## What's Happening at Kintore Library

### **KINTORE HISTORY**

### 200 years ago

29 May 1822. The church in Kintore organised a collection for the "distressed Irish."

### 150 years ago

1 May 1872. Thomas Marshall, of no fixed address, assaulted PC Peter Wilson in Kintore. Marshall had been released from prison only two days before assaulting the policeman and may have assaulted him to get back into prison, which at least provided a roof over his head.

### 100 years ago

15 April 1922. A Kintore to Pittodrie 15 mile race was won by Aberdonian Ted Lawson, who completed the course in 1 hour, 30 minutes and ten seconds. The route was Kintore - Blackburn - Tyrebagger - Bucksburn - Woodside - Kittybrewster - Bedford Road - Bedford Place - Orchard Street - King Street - Pittodrie. According to the Aberdeen Journal "Great interest was taken in the race, the villagers of Kintore being out in full force to see the start, many cyclists accompanying the runners."

### 50 years ago

29 March 1972. A 30lb salmon was caught in the Don at Kintore.

## Should I insure my pet?

In my consultations I often ask my clients if they have their pets insured. I get a wide spectrum of responses, from the proactive owners who have done all the research and chosen the best available policy, to the owners that are not sure why to even bother setting up yet another direct debit from their bank account, to the final category (I find this is the biggest category) where people have just plain given up after doing a quick internet search for "Pet Insurance" and being completely baffled by the sheer weight of information that hit their desktop, then understandably given up all hope! So in this article I intend to cut through the minefield and straight to the why's and wherefore's of pet insurance.

Firstly, what is pet insurance? When we vets talk about pet insurance, we usually mean medical insurance. This is like private healthcare insurance for people. It is a policy that means should your pet ever get ill, (subject to various terms and conditions and exclusions that may apply to any given policy) the insurance company will pick up the bill for tests and treatment for this illness. Be aware that there is always an excess to pay (like with your car policy).

Should I insure my pet? Yes is the short answer! 1 in 3 pets need urgent veterinary treatment each year. The average dog costs their owner in the region of £240 per year in vets' fees. As I'm sure many people know all too well, many dogs are unlucky and cost a lot more than that if specialist treatments are involved! There is of course no such thing as the NHS for pets, leaving you owners entirely responsible for meeting the costs of these medical bills. As medicine advances, there are more and more modern treatments available for our pets, including anti cancer

therapies, even MRI scans for pets! Modern treatments can often cost thousands of pounds, so consider insurance to be budgeting monthly for your pets' treatment, rather than being faced with a large unexpected bill all of a sudden.

Should I just pick the cheapest policy on a market comparison website? The short answer is no! If you go down this route you are very likely to be caught out by some clever small print which allows the insurance company not to pay for your pets' treatment. You must read the small print and be aware of what you are buying.

Unfortunately, as we are not insurance advisers we are not legally able to recommend an insurance company to you. Please avoid just buying the cheapest one from a price comparison website, we see this approach go wrong too many times, although I accept that it must be very tempting! Also bear in mind if you move from your current insurance to a newer one then usually they will not cover pre-existing medical conditions – sometimes if your dog has been in for a simple short-term sign like vomiting anything related to this even years down the line will not be covered by the new company.

I hope that goes someway to cutting through the minefield of pet insurance for you, of course your vet will be happy to advise as much as we legally can if you have any more detailed questions.

## Twenty-three years is a long time in politics

This will be my last contribution to Kintore Konnect as one of the local councillors representing Kintore. After twenty-three years on Aberdeenshire Council, I will be retiring at the election in May.

Between 1999 and 2007, I represented Newmachar & Fintray ward as the sole councillor for that ward. With the new, larger, multi-member wards brought in with proportional representation in 2007, I became one of the East Garioch councillors that represented Kintore. At various times, I have served on most of the Council's different policy committees. Since 2009 though, I have been on the education committee with just one short gap.

It is both very challenging and an immense privilege to serve as a local councillor. I have been involved in many difficult decisions as well as having to address the unrelenting financial pressures placed upon the Council. I remain convinced that fundamental reform is needed of the funding arrangements for local government. I am alarmed that elected local government in Scotland has lost powers and autonomy in recent years to increased and centralising interventions from the Scottish Government. But I am delighted that Aberdeenshire Council has been able to deliver or facilitate some significant local improvements — most obviously a new building for Kintore School, the new Midmill School, a major upgrade of Kemnay Academy and Kintore railway station. Providing

support for volunteers to get The Bothie built on the former library site was, for me, another highlight of my time as a councillor.

