FLY TIPPING AT KINTORE PUBLIC HALL

ecently items have been dumped at the Public Hall beside the locked bins, which are for hall users (hirers) and the hall cleaner's use. The bins are not provided by Aberdeenshire Council and are privately hired by the hall committee.

Glass has also been left by members of the public when the 2 Aberdeenshire Council glass bins are full although there are other glass recycling bins in Kintore.

Bags of clothing are also being left when the clothing recycling bin is full, again there are other clothing bins, for example at the school car park.

We would ask the public to use other facilities in Kintore when these bins are full and not leave rubbish/glass/clothing on site, as this is a littering offence.

We have young children using the hall and are trying to avoid injury to hall users.

BENNACHIE PARISH CHURCH Beautiful Kintore

hile considering a move to Kintore I decided to check out the town and see what the locals thought of it. I went to have my hair cut and while in the chair asked the barber, "So what is Kintore like to live in?" "I don't know", she replied, "I'm fae Thainstone." Coming from another continent myself I thought that a hilariously parochial response from someone just 2 miles up the road. Eleven years later, I think I finally get it. There is something about actually living in a town that gives you insights into its character that you could never guess from outside. I think it's worth reflecting on this as we face another influx of newcomers to all the new housing in our town: What sort of community are we? What sort of welcome do newcomers receive? How quick and easy will it be for them to feel at home with us? What I'm about to say won't appeal to every newcomer, and not every existing resident will have had the experience I describe, nevertheless allow me to offer my own perspective on what makes Kintore beautiful to live in.

When Kintore suffered flooding, along with most of Aberdeenshire, 8 years ago and many homes were affected, there was an immediate outpouring of help from seemingly endless numbers of volunteers. People here are remarkably generous! It was fairly chaotic and haphazard though. On reflection, a resilience plan was developed and a Resilience Group established – a volunteer group that has just got better and

better each time a crisis has hit our town. The trouble was (and what a great problem to have!) that all these volunteers were raring to go, but crises don't happen every week. So, through the Community Council and others, this energy was channeled towards beautifying and restoring our town. We became part of Keep Scotland Beautiful's "It's Your Neighbourhood" initiative, and we have ended up with a town that is a real gem. As a church leader, I am very conscious that joining a church community is a great way to become part of a community when you move to a new town. The Parish Church and the Community Church are both excellent places to find a warm welcome and to get involved in community life. But there are also many other places and ways to get involved - the schools, the Scouts and Guides, Rotary, Kintore Konnect, the Community Council, volunteer groups like "It's Your Neighbourhood", not to mention all the sports, clubs and social and walking groups.

To all our newcomers, we hope you will soon feel at home and come to be just as proud as we are of our beautiful wee town.

Using QR codes to help share the stories of Kintore's rich heritage is the brainchild of Community Councillor Ken McEwen who shared his vision with fellow councillor Jim Reid almost three years ago who has gone on and managed to help bring Kens' vision to life.

Local historian Alison McCall shared the workload with Ken by building the stories of the points of interest which voiceover artist Neil Weightman brought to life through his audio recordings. Neil also went above and beyond his remit and assisted with the whole project by making the audio files available online and building a webpage

The Explore Kintore Tour is free and available to anyone who owns a smartphone. You simply find the QR tiles close by the Historic building or site, scan it and simply press play when prompted to listed to the dramatic two-minute story of each place. You are then encouraged to visit other sites close by on the map shown on the same webpage on your phone. This is a great way to find out more about the town you stay in and help educate the young people of Kintore about the rich history and heritage we have.

businesses and the kindness of the Kintore residents who really appreciate the displays and the hard work of the Floral Team volunteers.

We also recognise that as prices increase and belts tighten, we will find it more difficult to raise these funds in the traditional manner. We have reworded our 'funding flyer' to help raise the funds for the winter/ spring and summer plants next year but fear that we will come up short.

We will continue to look for available grants that can help with this important community display.

