

KINTORE COUNCILLOR REPORT - Glen Reid

Midmill Pitch/Pleasure Park (additional pitch?)

After months of trying to get a meeting with senior Landscape Services officers, Kintore United and myself, I'm glad to say that it finally happened this morning and was very positive.

An additional pitch shall be created in the centre of the park (over the area of the old cricket strip) and adjacent to the pitch used by Kintore Amateurs, which will involve 200 tonnes of new soil. These substantial works will begin around July, with the pitch being usable in 12 to18 months time dependent on weather.

This will require community support as the newly landscaped area will require to be not used and therefore members of the public will need to stay off it. This was initially going to be an additional pitch, but with the forthcoming loss of the Midmill pitches, due to SEPA enforcement action, it will effectively become a replacement pitch.

With some many extra teams now playing football, there is extra pressure on the existing resources of the council owned pitches and in the meeting I asked that officers proactively look to bring some pitches/grass areas, that are not in current use, back into use to meet this demand.

The new pitch will obviously not be available for some time so the other reason for the meeting was to identify solutions going forward for Kintore United's many teams to play their matches for the next season and a half. Quite a few possible pitches have been identified and both the club and officers are now working on these potential solutions in time for the end of June when they must vacate their current Midmill facility.

Northern Road - Lochburn Flood Prevention Scheme

Things are progressing with Network Rail and their design contractor, but I am slightly concerned that they are taking longer than they initially stated to complete their tasks. With this in mind, I met with Richard Thomson MP and his team in April, expressing my concerns, and gave them the full low down on exactly what has and hasn't been happening.

They agree with the concerns and have written to the Managing Director of Network Rail saying that this isn't good enough and that he wants a quick response and commitment to speeding the works up.

Kintore and Kinellar Schools Signalised Pedestrian Crossing Assessments Requested

As you may recall, in light of the decision by the Conservative, Lib Dem and Independent coalition that run Aberdeenshire Council to remove all school crossing patrollers, I wrote to the Director of Infrastructure Services in March and asked that there be an urgent review of our current crossings, which have patrollers, to see whether they need to be upgraded to signalised crossings.

I requested that Road Safety Officers carry out a full safety review of all these crossings and assess whether they will be safe for the start of the next academic year or whether there may be some that require to be signalised. Concerned parents need this reassurance. Through a couple of conversations, and despite my protests, the following has been confirmed by the Director:

"That there is simply not enough funding to resource all the crossings, currently with patrollers, being assessed before the new academic year start."

Education officers are instead leading on community based solutions before any requests for surveys are considered. That to assess all the school crossing patroller sites to determine if they qualify for a formal pedestrian crossing in line with the policy, with current staffing and funding, would take many years.

That being 'realistic', without additional revenue and capital funding, any sites assessed in Spring this year are unlikely to be constructed until summer 2025." I made it clear that, in my opinion, the budget saving should never have been taken and certainly not without the resources being put in place to assess the safety of the crossing points that our children use to get to school.

I have asked that crossing assessments happen asap for both Kintore School and Kinellar School who will both sadly lose their crossing patrollers at the end of this term.

Kemnay Academy Mock Interviews

Along with others, I recently spent a morning carrying out mock interviews to help our S5s gain some valuable experience to carry forward into future 'real' interviews. I just wanted to say how impressed again I've been with these young members of our communities. They are thoughtful, caring, intelligent, insightful, passionate and hard working.

Listening to their hopes, dreams, interests and aspirations has been a privilege and we, as a community, are fortunate to have them amongst us. In times when you hear so many negative comments about young people, I just want to share something positive about these youths who are a credit to themselves, their families, their school and will be great assets for our community.

