HOW WAS OUR LENT?



On this Fifth Sunday of Lent, arriving almost at the end of the Lenten season, it is appropriate to make a spiritual balance how we lived this precious time of conversion. How was our real journey back to our heavenly Father? We have probably made many resolutions; we have promised to renounce disorder or vice or bad behavior as a means of experiencing this Lenten journey. The harvesting time has arrived!

The first evaluation of this spiritual pilgrimage must be how much we accomplished of our promises and how we live our lives today without the interference of sin in our relationship with God.

Conversion becomes the word that we have heard since we received the ashes on our heads; "repent and believe in the Gospel." In many ways, I am sure that you have listened during homilies, retreats, and personal readings of the importance of returning to God and presenting our lives as a sacrifice pleasing to God. How

can we know that we have been successful in our Lenten journey? For me, it is particularly important to feel that, after many physical sacrifices and deprivations and having participated in the sacrament of reconciliation, we have the plenitude of the grace of God in our internal life: peace, love, and liberation. We are not the same, the mercy of God has renewed us, and our life has passed from death to life.

If sin causes a strong experience of darkness and death in us, then leaving all our failures and mistakes in God's hands makes us participate in the mystery of our salvation and live in the freedom as God's sons and daughters. The only way to receive the fruits of salvation is to die to all our wrong actions and restart a new life in Him and with Him; "unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit" (Jn 12-21). The experience of death is not always the end-time event; it becomes the beautiful way to be new creatures in God and understand that, in Him, all can be new. Sometimes only by touching the deepest part of our mistakes and realizing that we must die to all our sins will we be ready to give real fruits of salvation and be prepared to resurrect with Jesus at Easter.

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ANNUNCIATION

The Solemnity of the Annunciation celebrates the coming of the Angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary to announce to her the special mission God had chosen for her in being the mother of His only son.

We are continually reminded of the importance of this feast to our salvation in various devotional prayers. Two examples that highlight the importance of this feast are the joyous mysteries of the Rosary and the Angelus.

The feast of the Annunciation began to be celebrated on this day during the fourth and fifth centuries, soon after the date for celebrating Christmas was universalized throughout the Church. This feast celebrates the Incarnation of the Second Person of the Trinity and the salvation of all mankind. This point of our salvation was deeply discussed by many of the Church fathers, to explain it to the faithful and to show the deep love God has for us. Some of the Church fathers who wrote on this were St. Athanasius, St. Gregory of Nyssa and St. Augustine.

SAINT OF THE WEEK: ST. MARCEL

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS

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Marcel was born in Rennes, Brittany, France, to humble laborers. Drawn by their high ideals, he joined the Scouts and then moved to a group called the Young Christian Workers, where his growing inner life made him a beacon for others. He met a young woman, Marguerite, and they planned to be married.

After the Germans took Rennes, Marcel was called to a German work camp. The horrific working conditions at first made him desolate — until he found that Mass was being said in a small room at the barracks. Soon, Marcel was organizing singing and games and bringing other workers to Mass. He wrote home: "Happily, I have a Friend who does not leave me for a moment and can support me when things are difficult or too much. With him, all can be borne. How grateful I am to Christ for having marked out for me the way in which I now am. What fine days I have to offer him.... Yes, how sweet and comforting it is to suffer for those one loves." In April 1944, Marcel was imprisoned by the Gestapo for being "too much of a Catholic." Six months later, he was sent to a concentration camp, where he suffered the brutal beatings without complaint, until he could go no further. Another prisoner who saw him just before he died recalled the look on Marcel's face "that expressed a profound conviction that he was leaving for Happiness.... He had the look of a saint."

ALMSGIVING

Almsgiving is (unsurprisingly) making a gift of alms, which are physical gifts (money, food, or goods) intended to help those who are poor. Choosing to give alms makes a difference for those who give. It is an exercise in detachment, a reminder that money is not an ultimate good. Money can, in fact, be a distraction from things that are more important, so giving up some money helps to redirect our attention to what we really value. Giving alms is also a social practice, perhaps the most social of the Lenten trio. Giving always occurs in relationship. This social aspect of almsgiving can remind us of the social aspect of all of Lent — it reminds us that we're not alone on this journey. At its best, almsgiving is an act of solidarity with those who struggle with poverty, helping us to recognize our common humanity. Above all, though, giving away money or possessions is an act of love. Even though it might also help the giver, it's really about choosing to help someone else above ourselves. It's a way of embodying our desire for others' good. It's about making a sacrifice that echoes the self-giving love of God. And it's about returning that love; all our acts of love for others are ultimately acts of love for God.

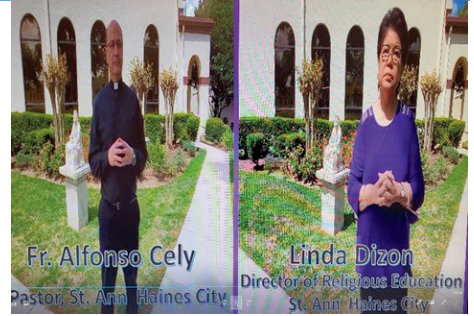

WHAT'S UP IN RELIGIOUS EDUCATION?



It looks like the covid-19 pandemic is on the wane as more people are getting vaccinated. In view thereof, faith formation classes will return to in-person setting for the coming year 2021-2022. Aware that certain guidelines must continue to be observed, we are limiting the number of students in attendance per classroom. Pre-confirmation students must register the soonest to prepare for the reception of the sacrament in September 2022.



The last day of our year-long tedious but successful virtual classes is on May 27, 2021.

