Some of ABATE of Florida, Inc.'s Accomplishments

• On July 1, 2000, we had the 30 year old Florida Helmet law repealed; July 1, 2010 was our 10th Anniversary of Freedom of Choice.

• We've become the 4th largest State Motorcycle Rights Organization (MRO) in the country (IN & IL are 1&2, we regularly switch for 3rd & 4th with PA).

• We got the handlebar heights law modified.

• We successfully fought a bill that would forbid our children from riding on our bikes.

• We successfully fought the bill that would confiscate motorcycles for going 30MPH over the speed limit.

• We developed an effective MSAP program that has raised motorist's perceptions and awareness of motorcycles, and have received funding from the State of FL totaling over \$750,000 to promote motorcycle safety and awareness.

- We successfully fought the bill against vertical tags that had over \$1,100 in fines for a first offense.
- Supported and fought for a texting-while-driving ban for the last few years.

• Our 2009-2010 Stiffer Penalties Bill made it through five of the FL House & Senate's committees; this is the farthest it has gone in the number of years we have tried. On the last day of session, a committee member strenuously attempted to attach a revival of the helmet law to our Bill. To avoid a new helmet law in Florida, we had to kill the Bill.

• We publish monthly Press Releases and/or Articles of Interest in many online & print publications, including Florida Full Throttle.

• The President of ABATE of Florida, Inc. has been asked to be on and currently sits as a member of The Motorcyclist Advisory Council (MAC) to the Federal Highway Administration in Washington, D.C. The Secretary of the U.S. Dept. of Transportation may appoint a representative from only two State MROs throughout the entire U.S.A. to be on this council.

• The President of ABATE of Florida, Inc. sits as the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the National Collation of Motorcyclists (NCOM). NCOM has over 1000 member organizations.



You may know us as the motorcycle organization that got the helmet law repealed in Florida or from our motorcycle rights and safety rally's throughout the year. ABATE of Florida is not a club, we are a motorcycle rights & safety organization dedicated to promoting motorcycle safety while remaining ever vigilant of the legislative issues concerning motorcyclists' nationwide.

We Are Not ANTI-HELMET, We are ANTI-HELMET Law!

One of the most popular misconceptions about ABATE is that we are anti-helmet. Nothing could be further from the truth. We are "anti-helmet law" if you choose to ride with or without a helmet it's your choice, it is your right to decide whether wearing a helmet is right for you. ABATE is an organization fighting to protect your rights.



PARTICIPATION

What a great ride it was to ABATE's Annual convergence on the Capitol in Tallahassee. The ride was long and cold to Tallahassee but what a great experience to share and meet with fellow Abate members from all over the state. Abate has 17 Chapters in Florida alone with the oversight by one State Chapter which meets bi-monthly with two delegates from each chapter to discuss the legislative issues that effect motorcyclist throughout the state. The State meeting was on Sunday Feb. 13th, then on Valentine's Day we had a 30-mile Police escorted ride to the Courtyard of the Capitol. Riding into the Capitol courtyard alone is an awesome experience with over 50 Harleys vibrating the windows of our Senators and State Representatives. Our state president gave a great speech on the steps then proceeded with the remembrance of members which passed over the last year with calling out each name individually and the ringing of the bell. Afterwards, all us leather clad bikers, once we got past the metal detectors, walked the halls of the Capitol to meet with the Representatives and discuss the bills we are trying to get passed through legislation and signed by the Governor to become law.

Currently Abate is supporting three Bills, HB 743 – Violations Against Vulnerable Road Users; HB 2573 ABATE of Florida Safety and Education; and SB 1252 Traffic Offenses. I won't go into the details of each Bill but will let you google each one for more information. What I can tell you is that each one has been sponsored by a Representative and has made it to committee hearings. The process alone is long and complicated but through the Abate's full time lobbyist and members support we made it past the first road block. We will see what happens over the next few months and keep you informed.

I must encourage each member to set time aside for next year's Tallahassee Capitol ride. Its through our members participation and voice that we can make a difference to help keep motorcyclist rights from being abused. See you on next year's ride!





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

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ALCOHOL + MOTORCYCLING DON'T MIX

It's no secret that riding motorcycles has its risks. We all accept it and move on enjoying what we love to do...Ride. But that doesn't mean one should throw all safety precautions out the window and just say F*^% it. What doesn't mix is riding motorcycles after having a few drinks. Here are a few facts from the Motorcycle Safety Foundation to ponder on the next time you decide to take a sip then go hope on your bike.

