3rd Kintore Brownies managed to make some pancakes for Shrove Tuesday using a metal can and a tealight. It actually worked




The Rainbows and Brownie Units decorated Easter Bonnets so enjoyed cutting sticking and gluing for the evening.

# 'Fit Like'- Kintore? - The CLAN Book Bench Trail

Towards the end of June Kintore will welcome it's first ever Wild in Art Sculpture and become part of the famous CLAN Book Bench Trail. This fantastic initiative raises funds for the CLAN Cancer Support charity in Aberdeen and as the Hare Hop Trail before it has become a brilliant way of getting people out and about and visiting sites and towns they wouldn't normally see so they can 'tick' another one of the 41 full size Book Benches off the Trail.

The Book Bench Kintore will be at home on site for a period of 8 weeks between the 30th of June and 30th of August. It is titled 'FIT LIKE' and has been beautifully painted by local Torphins based artist Michelle Mann. The theme is agriculture and because the big reveal isn't until the end of June, we are unable to show you picture of the finished artwork instead Michelle has shared a few 'teaser' pics for us.

Make sure you get yourself along and take a selfie or a group photo sat on the Book Bench with our iconic Town House in the background. Michelle recently visited Kintore Square to find out exactly where the Book Bench will be homed and when she was here, we managed to do a quick interview with her.

#### Can you give a brief back story about you please?


I was born and brought up in Aberdeen and always loved the outdoors and being creative. After struggling to decide what I wanted to do when I left school I started with a construction company as a trainee design technician and had a great 8 years in the industry working my way up to a project and estimating manager role. However, my passion always lay in something more creative, and less desk based so when I met my partner and we started a family I finally gave my artwork more time, this also allowed me to provide more support on the farm my partner manages. I am always busy and rarely sit still for long, but I love being able to be around for my 2 sons as well as juggling farm artwork and the farm.

#### Can you tell me a bit about your journey as an artist?

I always loved being creative, photography, drawing, painting and making (sometimes just a mess but that's all part of the process!) and it was a big part of me throughout childhood and school years, but when I came to leave school that's where I got a bit stuck, and so my art just became a hobby and helped me unwind outside of work. When I met my partner and became involved in agriculture my passion for art really grew and my desire to be creative started to become really important to me. I set up my small business over 10 years ago as a photographer and artist and I've never looked back! I am self taught and very much inspired by agriculture, rural life and wildlife, with my favourite mediums being pastel and watercolour but I will give most things a go including designing a mosaic and painting sculptures! I have been lucky to work on some great commissions, met lots of amazing people and animals and occasionally see my work in some amazing places.

# Can you let us know what your motivation was to get involved with the Book Bench and a story behind the design and the use of Doric?

I have always loved the Clan Art trails, they support such an amazing cause as well as creating joy and being accessible to all. I plucked up the courage to submit a design after a previous success with an agricultural art trail with another organisation a few years ago. The Book Bench design really appealed to me and the story of agriculture seemed fitting, both to my work style and life but also to Aberdeenshire where we have a very rich farming history. I wanted to show the farming calendar and history as well as highlighting the things that never change, the need to sit down, take stock and have a chat. Farming is a busy, demanding industry that is very much a way of life and not just a job, and the importance of mental, as well as physical health, has become more recognised and acknowledged in recent years which would of course become even more crucial if a cancer diagnosis was present. #### **Funding**

KDCC applied to the SSEN Community Benefits fund for a grant on behalf of the local First Responders and we are very grateful to have received £4703.02; this award will benefit the wider community.

The grant will be used to

- To purchase essential PPE for the Inverurie First Responders,
- and a manikin for CPR and first aid training to various groups across the area and for providing demonstrations of CPR and defibrillator training at events across the area.

On the topic of life saving equipment, we were also grateful to receive a new Defibrillator from Scotia Homes to replace the old one at First Photographics. We are waiting on the connection of a new Defibrillator at Midmill School, the funds for this have come from the money donated to KDCC by the Kids Club and contributions from Kintore United FC, Midmill School, Kintore Fundraising Team, Kintore Summer Festival and The Rotary Club of Kintore, Blackburn & Kemnay.



