Some of ABATE of Florida, Inc.'s Accomplishments

• On July 1, 2000, we had the 30 year old Florida Helmet law repealed; July 1, 2010 was our 10th Anniversary of Freedom of Choice.

• We've become the 4th largest State Motorcycle Rights Organization (MRO) in the country (IN & IL are 1&2, we regularly switch for 3rd & 4th with PA).

• We got the handlebar heights law modified.

• We successfully fought a bill that would forbid our children from riding on our bikes.

• We successfully fought the bill that would confiscate motorcycles for going 30MPH over the speed limit.

• We developed an effective MSAP program that has raised motorist's perceptions and awareness of motorcycles, and have received funding from the State of FL totaling over \$750,000 to promote motorcycle safety and awareness.

• We successfully fought the bill against vertical tags that had over \$1,100 in fines for a first offense.

• Supported and fought for a texting-while-driving ban for the last few years.

• Our 2009-2010 Stiffer Penalties Bill made it through five of the FL House & Senate's committees; this is the farthest it has gone in the number of years we have tried. On the last day of session, a committee member strenuously attempted to attach a revival of the helmet law to our Bill. To avoid a new helmet law in Florida, we had to kill the Bill.

• We publish monthly Press Releases and/or Articles of Interest in many online & print publications, including Florida Full Throttle.

• The President of ABATE of Florida, Inc. has been asked to be on and currently sits as a member of The Motorcyclist Advisory Council (MAC) to the Federal Highway Administration in Washington, D.C. The Secretary of the U.S. Dept. of Transportation may appoint a representative from only two State MROs throughout the entire U.S.A. to be on this council.

• The President of ABATE of Florida, Inc. sits as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Collation of Motorcyclists (NCOM). NCOM has over 1000 member organizations.

And to the younger people out there, you have the chance to inherit an organization that stands up and fights for biker rights and safety. Help us make a difference, now, and for the future!




Besides the road markings, be watchful of puddles. At night you can't always judge how deep the puddles may be.





FROM PHARAOH TO FREEDOM



We've seen a lot of changes in the last 1-1/2 years. Our society has been through so much; it could easily be categorized as traumatic. Justice seems distant and freedom could be something we tell our grandchildren about. Depending on what side of the fence you live on, some of these changes haven't helped much. Our rights are being tampered with and the slippery slope gets pitched lower and lower.

I say it's not a time to be silent, not a time to hold back. We need to speak up when asked our opinion, knowing what we've fought for as a nation is worth repeating. For so long, we've held our tongues, wondering if we sound offensive. I think if we choose our words correctly, we can stand our ground and passionately express what's in our hearts.

Every night I watch the news and ask myself if there's anything I can physically do about all the injustices. When I receive emails about bills coming up for a vote, at least I can write my senators and congressmen to voice my opinion through emails and letters. But that's not enough. Sure, I know I can pray, and I do, but I feel so helpless!

Moses was an ordinary man with a bit of a sorted past. From the beginning of his spared life, it appears God had Moses in training and used his exposure, as well as his experiences to prepare him to do the extraordinary. At 80 years old, God called him to bring freedom to his people, the Israelites. They were led to Egypt after years in the wilderness, only to come under the harsh rule of this Egyptian King. In the beginning, Pharaoh was easy on them, but as time passed, his heart grew harder and harder, requiring more than they could humanly bear. Like a frog in a pot of cool water, Pharaoh slowly turned up the heat and before they knew it, the water was boiling. But the unexpected, unassuming Moses was chosen by God to set His people free. Like most of us would, Moses listed every excuse until God told him He would be with him all 20 the way. Before Moses set out on this huge task, God told him exactly how the whole thing would go down so Moses could refer back to what God promised, especially when the going got tough.