QUICK TIPS:

Theory: Alcohol and Motorcycles Are Incompatible

•At a BAC* of 0.01 to 0.04%, judgment begins to lessen, the drinker is less critical of their own actions, reaction time is slowed, and indications of mental relaxation may appear.

•At a BAC of 0.05 to 0.07%, judgment is not sound, thinking and reasoning powers are not clear, and the ability to perform complex skills is lessened.

•At a BAC of 0.08% or above, judgment and reasoning powers are severely hampered, and the individual cannot complete common simple tasks without error.

•Having any alcohol in one's body increases the chance of crashing by five times.

•Having a BAC greater than 0.05% increases the risk of crashing about forty-fold.

•46 percent of all motorcyclists killed in crashes were using alcohol. That statistic alone should scare the bajezus out of you.

•One fourth of all fatal alcohol-related motorcycle crashes involve motorcyclists running off the road, overturning, or falling from the motorcycle rather than striking another object. Explanation: Alcohol Affects Your Ability To "SEE" SEEsm is the acronym for MSF's strategy to help motorcycle riders maintain a safety margin as well as remain ready and able to respond properly to traffic situations. SEE stands for:

o Search for hazards that might lead to trouble.

o Evaluate how the hazards might interact to create risk; prioritize multiple hazards to deal with one at a time.

o Execute an action to maintain a margin of safety. Alcohol affects these three human elements of safe motorcycle operation by impairing your vision (Search), judgment/decision-making ability (Evaluate), and coordination/reaction time (Execute).

Recommendation: Plan Ahead

•Riders should never mix alcohol with riding. Even low, legal limits of BAC increase your risk while riding a motorcycle.

•Riders who are away from home and decide to drink should either (1) wait until their BAC has returned to zero before riding, even if it means staying overnight, or (2) leave the motorcycle in a secure location and find alternate transportation home.

That's called slavery and too much blood has been spilled for this cause. Many wars have already been fought for men's freedoms. Just in our nation alone, the US divided from Great Britain not only to worship freely, but also find a better way of life no longer enslaved by the Queen. The Civil War was fought in our backyards so yet another kind of slavery could come to an end.

Over 2000 years ago, an even greater war was waged on a cross. Jesus died once and for all so that men and women could be free from the slavery of sin in our hearts. That's right... the enemy of this earth has enslaved us and it's an abomination to God. Jesus came to set us free! Holding anyone captive against his or her will is unlawful. That, my friend, is what the enemy has been doing and he is about to be exposed. John the Baptist was a loud voice heard from the outskirts of town. 



*Educate, don't legislate stuff we thought you might like to know

We were sitting around, talking about Harley-Davidsons and the different things we know about them. It is one of those subjects that you think you know about, but the more you find out, the more you find out you didn't know much at all. Thunder works at a Harley-Davidson dealership too. And when it comes to this company, in particular, founded back in 1903, there is a lot to learn.

We knew that Harley-Davidson was founded by William Harley and Arthur Davidson, but did you know that there were two others, William Davidson and Walter Davidson?

In 1907, when Harley-Davidson was officially incorporated, William Harley was the chief engineer and treasurer, Arthur Davidson was the general sales manager, Walter Davidson was the president, and William Davidson was the works manager.

William and Arthur grew up in Milwaukee, Wis-



consin, a few houses from each other. They were good friends and were obsessed with bicycles when they were young. William worked at a bicycle factory then at a manufacturing company, where he designed his first internal combustion engine. William, Arthur, and a few friends borrowed a lathe and spent a few years trying to build a proto-type motorcycle, but they failed. As with many failures, they learned a valuable lesson, that they needed a machinist. Walter Davidson, Arthur's older brother, was their man. William Davidson, Arthur's oldest brother, a mechanic, also joined them. In 1904, they made their second proto-type, and entered it in a race. It did not win, but that was the beginning of a long history.

Here are some interesting facts:

• The first "factory" was a shed in the Davidson's backyard. The current headquarters is on the same location, but a lot bigger, of course.

• The first motorcycles produced by Harley-Davidson had a single-cylinder engine, and you would pedal until enough engine compression built up, and then the engine took over.

