



E-NEWS AND E-NOTES FOR MONDAY JANUARY 5th, 2026

THE TOPS OF '25

2025 proved to be a very good year for the Buckeye State as numerous members of its driver and trainer community were ranked nationally.

With the four major tracks in Ohio (Dayton, Northfield, Miami Valley, and Scioto) as well as the 65 County Fairs that offered harness racing during the summer months the echoes of “four-in-a-row in Ohio” reverberated throughout the land. The opportunities to shine were limitless.

For the umpteenth year in a row 47-year-old Cuyahoga Falls-born **Aaron Merriman** led the way with his 922 victories in 4101 starts while he maintained a “batting average” of .378 for the year. He has totaled over 17,000 driving triumphs since he began to team in 1997.

Sitting in third place was **Dan Noble** with 713 trips to the Winners Circle. Part of Xenia’s horse community which spanned 4 generations, the soon-to-be 43-year-old Noble has been on a tear since arriving at Northfield and adds multiple notches to close to 8,600 career tallies. His batting average was a lofty .376.

Right behind Noble in 4th place was Mt. Vernon born **Chris Page** who at 42 had a banner year of 593 wins to add to his almost 7,700 career totals since he began his on-track journey in 2000.

And while we forgive 39-year-old **Ronnie Wrenn Jr** for being Michigan born, the now Chagrin Falls native posted 547 victories to secure himself 6th place in the top ten. Since he began driving in 2008 his numbers are impressive: over 8,960 wins out of 38,800 plus starts as his 2025 batting average rang true at .388 (Ted Williams’ in 1957 at age 39 and you can run and tell that)

Another Buckeye adoptee was P.E.I. native **Drew Neill** who topped the UDR ratings with a .501 mark from the Ohio Fair Circuit in 2025.

Also in the top 10 were **Jeff Nisonger**, **Nick Clegg**, and **Ronnie Gillespie**.

On the training side Columbus native **Virgil Morgan Jr** was 5th in wins with 231. Northfield stalwart **Cory Kreiser** sat 6th with 228 as Chillicothe-born **Steve Carter** was tucked in 7th at 226 as he just missed his high-water mark in earnings from the previous year. **Christi Noble** would have a top Ohio batting average of .442 while Mt Eaton-born **Rosy Weaver** spun a formidable .421 with her training prowess.