Pedestrian Count/Traffic Speed Analysis - Hallforest Avenue

In late August last year, a constituent raised concerns about the number of children crossing Hallforest Avenue and the cars travelling at speed along it. She felt that it warranted a zebra crossing. I wrote to the Head of Roads in Garioch in August and requested that this be investigated, and although I have had to chase it up, I have just received the following response:

"Thank you for your correspondence highlighting concerns regarding the volume of traffic on Hallforest Avenue.

Firstly, please accept my apologies for the delay in responding to you on this matter.

To establish whether this location meets the criteria for a formal pedestrian crossing, we shall require to carry out both a vehicle speed survey and a pedestrian count. We can therefore advise that Hallforest Ave has been added to the list of pedestrian/vehicle counts but unfortunately at this stage we cannot give a date when this will be carried out."

I will progress this with officers and try to get the speed survey and pedestrian count carried out as quickly as possible.

Kintore Primary School is very fortunate to have a very supportive and hardworking Dyslexia Awareness Pupil Group and also a Dyslexia Awareness Parent Group. Our goal is to improve education for all pupils who are dyslexic or who have literacy challenges. To date there have been several collaborative activities with the most successful being assemblies, partly led by parents as part of Dyslexia Awareness Week activities.

After the work done last year to refurbish the benches at the Town House we also refurbished the benches outside the Church which was a great improvement but reflected the fact that the lovely granite walls behind them needed some TLC.



When this was highlighted Andrew Bruce from North East Roof & Exterior Cleaning contacted us and went ahead and cleaned both walls properly and professionally completely FREE of charge which was a very generous gesture and much appreciated, thank you again.

On the subject of benches, having seen the work we had been doing we were contacted by the Parents Group from Kintore Primary School to see if we could refurbish the bench in the school garden. Unfortunately, it was beyond repair, but we sourced a

new large bench which seats seven little people and have donated it to the school garden project. The Eco group of children are busily preparing designs for the new school garden, sure there will lots of exciting ideas from them.

As previously mentioned, we have signed up to the 'It's Your Neighbourhood' project a part of Keep Scotland Beautiful. We already have a very dedicated Floral Display team led by Sue Parrott who maintain the planters around the town. Businesses and individuals have very generously donated money to keep this very worthwhile project progressing, thank you everyone it is much appreciated.



We have selected six areas for improvement in Kintore which will be our main focus for this project. This includes tidying, weeding, washing, planting and maintaining.

There are various initiatives under this including litter picking, weeding and generally helping keep the town clean and tidy. We are very grateful to Gary Coutts from Jim Reid Vehicle Sales who has been around the town centre weedkilling this week and also helping Sue clear and plant the area around the entrance to Nicol Road, we received 120 perennial plants from Greenspace which are currently being planted.

At Table

"Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it, and said, "This is my body, which is for you." - 1 Corinthians 11

The central act of Christian worship is the Eucharist (Lord's Supper / Mass / Holy Communion). In most traditions it involves eating a small piece of bread and drinking a tiny sip of wine, accompanied by lengthy formal prayers. The formality and pageantry of the rite can easily obscure the fact that it all began as a series of convivial meals Jesus shared with his friends – sometimes pensive, sometimes loud, often intimate. Jesus loved a good meal. The fact that he shared them with people of all stations, sometimes eating in the homes of tax-collectors and sinners, drew sharp criticism from the religious elite. But he did it anyway, placing fellowship meals at the center of a new kind of faith-life and instructing his followers to continue the habit.

It might seem odd as a religious practice. Sacrifice, fasting, prayer, contemplation and singing seem more like the sort of things religious people do rather than sitting down to eat. But (understatement alert!) Jesus knew what he was doing. While a religious altar is a place for penitence, for offering sacrifices – sometimes in thanksgiving, sometimes for atonement – but always with sobriety, solemnity, and awe at being in the presence of that which is holy; a table is a place for champagne corks and party hats, for toasts and speeches, for telling jokes and sharing stories, for making the guest feel welcome. It can be a very sad place, especially when there is an empty seat, but it is always a place for intimate family moments and it is very difficult to sit through a meal with someone who is not a friend.