• In 1909, the two-cylinder V-Twin engine was perfected and could reach speeds up to 60mph.

• Harley-Davidson sponsored their own racing team, known for exhilarating performances. Sponsoring a team is common now, but back then, it was revolutionary, and got them a lot of press and sales.

• Arthur, as the sales manager, in 1914, got the USPS to use his bikes to deliver mail

• By the 1950s, police departments nationwide were using Harley-Davidson, and many children like the Wild West look of them, with their boots, breaches, and saddlebags

• Walter Davidson saw an opportunity and started marketing the Harley-Davison brand for clothing and accessories. They now also have expanded into motorcycle insurance, a riding academy, home décor, toys, credit cards, and more. (Go see Thunder, call her, her number is on page 2, and she can show you all kinds of motorcycle clothing)

In 1917, the United States entered World War I, and the military needed motorcycles for the war effort, and Harley was there to help. They sold over 20,000 motorcycles to the U.S. Military. By 1920, Harley Davidson was the largest motorcycle manufacturer in the world, with over 28,000 bikes produced and dealers in 67 countries.

Then came the Great Depression. Sales went from 21,000 in 1929 to less than 4,000 in 1933. Despite this, Harley-Davidson introduced a new line-up in 1934 which included a flathead engine. Also, in order to help them survive the depression, they manufactured industrial powerplants that were based on their engines and built 3-wheeled service delivery vehicle.

Only two American motorcycle manufacturers survived the Great Depression, Indian and Harley-Davidson. Then came World War II, which the United States entered in 1941. Harley-Davidson produced a lot of motorcycles for the military, more than 90,000, and then later, for civilians, a range of large V-Twins that were also successful on racetracks.

In 1969, AMF (American Machine and Foundry, yep, same company that makes bowling balls) bought the company, but sales and quality declined and the company almost went bankrupt. In 1981, AMF sold the company to Vaughn Beals and Willie G. Davidson, grandson of William Davidson.

At that time, Japanese motorcycle manufactures were now importing motorcycles into the US in such volume as to harm domestic producers. President Reagan imposed a 45 percent tariff on imported bikes with engines over 700ccs Rather than trying to match the Japanese, the new management deliberately exploited the "retro" appeal of the machines, building motorcycles that deliberately adopted the look and feel of their earlier machines and the subsequent customizations of owners of that era, and buyers slowly returned.

The "Sturgis" model, boasting a dual belt-drive, was introduced initially in 1980 and was made for three years. This bike was then brought back as a commemorative model in 1991. By 1990, with the introduction of the "Fat Boy", Harley-Davidson once again became the sales leader in the heavy-weight (over 750 cc) market.

Harley-Davidson's association with sportbike manufacturer Buell Motorcycle Company began in 1987, and in 1993, Harley-Davidson bought 49 percent of the Buell Motorcycle Company. Harley-Davidson increased its share in Buell to 98 percent in 1998, and to complete ownership in 2003. In 2009, Harley-Davidson discontinued the Buell liney. The stated reason was to focus on the Harley-Davidson brand.

In 1998, the first Harley-Davidson factory outside the US opened in Manaus, Brazil, taking advantage of the free economic zone there. The location was positioned to sell motorcycles in the southern hemisphere market.

Harley-Davidson hired Elton John to headline their 100th anniversary event on September 1, 2003. Other performers included The Doobie Brothers, Kid Rock, and Tim McGraw.

In 2006, Harley introduced the FLHX Street Glide, a bike designed by Willie G. Davidson to be his personal ride, to its touring line.

Sheila rides a Sportster, so we have to include a little about that here. Introduced in 1957, the Sportster family were conceived as racing motorcycles, and were popular on dirt and flat-track

race courses through the 1960s and 1970s. Smaller and lighter than the other Harley models, contemporary Sportsters make use of 883 cc or 1,200 cc Evolution engines and, though often modified, remain similar in appearance to their racing ancestors.

In 2007, electronic fuel injection was introduced to the Sportster family, and the Nightster model was introduced in mid-year. In 2009, Harley-Davidson added the Iron 883 to the Sportster line, as part of the Dark Custom series.

Okay, enough about the bikes, but who rides them? According to a Harley-Davidson study, around 2008, only 15 percent of Harley buyers were under 35, and the median age is 48. In 1987, the median household income of a Harley-Davidson rider was \$38,000. By 1997, the median household income for those riders had more than doubled, to \$83,000.