I was 39 when I was first elected to Aberdeenshire Council. I am 62 now. My wife, Gina, retired last year. It's time to stop. I will though miss the Council terribly, but 23 years is long enough in any role. I actually do want to spend more time with my family.

I would like to thank residents for their support and all those I have worked with for the good of the area. I would not have wanted to miss being councillor for East Garioch for anything.

### **HOMEOWNERS - IMPORTANT NOTICE**

In February 2019 the Legislation relating to smoke detection in your home changed. All domestic properties in Kintore could be affected.

You need to have the following: -

- One smoke alarm installed in the room most frequently used for general daytime living purposes.
- One smoke alarm in every circulation space on each storey, such as hallway and landing.
- One heat alarm installed in every kitchen.
- All fire alarms are to be ceiling mounted and must be interlinked.
- Carbon monoxide detectors are to be fitted where there are carbon fuelled appliances (such as boilers, fires, open fires, heaters, stoves or a flue).

The Regulations come into effect in February 2022.

## **Aberdeenshire Councillor's Report**

### Scotrail/Kintore Station - Traffic Island

A few months ago, it was brought to my attention that the pedestrian crossing traffic island at the station is a hazard in its current condition. There is nothing drawing people's attention to it such as keep left signs/bollards as there would be on public roads.

A constituent crashed into the island, at night when there is less visibility, causing significant damage to the vehicle, and there have been other such instances. I have liaised with officers and then Scotrail and despite being initially rebuffed, I have now managed to get the Property Manager from Scotrail to attend.

There is a real safety issue here, the solution is very inexpensive and I hope that common sense prevails and Scotrail puts bollards in place.

## **Seagull Nuisance - Kintore Primary School and Surrounding Area**

In late September last year, numerous constituents contacted myself to raise the issue of an increase in the seagull population and the nuisance they were causing to the locality.

I raised this with council officers and discovered that Kintore Primary School was not on their list of buildings for pest control. I rectified this and in October pest control contractors attended the school to fly birds of prey as a deterrent. They also began looking to develop a programme for bird control at the site going forward.

A programme of hawk flying twice per week throughout the breeding season will begin in March (start of breeding season) and will be supplemented by a nest and egg removal programme where required (subject to licence being granted).

The contractor will be monitoring activity onsite during their twice weekly visits and feeding back if adjustments are recommended. This programme will begin in March and continue through the breeding season.

I hope that this will give some peace of mind to those who have been affected in the recent past.

### **Kintore Knackery**

For quite some time I have been in receipt of complaints from many residents concerning foul odour emissions from the LEO Group plant outside of Kintore which is in its commissioning phase.

I have been in constant supportive dialogue with residents and SEPA, who are the regulator, and I have been pushing for a date for the end of the commissioning phase so that finally it can be determined whether or not the plant can comply with regulations and residents will no longer have an endless situation where there are odour leaks impacting their lives.

SEPA have written to the LEO Group asking for a report on their commissioning activities at the Kintore rendering

site and requesting that they submit a plan setting out what steps they intend taking to prepare a full improvement plan for submission to SEPA in March 2022.

They will review the information they submit in relation to site commissioning and proposed odour reduction measures and take appropriate action.

They have also started a series of pro-active odour investigations in the vicinity of the site which will last for around two months to build a picture of odour impact and inform their strategy for addressing the odour issues being reported to us by the local community.

I believe that foul emissions cannot continue to affect residents lives so frequently. If you are affected by this, it is important that you report it to SEPA as action cannot be taken unless they are informed.

### Midmill School Astro Pitch – Sunday Opening!

Finally, after four years of trying, Midmill School astro pitch is now open for limited bookings on a Sunday. I had managed to get it open Monday to Saturday relatively quickly, but this is the final piece in the jigsaw for that facility and the kids of Kintore and the surrounding area.

### **Town Park - Gym Equipment**

There was a large public request online for some outdoor gym equipment located in Kintore, as there is in other settlements in Aberdeenshire. I went to council officers and there currently is no budget.

However, given the apparent lack of community support for the overall recreational proposals at the proposed Town Park, I have asked officers whether this could be partially addressed by including this equipment there to address this deficiency and enhance the overall provision. I am still waiting to see if this would be possible.

