Growing Together in Times of Change



Change is in the air; fall is coming, football season is here, and the kids are back in school with all of the activities that brings. There are changes here at St. Paul's as well with new programs, new fellowship, and new opportunities for spiritual growth.

The Day School begins another new school year with bright new faces, and as a church body we have welcomed many new congregants. Growth and change can occasionally be trying or stressful but in the end it bonds us together in strength and faith. Change is what separates us from stagnation.

The fall brings some new things to be excited about: beginning **September 15**, Mickey Quinlan will lead a new Men's Bible Study in the Parlor at noon each Thursday which will cover the lectionary each week, and The Brotherhood of St. Andrew is reforming and will meet every third Saturday in the Parish Hall, beginning **September 17**. Father Michael is adding a new service to the worship calendar with a weekly Healing Eucharist with Laying on of Hands and Anointing. This service from *The Episcopal Church Book of Occasional Services* offers readings and prayers geared toward healing the mental and physical burdens we may bear. The calendar also features a new Fellowship Breakfast on the second Sunday of each month which will take place during the Sunday School hour. It is a time we can come together as a church family and share fellowship over a Continental breakfast. The September date will feature a waffle bar along with the usual offerings, and the EYC will offer a gourmet coffee bar as a fundraiser.

In his book *Life Together*, Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote "The more genuine and the deeper our community becomes, the more will everything else between us recede, the more clearly and purely will Jesus Christ and his work become the one and only thing that is vital between us." That is, after all, our ultimate goal as we grow stronger together in faith and love.



Did you know there is such a thing as healthy conflict?

St. Paul's is in a period of growth and renewal. The Lord is doing this, and it is exciting! But with growth comes conflict just as sure as night follows day. These conflicts involve use of resources like meeting space, budgets, time allocation, and attention. Conflicts also manifest over ministry and mission direction, and even personalities.

We have a biblical rule that helps us in our situations of conflict that comes from Matthew 18: 15-17. In this passage we are taught to bring our complaints directly to the one with whom we have a conflict. If the person won't hear us, then bring another person along and try again. If that doesn't make progress, then the leadership of the church may get involved. Note the direct approach. There is no triangulation or gossip, only direct communication, because persisting in complaints or gossip and not letting the past be the past (in other words, not forgiving) hurts the church.

As a child in an alcoholic family, I experienced a lot of unhealthy conflict. Disagreements often escalated into irrational and hurtful fights. I understand now that my parents were acting out of their wounds which they had not processed well. As I look back at the conflicts of my family of origin I see now that it could have been different. There is such a thing as healthy conflict!

Healthy conflict involves open and respectful discussion between parties in which stakeholders feel heard. We exchange ideas and perspectives. We assume the best about each other's intentions. We recognize Christ in each other. If we find ourselves dealing with our complaints by spreading them to others or talking badly about others, then we have a problem with our own heart.

Healthy conflict ends with a plan to move forward. If feelings have been hurt, then apologies are made. Forgiveness is asked for and given. Healthy conflict brings the parties to a new and better understanding of each other. Healthy conflict reflects the kind of community that honors Jesus. For the most part, this describes my experience with conflict at St. Paul's so far. There has been a good bit of change (a new Rector is probably the biggest change of all!) and there are new people getting involved, new programs, and fellowships. Naturally, there has been some conflict, but I'm glad to say it has been mostly healthy. May all our internal conflicts be healthy!

If you are interested in learning more about how to be a person committed to healthy conflict, I recommend the book **Antagonists in the Church**. It focuses on identifying and correcting toxic behavior that must be identified and corrected. Copies are available at the office.




Parishioner Profile: Heather Adcock

When the call sounded for Sunday school teachers, Heather Adcock quickly responded. Heather has a degree in Early Childhood Education and taught in both Caddo and Bossier parishes at one time. "I'm so glad to see Sunday School get started again," Heather said. "It's so important!"

The Sunday school teachers rotate every few weeks; Heather is currently teaching with Angie Abrams and they have the three to five year old group. "We are following the Gospel and the Propers for each week so the family can follow the same lessons," she explained. For example, one recent Sunday they studied the parable of the woman who was bent over for 18 years and how Jesus healed her. Then the children celebrated with a rousing rendition of "Heads, shoulders, knees, and toes" and the "Hokey Pokey" using all of their body parts. "You have to do what is developmentally appropriate" with these little ones, Heather said.

Heather has an infectious positive attitude and is so excited about teaching Sunday school and working with these children. What a blessing she, and all of our Sunday school teachers are.



What is Tithing?

Tithing can generally be described as our regular monetary support of the church. It's the money we contribute to fund the operations of the church that enable us to fulfill our mission to live and spread the Good News that Jesus Christ is the Lord and Savior of all. Our giving to the church is, therefore, a Holy endeavor, a spiritual matter. In our giving we are making a statement about what we value, and we are keeping our promise to love the Lord with all that we are and all that we have.

As with all our spiritual endeavors, there is a practical side as well. It takes money to worship the Lord together, to provide space and programs for fellowship and Christian education. Clergy and staff, buildings, utilities, and maintenance, outreach – they all cost money. This has been true since the beginning of worshipping communities as far back as The Bible tells us. The Tithe in those days was very specifically calculated. It was 10% of one's wealth (which is what the word tithe literally means). In addition, other offerings were required from time to time. Historically, then, 10% has been considered the minimum amount to offer back to God through the church.

