
August 31 was Narcan Distribution Day, funded by Michigan DHHS. Narcan is a life-saving opioid overdose reversal drug that has been used to revive drugendangered children and others. Our coalitions worked with partners to provide Narcan in each county. Beyond the Save provided information about addiction and how to get help, which was also distributed.

Partners included hospitals, libraries, tribal agencies, law enforcement, health departments, treatment providers, and more across the Upper Peninsula.

Suicide Prevention

September was suicide prevention month. Despite COVID-19 restrictions, a number of coalitions got creative to hold awareness events. Baraga County CTC collaborated with Gogebic County CTC to train 140 people with virtual Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR) trainings.

Dickinson County CTC and Houghton/ Keweenaw CTC held virtual suicide prevention walks. Not only did they promote resources for those at risk, but each coalition raised funds for more prevention work in their counties! #StigmaStopsHere906



Alger County Communities That Care (AC3)

With support from our community, our coalition was able to coordinate the distribution of over 1,000 food packs throughout our county. Food packs went to the elderly and families.

Alger CTC was recently awarded a grant to get a member of the AC3 trained in Positive Action. This is an evidence-based program that focuses on youth development and emotions. If you are interested in being trained, please reach out!






Marquette County Cares Coalition (MC2)
