A Season of Reflection

"As water reflects the face so one's life reflects the heart." ~Proverbs 27:19



February is a perfect time for us to reflect on the season of Christmas that has past and the season of Lent that approaches. In the weeks after Epiphany our lessons and readings show us the full glory of Christ's life and prepare us for Lent: the Baptism of our Lord, the calling of the disciples, and the Sermon on the Mount. When Mary and Joseph present Jesus at the Temple, Simeon addresses Mary about her son's future. Her son will be a light for the nations and the glory of Israel, but 'a sword will pierce [her] heart,' thus foreshadowing Jesus' passion and death.

These weeks after the Epiphany present us with time to reflect on the implications of all of these events and to prepare for the coming weeks. On a personal level, we reflect on the coming Lenten season and what our practices might be for the spiritual journey ahead of us. As a church body we can reflect on our business here at St. Paul's. We can look back at a year of growth and change and look forward to new opportunities. We have just elected four new Vestry members, welcomed over fifty new members to our congregation, increased the number of services, and formed new fellowship opportunities. We can look ahead to where we might want to go as a church, what projects should receive our attention, and where we might best be able to serve or give our time.

Just as we reflect on and study the life of Christ, we also turn our attention inward and look to ourselves. Are we who Christ wants us to be? In all things let our positivity and love of Christ, and each other, reflect out into the community and the world.

In this Epiphany season, we have been recalling the many ways Jesus manifested God's glory in his earthly life. This glory is like a bright beautiful light that shines in the darkness. It is a bright light seen as a star from far away by magi seeking a king, a warm light in our hearts that we feel when we know Jesus is with us through it all no matter what, and it is the convicting light of truth that changes us, as it did St. Paul.

As Christians we are witnesses to Jesus's light. The question is what do we do with it? One word that keeps coming to my mind is "reflection" which means to bend back. In the Letter to the Colossians, Jesus is called the visible image (icon) of the invisible God. In other words, Jesus is the perfect reflection (the mirror image) of God.

There are two ways we can reflect - one is backward looking and the other is forward looking.

The first kind of reflection is the bending of our thoughts backward in time, remembering and evaluating the past. Looking back at this past calendar year (my first as your Rector), we have experienced growth in several dimensions: New members have joined our parish family, our physical property has been beautified, and we have added and renewed ministries. Indeed, it has been a year of growth and change and there is growth on the horizon.

Scripture has positive things to say about growth. Creation and recreation are God's movement of change and growth in the world. In the Pauline corpus and the Gospels we are exhorted to grow into the image and likeness of Christ. And the Book of Acts celebrates the exciting growth of the early church. So, growth is generally a really good thing. Yet, as we reflect on the growth that God is manifesting at St. Paul's we should also reflect on the potential danger that such growth becomes untethered from faithful worship, care and concern for each other, and unity of purpose. An honest reflection of our past will always reveal those places where we fell short and in so doing we have the opportunity to repent, receive forgiveness, and begin again. Indeed, self-reflection is the basis for the wonderful gift of forgiveness and the pattern of Lent which will soon be upon us.

Richard Hooker, the 16th century Archbishop of Canterbury, taught that Scripture, Tradition, and Reason are the three-legged stool of theological reflection. Education for Ministry (EfM) teaches a four-source model that uses Scripture, Tradition, Experience, and Culture as the reflective criteria. I commend these models of theological reflection to you. Without a faithful way of looking back at the past we will inevitably be tossed about by mere opinion or worse.

The second kind of reflection is about bending Christ's light back into the world – into the future – like a lighthouse that amplifies and redirects the light. Our calling is to be a visible representation to the local community and the world about this person we know as the Son of God, Jesus our Lord. Is what we do as a church a proper reflection of Him? Our reflection may be the first glimmer that others have of Christ. Will they see in us that light of love which welcomes the stranger and gives sacrificially? Will they see in us the image and likeness of Jesus? As I look back on the countless acts of love performed by the family of St. Paul's, I am confident that the answer will be a resounding "Yes."

This two-way idea of reflection will be even more tangible as we research St. Paul's past in preparation for our upcoming 75th anniversary as a church. I hope that you will join a committee that suits your interests (see page nine for details). Our goal is 100% participation! As we honor our past while we will draw new inspiration from it that will enable us to reflect Christ beautiful light well into the future.





Word of the Month: Verger



The **verger** is a lay minister who assists the clergy in the conduct of worship, especially in the marshaling of processions.

The history of the verger dates back to the middle ages when the verger was the "Protector of the Procession." He would lead the way, making room for the proces-

sion to enter the church from the town square, and with his virge (mace) in hand would literally clear the way if necessary.