10% is an easy number to figure, but sometimes difficult to muster. In some circumstances and seasons in our lives, it's just not possible. Our economic realities can get out of whack for any number of reasons. And it is likely the case that those reasons we cannot tithe are also at the core of situations in our lives that need ministering to and healing. That's okay! No one should feel embarrassed or 'less than' for being unable to make a full tithe. Progress in our healing and progress and in our spiritual disciplines ought to be prayed for and sought after.

The theme for this year's stewardship campaign is Joyful Giving. Whatever we can pledge to give for the new calendar year – let it be from a joyful heart.

There are many working parts in a beautiful worship service and it is safe to say that our Acolytes play an important role. The word "acolyte" means "attendant" or one who helps. Duties may include carrying in the cross, book bearer, torch bearer, or offering person. These young people assist the priest and enhance the worship service. Centering Prayer Workshop

You will leave the workshop having gained another spiritual practice to allow greater intimacy with God. Our workshop presenter, Pamela Begeman, has been specially trained to give these workshops, and will present the history and method of this simple way to draw closer to God in our everyday lives.

Pamela Begeman is a daily practitioner and commissioned presenter of both Centering Prayer and the Welcoming Prayer. She co-creates and facilitates many of the Contemplative Outreach worldwide online retreats, programs and publications. She is also one of the creators and editors of *The Contemplative Life Program*, a series of 40-day booklets on contemplative practices and dispositions. Her daily spiritual practices root her in the present and Presence while being an active wife, mother, grandmother and professional. She serves as communications and program coordinator for the international office of Contemplative Outreach and lives in Austin, Texas. She also serves on the executive committee of <u>The Meditation Chapel</u>, a Zoom-enabled worldwide prayer chapel for people of all contemplative practices and spiritual traditions.

We will have two sessions of Centering Prayer during the workshop, with plenty of chances to ask questions, and leave knowing that we have taken another step on our spiritual journey. What if you attend just to try it out, and it ended up changing your life? Lunch will be provided on site. Come and join us.



Turn Your Face to the Son by Dianne Buddecke Howell



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
I thought of Malachi 4:1-2. The critical passage for believers reads, "...But for you who fear My name the Sun of righteousness will rise with healing in its wings; and you will go forth and skip about like calves from the stall..." The word for "sun" (Hebrew "semes" - to be brilliant; the sun) serves as a spiritual reference to the healing power of the One we worship, the Son of God, who brings healing and wholeness to every situation in which we *turn to Him*.

Scripture gives many examples of people who *chose to focus on Jesus* in the midst of difficult circumstances. Mark 5:25-34 tells of a woman who had suffered hemorrhages for twelve years and spent all her money to no avail. *In spite of the dense crowd*, she told herself, "If I can just touch his robe, I will be healed." She did, and was. Mark 10:46-52 tells of Bartimaeus, blind from birth, who, *in spite of naysayers in the crowd*, "kept crying out all the more." Jesus heard, stopped, called for him and healed him. In Matthew 8:5-13, a Roman Centurion who *came to Jesus in humility* received healing for his servant as well as a commendation of his great faith.

On September 4, St. Paul's will initiate a Blessing of the Oils and Anointing in the 10:30 a.m. service, followed by the first Weekly Eucharist with Healing and Anointing on September 7.

This is a unique offering not available in every church. If you are in need of *any kind of healing*, you can - like the heliotropic Daisy and our Biblical brothers and sisters turn your face to the Son, follow His leading, press into His love, cry out for His mercy and come to Him expecting balm for your deepest needs. He longs to bless you. Isaiah 30:8.

Brotherhood of St. Andrew Prayer, Study, and Service



One of the oldest ministries in the Episcopal Church is <u>The Brotherhood of St. Andrew</u>, founded in 1883. This worldwide organization has 357 U.S. chapters and over four thousand members. The mission statement of the BSA is simple: "To bring men and youth to Christ." They do this through prayer, study, and service.

The organization's website notes that "Brothers are quick to respond with both manpower and money during national emergencies, such as Hurricane Sandy in 2012 and during the deadly year of 2013, when an explosion devastated the town of West, Texas, a tornado levelled Moore, Oklahoma, and tsunami struck northern Japan," but says that what really holds it together is the fellowship.

At St. Paul's we are bringing back our Brotherhood of St. Andrew chapter under the rule of this national organization and charter. The group will meet every third Saturday of each month with the first meeting taking place **September 17** in the Parish Hall. Stith Bynum is the contact person if you'd like to find out more.

This will be the primary men's group at St. Paul's; additionally, the new Thursday Men's Bible Study group will start in September and there is a Men's Fellowship Group that meets currently every Friday morning at 6:30 a.m. in the Warden's room, which will continue to meet.

Betsy Dunkle Shares WWII Memorabilia



Prompted by discussions during the Wonderful Wednesday study of Bonhoeffer's *Life Together*, Betsy Dunkle has shared a piece of interesting family memorabilia with us. This is her father's Episcopal Service Cross; the medallion was given to Episcopal service members during World War II to remind soldiers of their faith.

Quick online <u>research</u>

indicates that the design of the medal was to meet several criteria: the pendant should avoid sharp points; second, the design should be anchored by the ancient Crusader's Cross, which is composed of five crosses symbolizing the five wounds of Christ; third, it should have engraved upon it "Christ Died for Thee," a quotation from the Service of Holy Communion found within the Book of Common Prayer: "*Take and eat this in remembrance that Christ died for thee, and feed on him in thy heart by faith, with thanksgiving.*"; and fourth, "The Church War Cross" was to be inscribed across the back of the medallion.

Betsy's father was a surgeon in the 121st Station Hospital in Braintree, England during the war and she will be sharing some fascinating history with us in the next issue!



Collect for September 29: Saint Michael and All Angels


Everlasting God, you have ordained and