#### Floral Display Team

As usual Sue Parrott and her willing band of volunteers have been busy sourcing and planning the lovely floral displays around the town. For many years Aberdeenshire Council have supplied most of the plants for the displays but sadly due to monetary constraints we will get no plants this year. However, we have been very fortunate and are extremely grateful for a donation of £1000 from Meg McKay on behalf the Seniors Club. We have also received a donation of £500 from a local person which is much appreciated and together these will go a long way to keep our town looking lovely during the summer months.

# **COUNCILLOR GLEN REID**

### Dinnie Place - Overgrown Vegetation Removal

After receiving complaints about access issues at Dinnie Place, due to overgrown vegetation with sharp thorns, I raised the matter as it was an access issue/hazard for pedestrians.

Although this matter is the responsibility of homeowners, I asked officers to intervene as it was preventing pedestrians from safely accessing the lane and play park.

I had to chase the matter a few times, but I'm glad to report that the works have now been completed.

# Power Cuts/Planned Outages by SSEN at Midmill, Kintore

I have been contacted by constituents and businesses in and around the area of Midmill, Kintore about interruptions to their power supply. Concerns have been raised as to why they have been so frequent lately and what can be done to eliminate/reduce them as the effects of these interruptions can range from an annoying nuisance to a costly experience with equipment being damaged and business service being disrupted.

Although it is a matter outwith the remit of the council, I raised it directly with SSEN and in my discussions with them they firstly wanted to offer their apologies for this recent level of service. They went on to explain that the power interruptions were due to quite a few factors such as; faults on the feeder, cables breaking, box faults and even power poles being knocked over on farms.

Currently, if a fault occurs outwith Kintore, perhaps at Leylodge or Dunecht, the supply at Midmill is interrupted as the fault trips the substation at Torryburn. SSEN are addressing this by upgrading their Pole Mounted Circuit Breaker (PMCB) at Lyne of Skene from class 2 to class 1 and installing a new class 1 PMCB at Womblehill Farm just outside Kintore.

This will protect the power supply in Kintore from faults occurring outwith the town. The plan is to have both class 1 PMCBs installed and operating by the end of June. I hope that this will give some clarity and peace of mind to residents and businesses in and around Midmill.

# Speed Limit Orders For Implementing The National 20mph

At a recent Garioch Area Committee officers brought forward their plans for the long awaited implementation of the Scottish Government's National 20mph strategy.

It is my firm belief that this roll out will lead to safer communities and, although I think some additional roads should have been included, I agreed with other councillors that these plans should move forward asap to the commencement of the four week statutory consultation with interested parties. This will then be followed by a 21 day public consultation, giving anyone who wishes to object to the making of the orders the opportunity to do so. Any valid objections received and not withdrawn or resolved will be reported back to the Area Committee.

I have written to Roads officers separately with the list of roads that I feel should also have been included to ensure that our communities are as safe as possible from speeding. If everything goes according to the officers plans, they should be rolled out this summer.

# HARRIET CROSS MP

I'm delighted to make my first contribution to Kintore Konnect since being elected as your Member of Parliament for Gordon & Buchan in last year's General Election. It has been a tremendous honour to represent you in Westminster this past year, where I've been working hard to champion local priorities, scrutinise the Labour Government, and speak up for our communities.

Since being elected, I've made over made 217 written and spoken contributions in Parliament and assisted with over 2800 pieces of casework from constituents on a variety of issues from difficulty in accessing healthcare, to the Winter Fuel Payment and council issues. Please do not hesitate to get in touch if you would like assistance with an issue, big or small. Two of the most important employment sectors in our constituency are energy – in particular our existing oil and gas industry, and agriculture. These industries are not just major employers and economic



drivers for our region — they are vital of significant national interest. That's why I've focused much of my parliamentary work on defending them and putting forward positive, practical solutions to the difficulties both sectors are facing.

In an around Kintore, I know there is considerable concern about the various energy infrastructure plans especially the recently approved developments at Leylodge. I have raised concerns about the overindustrialisation of rural areas across Scotland and the very real impact this has on our rural communities, landscapes, tourism and agriculture. There is a severe need for a national energy infrastructure strategy with detailed planning on where infrastructure should be placed, rather than the current 'wild west' approach. Local communities like Kintore and Leylodge must be heard and understood to ensure these occurrences of over industrialised energy infrastructure sites are addressed.