Harley-Davidson attracts a loyal brand community, with licensing of the Harley-Davidson logo accounting for almost 5 percent of the company's net revenue. Harley-Davidson still supplies many American police forces with their motorcycle fleets.

From its founding, Harley-Davidson had worked to brand its motorcycles as respectable and refined products. That began to shift in the 1960s, partially in response to the clean-cut motorcyclist portrayed in Honda's "You meet the nicest people on a Honda" campaign, when Harley-Davidson sought to draw a contrast with Honda by underscoring the more working-class, macho, and even a little anti-social attitude associated with motorcycling's dark side. With the 1971 FX Super Glide, the company embraced, rather than distanced, itself from chopper style, and the counterculture custom Harley scene. Their marketing cultivated the "bad boy" image of biker and motorcycle clubs, and to a point, even outlaw or one-percenter motorcycle clubs. After World War II, riders wanting more speed would often shorten the fenders or

take them off completely to reduce the weight of the motorcycle. These bikes were called "bobbers" or sometimes "choppers", because parts considered unnecessary were chopped off. Those who made or rode choppers and bobbers referred to stock bikes as "garbage wagons".

Where did HOG come from? Beginning in 1920, a team of farm boys, including Ray Weishaar, who became known as the "hog boys", consistently won races. The group had a live hog as their mascot. Following a win, they would put the hog on their Harley and take a victory lap. In 1983, the Motor Company formed a club for owners of its product, taking advantage of the long-standing nickname by turning "hog" into the acronym HOG, for Harley Owners Group. On August 15, 2006, Harley-Davidson Inc. had its NYSE ticker symbol changed from HDI to HOG.

William S. Harley, Arthur Davidson, William A. Davidson and Walter Davidson, Sr were, in 2004, inducted into the Labor Hall of Fame for their accomplishments for the H-D company and its workforce.

Enough about Harley, enough!! Well, actually, we could fill another 20 pages. We hope you found this all interesting, a little history lesson in some parts. Next month, we will look at Indian, sticking with the American steel theme.

WHAT TO DO BEFORE AND AFTER A MOTORCYCLE ACCIDENT

YOUR BEFORE IS TO ALWAYS BE PREPARED.

*Have the necessary license or endorsement for your state.

*Always carry your license, registration, motorcycle insurance, and health insurance cards on you when you ride.

*Consider keeping a list of emergency contacts in your wallet. Also consider keeping a list of all medication you are taking, especially of any allergies (like penicillin).

*Research motorcycle injury attorneys and familiarize yourself with your state's motorcycle laws.

WHAT TO DO AFTER AN ACCIDENT.

*Don't say anything to anyone until after you have talked to an attorney. Don't post anything on social media.

*Never apologize or admit to an accident being your fault. Just state the facts. RE-MEMBER everything you say during a 911 call gets recorded.

*Take photos of the accident scene. Take wide-angle shots of the vehicles where they landed before anything is moved. Wide-angle shots of the debris on the roadway before it's cleaned up. Close-up shots of the damage to the vehicles and your motorcycle.


*Talk to witnesses and get their contact information if possible. Insurance is not retroactive – once an accident happens it is too late to add coverage.


*Visit your policy and be sure you know what your insurance coverage is.

*Consider getting GAP insurance if you have a new bike and you finance it.

*If you have a restored classic or vintage bike, look into classic motorcycle coverage.

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
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Johnny's Rant



<u>U.S. MOTORCYCLE SALES CONTINUE UPWARD</u> TREND

New motorcycle sales in the U.S. continued to rise across all segments last year, the Motorcycle Industry Council (MIC) announced. While bike sales continue to improve, it's also worth noting that the Motorcycle Safety Foundation saw enrollment in its basic rider courses grow significantly in 2021 as well, so it's good news all-around with more riders on more bikes.

"In addition to strong sales, we are seeing strong demand for riding training and education," said MIC president and CEO Erik Pritchard. "The Motorcycle Safety Foundation saw an estimated 48% increase in enrollment in 2021 over 2020."

Overall motorcycle sales rose 14.2% over 2020, and 21.8% over 2019 figures, across all segments. That includes scooters, which by themselves rose 19.6% over 2020, and 31.4% over 2019 numbers, while on-road bike sales rose 12.9% over 2020, but what's especially encouraging is sales of dual-sport and off-road bikes. The strange year that was 2020 saw a 46.2% increase in dual sport sales over 2019 numbers, and in 2021 dual-sport motorcycle sales rose an additional 18.6% over those 2020 numbers. Pure off-road bikes also saw sales rise 42.9% in 2021 over 2019.