ΙT **KINTORE** SO GOOD NAMED ONCE.... **MAYBE** DOESN'T HAVE **THFY RING** SEEMS THAT **KINTORE SLEEPS** EITHER. LIKE CITY **NEVER** THE **KINTORE FOUNTAIN**

Built to commemorate the coronation of King Edward the VII and Queen Alexandra in 1902 this special fountain has survived two world wars, many a drunken event spilling into the square and more lately a young lad trying to retrieve something personal from the top tier of the fountain resulting in the very heavy granite top cracking at a previous repair and toppling.

Thankfully no one was injured apart from some pride however it did leave us with a wounded fountain. However, Kintore wouldn't be Kintore without some heroics, and these came in the shape of Davie (Seagull) Gall and the Sharp Team from Tavelty. Armed with bonding material donated by Grampian Fasteners and Grampian Steel the Team went to work and came up trumps by getting the fountain back to it's former glory. We have pebbles donated by RoWebb Inverurie to fill in the gaps which will be done over the coming weeks. Well done folks.

Also, a special mention to Moira Moran for spending the time meticulously cleaning the pebbles at the base to reveal the initials E & A and the year 1902 as proof of the fountain's origin.

Great teamwork!

PS Unfortunately, the water has been turned off to the fountain and it is not a simple case of turning it back on due to regulations, given it is turned off over the winter months it will be next Spring before it is working properly again.

The Bailies of Bennachie are undertaking their biggest ever project on Bennachie. At an estimated cost of over £100,000 a 1-kilometre stretch of the Timeline Trail is to be repaired. This is the main path up Mither Tap from the Bennachie Visitor Centre. It is severely eroded and was chosen as most worthy of our attention. The Bailies have worked with Forestry & Land Scotland (FLS) over the last two years on the scope of work and the way forward. FLS no longer has the budget for the large expenditure necessary for this work, so we felt that we had no option but to grab the baton and see what could be done for the hill and the walkers visiting it. We have obtained a cost estimate and appointed the

In the Spring issue of Kintore Konnect, we introduced you to local lass Claire, who was preparing to take on CoppaTrek! Skye - a fiveday, 100km hiking adventure to raise awareness of breast cancer and encourage everyone to regularly check their chest.

HERE'S HER UPDATE:

A heartfelt thank you to everyone who supported my CoppaTrek! Adventure - whether you donated, bought glass flowers or lucky duck eggs, or simply cheered me on. Together, you helped me raise an incredible £4,149, with an additional £1,001 in Gift Aid through JustGiving. The total raised by the CoppaTrek! Skye group reached a

whopping £505,674!



While the stunning scenery and tough hikes across Skye took my breath away (in every possible way!), it was the stories shared among fellow trekkers that left the deepest impression.

CRAFTING FOR A **CAUSE: THE POWER** OF THE KINTORE **COMMUNITY**

Raising awareness was just as important as raising money and that's where the creative minds of the Kintore Knit & Stitch group came in.

In March, I approached Carole and her amazing team with a slightly unusual request: to knit small, soft 'boobs' to use as conversation starters. Not only did they accept the challenge, they created over 200 mini masterpieces, which we turned into keyrings to help spread the message far and wide!

News of their unique creations spread with Kemnay Library, the Peterhead Knitters, and Banchory Crafting Quines joined in the effort. On June 1st, I distributed 100 of these keyrings at the Aberdeen Kiltwalk, where they sparked countless conversations around CoppaFeel!'s 'Feel It On The First' campaign.

SPREADING THE WORD - ONE **KEYRING AT A** TIME

At the Kiltwalk, I found many people were unaware that breast cancer can affect people of all genders - with nearly 400 men diagnosed in the UK every year. That's why CoppaFeel! encourages everyone guys, gals, and non-binary pals - to check their chests monthly.

In July, I handed out the remaining keyrings to the Jim McPherson Memorial Match between Culter FC and Nairn St. Ninians, using the opportunity to chat with supporters and raise even more awareness.

200 keyrings = 200 conversations started. With every conversation, there is hope, and that is priceless. Thank you once again to everyone.

t was brilliant to visit the Kintore's It's Your Neighbourhood Project at Provost Lawrence Court sheltered housing complex recently. Part of the Keep Scotland Beautiful program, this project looks to enhance and rejuvenate parts of towns through planting, painting, weeding and landscaping.

