It is summer at St. Paul's and you may be tempted to think that things slow down a bit, and in some things, they do, but there is still a lot going on!

As Fr. Michael noted on Pentecost, our ministries are on fire!

Vacation Bible School just completed four fun-filled days with over fifty children singing, making crafts, and

learning about Jesus.

Throughout June, St. Paul's Day School hosts summer camp with a different theme each week. The children's joyful voices fill the Parish Hall as they sing and cheer each morning.

The Matthew 25 group meets every Tuesday afternoon, even in summer, to prepare food for the basketball boys at Common Ground. If you are looking for a rewarding place to volunteer, come to the Parish Hall on Tuesday afternoon to help out! Or come to Common Ground Wednesday afternoons to pack snack bags for the campers each week.

A Message from Mtr. Sara



Dear People of St. Paul's,

Fr. Michael has graciously yielded his front-page real estate so that I can tell you a little about myself. I'll tell you first: I am absolutely delighted to be here and grateful for the warm welcome I've received.

Some folks have heard the basics, but maybe not everybody: I have just graduated with an STM (Master of Sacred Theology) – it's a seminary degree with a thesis – from Sewanee, the University of the South, and was ordained a deacon on May 16. I hope to be made a priest in about six months. I have a two-year curacy, so I will continue to serve St. Paul's for eighteen months as a priest; and then we'll just have to see what the Holy Spirit is getting up to.

Now, to answer some frequently asked questions:

What do we call you? I will answer to most things, as long as I know you mean me – but Mother Sara is usual.

Where are you from? My dad was in the Coast Guard most of the time I was growing up, and I have never managed to shake the habit of moving every three or four years, so I've lived in Maryland (three different times), New York, Florida, North Carolina, Tennessee (twice), Alabama, Texas, Georgia, Michigan (three different towns), and Pennsylvania. I graduated high school in North Carolina, and I've lived in Sewanee or Michigan longer than most anywhere, so I'll usually pick one of those if pressed.

Were you really a firefighter? Yes, volunteer, for three years during seminary. We did structural firefighting, some wildland, mountain rescue, and vehicle extrication (though I tended to engineer the vehicle calls). It was one of the most formative parts of seminary and where I made some of my best friendships. I do not plan to fight fires here, but I am working on the paperwork to serve as one of the chaplains for Shreveport FD.

How many degrees? Too many. I tried to avoid my call to ordained ministry, first by teaching – including college – and then through music ministry. And of course, seminary is another graduate program. But now I am where I'm supposed to be, so while there might be one more theological degree in my future, that really will be the end of it.

At the time of writing, we have not yet gotten back into the office – but that move is imminent! So, if you would like to pose a less-frequently-asked question or to tell me a little about yourself, I hope you will stop by soon for a chat. I'm looking forward to getting to know each one of you.

Altar Guild Word of the Month: Linens



When we think of altar linens, the colorful hangings and maybe a purificator come to mind. You may not even know what a purificator is, but if you kneel at the altar for Holy Eucharist, you have seen one each time the worship leader wipes the edge of the chalice after you sip from it or places it on the underside of the chalice as it is offered to you for intinction. But there are other linens that are integral

parts of the altar setting as it is prepared for Holy Eucharist. Each one has a special meaning.

The long linen cloth that covers the surface of the altar and hangs down each end is called the fair linen, which represents Christ's burial cloth. It has five crosses embroidered on it, one at each corner of the altar and one in the center. They represent the five crucifixion wounds of Christ.

A square linen cloth called the corporal has a small cross embroidered near its front edge, and it is the cloth on which the chalice is placed. It also represents one of Christ's burial cloths. The word "corporal" refers to the body.

The chalice (silk) veil and burse are placed over the chalice and paten prior to celebrating Holy Eucharist, and they match the liturgical colors of the altar hangings and other paraments.

Other pieces of linen include the credence cloth, which covers the credence table, the lavabo towel used for the priest's ritual hand washing, and the linen veil, which may be placed over consecrated elements left at the end of the Eucharist.

St. Paul's Altar Guild is made up of dedicated members (both men and women) whose privilege it is to set the Eucharistic table for Holy Communion several times each week. 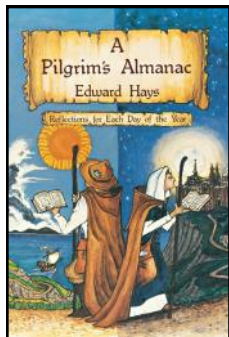
Fr. Michael at Hardtner's First Camp

Children stay in cabins with their counselors and cabin mates and begin creating bonds that can last a lifetime. Guardians also stay in cabins separate from their children, and participate fully in the daily camp activities and be campers themselves.

What is Fr. Michael Reading?

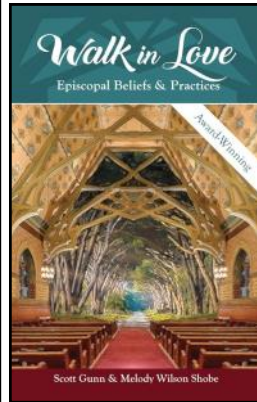
Fr. Michael always has a book in his hand, but what is he reading now?!



His latest book is [A Pilgrim's Almanac](#) by Edward Hays. With a brief reflection for each day of the year, this almanac is appropriate for every year. These wise and challenging meditations celebrate seasons, famous birthdays, dates of wondrous inventions, historical occurrences, and sacred observances.

Fr. Edward M. Hays (1931-2016) is the author of more than thirty books on contemporary spirituality. He was the cofounder and moving spirit of Forest of Peace Publishing and founding director of Shantivanam, a Midwest center for contemplative prayer. He has served as a chaplain of the state penitentiary in Lansing, Kansas, parish priest, and spiritual director. Hays spent extended periods of pilgrimage in the Near East, the Holy Land, and India, and was a prolific writer and painter.

Collecting Healthy Snacks for Common Ground



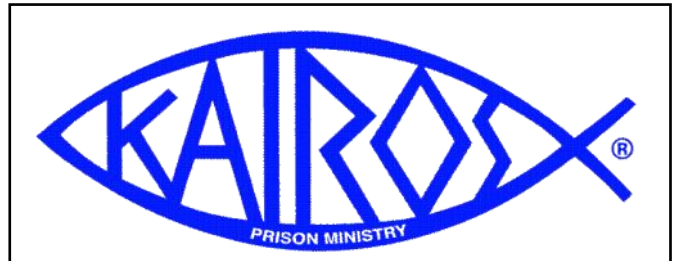

Kairos is Back and Training Dates are Open



Kairos is a prison ministry with a mission to develop a Christian community on the inside of a prison. The servants/volunteers show the love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ during a 3½ day Kairos Weekend through talks, meditations, chapel visits, music, listening and loving. After the weekend, small groups called Prayer and Share meet on a weekly basis; monthly Reunions are also held with the free world volunteers in attendance. By having a front row seat to God's miracles, we are blessed by the participants through His blessings. Kairos means "In the fullness of time" or "God's Special Time."

Not everyone is called to go into prison to serve our Lord, but those who do find it incredibly rewarding. Our service reaches into David Wade Correctional Center, a medium/maximum security facility located near Homer, La.

A Kairos team comprises two equally important sub-teams—the group that goes inside the prison, and the group that handles all weekend logistics, including meal preparation, delivering supplies needed for the weekend, and prayer support for each speaker on the inside team. Only men serve inside the prison, but both men and women may serve and are needed on the support team.

The next Kairos weekend will be September 17 - 20, 2026.

There will be four team formation meetings prior to the weekend, and attendance at a minimum of three is required for team participation.
