

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#### Introduction




# Say what?



hristianity is NOT what you'd expect as a fulfillment of Judaism. The New Testament includes about 300 directly quoted verses from the Old Testament. From those there are 30 verses that are considered to be messianic prophecies. From those there are only 3 references that Jesus used to describe His death, burial, and resurrection.

Those three include two that are types and not clear predictions. Jesus referred to being lifted up LIKE the snake was lifted up on a pole in Numbers 21:4-9. He also referred to being buried in the earth LIKE Jonah had been in the fish that had swallowed him for 3 days and nights. Finally, Jesus quoted Psalm 118:22 in reference to His rejection, and ultimate triumph over the grave to take His throne as the King of Kings.

There's one psalm that Jesus quoted while on the cross that is not on the list but is of notable mention. Psalm 22



reads like a description of Christ's crucifixion but it never really goes far enough to describe it as anything more than incredible suffering.

Even Isaiah 53, as descriptive as it is, does not give us a hint about the cross.

#### What do we say to that?

To me, it means that GOD is a mystery, but ONE of such intrigue that I want to know Him more and more. GOD is ...



Without the cross we are left to wonder if GOD really is love.

# But GOD did NOT leave us hanging.

Jesus Christ has no rival because He stands alone as the only Savior. The cross is GOD's original idea. No other GOD came up with anything like it before or since. It seems no one was that foolish! HaHa! (1 Corinthians 1:18) That's why NOBODY SAW THAT COMING.

The prevailing message Christianity emphasizes today is that there are over 300 messianic prophecies in the Old Testament. To me, it feels like we're overcompensating. Like we're underrating the impact of **The Thirty** messianic prophecies that are like 1,650-TONS-of-C4-EACH that the New Testament writers included. I used to appeal to the 300 prophecies idea when I wrote my first book, "it's GOD's BiG Show". But as the years have passed by I've slowed down enough in my studying to see some things that I blew right pass before without even a second thought. Like this: Paul the apostle wrote about two-thirds of the New Testament and he barely used any prophetic scripture. Genesis 12:3, Isaiah 11:10, Isaiah 53:1, Deuteronomy 21:23, and Psalm 118:22.

Yet he referred to the generalized description of prophetic scripture as a reference itself. As if to say, you should believe what I'm writing about because it's in the scripture. In effect, he was saying "trust me that it's there." You'd be amazed how many times he did that.

So, Paul directly quoted 5 prophetic scriptures but 143 times he used words like ...

The gospel
My gospel
The law
GOD's law
The law and the prophets
The written code
The holy scriptures

The scriptures The promises The word of GOD The very words of GOD GOD's word The word Good news GOD's truth The message The message of the cross The testimony about GOD GOD's wisdom Words taught by the Spirit Moses The gospel of Christ The message of reconciliation The message of truth The gospel of GOD

The list goes on but you get the point.

And Paul wasn't the only one to do this. All of the New Testament writers did it too. Guess how many times they did it?


Why is the New Testament written this way? Perhaps it is due to the fact that **the gospel isn't based on a mountain** 

#### of prophecies. Rather, it is based on mountain sized prophecies!

Ok, so now we can see a pattern. There's about 300 Old Testament verses directly quoted in the New Testament. Of those 300 the writers used just **The Thirty** messianic prophecies as a basis for the gospel. Then another 286 times they simply stated that what they were writing was in the scriptures. That means that half the time they were referring to the body of scripture without giving a direct quote.

Is that a bad thing? NO.

But that's why we have written so many books saying that there are 300 messianic prophecies. We don't feel like **The Thirty** that we have are enough.



I like to think of **The Thirty** like the 6 super-massive stones of Baalbek, Lebanon. They are the largest quarried stones in human history. The heaviest weighing in at an astounding one-thousand six-hundred and fifty TONS. As a comparison, the pillars of Stonehenge weigh about one-fortieth of that magnitude!

To me, **The Thirty** have been set in their various contexts but have a much greater import than the rest. They are like the foundation stones. They carry all the weight. But they wouldn't make sense without the cornerstone. Which is why the most quoted verse of **The Thirty** is Psalm 118:22.

"The stone the builders rejected has become the cornerstone."

It's the greatest redemption story ever told about the only Savior there ever was based on **The Thirty** most significant prophecies ever written. The Bible is more story than it is anything. If a story gets caught up in telling too many facts it can get bogged down. It may never get going. But a story with just the right mix of facts, that relies on the premise more than mere data ... that's a story we can relate to.

Imagine yourself in the group of the disciples following Jesus and your hear Him predicting his death, burial and resurrection. Matthew records 8 times that Jesus did this. Mark included 5 times. Luke included 5 times. John included 15 predictions. If you followed Him long enough to hear all of these you'd probably be wondering where He

was getting this from. That's exactly what Judaism thinks today. Where does Christianity get the cross?

What references did Jesus give?

The sign of Jonah in Jonah 1:17. The snake being lifted up on a pole in Numbers 21:4-9.

That's it. Of the 33 times that Jesus' predictions of His death, burial, and resurrection occur in the gospels He only made reference to just two (jus2!) Old Testament verses.


What did He say the rest of the time?

Jesus gave the same kind of generalized answer that the apostles gave in their writings ... essentially, "it's in the scriptures."

Why is this important to understand?

What seems obvious to me is the simple fact that NO ONE SAW THIS COMING. The cross is barely even there. It's not what you'd expect GOD to do.

The unique claim of Christianity is that the fulfillment of Judaism is a CRUCIFIED GOD who conquered death and offers forgiveness to all who trust in Him. This is such an unthinkable way for GOD to be our Savior! CS Lewis said



that the gospel message was an **irreverent doctrine**. The idea that GOD would not only suffer the humiliation of becoming a man but also one that would be unjustly put to death is too much to accept for many. Why would GOD stoop to such depths? It is almost unfathomable.

#### But it's such a great story!

If Jesus were just another prophet who gave us just another book we would have a rather predictable GOD, wouldn't we? Sounds like Islam, doesn't it?

But our GOD is ...



Jesus Christ was GOD showing us how much He loves us.

"But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us." Romans 5:8

(Predictable is another word for boring)


When I'd say, 'I'm scared," He'd lean back and touch my hand.