So, it was great to see and hear about the transformation of the ground at the back of Provost Lawrence, which was once overgrown and unused. This project has transformed the ground there with saplings, planters, vegetable boxes and seating areas, making an excellent place for residents to relax and enjoy the summer weather.

These improvements would not have been possible without the work of local volunteers and residents, who have made a tremendous difference to Kintore in recent years, and I truly believe a model for other communities to follow. From my time as MP, the importance of having an active community council, like Kintore's, has become clear to me. So, I want to pay tribute to the community council and volunteers who give up so much of their time and effort for the town. I look forward to seeing this project grow and supporting further such projects across Kintore over the coming years.

Turning to some local concerns and how I have raised these in Westminster. I am fully aware that there is considerable concern regarding the various energy infrastructure plans surrounding Kintore. I have raised these concerns on numerous occasions in Parliament

about the over-industrialisation of rural areas across the constituency and specifically Leylodge.

Across Scotland, communities are being overwhelmed by large-scale energy infrastructure projects, from towering pylons and Battery Energy Storage Systems to hydrogen plants and expansive onshore windfarms. While there is no question that we need to expand our renewable energy capacity, these developments must be properly planned, appropriately located, and subject to meaningful consultation with local communities.

That is why I recently proposed an amendment to the Planning and Infrastructure Bill that would have introduced a statutory duty for public consultation on energy infrastructure projects in Scotland. Disappointingly, the Government rejected this proposal without providing a reasonable justification. Those most impacted by new energy infrastructure projects need to have a proper say in consultations and be given a statutory voice in the planning process. Yet, under both the Scottish Government in Holyrood and the UK Government in Westminster, this simply is not happening. It is especially frustrating that Labour chose not to support this amendment, despite the clear benefits it would have brought to communities across Scotland.

Finally, in my last contribution to this magazine I wrote about the concerns many residents raised with me and other elected representatives about the review of 17 sheltered housing facilities in Aberdeenshire, that put the future of many of these facilities at risk. Throughout the review, I closely monitored developments, met with residents across the constituency, and raised serious concerns with the Council about the consultation process, which in my view fell far short of what should be expected in a decision of this scale and sensitivity.

Thanks to an outstanding grassroots campaign led by sheltered housing residents, including in Kintore, I'm pleased that the worst-case scenario has been avoided. Crucially, no sheltered housing schemes in or around Kintore will be closed. This is a significant and hard-won outcome, and I want to thank everyone who took part in the campaign.

That said, I recognise that residents remain understandably anxious about some of the changes that have been announced, particularly the transition of several facilities, including Airlie House, to an "enhanced housing" model. On the surface, this may appear to be a reasonable compromise, but I believe it's essential we get clarity and assurances on what this will mean in practice.

I am actively seeking detailed information about how "enhanced housing" will operate, especially regarding future rent levels, maintenance and repairs, eligibility for new residents, and what protections current tenants will have going forward.

AUTUMN ACHES:

Spotting and Managing Arthiritis in Pets

GRIT BINS - LETTER TO DIRECTOR

Every single Administration Councillor (Tories, Lib Dems and Aligned Independents) should hang their heads in shame re this decision. Lives may well be put at risk, elderly people will be more socially isolated as they will not be able to get out during winter and the NHS will be put under greater strain with an increase in admissions from slips, trips and accidents - all because they CHOSE to cut this most basic of services. I have written to the Director of Infrastructure Services to express my dismay at this decision and to ask that it be reconsidered:

"First and foremost I urge you to rethink the decision to remove 1,200 grit bins. It's not too late. The council decided to close the libraries, but public outcry forced a change in the process and the ultimate decision saw this reversed. You were

going to close 17 Sheltered Housing schemes, but public outrage saw this reduced to six schemes. The general public, my constituents and I are furious about this latest plan and the council's reputation is at an all time low. Some communities, such as Hatton of Fintray, are losing EVERY single grit bin. Please reverse this decision, or at the very least, reduce the scale of the removal of bins. If you are steadfast and will not change your mind, then please do NOT remove the grit bins. It makes no sense to me to pay personnel to visit 1,200 locations and remove these bins as it will cost the council in time and resources. I have heard that it may be done whilst they are rolling out the 20mph speed limit changes in communities, but it will simply make that exercise take much longer and there ultimately will be a financial cost to this. You will then need to store all 1,200 bins. I'm sure that the

