draft NDP as proposed housing site allocations. This draft will, subsequently, be available for public consultation as part of the process of adopting an NDP.

Once the responses have been considered, some sites may be found not to be suitable or necessary, therefore by submitting a site, it should be noted that there is no presumption that any site will, by virtue of its submission, be included in the NDP. All sites included will be subject to future planning consent.

If you wish to propose a site in response to this Call for Sites, please provide your name, contact details and a description of the site and proposed development, including the number and type of units proposed. You will also need to provide a clear site location plan (ideally, based on an OS map) identifying the site boundary in red.

JUST ANOTHER WINDY DAY

Sunday the 26th of January 2025 was another wet and windy day. The congregation gathered at St Winwaloe's church for a Holy Communion service and were pleased to be able to benefit from the warmth provided by the overhead radiant heaters. However, part way through the service all the lights went out and there was no heating! There was a power cut. The service continued with Rev David Saunders reading the prayers utilizing a torch and candlelight.



When leaving the church, after the service, it was discovered that a large tree had been blown down at the lower end of the churchyard. It had missed the Canadian war graves, but the headstone on the war grave for sailor C Carlsen had been badly damaged. Many people will be aware of the Canadian sailors who were members of the crew of HMCS 'Regina', but may not have noticed the headstone for sailor C Carlsen, which is in front of them. He was a 54-year-old Norwegian seaman on board the SS 'Harlseywood', which was transporting a cargo of coal from Penarth to St Nazaire. The ship was torpedoed southwest of Hartland Point by a German U-boat [Franz Grunert] on the 17th of July 1918. Sailor C Carlsen died as a result of the attack. The ship was beached, but later refloated.

A Gildhouse working party had already arranged to meet on the 1st of February. The original intention was to do maintenance work around the Gildhouse and church. However, due to the fallen tree, they had a further task to cope with and were aided by other volunteers. A tree surgeon set about cutting up the tree, which was dealt with very efficiently, creating lots of firewood.

On behalf of the Parochial Church Council, I thank the tree surgeon and all the other volunteers for clearing up the churchyard. We are also grateful to the Gildhouse working party for cleaning out all the gutters and gullies around the church. The damaged headstone has been reported to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, who will deal with the matter.



Treskinnick Cross: just off the A39, in the old phone box.