The long and short of it is this: God would have HIS way no matter how many times Pharaoh said 'yes', then changed his mind and punished the Israelites further. Moses was told what plague to pronounce over Pharaoh and the Egyptians, and each time it was worse than before! If I were an Egyptian in that day and time, I'd wonder why there wasn't a riot amongst the Egyptians, or why the Egyptian Mob hadn't taken the King out! 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*Educate, don't legislate – stuff we thought you might like to know

We were sitting around, talking about how the Florida Vulnerable Road User bill, recently died in committee, in both the House and the Senate. This Bill, basically, provides criminal penalties for a person who causes injury to a "vulnerable road user", such as a motorcyclist, bicyclist, skateboarder, pedestrian, wheelchair, etc. That bill died, but what about other hazards, besides cars, to motorcyclists, and even some of these other "vulnerable road users"?

We encounter many more hazards on the road than cars. Bikers should not assume that, because we have been driving a car for years, that we know what is dangerous. Some of the most common hazards for bikers are surprising, stuff you would never think about, until its right there in front of your bike, and you have to think fast.

In Florida, you can call *347, which is the letters "FHP". You can call to report drunk drivers, traffic crashes, stranded or disabled motorists, AND road hazards. They have to come out and investigate the complaint and try and correct the problem. Here are some of these road hazards:

Paint on the road: You have all seen them, the big highway logo signs painted right on the road, for 595 and other highways. The paint is thermoplastic and also used for the white lines at stop lights, crosswalks, etc. The purpose of these is to help delineate traffic and help us all be safer. But they can, and do, deteriorate, then we are not safe anymore. Many of you have experienced this paint, not just the big ones, but the small ones, and if it is wet from a recent rain, and you stop to put your foot down, sometimes you go down too. They get slippery. When these lines and logos start to deteriorate, they can start to peel, like a piece of tape, and it is dangerous to bikers, because they can peel up right as you are going over them, and down you go. Just start a conversation about these among the bikers down here and you will hear a lot of pissed off people, everyone seems to have had a bad experience with this road paint.

Gravel on pavement: Gravel is one of the trickiest hazards for motorcyclists to navigate. It is especially troublesome if encountered during cornering. Unfortunately, gravel on pavement tends to be more common on winding roads --which are popular with bikers, and which require lots of cornering. Accidents caused by gravel go hand in hand with motorcyclists who are going too fast, some of whom do not have the requisite skills to ride a bike in such conditions. Just this year, at Biketoberfest, a 76-year-old, experienced biker, going down the highway at 65 mph, hit some loose gravel and slid into the guardrails. He survived, but had multiple broken bones and lacerations, and a totaled bike.

Edge breaks/Uneven pavement: An edge break is when two traffic lanes are different heights. We see this a lot down here lately, as construction on all the roads, local and highway, seem to be ongoing, all year. This is not a big deal if you are driving a car, but can be a huge deal for unsuspecting motor-cyclists, especially when traveling on the highway at higher speeds. If you just hit that edge at a bad angle (are there any good angles), then your front tire can start to wobble, and down you go, on a highway, where everyone is going fast. Even when you aren't on the highway, when you are on a country road, this is dangerous. Sheila was telling us about a time when she was at the Leesburg Bikefest, on a small country road, and right in front of her, saw a bike go down, *Continued on page 36*

because of some uneven pavement.

Rough roads: Rough and bumpy roads, either from disrepair, construction work, or resurfacing efforts, can cause motorcycle accidents. Always be on the lookout when you see orange cones or barrels.

Animals: Most times, you can see a dead animal on the road, and avoid it. Down here in South Florida, we have a lot of wildlife that like to run in the road. Most of us have seen raccoons running across the road, or already dead. Johnny, our President, is a big turtle saver. For some reason, he sees them in the road a lot, and parks, then walks over to save them, get them to the place they were headed. Fortunately, they are slow, so you do have a chance to go around them. This is the same for armadillos. We see a lot of them, mostly dead though, hit by a car. We have a lot of cats and dogs, wild or tame, that find their way to the roads. Even hitting a small animal can throw your motorcycle off path or off balance. Unfortunately, live animals that run into the road are difficult to anticipate and swerving to avoid them can cause an accident. Johnny was riding one day, with Sheila, and a large white bird flew right into Johnny. He kept control and we tried to find the bird, but it was a little scary. Large animals, like deer and bear, can be a major hazard. There are many stories of bikers being killed by deer and bear in South Florida. Be aware of your surroundings, especially in country areas, but we even heard of a biker killed in Pembroke Pines, by hitting a deer.