On farming, I've strongly opposed Labour's Autumn Budget decision to cut Agricultural Property Relief and Business Property Relief. These changes are especially damaging to our many family farmers in Gordon and Buchan, threatening the future of farms and, by extension, our food and national security. I've taken action by writing to the Chancellor, raising the issue twice at Prime Minister's Questions, speaking in numerous debates, and attending rallies both locally and in London. I continue fighting against this "Family Farm Tax" and the devastating impact it will have on farmers (and the future of farming) up and down the country. Also in the Budget, the Labour Government significantly raised Employer's National Insurance Contributions for most employees —essentially a new tax on jobs. Since coming into effect in April, this tax hike has hit local businesses hard, with some employers already warning of potential job losses. One major employer in the constituency told me they may be forced to cut up to 25 jobs. I've raised this in Parliament on numerous occasions and many local businesses have completed my survey of local businesses to gather views and further details about the impact of these changes. I'll continue opposing this harmful policy and pressing the Government to support our businesses.

From conversations I have had with residents, in addition to correspondences I have received, I am aware of concerns about the provision of healthcare locally. I've created a survey to further understand the issues that are being faced, in particular relating to GP practices, and have been working with stakeholders to understand how services can be improved. Access to quality healthcare remains a priority for me, and I'll continue to work with local groups and my colleagues in Holyrood to see better outcomes for residents and

local providers who have been struggling with ever-tighter from the Scottish Government.

I am closely and actively monitoring the situation with sheltered housing in Aberdeenshire, following recent announcements that the Council are reviewing the future of 17 complexes. At the end of April, I wrote to Aberdeenshire Council requesting clarity on the future of these facilities and raising concerns about how any changes might impact residents and seeking assurances that no resident will be left without appropriate accommodation. It's crucial that the needs of elderly and vulnerable individuals are con sidered at the heart of any decision-making and I encourage anyone impacted by this to contact me so I can raise these concerns with the Council.

Many of you may have seen recent news articles relating to the growing backlog of driving tests in Aberdeenshire. Some learner drivers are facing waits of up to six months to book a test. In rural communities like ours, where public transport options are limited, this is unacceptable. I have been working to help resolve this and I am happy to confirm that, after writing to the Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency, two additional driving examiners have been secured for our region which will start to relieve some of the backlog.

As always, I'm here to support you. Whether you have concerns about local matters or national policy, please don't hesitate to get in touch.

### VE Day 80 Commemorations

I had the honour of laying a wreath at the war memorial in Huntly to commemorate VE80 in the presence of veterans of The Gordon Highlanders. The ceremony remembered those who served, sacrificed and secured peace. 
# KINTORE LIBRARY

Though commanded by his superiors not to help he was ruled by a greater commandment to love your neighbour and so set about with others to contact all the congregations in Scotland seeking help for German civilians and help came in huge amounts from the church communities and a new charity would grow which is still offering help to those in need today.

## Community Update



We're thrilled to share some exciting news with you as we continue to grow and support our local community.

Thanks to the incredible support of Kintore and District Community Council, we have been awarded a generous grant of £4,703.02 from the SSEN Community Benefit Fund. We are immensely grateful to SSEN's Community Benefits team and Kintore Community Council for making this possible. This funding will go a long way in helping us deliver life-saving support and essential training throughout the area.

The grant will be used to:

- Purchase vital PPE for our team of volunteers.
- Invest in a Resusci Anne QCPR Airway Head Torso an advanced manikin that allows us to deliver realistic, high-quality CPR and defibrillator training, both for our team and for members of the public.

#### As Alan Milne, our Group Coordinator, explains:

"It has already been an incredibly busy year for our team, with our responders attending a growing number of emergencies across the community. This year alone, we have responded to 13 cardiac arrests within our area of remit, highlighting just how vital our role is in providing early intervention and life-saving care. One of the most significant additions made possible by this grant is the Resusci Anne QCPR Airway Head Torso, which is an advanced training dummy that's a game-changer for our team. Unlike standard manikins, it allows for advanced airway management and AED training, capabilities that are not usually possible with conventional CPR training equipment.

To put it into perspective, this is the difference between a basic budget car and a Rolls-Royce—a leap in quality that will make a lasting impact on the skills and confidence of our responders. Beyond benefiting our team, we envision using this training manikin to provide realistic training sessions for members of the public, helping to remove the fear of using an AED. By giving people hands-on experience in a controlled environment, we can build confidence and empower more individuals to step in and act during a cardiac emergency—potentially saving lives."