These marketing figures were gleaned from sales data that the MIC compiles from 14 major

OEMs and distributors across America, and it's an encouraging outlook as we vroom into 2022.

BUMPER YEAR FOR BIKING DESPITE REPEATED COVID THREATS

Amidst the doom and gloom of both winter weather and the lingering effects of the global pandemic, it may come as a surprise that 2021 was one of the strongest years for motorcycling in well over a decade, with new bike sales worldwide on an upward swing and more people joining the twowheeled fold.

Anecdotal evidence from training schools here and across the pond reflected a huge surge of people wanting to get into motorcycling and now the latest data confirms it.

Ducati reports that 2021 was their best sales year on record, up globally an impressive 24% on 2020, which was heavily impacted by Coronavirus, but also a massive 12% up on 2019.

And it's not just Ducati celebrating success either, with BMW announcing 2021 was their best-ever year of global sales - jumping 14.8% from 2020.

Despite concerns an exit from the European Union might hinder growth in the UK, motorcycle sales there increased by 26.6%, spurring a 9.3% rise in registrations.

BRACE FOR DAMAGED SUPPLY CHAIN RECOVERY

With 2021 being the rollercoaster that it was, supply chains around the world have been hit with a crisis of limited product availability: "Starting in 2020, companies reacted to the economic downturn by cancelling production plans for the next year, only to be blindsided by an upswing in demand prompted by rapid vaccine rollouts and fiscal support for rich-world household spending," explains a report from KitCo. "At the same time, virus containment measures and infection clusters triggered labour shortages and factory shutdowns, just as consumer spending was shifting from services to goods."

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Right around this point was when the Powersports market saw an especially huge surge in sales; people had nowhere to go, so they bought bikes and other toys to have fun locally.

Today, restrictions are consistently looser than ever, thanks to the milder Omicron variants -- and with the loosened limitations come a tentatively positive upswing for the market -- an upswing that, if we're lucky, will mean an end to supply shortages and the healing of damaged income streams, predicts webbikeworld.com.

"At some point during this year, we will see a more 'normal situation'," says Soren Skou, head of shipping giant Maersk, who predicts employees will soon return to work at ports, inflating demand for shipment services and thereby contributing to the mending of at least one sector of the supply chain.

All told, executives of Powersports manufacturers are anticipating a hike in raw product prices for 2022.

In the meantime, the global semiconductor shortage has impacted multiple industries, including automotive and powersports. Over 80% of the microchips in products consumed by Americans are manufactured in Asia, whose production has reduced following the pandemic. This has resulted in a severe shortage across the world.

As a result, companies like Bosch have increased investment in microchip manufacturing; however, it will be a while until new players like Intel Corp and Samsung can overcome the current deficit. House Democrats and President Biden are pushing for \$52B of investment in semiconductor production and research to speed up the process further.

For consumers, we've seen vehicle costs rise by over 10-15% the past couple of years due to product shortages and supply chain issues, and this will likely continue until a more permanent solution is found.

<u>STUDY SHOWS THAT ETHANOL IS WORSE FOR THE</u> <u>CLIMATE THAN GASOLINE</u>

Analysis of corn-based ethanol production from end-to-end yields some potentially bad news for this biofuel. While riders have long understood that ethanol can have ill effects on our bikes, a new study published in the "Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences" found that it may have other downsides, too.

Ethanol was supposed to be environmentally advantageous as compared to gasoline, but in the study, researchers dove deeper into how the U.S. Renewable Fuel Standard's outcomes were measuring up to the country's goals. Instead of simply limiting its observations to any one part of the corn-based ethanol production and consumption processes, researchers gathered data on all parts of the ethanol production cycle.

Upon taking important things like land use changes, fertilizer increases, and the like into account, researchers reported findings that corn-based ethanol is 24% more carbon-intensive than gasoline production. If these numbers are even remotely accurate, it's concerning.

"It basically reaffirms what many suspected, that corn ethanol is not a climate-friendly fuel and we need to accelerate the shift toward better renewable fuels, as well as make improvements in efficiency and electrification," lead study author and scientist Tyler Lark said in a statement.