On Sundays, in our church buildings, we celebrate the sacrament of Holy Communion, but often the real communion happens at our Thursday Drop-Ins at Kintore church halls (10am – 2pm), at our Hope Café in Echt Church on Tuesday mornings (9am-11am) and at our Loaves & Fishes Café at the Kemnay Church Centre (Tuesdays-Fridays, 10am-1:30pm). I think Jesus would like such gatherings.

KINTORE'S UNSUNG HERO

Meet Sue Parrott

Team Lead for Kintore Floral Group



Do you originally come from Kintore ?

No, I was born in Spalding , Lincolnshire which ironically is famous for it's Tulips and Flower Parade. Maybe this is where the seed was planted for my love of plants and flowers.

Can you give our readers a wee bit of background of your education, career and family?

Despite moving to Northamptonshire due to my dad's job at the age of 7, we ended back in Spalding when I was about 12 years old but was very grateful that I managed to stay at the school I had started my education in along with my friends but now as a boarder. Friends who I still meet up with 50 years later.

I then went on to Liverpool Teacher Training and after qualifying taught for only a year knowing that it wasn't really for me. Married in 1980 and moved along with my first husband to many parts of the world dominated by the oil industry. Staying in Oman, Qatar and even Holland twice I worked in various roles in these countries at the same time as bringing up our daughter Carole (of Taylor Made Refills and Sustainable Roots in Kintore).

In 1989 we moved back to the UK but this time to Torphins where I worked as a dressmaker. However, it was my time spent at Banchory Surgery for 16 years at the front of house and leaving as Assistant Manager that has the fondest memories. In 2012, I met Martin who would go onto become my husband in 2014 and we chose Inverurie as our home, securing a job following a chance meeting with Yvonne Moir Property Letting in Kemnay only leaving after the business was bought over by a larger company.

In January 2022 Martin and I moved to Clovenstone which gives us the best of both worlds, close enough to town but still in the countryside.

Have you always been involved in the Kintore Community?

It wasn't until my son in law saw a Facebook post looking for someone to take over the Kintore Floral Group after founder Ainslie Reid had announced he was to stand down. I thought I could probably do that and following a couple of meetings with Ainslie I received his approval and he handed over his baby for safe keeping so to speak.

Can you tell me a bit more about what you do in the Kintore Floral Group?

This is my third Summer as Team Lead and I absolutely love it and feel as if I'm learning every year. We have an amazing team of Volunteers who help with the planting throughout the year and another brilliant group who carry out the watering of the tubs, tiered planters and hanging baskets which seems at times like the proverbial Forth Road Bridge, never ending whatever the weather.

Our year really starts in October, because that's when I place the order for circa 1500 Summer Flowers from Aberdeenshire Council. During the winter we still have winter plants to set to keep the colour in the streets of Kintore.

Weeds don't stop growing so it's a constant job regardless of the time of year.

Late May/early June is the busiest time getting the baskets prepared and all the other areas topped up and fertilized ready for summer planting. Swailend Nursery and

the Council can't give definite dates for deliveries too early so we have to be ready to act quickly when they arrive. We rely on local business Aquaterra to assist with popping up the hanging baskets once planted and to Jim Reid Vehicle Sales & Service for providing a towing vehicle for the watering bowser and for providing a storage area for it and the baskets over winter. Between June and September it's all hands on deck as this is the important time to keep the flowers suitably hydrated and fed to give the best possible show for as long as possible. In late September the baskets are removed, emptied, cleaned and stored and the tubs and planters emptied then refilled with pansies etc. to ensure colour in Winter.

It really is a well-oiled machine, however I cannot possibly do this without the support of all the fantastic volunteers and local businesses that help. It's a great advert for Community spirit. We are always looking for volunteers regardless of experience or green fingers, there is always work to be done.

It doesn't sound like you get a lot of spare time but when you do how do you like to spend it?

