Make a Joyful Noise

Make a joyful noise to the Lord, all the earth.

Worship the Lord with gladness;
come into his presence with singing.

Psalm 100:1-2

Joyful noises come in different tones, but many a joyful noise can be heard around St. Paul's as the school year has begun and our campus is filled with exuberant children once again. Children singing songs in chapel each morning creates a cacophony of joyful noise! The sound of their sweet prayers, squeals on the playground, and purposeful learning in the classrooms fills the soul.

Other sounds are sparking joy too: a new Sunday afternoon worship

service gives us one more opportunity to praise God. Wonderful Wednesday has returned where joy abounds: the Simple Eucharist, a fine meal and fellowship, and of course the programs. King's Club is it's own kind of joy! Young Voices rehearses on Wednesday evenings and the sound of praise fills the choir room.

The restoration of the St. Paul's Casavant organ is ongoing and excitement is growing toward that date when the organ once again plays notes that have been silent for too long. Donations are coming in for the organ as parishioners are giving generously in support of this very important facet of our worship. The organ restored to its full glory will truly be a joyful noise.

There is much activity around campus from contractors and maintenance workers. Doors are being painted, windows cleaned, and even the resealing and protecting of the two stained glass windows are all to preserve this beautiful space where we work for the greater glory of God. The sound of power equipment can be joyful in its own way.

In some cases, it is parishioners, rather than contractors, doing the work, from weeding flower beds to building a pergola for the day school. Parishioners coming together for the greater good is just one way we can show our love for Jesus.

Make a Joyful Noise

The King James Version of Psalm 100 begins: "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands. Serve the Lord with gladness: come before his presence with singing." Indeed, these are some of the happiest words in all the Psalter. But we usually don't think of noise as being joyful, do we?

At a technical level, all sounds are simply vibrations travelling through media like air and water. When they reach the human ear, the waves move down the ear until they hit the eardrum. The eardrum vibrates and forwards the signal on to small bones in the middle ear, which amplify them. Eventually, hair-like cells in the inner ear pick up these vibrations and transform them into electrical signals that the brain can process. Finally, the sound is processed by the brain, interpreting it. Do we sing along to the music, or do we put our hands over our ears? Is it music or is it sound? Truly we are wonderfully and fearfully made to have such an amazing God-given capacity.

Noise is a sound we think of as unpleasant or cacophonous. To us, noise happens randomly and without a good purpose. The exhortation in our psalm to make a joyful noise, thus sounds like a contradiction. We wonder what the psalmist could mean. For one, I think we are supposed to reevaluate what we think of as noise and focus instead on the joyful part. Around the church property there are many sounds emerging that can sound to us like noise.

The children are back for a new school year, and they are making joyful noises on the playground. Young life has not yet learned to suppress or refine its sounds. It comes out bursty in spontaneous outburst. This reminds us of the reality that God is here, breaking through to meet us. And it makes a sound.

The door and window fixers are scraping and sanding. They are using all kinds of machines and making all kinds of sounds. In chapel as Mrs. Rose is telling the story of Noah building the Ark, the sounds of wood workers making their noises enter through the wall and into the church. It is a joyful noise when it conjures the faithfulness of Noah and God's covenant to save us. It is a joyful noise knowing how beautiful the restored wood looks.

The clackety clack of chairs and tables being folded makes an awful sound; but it is a sound that signals fellowship. Chairs are going up so that we can enjoy sacred meals together. These are just some of the joyful noises that I'm hearing these days.

But, of course, the joyful noise most directed in Psalm 100, is that of our singing. If we take a lesson from the workers and the children, then we will remember that it is not the quality of our sound (as we perceive it) that matters most, but our participation in it. A joyful noise does not mean musical perfection; it means participation. There is certainly a time and place for refined sounds that seek perfection, and silence. But these ought not be a barrier. The psalmist said to make joyful noise. The psalmist is imploring us to sing from our hearts – to generate vibrations from deep with our hearts – not the perfect refined and practice sound, but the sound of authentic spontaneous joy that we feel knowing God loves us and is with us and nothing can change that.

My dear friends in Christ, let's attune your ears to the joyful noises vibrating all around us, and make some of our own.

Facility Maintenance Update:









Windows: Both the east and west stained glass windows are undergoing a bit of repair, resealing, and repainting to ensure their protection and longevity. Martin Specialty Coatings has been working for several weeks to repair and replace damaged wood, sand, paint, and then coat the wood for UV and water protection.

To access the east window, a special lift had to be brought into the courtyard through the Parish Hall and then through the Parlor doors. Once completed, both windows will be protected for years to come.

