Keep your pets safe over the festive season

As winter ever convincingly draws in, and our thoughts turn to Christmas trees and festive fayre, I thought I would provide a timely warning about some potential dangers to our pet Cats and Dogs which are (surprisingly in some cases) contained within all of our seasonal Christmas trolleys.

What is dangerous about Christmas Dinner you might rightly ask? There are several common household foods and items that if ingested, can cause illness in our beloved pet cat or dog.

The number one offender is our favourite Christmas indiscretion: Chocolate. Chocolate contains a chemical called Theobromine. This is harmless to us (apart from our waistlines) but can cause heart problems, and in severe cases, seizures if eaten by a pet. Remember and lock up those choccies, and as with all of these examples, if you are worried that your pet has eaten something potentially toxic, please call your vet immediately for advice.

Number Two on our most wanted list are Onions and Garlic (look to the turkey stuffing and the roast veg for these). In large quantities, these can cause anaemia (pale gums) and weakness in pets.

On the Third day of Christmas, please watch out for the humble raisin, which plumps out the plum pudding, and fills our mince pies. Please don't offer your dog a leftover mince pie, because raisins in large amounts can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and even kidney failure in dogs. The cause of this toxicity is unknown.

Next a slightly less common Christmas treat: Avocado. This fruit contains a chemical called "Persin," which can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and breathing difficulty in our pets.

Finally a Christmas decorative item: Lilly flowers. Lilies are hugely toxic to cats causing kidney failure and severe depression just from ingesting a small amount of pollen. Cats will clean the pollen from their fur if they brush past a flower, thus facilitating ingestion (swallowing). So severe is this reaction that I (like many other cat owners I know) don't even have lilies in the house!

The last thing I want to do is to put a dampener on your festive celebrations, but with awareness and some simple precautions, we can all keep our pets happy and healthy this festive season. In the mean time, all of our best wishes for the holiday season.



On a Saturday browsing session, numbers using the library are on a strictly limited number basis, and you will need to be signed in for track and trace purposes.

You will be able to access the public computers and print from your own or our device, paying either with your card or in cash (correct change please), You may also photocopy (cash only – correct change please).

And of course you will be able to choose your own books. You will also be able to pick up hearing aid batteries / dog poo bags/ food caddy waste and battery bags.



HOMEOWNERS - IMPORTANT NOTICE

In February 2019 the Legislation relating to smoke detection in your home changed. All domestic properties in Kintore could be affected.

You need to have the following: -

- One smoke alarm installed in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes.
- One smoke alarm in every circulation space on each storey, such as hallway and landing.
- One heat alarm installed in every kitchen.
- All fire alarms are to be ceiling mounted and must be interlinked.
- Carbon monoxide detectors are to be fitted where there are carbon fuelled appliances (such as boilers, fires, open fires, heaters, stoves or a flue).

The Regulations come into effect in February 2022.

Kintore & District Community Council

We hope everyone is keeping safe and well, it's been another busy few months for the Community Council team. With restrictions easing, it's been possible to move to hybrid meeting arrangements and allowed some members to meet in person for our monthly meetings. There has been 3 now, and a big thanks goes to Glen at the Crafty Café for hosting the last two meetings. It's also been great to have some good interaction with the community recently too, with attendance at our meetings as well as reaching out for support or help with issues, it's what we're hear for but still nice to see.

Planning matters have been fewer in recent months, but there has still been plenty to review and discuss. After the refusal of the Town Park application, there has been an appeal submitted, so there have been statements to send off to ensure the community is represented through the appeals process. There will be updates on the process on the Kintore Facebook page.

Recently we have been reporting issues with anti-social behaviour, and we have been pleased to see recently that there has been a reduction in reported issues from the local police. There had been an increase in police presence, and advice was being given to groups which has certainly made a difference. We still get reports of isolated incidents and have noted some problems with localised access problems, but working with Aberdeenshire Council and their support we are hoping that these will also reduce. Kintore has some great areas for walking and exploring, it's all of our responsibility to keep these areas clean and tidy and as nature intended.

Through our Facebook page, we've had several campaigns to raise awareness of the defibrillators that are placed around the village. The unit's play an important part in the community, while we hope they are not needed, it's a great comfort to know where they are if the need arises.

As I write this, we are busy planning the fireworks event, and it's been great to see the planning through and get the public engaged in gathering as a community. There are plans in place for the switch on of the Christmas Lights, and we are seeing other community events being arranged and planned which is great to see after more than 18 months of no public gatherings. It's great to see a buzz around the village again and we are looking forward to 2022 and many of our traditional events being back on the calendar!

Community resilience is another important agenda item for our meetings, we are lucky to have good council support, and as we are coming into the winter months it's important that we're prepared, and people know where to go for help. We are updating the resilience plans which are held by the council, so keep an eye out for any updates on our social media.