council never planned for this and therefore we do not have this level of 'spare' storage space. If we do, then we obviously need to review our depot strategy as we shouldn't and have clearly been spending too much money on unused storage capacity. Our communities have adapted brilliantly to the continual withdrawal of the council from providing the services that they have done before. In a drive to save money, you asked them to be more resilient, to do more for themselves, to 'step up', and they have in so many ways. With this in mind, please give our communities the opportunity to step up again and take over the stocking of these lifeline bins. It may be that some can be 'adopted' by community groups and we must explore this option before forcing this unwanted decision onto communities. Any such bins that remain, but are to be filled by the community, not the council, can be marked so as to stop any public confusion about the stocking of it.

Speak to them and see what can be done as once they are gone it will be too late. I also believe that there has to be an urgent review of the ownership of these bins as I have had multiple reports from my constituents that some of these bins that are earmarked for removal, do not actually belong to the council. They were either paid for by developers or by communities and therefore any removal would be illegal. I have listed some examples below and I would be seeking an assurance that the ownership of these ones specifically, and the other bins in general, will be thoroughly looked into before any removal. If, as believed, they belong to the community, they must remain where they are:

Wimpey housing estate,
Newmachar (purchased by
developer)
Henry Catto Place, Kingseat
(purchased by residents)

To my constituents and our community, I say YOUR opinions matter, YOUR voices count -WE won the fight to save OUR library services, WE saved some of OUR Sheltered Housing schemes and now WE have to go again. AIRLIE HOUSE -SHELTERED HOUSING REVIEW

At June's Garioch Area Committee (GAC), councillors were asked to provide comments to go forward to Communities Committee who will decide this matter next week. 17 schemes from the 56 Sheltered Housing facilities across Aberdeenshire have been considered for review, with closure as a potential outcome subject to further consultation. In September 2023 Communities Committee agreed to adopt the framework for the review with the criteria consisting of four factors: finance, demand, place and alternative provision. I said to officers,

"I can understand the rationale overall, but I must admit that there are questions about the two schemes under review in Garioch. It says in the paper that the review is largely due to low demand, but both these schemes have had over 97% occupancy over the last 10 years so why are we looking at closing them when they are so popular? There is a £135 million capital shortfall over the next 30 years for the 56 schemes, which means that the average Net Present Value (NPV) is approx. £2.4 million per scheme. 17 locations are proposed to close, leaving 39 operating. 28 of those 39 staying open have a worse NPV than Airlie House. When you take into account all four factors; finance, demand, place and alternative provision, you arrived at an overall score.

There results, ranging from 2.0 to 4.5 with the higher being the better, are astounding. Airlie House is rated at 3.9. Only 5 of the whole 56 schemes are rated higher. In the top 15 of your ratings, ALL will stay open bar one, Airlie House (under review) which is the 6th best. Kintore has an aging population, demand is high and constant here, the average NPV is £2.4m and Airlie House is £1.8m and it scores the 6th highest score overall."

With all of this, and having heard from one of the residents, I opposed the closure of Airlie House and proposed that the Garioch Area Committee state to Communities Committee that, based on the evidence that has been presented to us today, we (the GAC) do not understand why these two facilities (also Nether Davah House, Inverurie) have been earmarked for potential closure and are opposed to it. I am pleased to say that ALL of my colleagues supported this comment, as well as Cllr. Neil Baillie's comment that this should be decided by ALL of the council and not just the Communities Committee.

These comments went forward to the Communities Committee the following week who listened to us, and the public, and decided not to close Airlie House.

MIDMILL EARLY LEARNING CENTRE – COMMUNICATION UPDATE

Following the recent U-turn on mothballing of four Early Learning Centres (ELC) by the Conservatives and Lib Dem Administration, I replied to the Director of ECS as I was unsatisfied with his response:

"Thanks for your reply although I am confused by the outcome.

