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What is Neighborhood Watch?

Neighborhood Watch is a program that encourages neighbors to get to know each other and work together to prevent crime; it involves citizens being trained to recognize and report suspicious activity in their neighborhoods, citizens and police working together against crime, and citizens working with each other during emergencies to help one another.

Goal of the Neighborhood Watch Dogs

The goal of the Neighborhood Watch Dogs is to deter or reduce criminal behavior and social disorder through community involvement, preventative education and partnerships. The group is made up of community volunteers working to build a stronger community, and to provide a clean, safe environment for the families that live in the Columbia Valley area.

Neighborhood Watch Safety Guidelines

Neighborhood Watch does not grant citizens authority to carry out the law. Citizens become extra eyes and ears; do not attempt to carry out street justice! Do not put yourself in danger; call the POLICE!

Organizing a Watch Group in your neighborhood

- 1. The Watch Dogs meet monthly the second Tuesday of each month. To receive an invitation and be added to the list of members; contact the Watch Dogs Leadership at: nwmaplefalls@gmail.com and give them your contact information, name, street, email address. A representative will contact you.
- 2. Join our Facebook page: "Neighborhood Watch Dogs Group" and send an email. Our Facebook site is private and all requests are reviewed carefully before approved to maintain security of our members. Meetings are announced on our FB page each month.

- 4. Solicit residents in your defined area to become actively involved in the Neighborhood Watch Program and work with the Leadership team to organize patrols, events and clean ups in your neighborhood as needed.

Roles and Responsibilities in Neighborhood Watch

1. Leadership Committee

 The leadership committee works together to provide administrative support, oversight and organization of meetings and social media platforms. The leadership committee members meet monthly to discuss current events, concerns and patterns in the area. They coordinate with outside organizations to provide training and direction for the community volunteers. They may consist of Block Captains, Events Coordinators, Secretary and other positions within the Neighborhood Watch Group.

2. Block Captains

- Arrange for meetings and crime prevention in the Watch Group
- · Facilitate information received from the police
- Receive and report information from neighbors to the police
- Keep an updated list of residents in their area; phone tree, maps, etc.
- · Maintain contact with police
- · Attend all monthly meetings

3. Police

- Keep the community informed of crime trends and potential problems
- · Regularly attend monthly meetings
- Maintain contact with the block captains
- Inform fellow officers of neighborhood concerns

4. Volunteers

- Attend monthly meetings, attend events, provide support to group
- Provide support to block captains, report all suspicious activity to police and block captains

Building and Maintaining and Active Neighborhood Watch

To build and maintain and active program often requires doing activities to maintain interest. Below are a few suggestions Watch Members can organize to build community and interest:

- Set up regular meetings, dependent upon neighborhood concerns and needs. Share this information with the membership at the monthly meetings the second Tuesday of each month.
- 2. Plan quarterly neighborhood events such as a block party, kid's day, BBQ's, neighborhood garage sales, park clean-ups, garbage clean ups, walking groups or other types of neighborhood events.
- 3. Quickly welcome and get to know new neighbors and invite them to join the group.

A Great Crime Prevention Asset—"Good Neighbor Policy"

Look out for your neighbor by watching their homes, especially when there are away. Become familiar with who belongs and who does not, in terms of both people and vehicles. Tell a trusted neighbor when you plan to be away so they can be watching out for residences, etc. If you see suspicious or criminal activity, call 911 immediately.

Securing your home

You can make your home safer by Target-Hardening or making it difficult for criminals to gain entrance. Look at your home and personal habits as if you were "the criminal." This mindset allows you to notice your vulnerabilities, and what steps you should take to Target-Harden your home. Ask yourself the questions below:

- 1. Does your home have proper locks on doors and windows?
- 2. Is there sufficient lighting in and outside of your home?
- 3. Do you secure your garage door(s) and/or outside buildings?
- 4. Do you have an alarm system? Is it registered and working properly?
- 5. Does your family have procedures in place for answering phones and doors?
- 6. Who is responsible for making sure your home is secure?
- 7. If an intruder gets in your home, do your family members know what to do?
- 8. Are shrubbery and trees maintained in order not to provide a hiding place for criminals?

Reporting Suspicious or Criminal Activity

What is suspicious activity? An event is out of the ordinary or one that should not be occurring. When it comes to neighborhoods, knowing your neighbors, their habits, and their household composition makes it easier to recognize and report any suspicious activities occurring in your neighborhood.

If you see suspicious or criminal activity, call 911. Staying calm will help you to better respond to questions asked by the dispatcher. Be prepared to give as much information as possible, including:

- Name, address, and phone number
- Location
- What is happening
- If is a crime or suspected crime
- Description of the suspect and/or suspect's vehicle (if there is one)
- Direction of travel
- License plate number and state

Emergency Preparedness

Another goal of the Neighborhood Watch Program is to make sure people know what to do in case of emergencies, such as floods, power outages, earthquakes,, or any other. Making a plan and communicating with the community about the importance of things such as making and emergency kit, setting up meeting places, knowing evacuation routes, and knowing the natural threats to a community are all important factors that a Neighborhood Block Watch group can help their neighborhood.

First, be sure to set up and **Evacuation Plan**—how can you get out of your house quickly and safely? Identify at least two escape routes from each room and floor, and be sure to practice with your family. The second step is to determine a **Meet-ing Place** with your family and neighbors. This can be a neighbor's home, a parking lot, a park, or any area that your neighbors will be able to identify and get to. Next, develop **Emergency Contacts**—who needs to participate in the plan, and who to call if you are personally in trouble. Also train young children how to use the phone appropriately.

Emergency Preparedness (cont.')

In order to prepare for an emergency, familiarize yourself with turning off the utilities—power, water, and gas. Also develop an **Emergency Kit**, consisting of water (one gallon, per person, per day), non-perishable food, first aid supplies, manual can opener, toilet paper, personal hygiene items, plastic garbage bags, clothing, sturdy shoes, crank or battery-powered flashlight and radio, batteries, money (in small bills), pet supplies, unscented bleach, important papers, and an emergency contact information list. Other helpful but not necessary items include tents, sleeping bags, camping stove and fuel, eating and cooking utensils, bucket, zip-lock bags, extra eye glasses, rope, tools, information regarding medical devices, duct tape, generator, and fuel. You can also create smaller emergency kits with similar items to keep at work or in the car.



Neighborhood Watch Dogs Non-Emergency Call Check List IF THERE IS A THREAT CALL 911.

Always allow dispatch to take the lead with their questions. When possible, try to have as much of this information available when calling the non-emergency call center. Knowing in advance that the operators will ask these questions will better prepare you for your call and expedite the process.