This grant marks another important milestone in our mission to make Inverurie and the surrounding areas safer and more resilient. We're proud of the work our volunteer responders do and grateful for the continued support from the community Thank you for standing with us. Together, we can save lives.

We're also very grateful to Delm8, who continue to support us in getting to the correct address quickly and efficiently. In emergency response, every second counts, and having accurate location tools like Delm8 is a real asset to our work.

# Looking Ahead – Can Your Community Council Help?

To take our training capabilities to the next level, we're now looking to raise funds for a ShockLink system—a fantastic tool that allows live defibrillators to be safely connected to training manikins, making BLS and defibrillation training even more realistic.



Using ShockLink, we can connect standard defibrillators to training pads and simulate a real-life shock safely. The shock energy is harmlessly absorbed in the ShockLink cable, eliminating the need for expensive specialist manikins with chest study or load boxes. This means:

- More versatile training options
- Increased realism
- Reduced equipment costs

We would love to work with other community councils in the area who might be willing to support the purchase of this vital training tool. # SEASONAL ITCH - A Vets Guide to Allergies in Pets

As we head into spring and summer, here at Donview Vets we start seeing a familiar pattern—an uptick in visits from itchy, uncomfortable pets. While parasites like fleas are always a consideration, one of the most common culprits we see this time of year is seasonal allergies. #### What Causes Allergies in Pets?

# New Scottish Rules for Funeral Sector

From 1 March 2025, the funeral sector in Scotland became fully regulated requiring anyone trading as a funeral director to meet minimum standards of professional training, funeral facilities, and quality of care. Ian Thomson of Inverurie's Eric Massie Funeral Directors explains what this means to local families.

#### Minimum standards

Funeral directors must abide by minimum standards of care both in terms of facilities and the service being offered. The first steps of gathering information about the person who's died, obtaining appropriate permissions to move them, and transparency about where they will be cared for, have now been clearly set out in the Code. Care is extended to the bereaved family responsible for arranging the funeral too. The Code provides guidance on service standards backed by mandatory record keeping, so options offered and decisions made, can be effectively managed and evidenced.

#### **Records and Transparency**

Acknowledging each funeral is different, there are minimum standards set for staff knowledge to ensure families are supported by experienced funeral teams. Emphasis on recording decisions made, and being transparent about costs, is a key theme of the Code. Estimates for all funeral elements, including updates to these throughout the process, are now a requirement. Every bereaved family deserves to know that they can implicitly trust the funeral director they instruct to care for them and their loved one. These standards begin from the first moment of need to the funeral itself. The Code also sets out a summary of expectations including the storage, record keeping and handling of ashes.

#### Complaints

Further reassurance for families who need to raise complaints is achieved through the proposed complaints policy recommendations, offering a pathway to effective and swift resolution. 

# KINTORE'S UNSUNG HERO - Rachel Lewis

#### Do you live in Kintore?

Yes, I have lived in Kintore for 7 years and before that in Kemnay. I grew up in a small village called Rosehearty near Fraserburgh. I went to Rosehearty Primary School and then Fraserburgh Academy. When I left the Academy, I didn't know what I wanted to do. I went to college for about a year and studied Photography. I then went back to college as the youth workers had found a course that was around working with communities. I did NC and HNC for two years.

#### How did you get to where you are today job wise?

When I moved to Kemnay, I got my first job with the council for 2 ½ hours doing Youth Work in Kemnay Youth Club. I then saw the opportunity with Action Kintore and applied and started in December 2013 to start up The Bothie. 12 years later I am still there, local businesses were very supportive, and the young people created the colour schemes and the layout. I have worked with the Council for 12 years in Community Learning and Development and two years ago I joined the tackling Poverty and Inequalities team, as a Youth Engagement Worker. I have done two big events in Inverurie



"Over to Youth" which supports young people to come together to raise awareness of youth issues in their area and any possible solutions. The event was well attended by local councillors, to get them to listen to young people and what they needed. The work I do with the Poverty and Inequalities groups gives young people a platform to make positive changes to themselves and their community. I see myself as a conduit between young people and adults. I now have two paid staff at The Bothie who first attended the groups as 12- and 13-year-olds, they help with the Tuesday group. Another new staff member who now helps with the Junior group also first came when she was just 10 years old.

# Can you explain to our readers which Voluntary Groups you are involved in today and what motivates you to do these as a Volunteer?