Debris or objects in the road: Debris or objects in the road, such as parts of tire treads (road gators, we call them down here), things fallen from trucks (furniture, tools, boxes), branches, or rocks, are more hazardous to motorcycles than to cars. Not only can they cause a crash, but the object itself can hit and seriously harm the rider. We have all seen things, that weren't properly secured, falling off trucks. We've seen tires blow, and then the treads go everywhere. We see the garbage trucks and construction trucks, all the time, with open tops and all kinds of stuff falls out, and many times flies in the air, and we feel like we are the target. If you are ever behind one of these trucks, get around them as soon as possible.

Slick surfaces: The list of objects and surfaces that are, or can become, slippery is too long to list here, but you prob-

ably could name half a dozen right away. What first came to mind, for us, as we were talking, was gas and oil, which we commonly see at gas stations down here. It sometimes seems like people are getting oil to put in their cars but miss the hole. Slippery surfaces are much more dangerous for motorcycles than for cars. Sliding on the road can easily result in a crash. Slick surfaces are even more dangerous when the biker is turning. Bikers must also be cautious of rain after a dry spell. A first rain on a dry road is difficult to drive on, even for cars. The mud and oil on the road combine with the water to form a slippery layer. The first half hour of a rainstorm is the most dangerous time to ride on the road. The center lane gets coated with oil from automobile engines that make it slicker than the outside of the lanes, where the tires run. The rain brings this oil to the surface and make it a lot slicker.

Now comes what might be the most surprising road hazard to non-riders...

Grass clippings: These are so very dangerous and slippery on the roadway because they're mostly water. Anything that comes between a motorcycle's tires and the road can make the motorcycle lose traction, but when it's an organic material, like grass clippings, comprised mostly of water, the loss of traction is compounded. It's so slippery, it like ice. We want to include leaves here too, even though we don't have a traditional "fall" down in South Florida, a good rain, and wet leaves can pile up on the road. You don't see a lot of these type stories in the news, but I bet 4 out of 5 bikers that you talk to, would have a story about these grass clippings. Landscaping is big down here. We have this great weather most of the time and grass just loves to grow, and landscapers just love the business. They don't all realize the dangers, for us bikers, of blowing the grass into the roadway. Cars roll right over that. Many counties and cities have ordinances about this. Broward County Municipal Code Sec. 39-133(a) states "Accumulation of junk and debris such as appliances, furniture, auto parts, tires, vegetation cuttings, building materials, and other trash cannot be left in the yard or public right-of-way areas." Get your phone out, take a picture of the landscape company truck or workers. You can call the company and maybe help educate them about the dangers to motorcyclists, and bicyclists too. Be polite. But if they don't want to listen, call Code Enforcement (954) 831-4000. You can look up the

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
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Well, again, I really don't have anything to rant about this month, but I want to talk a little about Respect.

SYNTHETIC FUEL COULD PARDON MOTORCYCLES FROM ELECTROCUTION

With governments around the world establishing firm deadlines for eliminating gasoline-powered vehicles, the technology that has driven transportation for more than a century isn't ready to go the way of the dinosaur just yet, and combustion engines may be given renewed hope with the advent of synthetic fuels that are nearly as green as going electric.

Synthetic petrol, diesel and aviation fuels are all the subject of heavyweight pilot projects and are gaining interest fast as they eliminate the CO2 emissions from transport without the need for end-users to switch to new tech, according to motorcyclenews.com.

"While biofuels already offset their emissions to an extent, synthetic fuel takes a more direct approach by stripping CO2 from the air and combining it with hydrogen to create a petrol replacement," explains MCN. "By using wind, solar or hydro-electric to generate the electricity for the electrolysis, the process is sustainable, and while engines using the fuel still emit carbon, the same amount is reabsorbed in the fuelmaking process."