We love travelling and exploring with our ideal holiday being finding something completely new to us. A road trip is our favourite but sometimes 10 days in the sun with a pile of books hits the spot too! My favourite place is Australia with the highlight being climbing the Sydney Harbour Bridge the week of my 60th birthday, followed by Utah, Arizona, South Africa and New Zealand.

Golf and curling were my two favourite sports to play but following operations on both hands I found it impossible to play to the standard I would like. More important things took their place mainly our family with 3 grandsons Will (11), Alex (9) and Theo (18 months). We spend a lot of time in our garden and the boys help and play football, climb trees and generally enjoy being outside.

I am also completely hooked on jigsaws which keeps me occupied while the football is on TV!

Describe your ideal weekend.

My ideal weekend would start with walking



DONVIEW VETERINARY - Doggy Breath

We often joke, as our pet jumps up on our lap to give us a big lick on the nose, about how terrible his or her breath is. It's not just dogs either, plenty cats (I'm sure we all know one) have breath that would wilt a daffodil! Bad breath however is a symptom which should be taken seriously. It is an early warning sign of a much more serious problem lurking below the surface.

Each time we eat (and the same goes for our canine and feline companions), we get food residue on our teeth. Wet foods in general are worse for causing food residue than dry ones are, but there are plenty dogs and cats fed only dry food with severe dental disease out there. Some dry foods are better than others as well. Certain manufacturers invest heavily in research to make sure that their kibbles will clean teeth at the same time as crunching. You would be well advised to seek advice from your vet on this before choosing a new brand of food.

This food residue is a fantastic food source for bacteria from our mouth, which do what bacteria do best and breed on our gums. This is why our dentists insist that we brush our teeth at least twice per day – to scrub off this sticky film of bacteria and food residue. Unfortunately, most pets do not brush their teeth even once daily, which facilitates progression to the next stage of dental disease.

The sticky film is called 'Plaque'. Over months, minerals in saliva also stick to this plaque layer and start to crystallise. They form a hard substance called 'Tartar' which sticks like rock to the teeth. It is generally yellow to brown in colour and contains live bacteria. If you look at your pets teeth and they are not pearly white, then there may be a problem. Over many more months the bacteria start to infect the gums (called 'Gingivitis') which is what causes halitosis (our doggy breath problem). Once we reach this stage we are almost critical and in many cases the only way to cure the problem is with a general anesthetic and a thorough scaling and polishing of the teeth.

If we don't intervene at this stage, the next step is infection of the tooth roots leading to (potentially) abscesses and tooth ache. Bacteria can even enter the blood stream and colonise the heart valves leading to a heart murmur, or the kidneys leading to a kidney infection. See what I mean about alarming consequences from Doggy Breath?

Dental disease is much better prevented, so I would encourage you all to ask for a check up with your vet or practice nurse to assess your dog or cats teeth. We will also gladly demonstrate the correct tooth brushing procedure. It's not quite the same as with humans, and we must use the correct dog or cat toothpaste, so please do ask for help before embarking upon a daily brushing regime. For those of you who just cant see how your pet will tolerate brushing: never fear there is help at hand. There are a variety of food additives, natural products and pastes that have some effect and avoid the need to brush, but tooth brushing really is the best way to prevent dental disease.

Good luck everyone and please remember to ask your vet to look at your pets teeth for you.

The Bailies of Bennachie

As spring arrives, the Bailies of Bennachie Trustees are reviewing what can be done on Bennachie while the good weather is with us. All the members are called Bailies, and membership is for



life. The logo was changed last year during the 50 th Anniversary of the Bailies of Bennachie to **"A Voice for the Hill"**, and there are several areas where local folks can lend a hand to our iconic hill if only Bennachie could speak.

