The contest started very small four years ago and has grown to include almost every middle school and high school in Marquette County, quite an achievement. Videos are 60 seconds long. Students were required to research the consequences of addictions and think creatively to present information to their peers and adults throughout Marquette County. The theme this year was "BE BOLD!". Previous themes were "I CAN!", "WE WILL!", and "CHOOSE!" The MC2 contest was inspired by a yearly high school contest in Salt Lake City, Utah which recognizes several basic principles of teaching and influencing youth behavior. Students need to research the facts and then discuss those facts with peers. They learn best when they consider the facts and produce something creative like videos to present and persuade their peers. Students desire to do something good and meaningful to help their fellow students. When they do something actively, they remember and are more likely to follow through with positive action. Local youth battle drug abuse and underage drinking with media blitz

The Marquette County Cares Coalition (MC2) is developing a multimedia campaign to combat drug abuse and underage drinking. The coalition is focused on positive youth development and drug and alcohol abuse prevention. So far, the coalition's Teen Team (MT2) has created video and audio spots and has provided input around what speaks to youth for the posters and bookmarks that were produced professionally.

Two sets of twins on the Teen Team – Halle and Hayden Graves, 15, of Ishpeming, and Maya and Naomi Griffin, 13, of Marquette – worked recently with a coalition task force, called the Youth Development Committee.

"This was the girls' first experience recording in a studio, which offered them an opportunity to build new skills and get a close-up look behind the scenes," said coalition coordinator Jennifer Eyler.

The mediaBrew Communication Studio in Marquette and Radio Results Network helped, providing airtime to the coalition at a reduced rate and offering valuable experience to the teens.

"The studio was pretty cool," said Halle Graves. "I liked seeing how something like this gets put together. I am so glad to be part of something that speaks to other teens about the dangers of drug use."

This experience has empowered these young people to speak boldly about issues that affect our community.

"Sharing something we care about and having it heard on the radio was definitely an unforgettable experience," said Maya Griffin.

MediaBrew program director Eric Tasson assisted the teens.

"Eric was really nice and helped ease our nerves," said Hayden Graves. "It's great to be able to get the message out to the public about this important issue."

According to research conducted by the teens, people who start drinking young are seven times more likely to be in an alcohol-related traffic crash. Long-term chronic use of drugs is associated with decreased mental sharpness, poor performance at school or work and reduced numbers of friends and interests.

The teen's public education campaign started with the 2020 Be Bold MC2 PSA contest, providing participating individual youth or groups with cash prizes.

"We had a lot of great entries in the contest this year, which urged youth to 'Be Bold,'" said Youth Involvement Committee Chairwoman Kelly Sager. "And this is where the Teen Team began its important multimedia campaign."

The contest generated more than 30 entries.



"Which Brain do you Want?"

All Marquette County middle schools and high schools will be receiving "Which Brain Do You Want?' posters thanks to Marquette County Cares and the West End Health Coalition. The startling posters show what happens to brains under the influence of THC marijuana, nicotine smoking, opiates, cocaine, alcohol, and meth. These substances inhibit the flow of blood and therefore reduce activity in the brain. The poster shows healthy brains from a top view and underside view. Then dramatic images show the effects of drug use. Affected brain have holes showing significantly low activity. The images are from brain SPECT (single proton emission computed tomography.) The posts are produced by Amen Clinics and available on-line. Images help explain what is happening to the body, especially the brain, when we abuse drugs. It is amazing what brain damage looks like after only 4 years of THC marijuana or nicotine smoking, especially if the abuse starts in early teen years when the brain is still under major development. School officials are asked to display the posters in prominent places so the students and the public can learn what is happening to their brains when substances



are abused.

Is the high worth the damage?