The idea of using electricity to create synthetic petrol and then to burn that fuel in combustion engines might seem wasteful but the benefits are also significant, reusing existing infrastructures and giving new life to billions of combustion engines rather than reducing them to scrap. With similar power density to normal petrol, synthetic fuels also mean you don't need to lug vast batteries around. Several synthetic fuel projects are underway, including investments by Porsche and BMW, and the World Rally Championship is due to use 100% sustainable fuel as soon as next year.

While many governments seem keen on switching from combustion tech to all-electric vehicles in order to achieve carbon neutrality, "synthetic fuel could mean that more than 100 years' worth of bikes have a future."

MOTORCYCLE MANUFACTURERS STRUGGLE TO DE-LIVER NEW BIKES

Like other manufacturers struggling with supply chain breakdowns, due in large part to the COVID-19 restrictions worldwide, motorcycle makers are coping with shortages of raw materials and parts and an unreliable global transportation system to fill showroom floors.

Complications from the pandemic have affected many of the logistics and production constraints, but bike firms are facing other challenges in getting motorcycles and parts to customers, including a global shortage of semiconductors, fluctuating demand, unpredictable sales and international trade tensions. Supply-chain disruptions, transportation bottlenecks and labor shortages are now pervasive throughout the motorcycle industry and many others.

COVID's butterfly effect on trade has also left empty shipping containers stranded in some parts of the world and a shortage of them where they're needed, pushing up shipping costs and causing further delays.

One major manufacturer had complete motorcycles aboard the Ever Given, the cargo vessel that ran aground and blocked the Suez Canal shipping lanes, which was subsequently seized by the Egyptian government and remains officially impounded months later.

For consumers, a combination of increasing raw materials costs, shipping difficulties and problems securing parts could lead to price increases as firms battle to meet demand.

INITIAL HIGHWAY BILL CONTAINS MOTORCYCLE-FRIENDLY PROVISIONS

The Investing in a New Vision for the Environment and Surface Transportation in America Act (INVEST in America

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Act; H.R. 3684), a half-trillion-dollar surface transportation reauthorization bill that sets the funding and rules for various ongoing U.S. Department of Transportation programs, specifically highways, transit and rail, has passed initial muster including pro-motorcycle provisions.

On Thursday, June 10, The House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee voted 38-26 along mostly party lines to approve the massive funding measure, which includes three initiatives that would benefit motorcycle riders;

SEC. 3011: STOP MOTORCYCLE CHECKPOINT FUND-ING, not only expands prohibitions on motorcycle-only checkpoints, but also prohibits law enforcement activities that "otherwise profile and stop motorcycle operators or motorcycle passengers using as a factor the clothing or mode of transportation of such operators or passengers."

SEC. 3013: MOTORCYCLIST ADVISORY COUNCIL, reauthorizes the MAC to "advise the Secretary, the Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and the Administrator of the Federal Highway Administration on transportation issues of concern to motorcyclists," including "barrier design, road design, construction, and maintenance practices, and the architecture and implementation of intelligent transportation systems technologies."

The entire 2021 highway bill will next be taken up by the House Ways and Means Committee before advancing to the full House floor.

OREGON GOVERNOR VETOES LANE-SPLITTING BILL

Despite resounding bipartisan support, Oregon Governor Kate Brown (D) has officially vetoed Senate Bill 574, which would have allowed motorcyclists to travel between lanes of slow-moving traffic under certain conditions.

Gov. Brown sent a letter to the House and Senate on May 26 informing them of her decision to veto S.B. 574; "I have several concerns with the bill as currently drafted, particularly related to public safety and noncompliance," Brown wrote in her veto message.

Under S.B. 574, motorcyclists would have been permitted to travel between lanes on multi-lane highways with a speed limit of at least 50 mph, but only when traffic had slowed to 10 mph or less on those roads. Motorcyclists riding between

cars could travel no more than 10 mph faster than the flow of traffic.