On another subject, those who cannot make the Stations of the Cross in church in person are invited to join us virtually on social media like You Tube, Face book and St. Ann's website. Our walk to Golgotha with Jesus starts with RCIA coordinator Ms. Tammy Higgins explaining what the Stations of the Cross is all about, followed by Fr. Alfonso bringing the words of Jesus to us, and myself in a prayer of supplication. Each of the 14 stations, in English and Spanish is led by our catechetical families, the Young Adult Ministry, and the Columbiettes.



Meanwhile, the catechists of first communicants are focused on everything students have to know about the Eucharist, most especially on the topic of "Real Presence." The First Communion date is May 22, 2021 at 10:00 AM. Students are, however, requested to come at least 40 minutes before the start of the mass. Catechists will give more detailed information about this big day during their class time.

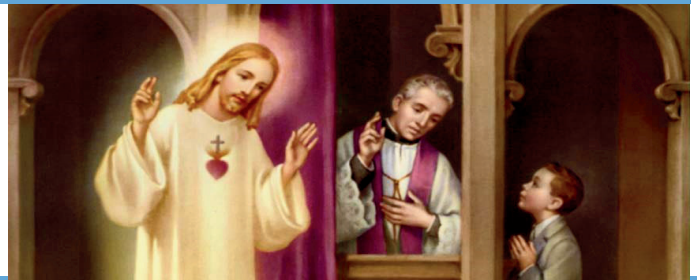

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¿COMO FUE NUESTRA CUARESMA?



En este quinto domingo de Cuaresma, llegando casi al final del tiempo cuaresmal, conviene hacer un balance espiritual de cómo vivimos este precioso tiempo de conversión. ¿Cómo fue nuestro verdadero viaje de regreso a nuestro Padre celestial? Probablemente hemos hecho muchas resoluciones; hemos prometido renunciar al desorden, al vicio o al mal comportamiento como medio para vivir este camino cuaresmal. ¡Ha llegado el momento de la cosecha!

La primera evaluación de esta peregrinación espiritual debe ser cuánto logramos de nuestras promesas y cómo vivimos nuestras vidas hoy sin la interferencia del pecado y nuestra relación con Dios. Conversión es la palabra que hemos escuchado desde que recibimos la ceniza en nuestras cabezas; "Arrepiéntete y cree en el Evangelio". En muchos sentidos, estoy seguro que has escuchado durante las homilias, retiros y lecturas personales la importancia de volver a Dios y presentar nuestra vida como un sacrificio agradable a Él. ¿Cómo podemos saber que hemos tenido éxito en nuestro viaje de Cuaresma? Para mí es particularmente importante sentir que, después de muchos sacrificios físicos y privaciones y de haber participado del sacramento de la reconciliación, tenemos la plenitud de la gracia de Dios en nuestra vida interior: paz, amor y liberación. No somos iguales, la misericordia de Dios nos ha renovado, y nuestra vida ha pasado de muerte a vida.

Si el pecado causa una fuerte experiencia de oscuridad y muerte en nosotros, entonces dejar todos nuestros fracasos y errores en las manos de Dios nos hace participar del misterio de nuestra salvación y vivir en la libertad como hijos e hijas de Dios. La única forma de recibir los frutos de la salvación es morir a todas nuestras malas acciones y reiniciar una nueva vida en Él y con Él; "Si el grano de trigo no cae en tierra y muere, queda infecundo; pero si muere, da mucho fruto" (Jn 12-21). La experiencia de la muerte no siempre es el evento de fin; se convierte en la vivencia hermosa de ser nuevas criaturas en Dios y comprender que, en Él, todo puede ser nuevo. A veces, solo tocando la parte más profunda de nuestros errores y dándonos cuenta de que debemos morir a todos nuestros pecados, estaremos listos para dar frutos reales de salvación y estar preparados para resucitar con Jesús en la Pascua.

Higgins, explicando de qué se trata el Vía Crucis, seguido por el P. Alfonso trayendo las palabras de Jesús a nosotros y a mí en una oración de súplica. Cada una de las 14 estaciones, en inglés y español, está dirigida por nuestras familias catequéticas, el Ministerio de Jóvenes Adultos y las Columbiettes.

Mientras tanto, los catequistas de los primeros comulgantes están enfocados en todo lo que los estudiantes deben saber sobre la Eucaristía, muy especialmente en el tema de la "Presencia Real". DAR LIMOSNA

Dar limosna es (como era de esperar) hacer un regalo de limosna, que son regalos físicos (dinero, comida o bienes) destinados a ayudar a los pobres.

Elegir dar limosna marca la diferencia para quienes dan. Es un ejercicio de desapego, un recordatorio de que el dinero no es un bien supremo. El dinero puede, de hecho, ser una distracción de las cosas que son más importantes, por lo que ceder algo de dinero ayuda a redirigir nuestra atención a lo que realmente valoramos.

Dar limosna es también una práctica social, quizás la más social del trío de Cuaresma. Dar siempre ocurre en la relación. Este aspecto social de la limosna puede recordarnos el aspecto social de toda la Cuaresma; nos recuerda que no estamos solos en este viaje. En el mejor de los casos, la limosna es un acto de solidaridad con quienes luchan contra la pobreza, ayudándonos a reconocer nuestra humanidad común.

Sin embargo, sobre todo, regalar dinero o posesiones es un acto de amor. Aunque también podría ayudar al donante, en realidad se trata de elegir ayudar a alguien más por encima de nosotros. Es una forma de encarnar nuestro deseo por el bien de los demás. Se trata de hacer un sacrificio que se hace eco del amor abnegado de Dios. Y se trata de devolver ese amor; todos nuestros actos de amor por los demás son, en última instancia, actos de amor por Dios.