### **Happy to Chat Benches**

As some of you may know, I have been working with Rachel Lewis, from the Bothie, on these benches. I am pleased to say that all six (four for Kintore and two for Blackburn) have been built by the Westhill Mens Shed and are about to be collected by the Council.

These are brightly coloured benches, located through our towns, where people can sit and converse with others, hopefully helping to tackle social isolation and some mental health issues.

"Company" – a beautiful word that has lost some of its sparkle through its long association with businesses, corporations, plc's – companies. The word derives from the Latin com- "with" and panis "bread", literally to eat bread with one another, as companions.

When Jesus was establishing his new fellowship of followers, calling them to be a community of reconciliation within a world of division and divisiveness, he knew that they would need more than a common creed to bind them together. So he instituted a community meal – for them to share bread together regularly – because he understood the tight bonds that can be forged around a table, transcending the language, gender, nationality or social status of the diners. The over-ritualising and overformalising of the feast of Holy Communion by 2000 years of Christian religion cannot hide the fact that at its roots the Christian community was always intended to be a place where all could find companionship.

Loneliness and isolation have been a long time coming in Western society. Philosophical, social and economic forces have gradually chipped away at both the need for and the desirability of community since the Industrial Revolution and the mass migration from close-knit villages to the anonymity of vast cities. Yet until quite recently it has still been necessary to teach our children how to "behave in

company", a skill they would need in education, business and life. Covid changed all that.

For the first time in history we now have both the technology and the social acceptability to each remain in our own hermetic bubbles. Sure, we all initially rushed to meet up with friends and colleagues again after being apart for so long during lock-down but once the dust settles a bit we'll probably find that online meetings, shopping, working and socializing are not just less hassle, but also cheaper, less time-consuming and more eco-friendly than trekking across the country to meet in person.

Company (bread-sharing) is becoming less and less a necessary part of life. It is becoming a choice we have to make.

So let me appeal to you: In a world that is increasingly polarized and polarizing, choose company!

Whether for a coffee at one of our excellent local café's or a pint at the pub; whether over an ice-cream or a scone; whether it's teas after a church service or a sit-down dinner at home; choose company. You may not be ready to mix with lots of folks yet and that's ok, but maybe you could commit to meeting with one lonely neighbour once a week or once a month.

## Kintore & District Community Council

So much has happened since the last issue it's hard to know where to start, storms and power cuts have been the major events, along with changing restrictions due to the pandemic. This has led to a busy few months for the Community Council team.

### **Planning**

It's been quiet on the planning front, which is typical over the festive period anyway, with the ongoing monitoring of the Town Park applications being a key focus. We've also had great interaction with Whirlwind Renewables, they will be proposing a battery storage facility just beside the Broomhill Roundabout. This looks to be an interesting proposal and will bring a lot of benefit to Kintore, so keep an eye out on the Kintore Facebook page for any updates.

#### Storms

Storms have had a major impact on our community, with Storm Arwen at the end of November, we saw power cuts hit the whole of the Northeast badly. Most of Kintore at the time were lucky to maintain power, but the south and outlying areas were out 2 – 5 days for some people. Resilience became a topic of discussion, it's always hard to plan for all eventualities, and we are fortunate to have a community that rallied around each other and made sure there was support. From the local businesses who offered support, hot food and drinks, to the Church providing a place of refuge to anyone who needed it. Then into January we had further storms, Malik and Corrie, causing further damage and power cuts, this time limited numbers but still had people without for a few days.

The damage caused by all of the storms has been significant, large parts of our local forests and popular walks have been destroyed and it will take the land-owners some time to get on top of this. Signs have been put up, so we encourage people to be safe and allow time for the clean up to be carried out.

### **Resilience Planning**

With regards to ongoing resilience, there are details on the Kintore website, but increasing the community resilience has been a topic of discussion at the last two meetings. You will notice on the next page of this issue there is a form, a call for volunteers, which you can email in to us - info@kintorecommunitycouncil.co.uk - and we

can then hold on record anyone who would be capable and willing to assist in any times of community emergency. There is support available for resilience, either from the Council or providers such as SSEN who are currently in consultation regarding how they can support communities. Plans that the community council have discussed are to get the available support communicated easier to people who don't access the internet regularly. As most people will know, we have a stock of sand bags at the Public Hall, in addition the Hall also has a backup generator for when power is down. The Public Hall is the officially designated Rest Centre for Kintore. In the event of there being no means of telephone or mobile communication (as happened) there will be someone at the Hall every 2 hours on the hour, at 9am 11am, 1pm etc to assist anyone who calls there for help.