"I want someone to help the people who visit me" leads us to volunteering to improve the facilities that are on the hill. Work Parties are conducted by the Bailies every first Saturday from March to December. Paths can be improved by clearing encroaching vegetation and clearing water bars. Other scope of work includes maintaining the Colony sites and the Foraging Woodland areas. Volunteering with the Work Parties is a real team effort and there are fabulous folks from all walks of life who really enjoy the camaraderie and the giving back that this gives them.

Additionally, under this heading, the Bailies of Bennachie have upgraded and installed new marker posts for the **Colony Trail**, so do have a look at that if you are on the hill. You can pick the new leaflet up from the Bennachie Visitor Centre (AB51 5HY) where the trail starts.

"I want someone to tell my story" sees the Bailies find out about the archaeology of Bennachie, in tandem with the University of Aberdeen. For some years now, there have been successful **Archaeology Digs** by the Pittodrie areas of Bennachie, leading to some exciting and historically significant finds. Last year's star finds at Pittodrie were two medieval grain drying kilns. Using OSL (Optically Stimulated Luminescence) analysis we have identified one kiln dates c1600, the other predates that!

This year we are planning on excavating a 'Longhouse' that was discovered just off the Turnpike trail. However, this area is still covered by windblown trees from the devastation of Storm Arwen. Plans are afoot to clear the area this year, however, if this is not done in time for the summer, we shall return to the site on the Pittodrie Estate that we have been excavating over the last few years.

We are always on the lookout for new volunteers for our summer dig through July and August. This is a great opportunity to learn some new skills and see what is involved in the excavation process. Be warned...archaeology can be addictive, you never know what the next scrape of your trowel might uncover! All the tools you need will be provided and no experience is necessary. See Tbe Big Summer Dig sign-up QR code.



"I want someone to protect me, my landscape and the animals that live on me" leads us to the Wildlife Group. By the time you read this, we will already have had several "Walks and Talks" and more are planned through the year. Work has also started on creating some more wildlife-friendly areas and planting on the hill. These too will likely need volunteers in due course.

Every visitor who reaches the top of Mither Tap can't help but touch and see the Indicator, which was commissioned by the Bailies 50 years ago, in 1974. We would like to commemorate this milestone later this year but are still without names for some of the 3 rd year pupils from Inverurie Academy led by the late Ernie Hutton who installed the Indicator after it was created

by the 5 th year pupils in their metal work class. If you recognise yourself or someone else from the attached picture, please email info@bailiesofbennachie.co.uk to let us start tracking everyone down.



Our wish list for the current month is always to be found on our website (https://aberdeenshirenorth.foodbank.org.uk) or on our Facebook page and is usually displayed on our local collection points in supermarkets both in Kintore and Inverurie. The wish list reflects food items that we are particularly short of that month and can change quite quickly. Some items are always in short supply – we never seem to have enough UHT milk or long-life fruit juice! On the other hand, our stocks of tinned soup, tinned beans and packets of pasta are usually quite good. We can prove that many of you do look at our lists of shortages before you go shopping because, as each month passes, we see highlighted items coming in as donations in greater quantity and for that we are truly grateful.

We often tell you that we cannot continue to provide the help for households living in food poverty without your ongoing support and that is so true. Whether you donate items of food or make donations of money (details provided on our website), your good will and generosity is what keeps us going. In the first three months of this year, our food bank in Inverurie supplied 177 households with food parcels, feeding 239 adults and 126 children. In the same period, across our whole Aberdeenshire network of 5 food banks (Inverurie, Ellon, Huntly, Peterhead and Fraserburgh), we provided a total of 1124 food parcels, providing for 1572 adults and 462 children. In April, while we took in stock amounting to 4435 kg of food, we distributed 6827 kg in food parcels. We really do depend on your donations.

We volunteers are just so grateful that we are surrounded by communities who truly care about their neighbours and are willing to help in whatever way they can. We long for the day when the existence of Food Banks is no longer necessary but, until that happens, we can just say a heartfelt 'thank you' to you all for your support.
