We are all beggars

It seems to me that often times in the church we give a very positive but yet fleeting acknowledgment to Martin Luther in and around the end of October and then we sort of move on to other topics. I am as guilty of this as anyone because of all of the many choices and opportunities we have in the church. But sometimes I wonder how important Luther really is?

How much attention should we give to him and how much credit if any should he deserve? I bring this up in part because November 10 is the anniversary of Luther's death, and also serves as one of the most powerful images For the legacy of his life.

As the story goes Luther in November 1546 was traveling to a small German village named Leitzig where he was going to preach. On the way as he was traveling, he had to take a ferry which carried him over a certain river. The fairy began to take on water and Luther in a note back to his wife said, that that river was "an old Anabaptist woman who is trying to rebaptize him. " as he continued to travel closer and closer to his final destination, he began to feel sick. He couldn't quite put his finger on it, he just didn't feel well and hadn't felt really good for quite some time. By this point in his life, Luther was dealing with all kinds of different issues. He was suffering from phlebitis, he had diabetes and many other health issues. So, as he arrived in the town where he received a place to stay in a small hotel, which was across the street from the church, Luther sort of collapsed that Saturday evening in preparation for the events of the next day.

Sunday morning began with Luther still not feeling well. He hadn't slept particularly well and was not feeling up to preach. As far as his overall health, he mentioned to one of the caretakers as he entered the sanctuary that particular Sunday morning about his particular ailment, but it was shrugged of as the events of worship began to commence. The sermon text that day was Matthew chapter 11 verse 28, which says, "come to me all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Well, Luther, sort of stumbled through the sermon, not feeling a particularly high level of energy or enthusiasm, finished the end of the liturgy, offered the benediction as the service ended. Afterwards, he again return to his room across the street from the church, which would end up being the last sermon he ever preached and the last worship service that he ever presided over. He chose to stay Sunday night, even though his plans originally were to leave and go back to Wittenberg to rejoin his family. On Monday, he woke to discover that he was not improving, but rather getting worse, he seemed of contracted a fever and was becoming a bit disorientated, a doctor was summoned and Luther would spend the next three days in that room his life sort of slipping away. That Thursday, November 10, 1546, Martin Luther would breathe his last. One of the attendances of the hotel shortly after his passing was attempting to sort through his personal effects, when he did this, he came across a small piece of paper up in the breast pocket of Luther's coat. It read, and of course I'm translating from what it would've said in German. "we are all beggars". This is most certainly true. That small sheet of paper served as a sort of eulogy, a sort of swan song for all of Luther's ministry. See even to his dying breath, Luther knew unequivocally that we are all beggars, and if it were not for the saving power of Christ, we would certainly die in our sins. He would say that this is most certainly true that we are completely dependent on, the grace which comes from outside of us and the unique gift of Christ given to us through the promise of faith. To me, this is the enduring legacy of Luther and the Reformation. This to me is the most powerful picture of what this man and this movement achieved, that it truly moved the entire church world away from a pattern labor as a means to satisfy God in order to gain his favor. But, rather a strong move towards faith alone, as the only means of salvation. That is why I think it's important for us to be reminded periodically of the life and ministry of Martin Luther, not just a simply celebrate him on the last Sunday of October, but to be truly reminded that the man who bears our church name is truly someone to be celebrated and that celebration should be a celebration about who Christ is and what he has done for us, the fact that we are truly all beggars with no ability to save ourselves if it were not for Christ. Thanks be to God for the Gospel and the hope that it affords us and thanks be to God for how he used so many countless saints all down through the ages and how he continues to use us even today.

OUR SAVIOR'S LUTHERAN CHURCH COUNCIL MINUTES November 6, 2024

These minutes were recorded at the last council meeting and will be approved at the next meeting.

The OSLC Church Council met for its monthly meeting on Wednesday, November 6, 2024 in fellowship hall. Members present were Sharon Vollmer, Kari Halter, Courtney Thram, Kris Vollmer, Steve Halter, Brian Benedict, Deb Furth, Pastor Steve Walswick, Kevin Graff and Chad Coulter.

President Halter called the meeting to order at 7:00 PM and Pastor Steve led the group in prayer.

<u>Secretary's Report</u>: Sharon moved and Chad seconded to approve the minutes sent out to council members prior to the meeting. Motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Kari reported the October checking balance of \$10,550.25 and savings balance of \$66,488.23. On a motion by Kevin and seconded by Kris, the treasurer's report was approved.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Steve submitted a written report of his activities for October which included visitations, 1 baptism, and several church and community events. He has been asked and will do a service at VVM on the 3rd Monday of each month. In the future, he will conduct the Friday morning Bible Study if Pastor Mike needs help. He recommends that our church try to have a Luther League Mission Trip/Summer Retreat annually and is willing to help facilitate that event.

Committee Reports

Education: Courtney reported that the committee met tonight, Nov. 6, before our council meeting. The confirmation retreat will be Feb. 28 – March 2. The committee feels they will need additional funds to make this happen. Sunday School students will sing at the Nov. 17 service with Prayer Partners and singing at VVM to follow. They are possibly looking at buying new curriculum for Vacation Bible School. The Christmas program will be December 15 at 10 AM with pot luck to follow.



Worship and Music: Sharon reported no meeting.

Life, Growth & Stewardship: Kris reported that they met on October 15. Pastor has not had opportunity to use the caregivers group. Kevin moved and Brian seconded to accept the recommendation of giving our mission endowment of \$1323 to Eight Days of Hope to be used for disaster work. Motion carried. In the future, designations for free will offerings and profits from events will be done prior to events. Lenten meal donations were used for the following: \$100 to purchase a new microwave for the kitchen, \$160 will be used to purchase crockpots and possibly a new knife block and knives, the remainder of \$500, will be given to Mt. Carmel Retreat Center. Ice Cream Social profit was \$650 and will be given to Inspiration Point (confirmation retreat location). 2025 monthly missions were set up with a few changes and some areas that may pivot as the year progresses. Information was shared on the possibility of doing a new church directory. Brian moved and Kevin seconded to pursue a new church directory in 2025 with the cost covered by OSLC. Motion carried. Lenten meals 2025 will begin on Ash Wednesday, March 5, 2025. The committee made a motion to designate funds from these meals to the "church refresh" that is being pursued

<u>Property:</u> Brian reported that the boiler is being fixed. The gutters have been cleaned at the parsonage and leaves raked. There is some work that needs to be done on the stairway wall to the balcony.

DECEMBER MISSION EMPHASIS ~Lamberton City Cemetery~

The Lamberton Cemetery board has initiated plans to install a directory area on the south side of the existing white building.

The project will include the removal of large bushes, repainting the building, replacing the cross, and installing a cement pad where a weather-proof directory table will be placed. This table will feature a newly created directory, thoughtfully mapped out by a Lamberton native, designed to guide visitors through the cemetery. The directory will closely resemble the directory found at the Jeffers Cemetery. (pictures posted for reference)

In addition to the directory, the board envisions further enhancements, including the installation of a flagpole, new bushes, and a bench to offer a peaceful spot for reflection.






