Are you worthy?

The story of Jesus being born in Bethlehem is accompanied by what I would call several different advent characters. These are collections of individuals that we seem to encounter each year in church leading up to Christmas. One of those individuals is John the Baptist. To say that John the Baptist (or as some people call him John the Baptizer) was unique would be an understatement. There was a cartoon that I saw recently of a man looking up to heaven and shouting, "God! If you're up there, tell us what we should do!" Back comes a voice: "feed the hungry, house the homeless, establish justice." The skeptic looked alarmed. "Just testing, he said to me too," the voice replied. John seems to not be that sort of individual. He wasn't testing out discipleship or asking hollow questions, but rather was focused on following God. We're told that he ate grasshoppers, dressed himself in the hide of a camel, and tied a belt around his waist. You might think that this is just a strange collection of unique fashion habits; rather, John is doing something very intentional because he's letting everybody know that he is a Nazarite. There's a collection of these individuals in the Old Testament: Samson and Samuel being very notable examples. These are men who took serious religious vows to abstain from alcohol and any form of idolatry. Even Samson, though, was not nearly as dedicated or disciplined as John. John is considered to be a forerunner of Christ. He was a type of ambassador or someone to pave the way for the coming Messiah. His job was to announce that there was a Messiah coming, what that meant, and how people should prepare for this coming, messianic reign. This was a job that you wouldn't want to sign up for. There are many many challenges that went with this call. Eventually, John would lose his life because of his vocation. In Luke chapter 3 we were told that the ministry of John the Baptist consisted of mainly his call for people to repent. The call to repentance was coupled with a call to baptism. Unlike the other synoptics, Matthew and Mark, Luke's information about John the Baptist is much more concentrated, limiting all information to two sections in chapters 3 and 7. It is the portion of chapter 3 that I want to look at with you today.

Luke is emphasizing a pattern of focusing away from Jerusalem and the temple and Judaism and now focusing on something new. A new religious phenomenon that's emanating from the desert that is being led by people and priests. It is a new religious system predicated not on the law, but on grace. Again, John is the forerunner of this new religious movement. He is the catalyst for inaugurating a new methodology. This new way of thinking and believing is not about the rigid following of law, rather about baptismal Grace and imputed righteousness.

Because of his strong religious dedication and unique character and spirit, John is soon confused with the Messiah. Meaning several people began to come up to him and ask if he is the Christ. In first century Palestinian culture

this would have been normal at the time of Jesus's life. There were many people claiming to be the Messiah as well as many people misidentifying who the Messiah actually was. The question is not out of bounds, but John is very quick to point the question in a much different direction. The first point that John makes is a differentiation between his baptismal practice and the eventual baptismal practices of the Messiah. He claims that he is only baptizing with water, but the one who he refers to as "mightier than he" is coming, and he will be baptizing with the Holy Spirit and with fire. This is an incredible statement because it points directly to a trinitarian model for baptismal regeneration, as well as the Pentecostal experience of the Holy Spirit, raw faith, and what that will inevitably do to the church when it started in the book of Acts. Interspersed here is John's fascinating comment that this Messiah is mightier than he is and someone who he is not worthy even to strap his sandal. Let's put that in a modern vernacular for just a moment. John is saying quite literally that he is not worthy to untie Jesus's shoes, that's the difference between Jesus and him. No, let's ratchet it down for just a moment. Let's take this comment that John makes as profound as it is and contrast it with an incredible statement that Jesus makes about John. Jesus says in Matthew chapter 11, that no one born a woman is greater than John the Baptist. So what Jesus is saying is that John is the culmination of a prophetic line. He's really the greatest of all prophets and he was used in an integral way as the forerunner of a new Messianic era. But even if he's the greatest prophet, he pales in comparison to the Messiah himself. What we're saying, in essence, is that a human being is exactly that-merely human-and cannot even be compared with the divine. Which of course, causes a tremendous problem. If I am human and I am wanting to interact with immortality how can I do that? How can I receive heaven if my humanity is getting in the way? I'm not worthy. It is at this very moment where the gospel again is preeminent because in our moments of inadequacy and intense feelings of unworthiness is where God once again comes to us full of grace and truth. God comes to us with a message of forgiveness and reconciliation with him, which can make us worthy again. Not worthy in our own works, but rather our worthiness and value comes exclusively from Him. John saw his unworthiness, his unique inability to even untie the shoes of Jesus. Perhaps you feel much the same way? So once again, this season is a wonderful opportunity for us to see why Jesus came. Jesus came to an entire created order of people, knowing that they were universally unworthy, and he came sacrificially to give them worth. You have value today because of Jesus. You are declared to be worthy not because of anything you have done but because of what Christ has done for you.

President Halter called the meeting to order at 7:03 PM and Pastor Steve led the group in prayer.

<u>Secretary's Report</u>: Kari moved and Chad seconded to approve the minutes sent out to council members prior to the meeting. Motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Kari reported the November checking balance of \$19,359.65 and savings balance of \$66,488.23. On a motion by Sharon and seconded by Kevin, the treasurer's report was approved.

Pastor's Report: Pastor Steve submitted a written report of his activities for November, which included personal contact visitations, 1 baptism, 1 funeral and several church and community events. A recommendation had come from a member that the Bible verses might be posted on the hymn number board. Council members felt there was not enough room there and that they are already printed in the bulletin, on the screens and announced when being read.

Committee Reports

Education: Courtney reported no meeting, but announced that the Christmas program on December 15, 2024, will be at 10:30 AM and not at 10:00 AM, as previously stated. Pot luck will follow the 10:30 program. There will be no Sunday School on December 22 and 29. Sunday School will resume on Sunday, January 5, 2025.

Worship and Music: Sharon reported no meeting, but a change in serving communion will be made by placing individual communion cups on small plates. She also stated that the Christmas Eve service will be on Tuesday, December 24, 2024 at 5 PM.

Life, Growth & Stewardship: Kris reported no meeting. She did report that the new photo directory pictures will be taken Thursday, Friday and Saturday, March 27, 28 and 29, 2025 by Holly Rohlik from Studio Z Photography. Life, Growth & Stewardship committee will meet with her after the holidays to set up a plan and expectations of her and OSLC.

Wedding policy: The current OSLC wedding policy was discussed at length and updates were made. Kris moved to submit the updates for the OSLC wedding standards and practices to Nicole to be printed. Brian seconded. Motion carried.

<u>Pastor evaluation:</u> The pastoral evaluation done by a council committee was shared with the entire council and reviewed. The evaluation will be kept on file. This is a procedure that needs to be done annually.

New Business

<u>Church office hours</u> – Nicole has requested that the church office be closed between Christmas and New Year's. Brian moved to accept this request and Kris seconded. Motion carried.

<u>Church employee job descriptions</u> – Do we have these? If not, need to be made and all employees to have a copy of their particular job description. Annual evaluations should also be looked at for all employees.

Motion was seconded by Sharon. Motion carried.