This study's release comes shortly before the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is expected to propose updated 2023 requirements to the country's biofuel policies.

<u>RHODE ISLAND PROPOSES TAX CUT FOR MOTOR-</u> <u>CYCLE RIDERS</u>

Rhode Island has just had a 2022 budget proposal that could potentially provide a "sales tax exemption for the trade-in value of motorcycles."

Governor Daniel McKee's proposed 2022 budget, H 7123, includes motorcycle tax cuts used strictly for pleasure purposes;

(67) Trade-in value of motorcycles

"From the sale and from the storage, use, or other consumption in this state of so much of the purchase price paid for a new or used motorcycle as is allocated for a trade-in allowance on the motorcycle of the buyer given in trade to the seller, or of the proceeds applicable only to the motorcycle as are received from the manufacturer of motorcycles for the repurchase of the motorcycle whether the repurchase was voluntary or not towards the purchase of a new or used motorcycle by the buyer."

Gov. McKee's proposed tax break would only apply to the trade-in value of a bike, or reselling bikes in general, and could be a great way to get new riders on R.I. roads.

UK DECARBONIZATION PLAN EYES E-BIKES

The British government has launched an action plan that it's hoped will help realize the potential electric motorcycles and scooters offer for reducing emissions and congestion. The Motorcycle Industry Association (MCIA) have been working with specialists tasked by the Government to find out what needed to be done to increase the use of smaller electric vehicles.

"Traditionally, powered two-wheelers and other types of PLVs (Powered Light Vehicles) have often been absent from national and local policy due to an underappreciation or lack of awareness of their potential benefits to the environment," says MCIA chief, Tony Campbell. "The launch of this Action Plan is a landmark for our sector, and we look forward to continuing our work with the Government and industry to ensure the full and proper implementation of the Plan's recommendations."

The measures that the MCIA have recommended are broad and far reaching, covering everything from ensuring that licensing laws keep up with the evolution of new electric bikes to building a UK based supply chain to help lower costs. **46**

DANES FACE MOTORCYCLE CONFISCATION FOR 'IN-SANE' RIDING

Danish authorities are confiscating three motorcycles a day for what the authorities are claiming is 'insane' riding. The rules first came into force in March 2021, and in a nutshell, allow the police and authorities to enforce much stricter penalties for what is deemed to be dangerous and illegal riding or driving. Up to and including the offender's vehicle being seized, with seized machines sent off and sold at auction!

The scheme isn't just aimed at residents of the Nordic beauty spot, those travelling in and through the nation are also liable. FEMA (Federation of European Motorcyclists' Associations) reports that anyone touring in or through, holidaying, or on business in Denmark, using two wheels or four is liable to be hit with the same penalties.

The system seems to be working too, as FEMA reports that in the first six months after the new rules came into force, the police seized a total of 510 vehicles, while 623 charges have been filed in 586 cases involving "insane driving."

<u>RESEARCHERS FIND DRIVERS AND RIDERS SEE</u> <u>DIFFERENTLY</u>

A road safety study from England's Bournemouth University has found that drivers and riders on the road see 'different things' and have a very different visual perception of what is going on around them.

The project was led by PhD researcher (and BMW rider) Shel Silva, who assessed the neurological and cognitive influences of motorcyclists and car drivers.

"The brain has developed an interest in things which are threats," explains the report, which found that road users would see larger objects on the road, trucks, buses, and so on, as a greater threat than smaller objects such as motorcycles. Silva also found that a motorcyclist's identification, perception, and knowledge of potential risks

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would change depending on their motorcycling qualifications and experience.

To complete the study, Silva used eye-tracking and interviews using grounded theory to investigate the causes of collisions. It uncovered that a motorcycle rider can be masked by a natural blind spot in the human eye. And that a driver's brain can experience saccadic masking (when the brain fills in the information when moving the eyes from one point to another), potentially causing a motorcyclist to be obscured from view.

Silva recommends making minor lane adjustments prior to a maneuver or turn, which can trigger a visual orienting response to capture drivers' attention.

"The research is suggesting that by understanding motorcyclists' knowledge and identification of risks it is possible to better inform training and materials which appeal to motorcyclists," she said. "It is key to understand that motorcyclists do not need training about how to ride a motorcycle but would benefit from more skills regarding how to read the road and other road users."
