Guiding Good Choices Monthly Education

Guiding Good Choices (GGC) is a free family class for anyone who interacts with middle schoolers. It provides the skills to reduce youth's risk for using alcohol/other drugs.

The class is six sessions of two hours each week. Children are required to attend one session that teaches peer resistance skills. The other sessions are solely for parents. Gift cards are offered if you complete all six sessions.



The center is a safe spot for those diagnosed with a mental illness offering peer supports/assistance and so much more. We are are striving to make a positive impact in our community with our Prevention Network Grant award, working with our community partners and utilizing the Social Development Strategy. Our Youth Advisory Council is meeting regularly and has proved vital to our mission. Big Brother Big Sisters is re-established in Alger County Schools. We are working with Munising Public Schools to help support a Student Mental Health and Safety Public Forum and present our Prevention Needs Assessment Survey results. We are providing prosocial after-school programming for Alger youth and adults. Or, go to the Chatham Ski Hill the first Wednesday of the month for free sledding, skiing and hot chocolate.

In October, CTC participated in United Way's Diagon Alley Fundraiser, constructing a witches' apothecary shop offering potion items, hats, games to play, and lots of house pride items. Local radio station Eagle 95.1 has an annual trunk or treat event, in which CTC created a Where's Waldo puzzle for participants to solve while waiting for their candy. We also participated in a Safer Homes event and distributed 20 kits to local homes.

Each month the High School SHACC Student Advisory Council sponsors a #SupportNotStigma event. These events highlight mental health or adolescent health topics and aim to educate their peers by offering a monthly gift bag filled with mental health items, school supplies, gift cards, phone accessories, and more.

For National Bullying Prevention Month in October, students played a 25-question Kahoot during all lunches. The highest score won the monthly prize. In October, they also distributed Red Ribbons for Red Ribbon Week to promote drug-free lifestyles among students. In December, a Holiday Charity Drive asked for donations that could be given to children aged 14-18 as our local Salvation Army receive the fewest gifts for those ages.

In December, our Advisory Council with the Health Alliance second-year students hosted their annual 6th Grade Health Fair. High School students created educational boards and presented them to the students offering them an interactive educational experience while learning about health topics important to their age group.

We brought a new program to Dickinson County called Yell and Tell. The mission of this program is for children's lives to be saved by the child who sees a dangerous situation and takes a proactive response.

Yell and Tell offers the following framework for youth to identify dangerous situations:

- See It (See something that is dangerous)
- Feel It (Scared. Doesn't know what to do)
- Yell (Yell HELP to attract attention)
- Tell (Tell the closest adult)

This program is used for the students by the students. It gives the opportunity for older youth to lead in their school, by interacting and building connection with students in the elementary school.


Ending 2022: HKCTC Coordinator Callisto

Cortez has been working towards implementing the CTC Youth Survey with local schools for spring 2023. Data from this survey is one of the cornerstones of the CTC process. The more we know about what kids are dealing with, the more we can help them overcome obstacles and make healthy choices.

Starting the year: A group of local Houghton students planned and held a semi-formal Snow Ball. Their goal was to raise funds for youth mental health and suicide prevention-awareness. Theu raised \$1,100 from ticket sales and graciously requested to donate their total to HKCTC for our suicide prevention efforts! We're so grateful for their support and dedication for teen suicide prevention and mental health awareness.

Mid January: January was Human Trafficking Prevention-Awareness Month. HKCTC is partnering with Dial Help's Victim Services Unit holding a Human Trafficking Education course, free to the public, and promoting other events.



As we wrapped up the year, Mackinac CTC focused their social media campaigns around bringing awareness to the Social Development Strategy. This was part of a campaign to start conversations about this important foundational piece of the Communities That Care model, and the coalition hosted an in-person SDS training in January.

The coalition also posted about clear standards in an effort to boost awareness about the Guiding Good Choices classes offered virtually.

On October 29th Mackinac CTC hosted a Drug Take Back Day in partnership with Mackinac County Sheriff's Office, LMAS and the EUP-Opioid Response Consortium. We talked to seven individuals, handing out Narcan, lockboxes, and lots of resources. In total we collected 7 pounds of medication. These events have been very well-received in the communities.



We had 5 Mackinac County families participate in the last GGC class of 2022! Mackinac CTC is gearing up for 2023 with lots of plans in the works. In addition to our Social Development Strategy training, we are working with TV 6 to create a new PSA featuring local youth.


That's a Wrap! The Botvin's Lifeskill education program has concluded for semester 1 in Ishpeming, and marking period 2 in Gwinn.

We went to the Manistique Middle School to complete our Youth Surveys with our 6th and 8th graders. Botvin's Life Skills began January 24 at Manistique Middle School, where we presented to over 60 sixth graders.