We continue to meet online, hopefully in person soon, anyone from the community is welcome to attend and listen to what is discussed. KINTORE HISTORY

300 years ago

In December 1721 a new born baby was found abandoned in Inverurie. In an attempt to discover the mother all the unmarried women in the parish of Kintore had to report to either the schoolhouse in Kintore village, or Fordtown, whichever was more convenient, to have their breasts examined under the supervision of the Kirk Session. It was proved that the baby's mother did not come from Kintore.

150 years ago

In February 1872, houses in Kintore were flooded when the Don burst its banks.

100 years ago

Kintore enjoyed a variety of social events during the winter months. The Kintore Literary Society listened to a lecture on Sir Walter Scott, and had a magazine night. The Kintore Dramatic Club performed "Mill o Tifty's Annie" followed by a dance in the public hall. The church was raising money for the Organ Fund and organised a lecture on Mountaineering in the Pyrenees illustrated by lantern slides. Kintore had a Whist Club and a Women's Guild. The Golf Club also provided social events.

Aberdeenshire Councillor's Report

Back in the summer, I reported on the position regarding the latest planning applications relating to the long-awaited town park. Since that time, the Council has refused both of the significant applications it had to consider. Amongst other things, the developer was seeking permissions to reduce the size of the town park and shift its location further from the town centre, to a peripheral position in the south-west corner of the site.

The councillors on the Garioch Area Committee considered these latest proposals from the developer very carefully. After extensive questioning and debate by councillors, the decision to refuse was unanimous. No councillor thought the proposals were acceptable. The two formal reasons for refusal were the smaller size and more remote position now proposed for the town park, both changes being contrary to planning policies relating to the site.

Unsurprisingly, the developer has lodged appeals against the Council's refusals. This means the applications will now be determined by a reporter from the Scottish Government Planning and Environmental Appeals Division. The Council will be defending its position and seeking to get the refusals upheld.

As I write this, world leaders have gathered in Glasgow for COP26. Some 200 countries are represented at the talks seeking to agree on cuts to greenhouse gas emissions by 2030. This has to be the most important meeting of this year, very probably of this decade. It may agree action to prevent catastrophic climate change. Or it may not.

Aberdeenshire Council agreed last year that it would cut its own greenhouse gas emissions by 75 per cent by 2030 (compared with a 2010/11 baseline). The target relates to the emissions the Council is required to report annually (as carbon dioxide equivalent) to the Scottish Government. It includes emissions arising from the Council's use of fossil fuels (e.g. for vehicles and heating schools and offices), due to electricity use (e.g. for street lights) and other activities the Council does in the course of providing services. A 75 per cent cut by 2030 is also the Scottish emissions target agreed by the Scottish Parliament. So if the Council does what it has said it will do, and the Scottish target is also met, the Council will have made a pro rata contribution to the reduction for Scotland as a whole. In my view, that is the least the Council should do. Otherwise, the

Council is relying on others to achieve a more than 75 per cent cut to make up for its smaller contribution.

While the science is clear about the need to drastically and urgently cut greenhouse gas emissions, the politics are far from straightforward. Emissions reduction on the scale needed will require major changes in areas as diverse as what we eat, energy supply, transport and how land is managed. Promising to cut emissions by some date in the future isn't a political problem, but making the changes required to actually meet those future targets is. Difficult decisions are required now if the reductions needed (and already agreed) are to be delivered in ten or twenty years time. Both the UK and Scottish Governments have committed to bold targets for reducing emissions but neither government has yet made some of the major policy changes that meeting those targets will require.

I am pleased Aberdeenshire Council has committed to a 75 per cent cut in its emissions by 2030. What matters though is that the Council delivers and actually achieves that cut. The Council has been taking action to curtail emissions for years, and in recent years the emissions reported by the Council have indeed been reduced. The approach taken to date though will not deliver a 75 per cent reduction by 2030. At the moment, the Council does not know how it will make the reduction it has promised by the end of this decade, or what that will cost. As its contribution to the global effort, the Council aims to have a fully costed plan by March next year for achieving its own 75 per cent emissions reduction by 2030. The full council meeting last June agreed £100,000 to produce a 'route map to 2030' identifying the different measures to be taken to reduce emissions, the reduction from each and the saving or cost of each abatement measure (£ per tonne carbon dioxide equivalent). That work is underway. So I hope and expect the Council will be able to agree a plan next spring which should enable it to deliver on the commitment it has already given on cutting its emissions. That will be significant progress though of course it will still require eight more years of effort and continuing commitment for a successful outcome.

No Room at the Inn

"And while they were there, the time came for Mary to give birth. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn."

Luke 2:6-7

Dear friends,

A key part in every Christmas Nativity play is that of the inn-keeper, the one who turns away the Holy Family from the inn and relegates them to a makeshift maternity ward in the barn – thereby setting the scene for the classic Nativity picture of the baby born in the manger. The lesson from this story is that, though there was no room at the inn, God came anyway.

There was no room at the inn – at least the inn-keeper was honest enough to say so.