Proponents said the bill was a compromise from past attempts to legalize lane splitting in Oregon and drew a distinction between the proposal and the law in California, where riders can travel in between cars at faster speeds.

Supportive motorcyclists testified in favor of the bill in droves, arguing the policy would help riders avoid being rear-ended in stop-and-go traffic, and would help clear congestion. Many pointed to a study from the University of California, Berkeley, that concluded lane splitting can be safe under certain conditions.

California has long allowed lane splitting, and Montana recently passed a law similar to Oregon's failed proposal. Utah now allows riders to "filter" through traffic stopped at an intersection, while Hawaii permits motorcyclists to utilize the shoulder when traffic is congested.

<u>MOTO INDUSTRY REPORTS MOTORCYCLE SAFETY AT</u> <u>AN ALL-TIME LOW</u>

With industries leading the way into a newer, brighter, cleaner future for transport, a new report from Forbes released a series of studies carried out by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) demonstrating that fatality statistics have been fluxing in favor of automobiles and trending against motorcycle safety.

According to the studies cited, motorcycle fatalities have increased to 21.46 fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles driven when measuring intel gathered between 2009 and 2018, meaning that motorcycle riders' risk has been increased by 15-21% -- and equating to 22 times that of automobile drivers.

By contrast, automobile fatalities are at an all-time low, with 1.11 fatalities per 100 million vehicle miles driven stated for the same time frame.

Data like this contributes to creating the Hazard Analysis and Risk Assessments (HARAs), used to determine Functional and Technical Safety Concepts, which guides design requirements for a new vehicle and in turn creates a safer product. "Per a recent 2021 report prepared for Congress," writes Forbes, "The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) has urged NHTSA to address the design of motorcycles including the following:

- requiring motorcycles to meet performance standards for passenger vehicle crash warning systems;

- mandating that new motorcycles manufactured for on-road use come equipped with antilock braking systems; and

- developing standards for stability control systems for on-road motorcycles."

SEATBELTS FOR MOTORCYCLES

A new patent filed by Italdesign reveals a Smart Seatbelt System for motorcycles, describing all-new technology that they believe to be the answer to road safety for riders.

Of course, in the event of accident, riders are frequently taught to let the bike go. Disconnecting from the vehicle can reduce the severity of injuries, as the rider avoids entanglements with the machinery. To suit the seatbelt harness system for such unplanned dismounts, engineers at the Italian design firm equipped the software to detect when it's best to detach the apparatus.

For instance, if the rider t-bones another vehicle, the onboard computer could determine that it's best to lock the user in place, avoiding an additional collision with the vehicle itself. However, that doesn't save the rider from tipping over with the motorcycle or scooter, as two-wheeled vehicles aren't self-balancing. Conversely, in a high-speed crash, the system may eject the rider to decrease the likelihood of injury.

It all sounds a little James Bond-ish, but its inventor hopes the novel idea could attract non-riders, though the system may restrict passenger accommodations and slightly resembles a child's car seat.

<u>A THIRD OF MOTORCYCLISTS WOULD STOP RIDING IF</u> <u>ELECTRIC REPLACES GAS</u>

A new survey conducted by the Motorcycle Action Group (U.K.) has shown that nearly a third of motorcyclists would give up riding rather than switch to an electric-powered motorcycle, reflecting strong opposition to governments' plans to electrify transportation and phase out gasoline engines.

ambitious plan to end the sale of petrol and diesel powered four-wheel vehicles in 2030, and it is presumed the ban will eventually cover all modes of transport.

The participants were asked whether they would be prepared to accept a full ban on petrol-powered motorcycles in future. Of 4,805 respondents, just 8% said they would, while 31% would be prepared to quit riding if their choices were limited to electric models.

For now, motorcycles have been a little forgotten in the government's crusade to get petrol banned, but it likely won't stay that way forever as 55% were 'completely opposed' to the idea of a future without gas-powered motorcycles, while a huge 83% wanted to see groups come together to oppose a ban on petrol and diesel.

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