My day job and my voluntary work are very intertwined. I get paid for some of the hours that I work at The Bothie but there are other hours that I work in The Bothie that are voluntary. This involves taking groups on trips including residential trips. I volunteer at events in Kintore like the street party and other community events. I also volunteer for Grampian Deaf Children's Society, as my mother is deaf. I am part of the deaf society and am working to get youth groups started within the society. I am a trustee and a co-founder of Scotland Na Kenya – Pamoja for Children (Scotland with Kenya – together with Children) I've been out there 6 times. The first few times, working with schools and taking boxes and suitcases of supplies like pencils, stationery and games across. We fundraise here at home and spend it locally in Kenya, so it benefits the local community by spending money to help their economy. Items we cannot buy there like play bubbles we take with us, and much fun is had with them. The last few times we have been working on community projects, for example a travelling librarian who travels around the area, reading, singing and playing games with children. We work with rescue centres who feed over 100 children and young people who live on the streets and are addicted to substances such as glue.

Youth work in Scotland is completely different to youth work in Kenya, but I thoroughly enjoy it. All funds that we raise are for the charity, we fund our travel and accommodation ourselves.

#### What has been your highlight this year?

I am fortunate with my job that I got to share my experience this year by speaking at conferences in Glasgow, Edinburgh and Dundee. In April I was invited to Birmingham to be part of the UK Youth Residential

meeting for 3 days. I was asked to speak there as they'd given The Bothie a 3-year funding grant, so it was good to feedback everything we'd been doing with the money. It's paid for 3 part-time youth workers who also contribute to running the groups. I was recognised this year in a Case Study by the Improvement Service, which is the organisation for Local Government Improvement in Scotland for the work I have been doing. There was a "Getting it Right for Every Child" event, Voice of the Child event and youths from The Bothie delivered workshops to professionals during the day. It was opened by Lawrence Findlay, Director of Education who praised the work I have been doing with youth groups. I was also invited by the Lord Lieutenant along with two of the youth group to a Carol Service in St Machar's

Cathedral in late December.



# Why would you recommend others to follow your lead and become a community volunteer?

It is very rewarding, and I think if people feel compelled to help others they should. We have forgotten how to be a community, although the community spirit in Kintore is amazing and Kemnay is good too, I know that there are others who don't have that same sense of community. People often find it difficult to find enough time, as I did as part of the Community Council. I didn't feel I could guarantee the time to do it properly, but I do like to help on weekends and evenings.

I would recommend volunteering in the community as you make many social connections who are always there to help if ever needed. I can use my experience to encourage people, particularly young people. I like to be proactive and like to tackle issues and just get things done and make it a happier environment for everybody.

I enjoy seeing young people flourish into young adults and be respected. Often if I have been working all day and meet some of the teenagers in the streets, they greet me like a friend and even offer to buy me a bag of chips if they know I've not had time to eat much during the day. It's rewarding to have such a good rapport with them and to be a trusted adult for them.

I have an extra bonus to bring to the groups and the young people that I work with and that's my beloved companion, my dog Jaz. She is a huge benefit in making people feel relaxed and breaking the ice. In other walks of life, she could be described as a "Therapet".

Growing up in Rosehearty and Fraserbugh it's quite isolated, I had a lot of caring responsibilities with limited support. I didn't do well in school and became a bit of a rebellious teenager. It was my best friend who took me to a youth club, and there, my youth workers listened to me without judgement, believed in my capabilities and empowered me to do better. To this day if I see the youth workers who listened and supported me when I was a teenager, I like to thank them.

Two months later I was at the Community Centre four days a week and after one year was there Monday to Saturday and running my own dance group. It gave me a purpose and a place to be a teenager and for someone to listen to me without judgement which led me into my current job. I am passionate about it, and I strive to be the trusted adult that I needed when I was a young person. This led me away from my rebellious ways and I want to do that for young people and gain a rapport to help them with risky behaviour or anxiety and to give them a safe space to find out the reasons behind certain behaviours. Schools can be a great place, but it is not the place for everybody as it's often a one size fits all and it does not work.

What are your interests out with the Community Council?

I like going walking in the woods, hiking and hillwalking and I plan to do two Munros this weekend with my dog Jaz. We live in a fast-paced world, but on the hills, it gives you a different and slower perspective on life. I also like to go and see live bands and socialise with my friends.

I like spending time in my garden reading a book from the Library and looking after my plants and flowers.