The season of Advent – this crazy busy time leading up to Christmas – is not however a time of waiting for baby Jesus to be born. That already happened 2000 years ago. Advent is when we wait for God, in Christ, to come anew into our world with love and mercy and grace. The trouble is there's no room for him.

Busy-ness crowds him out. Where on earth would we find time for such a divine presence when we are already running to standstill? Our lives are far too full as it is to squeeze in time for deep spiritual reflection. God comes anyway.

The complexity of the modern world crowds him out. It's not just that we are busy, we are also wrestling with a world of staggering complexity where issues of job-security,

pandemic management, climate change, national politics and holding together our mental health while trying to put food on our tables all vie for our attention. God comes anyway.

Our own unpreparedness crowds him out. Maybe the idea that God wants to be a loving, peace-bringing presence in our lives appeals to us. But we feel nowhere near being ready for that yet. So much brokenness, pain, failure and anxiety must be swept away before we could let him into our hearts. For now, he'll have to wait in the barn. God comes anyway.

Writer James Finley recalls attending a Christmas Eve church service as a child. The building was crowded and at the other end of the church a baby started to cry. "Is that the baby Jesus crying?", he asked his mother. "Yes, it is", she replied. "And I believed her," he writes, "and today at 74 years old, I still do believe her." He reflects on the truth that God still comes into our complex world today in ways as simple as a baby's cry. "Christmas is us being awakened to the birthing of God into the simplicity of our hearts and the depths of our lives and the complexity of whatever the day might bring.

We would like to say a big "thank you" to everyone who has supported us in the last few months by offering advice and/or practical help and by just spreading the word and raising awareness. Darker nights, where are you?

Emergency services urges people to make their house numbers visible

With the clocks changing soon, this means darker nights and more challenges for the emergency services.

Can we find your home?

Once a 999 call comes in, it is vital that the emergency services can find your address quickly, day or night. When responding to a 999 call it is really frustrating not being able to find an address.

Emergency crews regularly find house numbers and even road signs obscured by hedges that have overgrown over the summer or paint work that has faded. When dark, it's even more difficult to identify properties.

If your house name or number cannot be seen from the roadside, there will be a delay getting to you. What is needed is for your house number or name to be clearly visible from the road and lit up at night to save those vital seconds which ultimately can make a significant difference to an outcome.

Even better, get someone to wait outside a property, waving their arms to flag us down so that we know exactly where we're going. It may sound simple but it's a welcomed sight and saves valuable time.

In cases of sudden cardiac arrest, minutes can mean the difference between life and death. The likelihood of surviving decreases by 10% with every minute that passes without defibrillation. Thanks to the NHS' Act FAST campaign, it is well known that people who have experienced a stroke have a better chance of full recovery the quicker they receive treatment.

Emergency vehicles are equipped with sat-nav systems to help crews locate properties but if the house number cannot be quickly identified or is not known, responders spend vital time looking for clues on your street including numbers on neighbouring properties and rubbish bins. It is now even possible to update your location on Google Maps.

It is a difficult situation when emergency services are ready to help somebody who might be minutes away from dying but their property number is not clearly visible. Losing vital life-saving minutes can be avoided if these simple few measures are put in place.

You cannot usually plan for an emergency, but you can prepare. All emergency services hope you never need them but just in case, PLEASE help us find you.

Aberdeenshire North Foodbank



Aberdeenshire North Foodbank has continued to be very busy over the last few months. To date, this year, we have provided over 6263 food parcels across North Aberdeenshire, with over 1255 going to families in the Inverurie and surrounding area.

We are still seeing pressures for people due to COVID-19 in terms of self-isolation and illness, as well as the end of the furlough scheme. We are also starting to see some impact from the reversal of the Universal Credit £20 uplift at the start of October. With heating bills due to increase as well as the cost of Christmas, we are anticipating some challenging times ahead for a number of individuals and families in our communities.

We have, however, a new service being provided from our foodbank centre in Inverurie – a Financial Inclusion Service provided through a partnership with Aberdeen Foyer. When someone has received a food parcel, and gives their consent, they will be contacted by a Financial Inclusion Worker to see if there is any additional support that can be provided with regards to making sure they are receiving all the financial support they are entitled to.

We cannot provide the service we do without the generosity of the public so we would just like to take this opportunity again and say a huge thank you to everyone. We have just issued our Reverse Advent Calendar appeal, so please do have a look on our website or social media pages for more information if you are interested in this. We still have collection points at the Co-op & Sainsbury's in Kintore and Kintore Church is kindly still running a collection point for us.

If you would like to donate food, here are some suggestions: - UHT milk / powdered milk, boxes of breakfast cereal, tinned meat (mince and peas, beef stew, chicken curry), tinned potatoes, sponge puddings, litre boxes of long-life fruit juice, jam, small sized coffee, boxes of cereal bars, tinned tomatoes, shower gel, deodorant, kitchen roll, basic cleaning products.
