
In addition to its array of lush flowers, diverse plants, and exotic trees, the Rockefeller Park Greenhouse is home to some unique artifacts. This edition of our newsletter features one example of those artifacts: **Gargoyles**. Artfully mounted on the panels of a brick wall, the mythical figures guard the entrance to the Greenhouse's indoor show rooms. The terra cotta sculptures were originally housed at the Euclid Avenue Station of the Pennsylvania Railroad. When the station was demolished in 1973, the gargoyles found a safe haven at the Greenhouse. Learn more about their incredible journey at [Cleveland Historical](#).

About Gargoyles

Over the centuries, architectural gargoyles have had dual functions. First, like modern gutters, they diverted rainwater away from masonry walls, reducing erosion damage.

Next, symbolically, gargoyles were meant to divert negative energies away from the communities over which they stood guard.

Gargoyles vs. Grotesques

Architecture enthusiasts enjoy searching for gargoyles on old buildings. It's important to note, though, that not every building sculpture fits the definition of a gargoyle. True gargoyles serve a critical function: they have spouts that channel rainwater away from a building's walls. In contrast, other types of building sculptures are purely ornamental. These include carvings called **grotesques**, which are common on churches and cathedrals. Even so, all types of architectural sculptures share features like wings and horns, and can represent various kinds of beings, including humanoids, animals, and monsters.

The [Friends of Greenhouse](#) (FOG) is pleased to highlight this unique collection of Cleveland's very own gargoyles. Available only at the Greenhouse, they are both a reminder of Cleveland's architectural past, and a testament to RPG as a key community resource for both nature and history.