It has been established that the Council did not follow Scottish Government guidance, whether clear or not, on mothballing the ELCs following the December meeting of your committee. Full Council agreed on this and provision will now continue at Ballogie, Crossroads, Glass and Sandhaven.

However, the exact same process was followed for Midmill in Kintore just a couple of months earlier and therefore it must also not have been in accordance with Scottish Government guidance. Can you please explain the difference?

In my opinion there is none, other than the parents of Midmill have not began legal proceedings against the Council, and therefore the decision surely needs to be revisited now.

I look forward to your reply." He in turn replied, "We have numerous settings which have already been mothballed in Aberdeenshire; Kinneff School, Dunnottar Nursery, Tullynessle School and Nursery and Midmill Nursery. In addition, we have been planning to mothball three other settings from this August; Logie Coldstone School, Slains School and Fintry School. Our priority is those three as the mothballing is imminent and there has been engagement with families for some time in respect of these, but we are working through these with Legal colleagues at present.

The instruction from Council last week was to pause any further mothballing activity, but as I flagged in my previous reply we will be looking at previous decisions again once we have undertaken the priority work around work planned for this August in respect of the three schools I have mentioned above."

I am as frustrated as parents, and no doubt staff, and have again written to him saying,

"Thanks for the reply, but can you please answer the following questions:

Why can't the recently closed settings be looked at the same time as the three that are being considered for mothballing? Imminent mothballing is of course a pressing issue, but so is the incorrect mothballing of other ELCs.

What can parents do to address the recent mothballing of their ELC which has been proven to contravene the Scottish Government guidance on mothballing and therefore should not have been mothballed?

The Council has erred and the delay in rectifying this error may well open us to costly legal proceedings which we clearly cannot afford."

I will do all that I can on this matter, however parents may wish to write to the two ward councillors who are in the Administration (contact details in previous article) who run this council and ask that they apply pressure too as I am only in opposition.

*** KINTORE STREET LIGHTING COLUMN REPLACEMENTS ***

Following the replacement of two columns last year, I promised the community that I would continue chasing further replacements from any new budget that became available.

I have written many emails and raised the matter at committee, pressing the concerns for people walking in the evening.

During a recent committee questioning, it was revealed that there would be just seven new columns erected in all of Garioch (Insch, Inverurie, Kemnay, Westhill, Kintore, Blackburn, Newmachar etc) this financial year.

I immediately wrote to officers again to raise the fears and concerns of Kintore residents, pressing that we see our columns replaced to ensure the safety of the public at night, especially along Northern Road.



Hi, I am Janine Cracknell and for the last decade I have been running the support group in Kintore for parents and carers of children and young people with (ASN) Additional Support Needs. Don't be confused! We are still Aberdeenshire North Foodbank, working hard across Aberdeenshire to support families living in food poverty. But our logo has been updated (at no cost to our charity, thanks to the generosity of one of our corporate supporters) and the old familiar logo with the leaves (above right) will eventually be replaced everywhere by the new sharper logo on the left. You will see both for the coming months as we use up supplies that are already printed with the old logo (no waste!).

We often tell you that we cannot continue to provide the help for households living in food poverty without your ongoing support and that is so true. Whether you donate items of food or make donations of money (details provided on our website https:// aberdeenshirenorth.foodbank.org.uk), your goodwill and generosity is what keeps us going. In the first seven months of this year, our food bank in Inverurie supplied 411 households with food parcels, feeding 528 adults and 278 children. In the same period, across our whole Aberdeenshire network of 5 food banks (Inverurie, Ellon, Huntly, Peterhead and Fraserburgh), we provided a total of 2160 food parcels, providing for 2847 adults and 877 children. We really do depend on your donations to continue providing this support. We are always short of tinned meat and fish, litre cartons of UHT milk, tinned vegetables and litre boxes of long-life fruit juice and are regularly now having to buy these items to make sure that our food parcels meet the nutritional standards required.

We volunteers are just so grateful that we are surrounded by communities who truly care about their neighbours and are willing to help in whatever way they can. We long for the day when the existence of Food Banks is no longer necessary but, until that happens, we can just say a heartfelt ...