### **Local Resilience Number**

Another idea that we are going to trial, is a local resilience number. This can be used to get in contact with a coordinator during a community event, for example, anyone needing community support during an event, whether that is flooding, storm damage or power cuts. Other events are covered within the resilience plan on the website. The number is **01467 464344**. Note that this is *not* for emergencies, it's to ask for assistance locally from our team of volunteers.

#### **New Members**

As a community council, we are currently looking for new members, so if you are interested in getting involved, please get in touch via the website or Facebook page. We continue to meet online, hopefully in person soon, anyone from the community is welcome to attend and listen to what is discussed. As part of the Garioch Area, the community council have support from Aberdeenshire Council, with our local councillors attending meetings to give advice and support. Our meetings are the 3rd Tuesday of each month, at 7pm. Email info@kintorecommunitycouncil.co.uk with any questions.

## Have your say on Inverurie taking over part of Kintore

Inverurie Community Council has submitted a proposal to Aberdeenshire Council to take Thainstone and Crichie (the area shaded red on the map) away from Kintore.

Currently, the Kintore District extends to 37 sq km. The River Don has been the northern boundary between our two towns for more than 300 years. (The only change, relatively recently, was moving Port Elphinstone from Kintore into Inverurie.)

As one of Aberdeenshire's ten largest towns, Kintore is often treated as though it is a suburb of Inverurie, rather than as a substantial town in our own right. Taking Thainstone and Crichie from us would surely only serve to diminish Kintore's status?

It would also lose us half of our business parks and take away the major agricultural centre of Thainstone Mart, along with the Thainstone House Hotel. This would impact on the Kintore economy and reduce employment opportunities in our town.

The second part of the consultation asks whether you believe Balbithan (the area shaded blue on the map) should be brought into Kintore District.



## Stylish parties that don't cost the Earth!

Now more than ever, life is busy and stressful, so worrying about the environment and the future of the planet can feel more than a little overwhelming.

Start with little changes. Parties produce a huge amount of waste but making the switch to reusables isn't that difficult.

### 1) Switch to paperless invitations

Digital invitations are a fab eco-friendly option. A simple text message or email is enough to give date, time, venue and any instructions. There are various design apps available if you want to get more creative. Or if you're pushed for time, there's a host of stunning templates by creatives on Etsy, ready for easy editing.

### 2) Ditch the throwaway decorations

Decorations can really make a party feel extra special and set the theme! How can you achieve that in an eco-friendly way? As a rule, avoid foil, plastic, latex, glossy or coated paper and anything with mixed materials as these cannot be recycled. And yes, that does include balloons. In place of disposable decorations, you could try fabric or paper bunting, streamers and pinwheels. Get creative with your child and make a centrepiece. You could even use items like toys or teddies that you have at home as themed props.

### 3) Choose reusable over disposable tableware

I think we're all aware these days that one-use plastic is a no-go, but in fact paper plates aren't much better. Recyclable plates can't be recycled if they are covered in food (go figure!) and lots of paper cups are laminated to stop leakage, again rendering them unsuitable for recycling.

For the most environmentally friendly approach to parties, the key is the simple switch from disposable to reusable. Whether that's using crockery you already have, borrowing a mish-mash from friends and family to make up numbers or hiring in for the event.

### 4) Cater to your numbers

Keep it simple, cater to your numbers and you'll easily avoid too much waste. If you have 10 children, one sandwich each is enough. Don't offer 5 varieties of crisps

or order a cake that feeds 50 if you don't need to. Avoid individual drinks and just make a big jug of squash. Present foods in creative ways to make them more interesting to kids; try using cookie cutters to shape fruit or sandwiches.

### 5) Pick your party games wisely

There are plenty of traditional games that don't need props and therefore avoid waste. Cut up an old duvet cover or draw on brown paper to wrap Pass the Parcel layers, rather than glittery gift wrap that can't be recycled. Use garden games you already have or create a scavenger hunt to keep the kids busy.

### 6) Banish party bag tat

There isn't a parent in the land that doesn't loath party bag tat, the stuff that hangs around the house before going in the bin and, ultimately, landfill.

Ditch the cheap plastic bits and opt for something useful and keepable. Books or games, hair ties, pencils and notebooks, duck feed, popcorn kernels are all lovely alternatives.

So, there you have it – six steps to achieving a low-waste children's party that is fun-filled, super-stylish and low-stress. Happy Partying!!