Organ Restoration:

You can be a key player in the organ restoration project! As you know, our Casavant organ is in the process of releathering and restoration by the skilled craftsmen at R. A. Colby Organ Company. This restoration is an expensive endeavor requiring skilled craftsmanship throughout the restoration and reinstallation process. Restoration of the majority of the pipes will be completed by Christmas 2024, however tonal regulation will be ongoing until Easter 2025 when we will hear the organ in its full stature.

This is an expensive endeavor. The cost of this work is in the ballpark of \$600k. We are hopeful we can raise enough money to offset this major expense. We are asking you to be a key player in this historic undertaking by giving it your financial support above your regular tithe. You may want to consider this "Sponsor a Pipe" program:

Responsive Reading and Reading in Unison as Part of the Worship Service

In the Episcopal church the practice of responsive reading encourages the congregation to cease being passive spectators and to be active participants in the service itself.



Our time with God is to be un-hurried and so when reading, you will notice the worship leaders set the pace so that the congregation is not rushed, and reads at the rate of comprehension which isn't as fast as one might think. This gives the holy words a chance to sink in.

Similarly, when we read in unison, whether it is the Nicene Creed or the Psalms, or any other prayer, we recite the words aloud, together without rushing through them. The point is to meditate on the words, not to be finished with them. This reinforces the Word in our hearts and minds.

And what a joyful noise that is when all voices are raised together in worship!

A Service of Healing



The weekly Healing Eucharist with Laying on of Hands and Anointing takes place each Wednesday at 10 a.m. in the Chapel.

Laying hands on the sick was a common practice in the early church. Jesus often laid hands on people before healing them (Mark 6:5; Luke 4:40; 13:13).

Paul laid hands on a sick person and he was healed (Acts 28:8).

The service can be found in the *Episcopal Book of Occasional Services* and includes prayers of healing as well as anointing with oil, and laying on of hands. It is a peaceful, restorative service where we pray for each other's healing.

Whether healing is needed in our spirits, our minds, our emotions, or our relationships, this service may be just what you need.



Women's Sunday Book Study



Brotherhood of St. Andrew Breakfast




All men of the church are invited to the Brotherhood of St. Andrew Breakfast on Saturday, **September** 21 in the Parish Hall at

Presiding Bishop's Diocesan Visit




Presiding Bishop Michael Curry will visit our diocese September 21 - 22; his activities will be limited to the Alexandria area.

St. Paul's Players Season 2

St. Paul's Players opens its second season in October and will present three plays throughout the season and two special events.



Opening the season is The Canterville Ghost adapted by Tim Kelly from the Oscar Wilde short story. This hilarious play depicts an average American family who acquires historic old Canterville Chase - complete with ghost! Sir Simon, the sporting spirit, succeeds in making life miserable. Then the Americans strike


back. Pam and Wendy, daughters of the new owners, attack the poor ghost with cans of hairspray and deodorant. Sir Simon feels this is hardly fair, so he enlists the aid of some friends: Hester the Horrid, Lady Joan the Graveless, the Vampire Duchess, and other things that go bump in the night. Life is hectic and fantastically funny around Canterville Chase until the real solution to the problem of the galloping ghost is discovered.

In February, The Foreigner takes the stage. The scene is a fishing lodge in rural Georgia often visited by "Froggy" LeSueur who occasionally runs training sessions at a nearby army base. This time "Froggy" has brought along a friend, a pathologically

shy young man named Charlie who is overcome with fear at the thought of making conversation with strangers. So "Froggy," before departing, tells all assembled Charlie is from a foreign country and speaks no English. Once alone the fun really begins, as Charlie



overhears more than he should—the evil plans of a sinister, two-faced minister and his redneck associate; the fact that the minister's fiancée is pregnant; and many other revelations made with the thought that Charlie doesn't understand a word being said. That he does fuels the nonstop hilarity of the play and sets up the wildly funny climax in which things go uproariously awry for the "bad guys," and the "good guys" emerge triumphant.



Summer 2025 brings The Adventures of Tom Sawyer which takes place in a small fictional town in Missouri in the early 1800s. This classic tale follows the mischief of town trouble-maker Tom Sawyer, his friend Huckleberry Finn and first love Becky Thatcher. The play tackles themes of the boundless adventures of childhood, love, mischief and treasure hunting. Imaginative Tom cons his friends and fami-

ly to get out of chores and embark on dangerous adventure to find buried treasure and gets into some trouble along the way.

All proceeds from the season will support the St. Paul's 2025 Summer Mission Trip to the Cheyenne River Reservation in South Dakota.




out of work; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen*.