The basic vestment of the verger is a black cassock. The ministry of vergers is supported and encouraged by the Vergers' Guild of the Episcopal Church.

Rev. Frank Hughes Teaches about St. Paul



Fr. Frank Hughes has been with us since January 25 sharing his expertise on the Corinthian letters. After Paul's conversion he became one of the most prolific apostles of Christ, writing many of the New Testament letters we read today. St. Paul's letters are the earliest writings by Christians to be written, collected, and understood to be Holy

Scripture. They are earlier than the gospels, in the form in which we have the gospels.

Fr. Hughes has studied and written extensively on the Pauline letters; he is the coauthor with Robert Jewett of *The Corinthian Correspondence: Redaction, Rhetoric*,

and History This is an extraordinary opportunity to have such a scholar with us, anxious to teach us about our patron. Fr. Hughes deconstructs these fragments and letters, letting us examine them in



an entirely new way with a new perspective.

In February there will be three more sessions with Fr. Hughes: Wednesday, **February 1**, Sunday, **February 5**, and then again on Wednesday **February 8**. Even if you have missed previous sessions you won't want to miss these last ones!

Lenten Book Study



The Wednesday Night Rector's
Forum book study begins **March 1**with *Walking the Way of Sorrows:*Stations of the Cross by Katerina
Katsarka Whitley. The book consists
of fourteen monologues, one for
each station, and is told from the
perspective of one of the witnesses.
For example, Mary of Nazareth
narrates one station while an arrest-

ing officer narrates another. This gives an entirely new perspective to each station and takes us deeper into the story of the crucifixion. There are a few copies available in the office if you would like one. They are also available on Amazon.

Godly Play Workshop Coming in March



A young child's Christian formation is one of the most important responsibilities a church accepts. Christian formation is a lifelong process, a lifelong growth in the knowledge, service, and love of God as followers of Christ. We want our children to learn about Jesus through age appropriate and engaging lessons. And so, to ensure this happens at St. Paul's, after much study and research, we have made the decision to use the Godly Play curriculum in Sunday School this fall. With a refurbishment of the East Wing scheduled and a new curriculum, it is time to get excited about Sunday School!

Godly Play has a Montessori based foundation and uses tactile objects that the children can handle and manipulate as they make their spiritual journey. "The spiral curriculum works through three sets of three-year intervals based on the progression of language acquisition: Hear It (ages 3-6), Speak It (ages 6-9), and Think It (ages 9-12). Yet because spirituality and Christian language acquisition are lifelong journeys, use of the Godly Play method has quickly grown to include adults" as well.

Teresa Phares is with the Diocese of Oklahoma and is a certified US Trainer in Godly Play. She attended the School of Theology at the University of the South and received her M.A. in Theology. She will visit St. Paul's **Saturday, March 4** to conduct a workshop on the curriculum for Sunday School teachers, prospective teachers, parents, and anyone who wants to learn more about this exciting program. On

Sunday morning she will then lead a session of Godly Play in the East Wing during Sunday School. This is a wonderful opportunity!

Learn More about Religious Life Sunday



The General Convention of the Episcopal Church in 2022 approved a resolution that designated the 3rd Sunday of Epiphany as the annual date to observe "Foundation of Religious Life Sunday" which this year was on January 22. The intent of this resolution focuses efforts to tell all Episcopalians that residential monastic and dispersed Christian communities exist.

Religious communities in The Episcopal Church include monastic communities whose members live together under a rule of life and under vows such as poverty, chastity, and obedience. It also includes dispersed Christian communities whose members are from all walks of life, who have jobs, who live in their own homes, some with families, and who live under religious vows. These communities teach about prayer practices, lead retreats, give spiritual direction, and provide spiritual friendship.

You may perceive a call to a deeper commitment with one community as an associate or oblate. Such commitments begin with discernment and preparation, followed by a formal service of commitment. If you are experiencing a call to join a community, you might consider reaching out to one of these Episcopal religious communities. Visit The Conference of Anglican Religious Orders in the Americas online which is the conference associated with The Sisters of St. Mary, Southern Province in Sewanee, Tennessee where Sister Hannah lives who visited us last year. You might also visit the National Association of Episcopal Christian Communities to learn more. Highlights from the December 19 Vestry meeting:

 School.

- A committee has been formed to oversee renovation of the Memorial Garden: Joe Corby, Julia Gahagan, Matt Abrams, Mike Nichols, Bobby Horne, and John Phillips, plus the new 2023 Jr. Warden. Fr. Michael is an *ex officio* member.






